AUSTRALIA CALLING!

DURING the past three years there have been 67,000 British emigrants to Austalia, and Mr. Philip L. Cooper, of 26, North Street, Collinswood, Adelaide, S.A., writes as a member of St. Peter's Cathedral Bellringers' Society on behalf of his fellow-members that he is sure that there must be some ringers among this new population, but to their knowledge none have appeared in Australian towers.

There are about 30 towers in Australia of which about 20 are ringing, and he suggests this should be made known to the ringing public at home. 'Change ringing in Australia has made great strides in the last three years, and if some ringing emigrants were here they would be of invaluable help to us. In Adelaide there are three towers, two of which are ringing. Our tower, as you probably know, is only two years old. It has a ring of eight by John Taylor and Co., with a tenor of 41 cwt., the largest swinging bell in the Southern Hemisphere.

'Many emigrant ships pass through Adelaide, and we extend a very cordial invitation to any ringer, emigrant or tourist, who comes to Adelaide to visit us. We ring for half an hour before each of the Sunday services, which are at 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. Our practice night is on Tuesdays from 7.15 to 8.45 p.m. Such ringers are asked to ring or write to either myself (tel. M2793) or to our captain, Mr. P. R. Vincent, 25, Brandreth Street, Tusmore (tel. F3515).

'I am sure that all towers in Australia would give similar welcomes, especially to emigrants, who would find in their fellowringers of Australia staunch friends for their future living. It was mainly the British Navy personnel who were stationed at Sydney during the war that put change ringing on its feet in Australia. We hope that ringer-emigrants can carry on where they had to finish. Australia must have English ringers of experience if it wishes to progress thoroughly in its change ringing.

'We hope that through the medium of "The Ringing World" all English ringers will know that they are really welcome in Australia. There are six ringing towers in Sydney, two in Adelaide, one in Melbourne, two at Hobart, one at Christchurch, N.Z. (two more elsewhere in New Zealand). There are several other towers in N.S.W. and Victoria which are in the country areas.'

The Central Council naturally watches very closely ringing in Australia. At York this year Mr. W. Rowe, of the New South Wales Association, was re-elected an hon. member, as a tribute to the fine work he is doing at Sydney, which includes the production of 'Ringing Towers,' the monthly bulletin, which aims at developing the family spirit and at the same time providing instruction. By his office as an hon. member he is thus the Central Council's direct representative. We in England want our Australian friends to know that it is our desire to help them in every possible way. To ringers at home who are thinking of starting a new life in Australia or New Zealand, we would impress upon them the advantages of the right hand of fellowship that has been extended to them. Contacts before sailing are very helpful.

METHOD EXTENSION.

The following notice of motion was submitted by the Universities Association: 'That this Council undertakes to review the principles of method structure, with the purpose of adopting criteria for the recognition of the extended form of a basic method.'

Dr. Hatcher said as a new member of the Council of the 1948-9 vintage, to use the phrase of the Biographical Committee, he did not anticipate that his maiden speech would mark such an important occasion as the presentation of the motion on method extension. He did so in the name of the Universities Association following a resolution at its last general meeting which took the form of an amendment to a proposition about London Royal. But while reluctant to make a rapid decision on the precise nature of extended London, this meeting gave full support to the idea of considering the problem of extension in more general terms.

Most methods were treble dominated with plain or treble bob hunting paths. They might be simple with a principle defining duty bells ratelative to certain, often extreme, treble positions not multiplied in frequency as the number of bells was increased (e.g., Plain Bob, Kent Treble Bob), or were more complicated with a principle defining duty of bells relative to these positions, and also to other internal positions which did increase with the number of bells (e.g., Cambridge). For a method of the latter type it would be evident that the minimum number of bells involved was that which sufficed for the inde-pendence, or non-interference, of the two types of duty.

From that point of view a method which could be extended at all could be extended upwards indefinitely, each addition of two bells giving an extra internal set of positions. Thus a method principle had for its expression a minimum number of positions which was variable according to the spatial implications of the duties, but an indefinite maximum, e.g., Plain Bob from four upwards, Cambridge

e.g., Plain Bob from four upwards, Cambridge six upwards, Yorkshire eight upwards. Such extensions of the basic method, however, in many cases did not conform to accepted lead-end requirements, and in the case of these methods attempts had been made to produce legitimate extension by modification of the structural ideal. Here was the real problem, and there might be a large number of such variants claiming recognition number of such variants claiming recognition as the accepted extended form. This was exactly the position with London, in which method some 16 versions for the Royal ex-tension had been published in the last 40 years.

It was not his intention to comment there on the respective virtues or vices of these versions of London Royal. All he would do was to emphasise the urgent need for the Council to go into the matter thoroughly and then give the Exercise guidance.

In proposing the motion he would suggest that, if adopted, those entrusted with the responsibility of making the review of method structure should present a report to be published either in book form or in a series of articles in 'The Ringing World,' before the Central Council was asked to take any decision.

The Secretary: In the absence of Miss Cross I beg formally to second. At the same time it is my duty to given you the recommenda-tion of the Standing Committee that the motion be accepted and referred to the Methods Committee for report.

Mr. E. A. Barnett: It is merely an easy way of getting out of something the Standing Committee does not understand, and speaking for one member of the Methods Commit-tee he does not either (laughter).

The recommendation of the Standing Committee was carried.

NEXT MEETING

The Chairman said the Gloucester and Bristol Association had invited the Council to Cheltenham and the Sussex County Associa-tion to Eastbourne. The Standing Committee recommended Eastbourne, as they understood there would be a difficulty about accommodation at Cheltenham.

Mr. C. H. Kippin proposed that the next Council meeting be held at Bournemouth. The bells of Eastbourne could not be called firstrate, and there were not many towers in the vicinity. At Bournemouth there were ideal arrangements for ringing and accommodation.

TRENCHANT REPLY TO LIBRA

Dear Sir,-I must say that I deplore the leading article on Method Extension in this week's 'Ringing World.' As a personal opinion, among the correspondence it would not be out of place, even if written under a nom de plume (and I suppose this is really necessary?), but to have it in the position it is, where one expects to find an unbiased attempt to deal with all sides of a question, even though some definite conclusion is reached, is most certainly out of place. It reached, is most certainly out of place. could be taken as an attempt to coerce the Methods Committee in its work-to get them to rule the matter out of hand without the conscientious consideration of all points, which I have already asked the members to try to do even though they may (and I know some do) feel very strongly about it. I trust this is not so—at any rate, the Council may be assured that the matter will be properly investigated, even though the final conclusion may be the obvious one.

Again, even in the correspondence columns I would feel the general tone of the letter to be biased to the extent of unkindness. One of the things which I have found among some C.C. members (speaking as a newcomer) is this tendency to be really unkind to those who say or do something they dislike. Of course, nobody expects (I hope) that everybody will agree with his opinion on any matter, but I think it is only common justice to expect that that opinion will be respected and not simply treated with scorn and derision. It has hap-pened to me, both by word and in 'The Ringing World,' and I fear I can detect the same spirit in this letter concerning Dr. Hatcher. Can anyone deny that the remarks about his speech are almost insulting and certainly most unkind?

Then, too, isn't the comparison of the present and the past also both unkind and dangerous? As far as I know, no present-day expert has claimed a 'monopoly of wisdom,' neither has he decried those who have gone before. But to say that any subject has been 'worked out' (that seems to be the sense of the words) is literally dangerous. Not only in ringing but in all subjects, most important and valuable discoveries have been made because someone has investigated some of these 'worked out' ideas and found them not so 'worked out' as was thought.

Finally, without meaning to be unkind (that would never do after what I have said above!)
may I be very candid? The lack of respect for someone else's opinion is, I believe, one of the surest signs of ignorance. In my experience real knowledge always brings tolerance, for real knowledge means that all sides of the question have been considered, and if that is done I am certain that it brings respect for the judgment of another who has faced the same questions but arrived at a different conclusion .- Yours sincerely,

Membership Gains in all Districts

The 70th annual meeting of the Essex Association, held at Chelmsford on Whit Mon-day, was attended by 150 ringers and friends,

day, was attended by 150 ringers and friends, each district being well represented.

The service in the Cathedral was conducted by the Provost (the Very Rev. C. K. Waller), the address being given by the Right Rev. Hugh Gough, Bishop of Barking. During the service the names of members who had died during 1948 were read, viz., S. Blatch (North Weald), S. Jennings (Harwich), A. Mansfield (Epping Upland), J. Moule, A. Prior (Levtonstone), J. F. Philbrick (Prittlewell), F. Ringe (Brentwood), J. Turner (Earls Colne), E. (Brentwood), J. Turner (Earls Colne), E. Townsend (Great Bardfield), besides the names of several non-resident members.

It was the first occasion the Bishop had been privileged to speak to a large gathering of ringers, and his stirring address will long be remembered by those present.

THE CRACKED BELL.

After referring to the place of bells in Church and civic life, the Bishop said:—

Occasionally one does hear a cracked bellone that is out of tune with the others. Ringers call men to worship, but, is your life in tune with worship? Do you take part in the service or do you slip out after ringing, as I have seen ringers do? Sometimes we do not carry out the practice we urge upon others. Are our lives in tune with the music of the bells? They give forth the music but you must do the pulling. We must place our lives in God's hands. Ringers are members of a team, and each one has a part to play. Our religion is a personal matter, but we are all one in the service of our Lord-all members of one brotherhood, and if we fail the whole witness of the Church of God is spoilt. Remember your duty to the Church—the most Remember your duty to the Church—the most glorious society to which we could belong. In Psalm 96 it says, "O worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness. . . ." It is not sufficient just to sing with our lips, or to ring, but we must worship with beauty of character. The Master (Dr. T. P. Spencer-Phillips, J.P.) presided at the business meeting, held in the Chapter House, and was supported by the Bishop of Barking, the Provost, and the officers of the Association.

THE BUSINESS MEETING.

The annual report showed that the vigorous reconstruction of 1947 had been successfully continued in 1948, thanks to the untiring efforts of Mr. G. L. Joyce (deputy Master), supported by an enthysication committee. supported by an enthusiastic committee. Membership had increased in all the districts, a gain in all of 98 ringing members. Several towers were still in need of recruits to ensure

towers were still in need of recruits to ensure regular Sunday ringing.
Hutton (5), Great Wakering (6), Downham (6) and Thorpe Bay (8) joined the Association, whilst Nazeing (5), Chrishall (6), St. Osyth (6), Stebbing (6), Great Bromley (6), St. Leonard's, Colchester (6), Finchingfield (8), Bocking (8), Stanford-le-Hope (8) and Waltham Abbey (12) have shown revived interest. Repairs have been completed at Great Dunmow (8) and All Saints', Maldon (8). It is repretted that no ringing is done at Thorpe-Dunmow (8) and All Saints', Maldon (8). It is regretted that no ringing is done at Thorpele-Soken (6), Great Holland (8), Leyton (8) and West Ham (10). The latter two towers are out of action through structural defects.

The 'Crusaders' of S.W. Essex continued their monthly summer activities, with other

districts increasing their practices. A healthy fellowship had been built up through these extra meetings. Mr. L. W. Wiffen (peal secretary) and Mr. F. Dench (peal committee) resigned from the committee, and both merited the thanks of the Association for their residuable services for many reason. their valuable services for many years. Two vice-presidents, the Rt. Rev. J. T. Inskip (Bishop of Barking) and the Very Rev. W. E. R. Morrow, M.A. (Provost of the Cathedral), retired last autumn, and the Associa-tion owed much to them for their unfailing kindnesses and ready support throughout their long ministrations in the diocese. The library, lodged in the Cathedral, under the care of Mr. H. W. Shadrack, had received interesting additions, presented by Miss A. White, Mr. M. Hodgson and Mr. G. L. Joyce. Noteworthy is an autographed copy of the original edition of 'The Nine Tailors' and some letters concerning the book from Dorothy L. Sayers.

Fifty-nine peals were rung during the year—54 on tower bells, 5 on handbells; 19 shared the conducting, 25 rang their first peal, and 74 their first peal in the method. A noteworthy performance was the 'first ever' of Prittlewell Surprise Royal at Prittlewell on April 3rd, conducted by Mr. P. A. Corby. The Bell Restoration Fund had been well supported, with a record balance of £246 3s. 4d. Grants amounting to 235 were made to Great Wakering and Thaxted. The Rev. C. Scott-Little, M.A. (now Deputy Master) had been asked to serve on the Diocesan Advisory Committee

NEW FORM OF REPORT

The income showed an increase of £9 4s. 9d., but the balance, as in the previous year, was reduced. This should not re-occur, as the in-creased subscription and the introduction of peal fees should provide an income to meet all outgoings. The lay-out of the annual re-port—printing, information and arrangement -was favourably commented upon by several members, including congratulations from Mr. E. C. S. Turner, of the Middlesex Association, and well worth the increased cost of produc-

The auditors (Mr. H. Turner and Mr. J. H. Crampion) spoke in glowing terms of the good work of the general secretary and treasurer (Mr. R. C. Heazel) and the efficiency

of the district secretaries.

Mr. Shadrack (for trustees) said that it would be useful to have a bookcase and they would be grateful if one could be obtained. Mr J. Chalk urged for more hon. members. commented on the marvellous response from ringers towards the Bell Restoration Fund, which enabled the appropriate committee this year already to make grants to Fyfield, Bob-bingworth and South Benfleet, amounting to He advised those who had bells attended to to see that the work was properly carried

The committee, by a majority vote, had recommended to the A.G.M. that the Association should have its 'Standing Orders,' be adopted or suspended according to the wishes of the meeting. WINCHESTER & PORTSMOUTH GUILD 70th ANNIVERSARY MEETING.

In the course of his address he extended a hearty welcome and spoke of his great pleasure in the Guild returning to its birthplace on that occasion. He stressed the great part that the diocesan Guilds contributed to the service of the Church and referred to the Guild as a 'handmaid of the Church.' He wished them Godspeed and a very happy anniversary.

An excellent tea was partaken of in Church House, after which special references were male to the early history of the Guild through such early pioneers as Henry White (Basingstoke), John W. Whiting (Fareham), J. Hewett (Gosport) and the late Master (Mr.

G. Williams), by the general secretary (Mr. F. W. Rogers) and Mr. G. Pullinger.
Mr. W. Andrews (Winchester) paid special tribute to the valuable work put in by Mr. Pullinger, who was general secretary at the time of the division of the Guild (when Portsmouth and Guildford became separate dioceses), and who showed the utmost tact and perseverance in handling the Guild's affairs.

Mr. Tucker (North Stoneham) said he first came to Basingstoke over 50 years ago. At that time there was no ringing at Southampton, his nearest towers for change ringing being either Winchester, Romsey or Bas-ingstoke. Mr. R. Brown (Southampton) also paid a tribute to the late Mr. George Williams.

At the conclusion of the speeches a hearty vote of thanks was accorded the Archdeacon of Basingstoke, the incumbents at the various towers, and Mr. J. Chesterman for making all arrangements for the programme of the day-Ringing followed until a late hour. Members were present from many of the towers in the Guild with visitors from Epsom, Byfield (Northants), Reading, Oxford and Stanwell (Middlesex).

CHESTER DIOCESAN GUILD

HEALTHY POSITION REPORTED AT FESTIVAL.

The 41st annual report of the Chester Guild, presented at its annual festival at Crewe on June 11th to a representative gathering of 125 members and friends, including Mr. G. L. Grover, of the Guildford Diocesan Guild, drew attention to the fact that in spite of the efforts of the instructors, there were still silent towers in the Guild.

It was felt that this was due in some cases to estrangement of ringers and clergy, and it was pointed out that no vicar could be exwas pointed out that no vicar could be expected to look with favour on ringers who used the bells purely in pursuit of their hobby and did not take their proper place in the corporate life of the church. The standard of church service was, in general, high, but every member was urged to be aware of his respon-sibility to the Exercise in that respect.

The report recommended members to study the article on wastage contributed to 'The Ringing World' by one of the Guild's mem-bers, and suggested that while many may not see eye to eye with the writer, none the less it would be agreed that wastage was, in fact, serious, and that a refusal to examine its

implications could only be disastrous.

A healthy state of affairs was disclosed by the report, there being a membership of 22 honorary members and 740 ringing members, and the number of young ringers in all branches was particularly noteworthy.

The social side of ringing was being well catered for, ringing trips being very popular.

catered for, ringing trips being very popular, and in this connection the meeting decided that the time was ripe for the revival of the annual dinner and instructed the Master and general secretary to make the necessary arrangements for it to be held in Chester in the early part of October.

Peal ringing showed an increase, 126 peals

having been rung, in which 28 members rang their first peal and seven conducted their first peal. Sunday service bands rang peals of Double Court Triples, Erin Triples, Superlative Surprise Major, London Surprise Major and in seven Minor methods. The average age of the band which rang the peal of Cambridge Surprise Major was 20, the youngest to record a peal in the method for the Guild.

AMONG THE FOREMOST

The 25th anniversary of the first 35-method peal at Norbury, a milestone in ringing history, was marked by a peal in the same methods at the same church, in which two of the original band took part. Over, the scene of the 17,280 Kent Treble Bob Major on July 21st, 1923, maintained its association with long lengths by a peal of 10,080 Bristol Surprise Major on ember 18th, 1948.

First peals in the following methods were ung: Cheshire Surprise Major, Stockport Surprise Major and Ramsey Surprise Major, and the Guild rang its first peals in the following methods: New Cambridge Surprise Maximus, Yorkshire Surprise Royal, seven Spliced Surprise Major, six Spliced Surprise Major, Edinburgh Surprise Major, Aldenham Surprise Major, Double Court Triples, Erin Triples and 18 Spliced Surprise Minor methods. This list compared favourably with other guilds throughout the country, and the Chester Guild was justifiably proud of its achievements, which placed it among the foremost organisations in

In common with all ringing societies at the resent time the financial statement revealed that something must be done to bring expendi-ture into line with income. Discussion took place on the best ways of securing an increased income, and it was eventually decided that the most satisfactory was to increase the subscription by 6d. with effect from January 1st, 1950.

The Rev. J. Kingdon, of St. Mary's-within-the-Walls, Chester, a keen and enthusiastic ringer, was appointed his successor.

The final business of the meeting was to fix the place of the next annual festival, and in response to the invitation extended by the Northwich Branch it was decided to visit them

Votes of thanks were passed to the Vicar of Christ Church, Crewe, the Rev. Roberts, of Coppenhall, the local ringers for all their efforts and all who had contributed to the sucess of the meeting, which was handled in his usual dexterous manner by the Master, Mr. J. W. Clarke.

OBITUARY

MR. ELI WATERS.
On Sunday, June 12th, the death occurred of Mr. Eli Waters, who had served with the band at St. Peter's Church, Bournemouth, for He was in his 84th year and regularly attended the belfry until October last, when the doctor advised him to discontinue ringing.

Mr. Waters was taught to handle a bell by Mr. George Preston, the present captain of Christchurch Priory band, in 1892, and rang his first peal in 1896. Unfortunately a record of his peals is not available, but he rang several in the standard methods in his earlier ringing days.

About 1900 he identified himself with St. About 1900 he identified himself with St. Peter's, and subsequently joined the band he was to serve so well and faithfully. He was captain of the band from 1926, but gave up the office in 1936, as he said at the time, 'in favour of a younger man.' This was typical of Mr. Waters' nature, for he would not hold any office unless he felt he could do the job thoroughly. A lifelong friend described him as 'one of nature's gentlemen,' a tribute which explains the love and esteem accorded to him by all who came in contact with him.

The funeral service was taken by the Rev. J. Coutts (assistant priest and a ringer at St. Peter's) on June 16th in St. Peter's Church, and interment followed at Boscombe Cemetery. Many ringers attended, and the bells were rung half muffled after the service and again in the evening. A course of Grandsire Triples was rung round the grave by Mrs. F. J. Marshallsay, Messrs. F. Price, D. T. Mat-kin and A. V. Davis. Floral tributes included wreaths from the Vicar, churchwardens and people of St. Peter's, the local company of ringers, and the two local branches of the Salsbury and the Winchester Diocesan Guilds.
