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## YORKSHIRE'S MESSAGE

THIS week-end the leaders of the Exercise will assemble at York for the meeting of the Central Council. Yorkshire ringers are sparing no pains to make the occasion worthy of their guests, and Mr. L. W. G. Morris, the hon. secretary of the host Association, has had a particularly onerous time in answering the many queries of the visitors.

Yorkshire has a new president in the Rev. C. O. Ellison, who was introduced to the Council at their last meeting in London within a few days of accepting office. The familiar face of Canon C. C. Marshall will be missed. His long tenure of office has been followed by his recent death. He left Yorkshire in the hope that in the warmth of Devonshire he would be restored to health after his accident, but it was not to be.

As the largest county in England, Yorkshire takes its appropriate place in the annals of English ringing with 1,520 members. Its ringing is also of a high standard, and it is interesting to note that more than one-third of the 1948 peals rung for the Association was of Surprise methods. There was a time when Kent Treble Bob was the 'backbone' method of the Association, so much so that it came to be dubbed 'Yorkshire Glory.' A great change has undoubtedly taken place, comments Mr. W. Barton, the hon. peal secretary, 'for it will be noticed, perhaps with wonder, that only two peals of Kent appear in this year's list; this is a break in tradition that none of us will deplore so long as the accurate striking which was a feature of the old Treble Bob ringing, is maintained.'

The Association makes a strong point in not belittling peals rung in standard methods, especially where a young band is struggling in the elementary stages or where there is little or no opportunity to practise the more advanced methods. 'To our members who are so placed our message is: Keep on trying, and when you attend an Association meeting go with the fixed determination that you will ring something you cannot get at home. In the meantime your peals of Grandsire and Plain Bob are just as welcome to us as the Surprise peals rung by your more experienced brethren.'

This sentiment, we feel sure, will receive general endorsement. Contrary to what has been expressed in certain quarters, the yard stick of English ringing is the peal and not the 10-minute touch. The peal demonstrates the mastery of the method as a ringer and later as a conductor. Peal ringing is not, as some of our readers indicate, confined to a few. Among the resident members of the Yorkshire Association no fewer than 202 rang peals last year and 564 have peals recorded to their credit in the last report of the Association. In addition there is a very long list of out-of-county members who are peal ringers. It cannot be over-emphasised that where ringers have peal experience the standard of Sunday service ringing is at its highest.

## THE YORKSHIRE ASSOCIATION

### Tribute to Canon Marshall

The annual meeting of the Association took place in glorious weather at Selby Abbey on May 7th, and was attended by upwards of 130 members and friends, representative of all the districts. The fine ring of ten was going early to Stedman Caters and Cambridge Royal, and at 4.15 a brief service was held, conducted by the Vicar. An excellent tea was afterwards partaken of in the Hawdon Institute, followed by the general meeting.

The chair was taken by the president, the Rev. C. O. Ellison, who said the meeting was being held under the cloud of the passing of Canon C. C. Marshall, their former president, and the meeting stood in silence as a tribute. Canon Marshall had been the unfortunate victim of a road accident early in 1947, and tendered his resignation to the annual general meeting at St. Chad's, Headingley, in May of that year.

His untimely resignation was received with unanimous regret, and it was hoped a restful retirement would restore him to health. Most unfortunately this did not prove to be the case, and in his passing the Association has lost one of its staunchest supporters.

Unanimous votes of thanks were accorded to the Vicar, churchwardens, organist and local company in their combined efforts to make the meeting the great success it was.

In presenting the 73rd annual report, the President said it was most gratifying to note that 149 new members had been enrolled during the year, which, after deducting those who had lapsed and passed away, represented a net increase of all but 100 on last year's total. Reports from the districts showed that the work of the Association had steadily progressed, and that a lively interest was being maintained.

The peal secretary's report showed that 111 peals had been rung during the year, 106 on tower bells and five on handbells, at 59 churches and two handbell centres and was an increase of nine on last year's total. Of this total there was one peal of Surprise Maximus, five of Surprise Royal and 33 of Surprise Major, including one Spliced in four methods. The 111 peals rung had been shared between 38 different conductors, headed by the general secretary, Mr. L. W. G. Morris, who had called 23 peals, three of Surprise Royal and 20 of Surprise Major, and now had the double distinction of having rung 200 peals for the Association, 100 of which he had conducted.

#### RISE IN COSTS: A WARNING.

The balance sheet showed a loss on the year's working of £23, and the committee had felt the need to add a word of warning that this situation could not be tolerated indefinitely, but in the hope that the cost of printing the annual report, which was easily the largest single item

of expense, had reached its peak, had deferred recommending an increase in subscriptions for the ensuing year.

A unanimous vote of thanks to the treasurer and hon. auditors was accorded on the motion of Mr. B. Sutton, seconded by Mr. S. Steel.

Mr. S. F. Palmer was re-elected treasurer for the next three years on the motion of Mr. P. J. Johnson, seconded by Mr. W. Barton. Mr. Palmer, in acknowledging his re-election, said that he was getting on in years, but his interest was as great as ever, and he would be pleased to continue to serve as long as he was able to do so. Mr. W. Barton was unanimously re-elected peal secretary, and in acknowledgment thanked the members for their renewed confidence and paid tribute to the assistance he had received from Miss Molly

Cross.

## Midland Counties Guild

### THIRD ANNUAL MEETING AT BURTON.

King Edward Square, Burton-on-Trent, with its monument, municipal buildings, gardens and the stately Church of St. Paul in the background, formed a picturesque scene to the ringers who were present at the annual meeting of the Guild, held at this church on May 4th.

The grand ring of ten, under the supervision of the Ringing Master (Mr. B. G. Key), was well patronised in various methods by those who attended. The company included the oldest and youngest ringers in the area, Mr. Dunkley, of Tamworth (81 years), and Norman Cotton, of Overseal (8 years).

There were nine conductors—two less than in 1947. The secretary stressed the need for younger members to aspire to the art of conducting.

The treasurer (Mr. J. H. Brittan) presented a favourable balance sheet, pointing out that the £13 deficit balance of 1947 had almost been cleared. Both reports were adopted.

Election of officers for 1949 resulted in the president (Mr. W. W. Worthington), chairman, Ringing Master, treasurer, secretary and auditor being unanimously re-elected and thanked for their services. Four committee members were elected: Messrs. E. W. Beads Moore, W. J. Leach, S. H. Jones and W. F. Woodward.

Written notice had been given by Mr. E. W. Beads Moore, supported by Mr. J. H. Brittan, that Rule 7 be amended to read, 'The annual meeting be held the second Saturday in January each year,' and was passed after discussion.

Following inspection of the new Guild Certificate, it was decided by 25 votes to 9 that they be issued gratis to all members later.

An omnibus vote of thanks, proposed by Mr. B. G. Key, to the Archdeacon of Derby, Vicar of St. Paul's for use of bells, and to the local ladies who had so ably prepared the tea, brought the meeting to a close.

## LEICESTER DIOCESAN GUILD

### 1948 A YEAR OF PROGRESS.

Full use was made of the Leicester bells during the afternoon of May 7th, the occasion being the annual meeting. Members and friends from a wide area were present at the service, held in the Church of St. George. The Vicar, the Rev. Adams, in his address, spoke of the history of St. George's Church and bells. The company of over 150 enjoyed an excellent tea in the Church Hall.

The president, Mr. H. J. Poole, was supported by the Guild officers at the meeting, also by Mr. H. W. Perkins. The president welcomed the visitors, among whom were Messrs. E. J. White, G. Freebrey, J. F. Wilkinson, H. C. Edwards, P. K. Williamson and Mrs. and Miss Beamish, the last named being complimented on her achievements.

The President remarked on the very successful year and expressed the Guild's thanks to the general officers and to the district officers, especially the district secretaries, who seldom saw their work in print, but carried out their very essential work behind the scenes. In particular, the Lubenham people had expressed their grateful thanks for the help they had received from the Market Harborough District.

He mentioned the recent repairs and additions to the bells at Hunnerstone, Aylestone, Birstall, Shepshed, Markfield and Somerby, and said they should be grateful to the local clergy and local ringers. Often augmentations were due to the local ringers urging their parsons on.

The young ringers were to be congratulated on their progress; he was glad to see so many coming along, as the future belonged to them. First pealers were congratulated. All stood in silence in memory of the ringers lost during the year; among these were Mr. J. Garrett, the Rev. Beresford, Messrs. C. Marshall, Jackson, Singleton, J. Dean and H. Stubbs.

The Hon. General Secretary, in his report, said that all districts had reported a busy and successful year. In particular, Syston District had visited every tower and had held two joint meetings. Market Harborough had collected over £6 for the Bell Repair Fund, a very good effort. Hinckley had held 15 meetings, all well attended. They also had found time for their annual dinner, socials and a few dances. The district also arranged special practices in, to most members, new methods, resulting in raising the general standard of ringing.

### 118 NEW MEMBERS.

The second festival, held on October 16th, was supported by members and friends numbering about 150. In 1947 the number of towers in the Guild was 91; there are now 95. The book membership now stood at 941 ringing members. During the year 118 new ringing and 28 non-resident members were enrolled.

## A WORCESTERSHIRE BENEFACTION

The birthday peal of Grandsire Caters at Claines, near Worcester, was a gesture to Mr. Percy Thomas, whose gifts to his Parish Church include five new bells and a clock.

Originally a ring of five Claines bells were made eight in 1927 by the addition of three trebles, in memory of Mr. Thomas' father, Emanuel Thomas, J.P. In 1940 Mr. Thomas gave two trebles to make the present ring of ten, in memory of his mother. His most recent gift has been the installation of an electric clock, with two faces on the tower and Westminster chimes. This was given to the memory of his wife, Mrs. Florence Elizabeth Thomas.

He is well known to Worcestershire and Birmingham ringers for his love of bells and clocks, and visitors to his home are always intrigued by his remarkable collection of clocks with their varied chimes.

When Worcester Cathedral bells were recast in 1928 Mr. Thomas gave of his services freely and was instrumental in raising a large sum of money from subscribers who had connections with his business. He has also been generous with other restorations in the Worcester area.

To date, 410 Guild Certificates had been sold. The peal secretary's report was, in the absence of Mr. E. Morris, read. It showed that in 1948 the Guild came third in the list of societies for peal ringing; 114 tower and 27 handbell peals had been rung, a total of 141. The peals rung included the first peals for the Guild of Erin Caters, Lincolnshire and Stanton Surprise and also Edinburgh Delight. Cambridge had been rung from Minor to Maximus, and Yorkshire from Major to Maximus. The first pealers numbered 29; 184 rang their first in a new method. Three new conductors appeared.

The hon. treasurer, Mr. A. E. Rowley, in his report, said the funds of the Guild were in a very healthy state. The Bell Repair Fund, having had no calls during the year, had reached £188 17s. 3d. The general funds amounted to £74 6s. 11d.

Mr. H. J. Poole was re-elected president. Four vice-presidents had been nominated. Of these, Messrs. A. Ballard and J. Carter asked for their names to be withdrawn, leaving Mr. E. C. Turner and Mr. P. L. Taylor, who were elected. The hon. general secretary, Mr. W. A. Wood, and the hon. treasurer, Mr. A. E. Rowley, were both re-elected and thanked for their services. Mr. S. Burton was elected as peal secretary.

### PEALS ON MEETING DAYS.

In supporting a motion deprecating the increase in the number of peals attempted at the same time as a general meeting is being held, frequently in the same locality, Mr. E. C. Turner recalled passing the tower at Claybrooke when on the way to the last quarterly meeting at Lutterworth. A peal was then in progress. Mr. Turner said the officers of the Guild, chosen freely by members, should be treated with respect, not as individuals, but as representatives of the Guild. The arrangement of peals on general meeting days, often in nearby towers, was not showing this respect. He had no wish to discourage peal ringing, but members had rung peals on the general meeting days.

Mr. K. Roe supported and other speakers spoke of district meetings having to be cancelled because some towers were not available by reason of peals having been recently rung.

The meeting was practically unanimous in favour of the motion, no one voting against. The President announced that grants had that week been made to two tower repair funds, one of 10 guineas and one of 20 guineas. This brought the total granted this year to 50 guineas.

It was decided to hold the festival and dinner later in the year. A social followed, which was enjoyed by many until a late hour.

## ESSEX ASSOCIATION NORTHERN DISTRICT.

Seventy members and friends from 19 parishes, which is believed to be a record for the district, attended the meeting at Dunmow on May 7th.

At the Association's service, the Vicar, the Rev. Callum, gave the address, and the Master, Dr. Spencer-Phillips, read the lesson. An excellent tea was supplied and prepared by the Dunmow ringers and their wives.

Miss H. G. Snowden, the District Master, presided at the business meeting, when 12 new members were elected. It was decided to hold a practice at Great Easton on June 11th.

## GLOUCESTER AND BRISTOL

Regret was expressed at the Cheltenham Branch meeting at Alderton that the local captain, Mr. G. Banner, was in hospital for an operation. The meeting also stood in silence to remember Mr. G. Agg, recently buried at Alderton, who joined the branch in 1925. Ringing ranged from Grandsire to Cambridge.

## OBITUARY

### MR. ALEXANDER SHARP.

By the death of Mr. Alexander Sharp, of Freiston, near Boston, at the age of 75, the Eastern Branch of the Lincoln Diocesan Guild loses its oldest member.

'Zan,' as he was familiarly known to all his friends, commenced ringing at the early age of seven, and had therefore been ringing for a period of 68 years. Of a quiet and kindly disposition, he was endeared to all with whom he came in contact and will be much missed in ringing circles. He was not a great peal ringer, having rung only four peals, one of Bob Major and three of Minor.

He was laid to rest in the village churchyard near to the bells he loved so well on May 22nd, four of his fellow-ringers—Messrs. H. Harper, E. Barnes, A. Burchinal and G. Dawson—acting as bearers. In the evening, with the bells half-muffled, 1,272 Kent Treble Bob Minor was rung, this being his favourite method. F. D.

### MR. WILLIAM BIDNELL, HYTHE.

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## LETTERS

## KEEPING THE ART ALIVE

Dear Sir,—There is one sentence in Mr. Corby's letter published in 'The Ringing World' of May 13th with which I feel I must join issue. It is the final paragraph which states, *inter alia*, 'It is the peal ringers who keep the art alive. . . . I could not disagree with him more.'

Casting one's mind over the ringers one knows, I fail to see how it can possibly be disagreed that the percentage who are the slightest degree interested in ringing peals is very small—unless, of course, one moves in a peal ringing circle only. The backbone of the Exercise are not the few who specialise in peal ringing, but the majority who go on, Sunday after Sunday, just ringing for service and practising what they preach by attending the service also.

I feel that we are passing through an era where such a fetish is being made of peal ringing that we are in danger of beginning to mistake the shadow for the substance; the means for the end. Church bells exist to be rung on Sunday to call people to church, not for a band of experts to amuse themselves with on a week-day. Happily, the majority of ringers are regular service ringers, and for that reason the art would pursue the even tenor of its way even if there was no peal ringing.

Moreover, there is one thing that can very definitely be held against peal ringers. They are the culprits who cause those wrothful letters which one reads from time to time in the papers, written by bell haters who complain of the 'excessive din' or suchlike phrase. Most bell haters I have spoken to will admit—albeit reluctantly—that a practice night in the week may be necessary, but they immediately follow it up by asking why is it necessary to ring the bells for three hours on end without a pause? Why indeed?

Do not think, sir, that I am against peal ringing—far from it; but let us get things in their true perspective. In the structure which is the brotherhood of ringers it is the regular Sunday ringers who are the main foundations and walls; peal ringers are the adornments, the pinnacles, the gargoyles, what you will. They may make the structure more ornate, but as a structure it would get on just as well, and be just as useful, without them. If a band has put in a year's regular Sunday ringing and feel like celebrating with a peal, good luck to them. Such an occasion as the birth of Prince Charles is a justifiable reason for a peal. Again, a young band of ringers not long able to ring (say) Grandsire Triples would be much encouraged by the successful achievement of a peal. But an occasional peal of that sort would hardly qualify the band for being considered peal addicts and are not, therefore, I take it, the 'peal ringers' who Mr. Corby has in mind. He states categorically that it is the peal ringers who keep the art alive. I am prepared to state, equally emphatically, that in my view peal ringing, *per se*, does little or nothing for the good of the Exercise.

One feels that habitual peal ringing is something in the nature of a psychological disease, which, like other things taken to excess, is liable to strike deeply at the moral fibre of the unfortunate sufferer. It is time habitual peal ringing was recognised for what it is—the selfish pastime of a few.—Yours faithfully,

## VARIATIONS IN DOUBLES

Dear Sir,—In Mr. E. Morris' last paragraph he asks that each variation should be given a different name. What constitutes a variation? Am I right in assuming that a method with, say four working bells, should have a plain course of four leads?

If so, what is the plain course of several of the methods frequently rung, viz., St. Dunstan's, London Single, Oxford Bob and Antelope? In Antelope there are three working bells and one in the hunt. But the plain course is incomplete, as two leads bring up rounds. April Day is Plain Bob with a Grand-sire Single. Its plain course is identical with Bob Doubles.

How many methods does Mr. Morris' band think they rang at Dingley on May 3rd? In my opinion there are two, as the spliced arrangements are all Grandsire.

I would be interested to see the figures of the four different callings of April Day, which I am awaiting from the conductor, as required by our Guild rules, under which title the peal was rung.

## TWO TYPES OF PEALS?

Sir,—Could not the question of normal v. condensed peal reports be solved by having both types? There are still many ringers, who only ring one or two peals a year, to whom the ringing of a peal is sufficiently noteworthy to justify the printing of peal cards, and I suggest that those who order peal cards should have the type set as at present, the proposed condensed setting being reserved for the remainder.

This should enable more space to be available for other matters, especially if the paper ration will run to a 16-page issue, which I think the committee should have no hesitation in producing as a 4d. paper, especially if it could be made more attractive. One's mind goes back to the period during the war-time ban when no peals were reported. There must be many new ringers who have not had the opportunity of seeing the wonderful historical articles which appeared during that period, and it is a matter for consideration whether some of these should not be reprinted, and further matter from the same source used, if such is available. Such a reminder of the way things were kept going during that difficult time should be a stimulus to those who have joined the ringing fraternity since then.—I am, sir, yours, etc.,
