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## DEVALUATION

A WORD uppermost in the nation's mind this past fortnight has been 'devaluation.' This column is not the place to discuss the fiscal implications of the word. Devaluation arises when the credit of a country is greatly in excess of its assets, and the same word and principle might be applied to ringing or anything else.

If, peradventure, everybody can ring a particular method to a peal then its value as a performance is undermined; it is devalued in the eyes of the ringing community. The progress since the war has created new standards, and most weeks it is our pleasure to record new methods or complications of 'splicing' of a very high order that make much of the past sound commonplace. But if there has been this devaluation in the realm of performance, surely it is equally applicable in the number of peals rung. Except for one week in the very hot weather the average number of peals has been well maintained, and the facility with which some bands' score peals indicates either conductorship of a very high level or particularly safe ringers.

Is there any method that can be usefully introduced to ensure that all the peals rung are of good value and true in every respect? A suggestion has been made that umpires should be appointed. We would be so bold as to assert that the number of competent umpires in the Exercise is very few, and it would be practically impossible to arrange for the whole of every peal to be checked.

The correction of 'trips' is another matter. We do not believe that the ruling of the Central Council is fully appreciated. It states that 'any shift or error in ringing be immediately corrected and that no call be made, or having been made, be altered or withdrawn, later than during the change at which a call would properly take effect.' Much depends upon the interpretation of the words 'immediate correction.' Instances have been reported to us where the process of 'correction' has taken an unconscionable time, and to those outside the belfry the sound has been very much like firing. There are conductors who pride themselves on the purity of their peals and will not hesitate to call 'stand' when such circumstances occur. Others treat the subject differently, and by their dexterity eventually sort out these tangles and regard the situation as an instance of masterly conducting.

Is there any method by which a higher standard can be introduced or any check made on such peals? The crux of the question is one of personal integrity. We met the other day a ringer who refused to record in his personal peal book any peal which had doubtful qualities. Certain of these peals had been published in 'The Ringing World' and recorded in the annals of his Guild or Association. His conscience was however not clear. What should such an individual do? Should he report the circumstances to his Guild or the appropriate committee of the Central Council? Undoubtedly this would be the correct procedure. But there would be repercussions. It would probably result in a limitation of invitations to him to stand in peals, and it would certainly not lead to harmony in his Guild. At the risk of unpleasantness we would implore the Exercise not to 'devalue' in any sense its peals. A high standard means a hard path for the beginner struggling for his 'first,' and even if there are failures it is far better to have the laurel wreath untarnished.

Eighteen-year-old Alan Cattell, son of Mr. Arthur Cattell, churchwarden of All Saints', Leicester, is the first ringer in Leicestershire to ring two tower bells double-handed to a peal. The party met short for a peal of Minor and Alan volunteered to 'have a go.' It was an excellently struck peal. At the conclusion a note was found under the belfry door for the six ringers to meet next day for a peal. The writer, Mr. W. P. Whitehead, was unaware that there were only five men ringing.

The Sussex peal tour, which started on September 10th, resulted in eight peals being scored. The eleven participants came from Ashford, Swindon, Nottingham, St. Ives, Daventry and Wendover. A report of the tour and peals will appear next week.

Royston, Yorks, ringers have a warm spot for Dr. H. B. Pare, who was chiefly instrumental in getting the bells recast. A farewell peal on his retirement from practice was rung.

His two daughters, Rosa and Peggy, participated with Mr. Frank Lamb in the peal at Barnby Don, Yorks, in honour of his silver wedding.

When the bells at St. Mary-le-Tower, Ipswich, were rung, the weather-cock at the top of the steeple revolved. Steeplejacks have investigated and found that the spindle holding the weather-cock is moulded into the steeple and, being made of iron, has rusted, causing a crack round the top of the steeple. Bellringing will not be resumed until the repair work is finished.

Regarding the peal of Yorkshire Major at Waterford, Ireland, on August 31st, Mr. F. Bennett writes: 'The first peal in the method for the Irish Association was rung at Holywood on September 17th, 1936, by a tour arranged by the late Mr. Gabriel Lindoff and Mr. O. T. Coles, and which I had the privilege to conduct.'

## BELFRY GOSSIP

National publicity has been given to the peal of Stedman Triples at Bulwell, Notts, where the first peal was rung on the bells. The regular ringers in this tower went on strike as a protest. Their action is characterised by the Rector, the Rev. G. Sprittle, as 'dog-in-the-manger.' 'Southwell Diocesan Bellringers' Association asked me if they might ring a peal on our bells and I gave them permission, thinking our ringers would be glad to co-operate.' The attitude adopted by the Bulwell ringers is: 'This is our church, not theirs.'

Mr. E. Jenkins conducted his 300th peal at Brighthouse, Yorks, on Sept. 14th and his 100th peal for the Yorkshire Association at Queensbury on September 16th.

Ringing friends of Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Goodfellow, both members of St. John's, Hillingdon, band, will be glad to learn that Mrs. Goodfellow has made a successful recovery from her recent operation, and has returned home from Iver Hospital.

The North Wales Association certificates were previously printed by Messrs. A. Falkner and Sons, Manchester and London. Mr. A. J. Hughes appeals to our printing friends to help him trace the firm for a renewal order and to save the expense of a new block.

Mr. T. Trollope, of Oxford, attended the Bicester Branch meeting of the Oxford Guild on September 3rd, and visited old friends in Middleton, where he had worked some years ago. He is the only survivor of a band who visited Middleton Stoney with the late J. W. Washbrook in 1887.

By ringing the tenor, Mr. John E. Bibby has 'completed the circle' of his own tower, Frodsham, where he has been ringing for 30 years and has scored nearly 100 peals on the bells. The band congratulate him on the capable manner he turned in this 'very odd struck' bell.

## A RETURN VISIT TO DEVONSHIRE

### Tourists Score Eleven Peals

IN beautiful weather, twenty-three tourists assembled on September 3rd at Buckfastleigh, Devon, for a week's ringing tour amidst some of the finest scenery Great Britain has to offer. For many of the party it was their second tour in this district. There were 15 peal ringers and eight wives, of whom two were also ringers, and a young man of nine months old.

The week's activities resulted in eleven peals in eight methods, as recorded elsewhere. In addition, peals were attempted at Uffculme, Babbacombe, Moretonhampstead, Cullompton, Chudleigh, Exminster and Buckfast Abbey. There was also ringing during the week at Buckfastleigh, Bradninch (where the 'go' of the bells left much to be desired), Chagford, Brent Tor and Ashburton.

On the first Saturday an advance party was joined at Brixham and Dartmouth by Mr. F. J. Cullum, of Erith, Kent, who was on holiday in the district. Mr. Cullum has family associations with Brixham and was very glad to call a peal of Rutland there, the first in the method for the Devon Guild.

Other 'occasional visitors' during the week were Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Collins, of Croydon, Mr. Sangwin, of Bude, and Mr. H. C. Spencer, formerly of Birmingham, and now of the back of beyond in Cornwall, who joined the party at Launceston and Tavistock. Mr. Collins rang the tenor to a peal at St. Stephen-by-Launceston and in the afternoon conducted those not in the peal at Tavistock on a very

pleasant jaunt to Brent Tor, where the Church of St. Michael stands high on a rock. On Friday, Mr. C. W. Powell, of Lyme Regis, took part in the peal of Superlative at Heavitree, and Mr. E. J. Taylor and Mr. Collins were in the attempt for Stedman Cinques at Buckfast Abbey on the last day of the tour. Mr. Stafford Green came along to listen to this attempt.

A great disappointment was the withdrawal of permission for a peal attempt at Tiverton. Thanks to the good offices of Mr. E. J. Taylor, permission was, however, obtained at short notice for a peal at South Molton instead. Other local arrangements were made by Mr. A. L. Bennett, of Buckfastleigh, with his usual kindness and efficiency.

#### CHURCHWARDEN'S ALARM.

The Collopington attempt had to be abandoned as a result of panic-stricken banging on the belfry door by the churchwarden, who thought one of the tower pinnacles was in danger of collapse. This gentleman applied an additional method of interruption in the form of a long piece of wire waved wildly round the feet of the ringers nearest the door. It afterwards transpired that the tourists' visit

was considered a very suitable opportunity to test the reaction of the tower to the bells!

Transport for the week was in the form of a coach hired locally with the addition of a hired car as necessary. There were many narrow lanes and steep hills to be negotiated, particularly on the ride over Dartmoor to Tavistock and Launceston. This run included distant glimpses of the well-known convict prison, which, even on a beautiful September day, was not without its usual shroud of mist and cloud.

A pleasing feature of the ringing was the ungrudging enthusiasm of the local round ringers for good striking. Some good peals were rung and there was good ringing in many of the abortive attempts. Some really fine rings of bells were encountered and the diffi-

#### OBITUARY

##### MR. J. G. CARTLIDGE.

The death occurred on Sept. 10th of Mr. John G. Cartlidge, vice-captain of the Cheddar, Staffs, R.C. ringers, at the age of 53 years. 'Jack', who had been in failing health for about four years, was a regular Sunday service ringer almost to the last. He died about a fortnight after his operation.

Mr. Cartlidge was a very keen ringer and good striker and in the Surprise class. He had rung about 70 peals, chiefly for the North Staffordshire Association. He was also a parish councillor and a keen exponent of chess.

The funeral took place on September 13th following Solemn Requiem Mass, after which several members of the Association rang half-muffled touches of Bob Minor and Grandsire Triples on the bells. On Sunday the bells of the Parish Church were also rung half-muffled as a token of respect.

## Three Guilds Festival

## LEICESTER RINGERS IN IRELAND

(Continued from page 545)

WE all stayed together at the Adelphi Hotel, Waterford, and Wednesday morning gave us our first experience of Irish rain. The peal team assembled at the Cathedral Church of the Blessed Trinity and rang a peal of Yorkshire Surprise Major, whilst underneath the belfry four others rang a handbell peal of Grandsire Triples. It was the first handbell peal of Grandsire Triples to be rung outside Dublin.

The ring of eight in the Cathedral is by Mears, dated 1872. They were rehung in 1939 by Gillett and Johnston. The peal of Yorkshire was the first peal on them since the re-hanging. We were pleased to meet Mr. Walsh and other local ringers, who had a peep at the peal ringers from the belfry balcony.

Following luncheon, the convoy moved off on schedule along the River Suir, via Carrick-on-Suir and Clonmel to Cashel, seat of the ancient Kings of Munster. We were received here by the Dean of Cashel. By now the sun had replaced the rain, and in the beautiful sunshine the Dean conducted us round the ancient buildings of St. Patrick's Rock, and gave an interesting exposition of its history.

It was at Cashel that one of the unexpected joys of the tour was experienced. Following tea, we were privileged to hold a special service at the Cathedral. It was conducted by the Dean, Mrs. J. F. Milner was the organist and the choir was made up of members of the touring party. A course of Grandsire Triples was rung in the chancel during the service by Messrs. R. F. Elkington, G. S. Morris, A. Ballard and H. J. Poole. In the short address of welcome the Dean commented on the bells and said it was the first time that they had been heard in the Cathedral. The two small choir girls were accompanied by Barbara Morris, who had been invited to robe with them.

Tipperary was our next call and it was not such a long way as the song would suggest. A brief halt here for a drink and look round and then on to Limerick. We were accommodated in two hotels at Limerick. The married couples and girls in one and those with little or no responsibilities in the other.

Thursday morning commenced with attempts for two peals, which both came to grief. Cambridge Surprise Major at the Cathedral Church of St. Mary was halted by a shift course after about an hour, whilst Stedman Caters on handbells was stopped after about an hour and a half by a clapper falling out of one of the bells.

## A SENSATION.

It was now 11 a.m., and the 'gaffer,' on learning the verdict of the Cambridge failure, decided we were going to ring that peal at the Cathedral then. 'Up those steps' was the order, and those taking part forfeited their lunch and made shift with some sandwiches after the peal.

This peal provided one of the sensations of the week. After about an hour the tenorman was seen to be fiddling with the tops of his flannels, which shortly afterwards descended to his feet. This effort to keep cool certainly paid dividend towards the end of the peal.

After the peal the ringers were met by Mr. J. A. Haydn, whose great interest in the Cathedral and the bells was referred to later by the Dean of Limerick. In Mr. Haydn's historical survey it is recorded that a certain John Budston, a wealthy citizen of Limerick, made a gift to the church of four brass bells. In 1670 six bells were presented by a William Yorks. The present tenor was originally cast in 1673 and recast by Tavlors in 1930, four other bells were recast in 1938, when the peal was rehung on ball bearings. They are now an excellent ring and go like 'tops.'

The remainder of the party had lunch in Limerick and then journeyed on to Ardara-crusha, where the now famous electricity plant

—driven by water from the Shannon River—was inspected. The peelers caught up with the party here and travelled on with them to Killaloe. In the picturesque setting of the Lakeside Hotel we were met by the Dean of Killaloe, who joined us at tea. It was here that a 'Killaloe Surprise' was introduced. Fred Dukes, who had been taken by surprise at Drogheda when presented with the tankard, revelled in the opportunity to get even in presenting—on behalf of the tourists—a wristlet watch to 'H.J.' He conveyed the thanks of everyone for the wonderful time they were having and for all that had been done in the arranging of the tour. 'H.J.' suitably replied in acknowledgment.

The Dean extended a hearty welcome to the visitors and later conducted the party to the Cathedral, where he explained in detail its ancient history. We found here a set of eight bells, but alas! they were a fixed unit. 'H.J.' soon made himself at home on the chiming apparatus with hymn and song tunes, and afterwards four of the party tapped off a course of Grandsire Triples.

## AT LIMERICK.

Our next call was at Mount St. Alphonsus for a pull on the ring of ten. These bells were seen by many of the party in the Loughborough Foundry, but few thought at that time they would have the privilege of ringing on them. We were welcomed by the Rev. Father Kelly and received in the belfry by some dozen or so local ringers. A course of Stedman Caters and Cambridge Surprise Royal proved of great interest to the local people, and a message was received from the priest that we could come back after the service at 8 p.m. and ring on until 10.15 p.m. This was not possible as a social evening had been arranged with the ringers.

A meal was waiting at the local Youth Association headquarters and we were received here by the Dean of Limerick and the local ringers. A great welcome was extended by the Dean, Mr. Haydn and others, and on behalf of the tourists Harold J. Poole thanked those responsible for the hospitality.

At the social handbell ringing formed a prominent feature, to the great joy of the Limerick ringers and friends, and the tourists had lessons from their local partners in Irish dancing. It was indeed a great occasion—the like of which had seldom if ever been experienced before.

It was during the social that a feeler was put out about the possibility of ringing a peal on the grand ten at Mount St. Alphonsus. To our great delight we received the 'O.K.' to start at 9 next morning.

Prior to the start of the peal we said goodbye to Fred Dukes, who returned to Dublin en route to join Phil Corby's touring party in Devon. A first-class peal of Yorkshire Surprise Royal was rung at Mount St. Alphonsus, and Mr. L. Benson, ringer and son of the local captain, sat in the belfry throughout. We were thankful indeed he was present, because someone about half-way through the peal tried to enter the belfry, and whilst they succeeded in raising Redvers on the trap-door a few inches, they did not otherwise disturb us. Outside the monastery we received congratulations on all sides on the ringing, and then we said goodbye to our Limerick friends.

On the journey back to Dublin we called at Kildare for a look round St. Brigid's Cathedral. Our arrival at Dublin was rather late.

## A GRAND FINALE.

As a grand finale we all assembled at the Green Rooster, a restaurant near the famous O'Connell Bridge, for supper. The last opportunity to supper regardless of ration restrictions. Chicken and ham was the favourite dish and two of the weaker sex tried to strengthen up a bit with repeat orders. Saturday morning was devoted to shopping. In the afternoon the first handbell peal to be rung

on ten bells in Ireland was accomplished in St. George's belfry. Several were tried out for 9-10; the result, Harry Wayne retained and the others placed on the 'open to transfer' list.

We assembled on the quayside at Kingstown, and after some delay boarded the SS. 'Hibernian' for home. It was a grand crossing, starlight with the moon reflecting in the water. The parting of the ways came at Holyhead, where we said goodbye to those continuing the journey by train. The remainder stayed the night at Holyhead.

On Sunday morning we renewed acquaintance with Vincent Child and Albert Hughes at Llanfair P.G., where in the small church on the island adjoining Menai Bridge we rang a peal of Stedman Triples on handbells. This was Vincent Child's first handbell peal.

So came to an end one of the most interesting tours ever to be undertaken. History was made in several directions in regard to first peals, and the social events of the tour were such that many happy memories will be retained by the tourists and by those who received us and made us so welcome.

Our thanks are due to Fred Dukes, who made all arrangements in Ireland; to the ecclesiastical authorities for the use of the bells; to the Deans of Limerick, Kilkenny and Killaloe, and to the Rev. Father Kelly, of Mount St. Alphonsus, for their exceptional interest; to the ringers of Ireland for their wonderful welcome and hospitality; and to the Dean of Cashel for his attendance upon us and for the beautiful service at Cashel Cathedral. ST. DAVID'S DIOCESAN GUILD  
QUARTERLY MEETING AT LLANBADARN  
FAWR.

Travelling 55, 72 and 80 miles were necessary for bands in the St. David's Guild to reach the 12th century church of St. Padarn at Llanbadarn Fawr in the suburbs of Aberystwyth for the quarterly meeting on September 10th.

The journeys were well worth while for ringers from Haverfordwest and Tenby enjoyed the trips over Prescoelly mountains to Cardigan, after which they followed the undulating coast up to Aberavon, where the road was shared with ringers coming from Carmarthen, Llanelli and Swansea by way of Lampeter.

By 2.30 the eight bells were ringing to proclaim their 200th birthday. After a groping climb up the dark spiral the writer was amazed by his first impression of the size of the ringing chamber. Four shafts of light showed the heads of three dozen people and the ropes well away in the centre. How different from the little church at Sowton, Devon, with its ring of eight and all elbows touching against the walls where the writer first rang on his box.

At the service Dr. H. Islwyn Davies sketched a brief history of the bells and church and referred to the fact that owing to absence of railways and good vehicles the bells were cast in the churchyard and that such craftsmanship could be an example of the kind of skill that church service demanded. During tea ringers shared the bells' birthday cake, which was cut by Mrs. Bonsall.

Sir George Forsett Roberts acted as chairman for the business meeting, during which it was decided to hold the next meeting at Llandovery on December 10th. New members were elected and a collection made to the Guild Bell Restoration Fund amounted to £1 10s. 1d. Mr. Robert Pateman (grandfather and father of ringers) was elected an honorary member with Sir George. Llanstephan band were elected as probationary members.

After the meeting touches were attempted until group by group the visitors set off on their long journeys, leaving the young Llanbadarn ringers to round off a successful bicentenary.
