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## LAMBETH

'WHERE have been a number of references in 'The Ringing World' to the Lambeth Conference. Peals have been rung in honour of the visit of overseas Bishops, and in various centres ringers have had the privilege of displaying their art to Bishops not familiar with the English tradition of change ringing.

This big conference has concluded, and the Bishops have published their findings in the form of an encyclical letter which they ask should be read in every place of worship in the Anglican Communion on October roth. Some might justly ask what this has to do with bellringing. The answer is that as bellringing is recog. nised as a service to the Church, so those who participate are servants of the Church, and as such the pronouncements in the Lambeth letter are of vital importance.

There is no place in the Church for those who will not try to honour the obligations of membership,' states the encyclical. 'We thankfully recognise how many do so honour them, how great is the zeal of many of our younger people, and bow much is owed to the witness of faithful congregations and to other office bearers. But all must take their full share.' The Bishop of Monmouth, in an address to Welsh ringers, put his finger on a point which is of much concern when he remarked that it puzzled him greatly why we, who spend so much time and energy in our ringing, should turn away from the service for which we ring. It is possible that the experience of the Lambeth discussions was uppermost in his mind.
One noticeable thing about ringess is the large number of happy marriages of husbands and wives finding a common interest in the service of ringing. 'We should not forget that faithful and happy marriages still far outnumber those that fail,' states the letter in urging a firm stand by members of the Church by word and example to uphold the sanctity of the marriage bond and to counteract those influences which tend to destroy it. Familiar, as all ringers are, with wedding bells, the public proclamation of such an act is, in our opinion, an added seal to the marriage contract, and we trust that this traditional practice will long continue.
This column is not the place for any dissertation upon the relationship of Church and State or Marxian Communism. We would, however, conclude with the pertinent observation that 'a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which be possesseth.' To possess much and to strive to possess more, states the letter, has been the cause of great evils and will continue to breed envy, hatred and strife under any economic system. The happi. ness that is to be found among many ringers is surely based on making other things than the quest of riches the main object of life. Perhaps the greatest contribution that we ordinary folk can make is in trying to bring the example of Christ into our everyday life. True, there will be many failures, but a courageous effort is well worth while. It is by the faithful discharge of the duties which men owe-to God by uprightness of life, to society by honest work, and to each other by bearing one another's bur-dens-that we shall leave this world as a better place than we found it.

Will the ringer who submitted the peal of Stedman Triples on August 21st at Old Basford, Nottingham, please send his name and address to the Editor?
Mr. C. T. Andrews, of Melksham, informs us that W. Pye's band did not ring Cambridge Maximum at Trowbridge but Cambridge Roval. The only Maximus previously rung has been Plain and Kent.
Mr. Herbert Barlow has now rung peals from 6 bells to 12 . He has been a member of the Lancashire Association since October, 1898, and his first Minor peal was on August 28th at Rochdale.
Mr. Jim Shepherd, of Swindon, who has recently been in hospital, is back in ringing circles again, and was among those who attended the meeting of the West Dorset Branch, Salisbury Guild, at Powerstock, last Saturday.
Three generations of the Jefferies family ring at Mangotsfield, near Bristol. Mr. J. G. Jefferies has his two sons and two grandsons all ringing with him. One of the family, $13-$ year-old M. Jefferies, rang his first quarter on September 3rd, 1,260 Grandsire Triples, ably guided by grandfather, the conductor.
The peal of Superlative Surprise Major on August 2nd at St. Mary's R.C. Church, Clapham, London, celebrating the centenary of the church, is worth noting. It was the first peal of Surprise on the bells and the first peal on them for nearly 40 years. The last was a peal of Stedman Triples, called by the same conductor, Mr. Thomas H. Taffender.

John A. L. Thompson, who scored his first peal of Bob Minor at Exhall, Warwickshire, on August 28th, has now rung peals of Plain Bob Minor, Major, Royal and Maximus.

'And all that is met by the fact that it was rung non-conducted and silent, and is the first non-conducted peal for all the ringers and for the Leicester Guild.

# THE TRURO DIOCESAN GUILD 

by the rev. A. S. ROBERTS.

oTOBER 8th. 1947, was the jubilee of the foundation of the Truro Diocesan Guild, which is now in its fifty-first year. On this day in 1897 a meeting was held at Truro Cathedral, then without nave, western towers or beils, under the presidency of Bishop Gott, who in his charge to the diocese in 1894 had devoted a section to bells and ringing, and had urged the formation of a guild. At that time only two towers were affliated to any guild, and they were St. Mary's, Penzance, and Gulval. which were linked to the Devon Guild.
Mention of these two towers brings into this early picture the name of Dr. John Symons, who was much concerned with ringing at these two towers, and who had called the first peal ever to be rung in Cornwall in 1883, at Penzance, which was Grandsire Triples. Ringing progress in Cornwall has alwass been helped from outside the diocese, and the things that make history in the Truro Guild prove the ralue of ringing tours and the encouragement they give.
Prior to this first meeting there had been a peal attempt (Superlative, which lasted two hours) at Kenwyn Church by a touring band, among them being the Rev F. E. Robinson (Master of the Oxford Guild) and the Rev. Maitland Kelly, who did so much for ringing in Devonshire. The Oxfurd and Exeter Dioceses, therefore, had an influence in the formation of the Truro Guild, for both Mr Rohinson and Mr. Kelly gave their advice, and Dr. Symons urged the formation of the Guild.
In 1898 ' The Constitution and Rules of the Truro Diocesan Guild of Ringers' appeared, having, been printed in Plymouth. The first festival was held at Veryan (six bells), the tower of the first secretary; the Rev (afterwards Canon) J. A. Kempe, in 1898, which was attended by seven bands of ringers, and indeed it was a full day-Holy Communion 8.30 a.m. luncheon 1 p.m., special ringers' service 3 p.m. tea $5 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$., harvest thanksgiving service $7 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$., with ringing by the various bands the whole while between each. The day was a Tuesday

## To Overcome prize ringing

These festivals were held each year, and a carefully prepared programme drawn up with each band of ringers attending being alliocated a certain time for ringing. Such a method had to be, for there was little or no change ringing. except what a 'special band , could do, and the whole object of the Guild was to overcome the prize ringing which was then rampant throughout the county, and which still does exist in East and South-East Cornwall; there is, however, none in the western half of the county.
Prize ringing generally has succumbed to the progressive influence of the Diocesan Guild, and the fact of its diocesan status. Although money prizes are still given, the area in which prize ringing still operates has gradually aiminished. There was an agreement between towers in a certain area not many years ago that monev prizes should he given up, and this brought into being the Mid-Cornwali Association as a branch of the Diocesan Guild. At this branch's festivals certificates are awarded to those bands which attain a certain standard of striking. Some such local effort was made at Lanlivery in 1911 after there had been much disagreement over money prizes.
The following elaborate invitation to take part is of unique interest:-

To the Ringers of the Tower of Grentlemen. An Open Competition in the Art of Round Rincing will be held in the Tower of Saint Dunstan, Lanlivery. on S. Dunstan's Day. Mar 19th. 1911. The Prizes will be 1st A Certificate that-in the opinion of the Judges-the Set named therein were, indiridually and collectively, worthy to be considered MASTER RTNGERS of the Order of
S. Dunstan; 2nd, COMPANIONS of the Order of S. Dunstan; 3rd, BROTHERS of the Order of S . Dunstan; 4 th and following, Certificate of ability to ring a good Round Peal to all who satisfy the Judges. A ribbon embroidered with 8,6 , 4 or 2 Bells will be given to each successful competitor as a token.

The Rules will be according to Ancient Custdm, provided that Ringers be certified by the Captain of their Tower as Bona Fide Operative Ringers who have rung for service during the past year. The names of intending competitors must be sent in to us on or before 10th May. No entrance fee. Donations to defray expenses will be received by Mr. W. H. Rundie, Lanlivery. Hoping to meet all our old friends and enjoy a quiet day, We are, Gentlemen. Yours fraternally. BENJAMIN ROSKILLY, Capt. W. H RUNDLE, Vice-Capt. and Treas

Such a gathering as this was outside the Diocesan Guild, but it is the kind of thing that helped some to give up their old ways.
The first printed report appeared for the year 1902, and in this it is shown that there were 13 towers in union with the Guild. The 1947 report shows 65 towers in union, and 13 under the Mid-Cornwall Association. A total of 78. The purpose of affiliating towers, and so accepting all the members of such towers as members of the Guild, has been kept up and found generally successful as it keeps the tower, and ringers too, sacred from prize ringing.

## DR. SYMONS' WORK

The general history of the Gui'd shows what a tremendous amount of pioneering work had to be done br a few, and in this Dr. Symons, who died in 1944. was one of the few practical ringers to do it. He was successivelv Master and President of the Fuild, and it is now proposed to place a bell to his memory at Madron Parish Church when the present six are augmented to eight.
His daughter, Miss Eileen Symons, the present president of the Guild. has loaned me some of his books and papers which show his immense interest in bells and everything pertaining thereto for manv cuttings have been preserved, details of all the bells of Cornwall
were kept almost up to date, letters from various ringers of bygone days, and one which shows that even in his surgery he was studying method ringing many years ago. It reads Dear Dr. Symons, Kindly send me another Bottle of the Sleeping, Draught. Yours truly Feb. 10th, 1881.' This short request is written on a double sheet of note-paper, and on all four sides there are closely written details of how to ring Grandsire Doubles and Triples.
Dr. Symons worked with four secretaries, first, Canon Kempe, and then with Canons H H. Mills and H. $\mathbf{R}$ Jennings, and with the present secretary, the Rev. W. H. R. Trewhella, who has provided Cornwall with two sixes-at Zennor and Crantock. When Dr. Symons became president in 1930 he was succeeded by Lt.-Col. C. F. Jerram, who was followed in 1938 by Mr. W. H. Southeard, of Truro, who is the present Master.
Method ringing is still only found at a few centres and generally it is confined to the standard methods. The greatest problem is to provide instructors, and their work is made harder by the fact that few towers have any tradition of change ringing. However, progress during the second half of the fifty years is most evident, and again touring bands have done good in that they have inspired enthusiasts to emulate their successes.
One of the greatest works for the Guild has been done by Mr. C. E. Lanxon, the present peals secretary, who collected and wrote up all the peals rung for the Guild, having just passed the 150 mark. Previously no proper records had been kept. The first peal for the Guild was not rung until 1907, and this was at Emmanuel, Plymouth. The same year a touring band rang six peals, and this inspired peals at Kea and Kenwwn, both near Truro, where locals with the heln of visitors rang eight peals of Grandsire Triples between 1909 and 1911. Dr. Symons took part in some of these.
There were some three or four more up to 1913. but the war had its effect and no more were rung until 1926-- a space of 13 vears In this rear a touring band rang the tirst peal of Royal (Kent T.B.) at the Cathedral, and this inspired some locals who got to work and with the help of Plymouth ringers in the next vear, 1927, fourteen peals were credited to the Guild. I find my name in twelve of these.

The first neal on eight by all Cornish ringers for the Guild was at Penzance in 1933, fifty years after Dr. Symons' peal there, and the first on eight for the Guild by a hand from one tower was at Lanhvdrock in 1934: the band was from the Cathedral. Roth peals were Grandsire Triples and I had the honour of conducting both. The greatest a chievement so far was the peal of Bob Roval at the Catherra? in the Jubilee Year, but the peal was rung for the Diamond Jubilee of the Cathedral and the credit goes to Mr. C. E. Lanxon, who is the first Cornishman to conduct a ten-bell peal. Mr. Lanzon, too is the only Cornishman who has called one of his own compositions this being Bob Major at Roche: on this occa sion we rang two peals by beginning with Stedman Triples in the morning at Lanivet, but several visitors were in both neals.

A summary of the neals shows that during the first 25 vears of the Guild's life 19 neals were rung. and local membew took nart in seven of these. During the last 25 vears 134 pea's have been rung and resident members have fal-en nart in over 100 and it is now the custom to ring peals without outside help. It is fitting that the greatest number of peals a one inwer has been rung at the Cathedral. 15 in all. with the neighbouring towers of Kea and Kenwrn claiming ten each.
The general condition of the bells in Cornwal] is excellent. and the countr has been a good

## FROM THE EDITOR'S MAILBAG

## Ringing To-day

BLACK SPOTS-SUGGESTED CAUSES.
Dear Sir,-The recent historical surveys of our great ringing associations which have appeared in 'The Ringing World,' particularly the more recent one of the Kent County Association, impel me to write. The surveys give some idea of the progress made in the art during the past 50 or 60 years, which from a peal-ringing point of view are undoubtedly remarkable. Very noteworthy progress in peals and methods rung has been made throughout the Exercise during the past 20 years. Can the same be said of Sunday service ringing?
The avowed aim of the fourteen Associations to which I belong are roughly similar:-
(1) The maintenance and encouragement of service ringing in all the churches.
(2) The cultivation of the art of change ringing.
(3) Belfry reform-whatever that may mean.
During the 42 years of my ringing life I have at various times been resident in the areas covered by the Midland Counties Association, Middlesex County Association, London County and Bedfordshire Associations, and have always given precedence to service ringing. Further, I have had opportunity to visit on Sundays towers in Essex, Herts, Sussex and Surrey. I have for the past 18 months been a resident member of the Kent County Association (Canterbury District). My experiences prompt the questions: Why is it that local service ringing is so much better in some areas than in others? Is it to the credit or default of the County Association or Diocesan Guild that such marked differences occur ${ }^{\text {P }}$ Do some Associations, in fact, give as much attention to this aspect of their work as their rules imply? Why, for instance, can Luton-who do not ring pealsring excellent London Surprise, whilst Canterbury, a much older home of ringing, ring only bad Grandsire?
I am aware that many areas where the local bands reach a good standard owe the fact to having been fortunate in the past in that they have had the sustained assistance of enthusiasts who knew how to handle a bell properly and took pains to teach others to do so. I am convinced that this matter of proper bell control is the crux of all progress and good- striking, and that many Associations do not fully realise the debt they owe to these strong men of the past who insisted on proper handling first. Again, do our Associations use their influence to the full to encourage the clergy to know something of the art and to encourage good ringing? Are some of our County Associations, in the light of present-day demands, too unwieldy to admit of proper instruction being given to recruits? Perhaps my friends of the Leicester Diocesan Guild could give some idea of the benefits or defects of the smaller unit.

The fact remains there are many black spots. Morsover they often exist within the areas of our largest and most peal-prolific Associations. The Kent County Association (Canterbury District) covers an area of some

customer to the bellfounders. Of the fortr octaves all are in good going order; only some two or three sixes out of about ninety are out of order, and these are to be restored, and several are a waiting augmentation to eight, a dozen or more fives are quite ringable. There is a love of ringing in Cornwall. and this keeps the bells in good order, and one must credit even prize ringing with doing this also, but the Truro Diocesan Guild was founded for the cause of the best and most progressive trpe of ringing. and in this it must be loval to its founders.

30 miles' radius. It has in affiliation 51 towers- 2 twelve, 1 ten, 18 eights, 21 sixes, 9 fives-all more or less in good ringable condition. It has some 200 members. There is no dearth of recruits. Yet it is the exception to ring even a passable touch in a simple method at either district meeting, practice or service. The number who can strike a bell properly are very few, and it is impossible to find a band for a standard method peal without seeking the aid of "crack ringers ' from North Kent, Ashford or Maidstone. Why is this? The recruits coming forward are in many cases left to the mercy of teachers who cannot themselves ring and never will. Towers are in the hands of socalled ringers who cannot even ring rounds, yet the elergy in their ignorance of ringing look upon them as efficient instructors. Such a state of affairs is not to the credit of an Association so influential as Kent County.

Perhaps a drastic pruning operation and replanting in good soil of the pieces lopped off would bring forth new life.

## ST. COLUMB DOUBLES

Dear Sir,-In the past the term 'method' as applied to Dofibles methods has taken on a certain loose meaning which it would seem advisable to accept, having consideration for the achievements in the five-bell field. Records were set up, claiming that a number of different methods had been rung, and, as far as one can discover, no voice was raised in protest until Mr. Barnett happened to read an Australian paper.

April Day (Grandsire single leads applied as bobs to Plain Bob), Old Doubles (Plain Bob with an 'extreme' bob) and Norfolk Doubles (Plain Bob using both 'ordinary' and 'ex treme' bobs) are of considerable antiquity and have been rung over a long period of vears in company with others like Fortune, Hudibras, Antelope and those intriguing extents called Jolly Dick and Jack o' Both Sides.

On April 30th, 1883, the Cretingham (Suffolk) men rang a peal of Doubles and the Norwich Diocesan Association noted 'the remarkable performance of the Cretingharn Branch, who rang 5,040 changes on five bells in twenty-one different methods." This peal included April Day, Old Doubles and Fortune, together with Gog Magog (which may have heen what is so called in at least one district the three-part extent of Grandsire produced by plain lead, single, bob, single).

It is therefore a little late in the day to castigate these Doubles methods and certainly illogical to suggest that peals containing these methods and others constructed on the same principle may not be used to break records. If, for example, April Day is a method-and a very large number of ringers has accepted it as such-then St. Columb is also a Doubles method. The object of all record-breaking is to surpass previous achievements performed on a certain basis, and Mr. Pink and his band are fairly entitled to claim that they have set up a record in ringing a peal in forty-two Doubles methods.- Fours faifhfully,
