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JEALOUSY

*Love is stronger than death
And jealousy more cruel than the grave.*

ADDRESSING a ringers' meeting some years ago, the Vicar of Ringmer, Sussex, in the words of 'The Ringing World' of the time, 'took the opportunity of uttering a word of warning against the intrusion into the belfry of the ogre which he described as "Old Green Eye." Such a warning is not out of place. Jealousy is to be found in the ranks of ringers no less than among other sections of the community, for ringers are only human.'

This advice might well be taken to heart by ringers in general. Many readers will have perused with regret the recent correspondence between representatives of two bands in the Midlands, and will perhaps have reflected how strange it is, considering the pacific nature of ringing and its associations with the Church, that such great passions can be aroused in its devotees, although those with experience of other sides of Church life will know this is by no means confined to ringers alone. Nevertheless, there are many stories of how, for example, the ringers from one tower of this or that town will not walk on the same pavement as those from a neighbouring church and, though in after years it is possible to look back and realise how futile such behaviour is, much bitterness can be caused at the time and much harm done to the ringers themselves.

Whatever the causes, real or imaginary, of the present differences in the Leicester Diocesan Guild, many will feel that it is mostly likely due to the inability of two very gifted conductors to work in harmony. The example of William Pye's band can be quoted to show that, even though it regularly contained not two but three or four conductors, little if any less capable than himself, no difficulties arose because all worked together for the common good.

The younger members of the Leicester Guild, instead of disputing amongst themselves which of them has achieved the most, would do well to keep that example before them. It is pleasant to know that one has, say, rung more peals in a given time than anyone else, or that a greater proportion of them have been Surprise peals—not that their value is thus in any way enhanced—but these young men should also remember that their records have greater merit when they result more from their own efforts than from the exceptional ability of well-known conductors. In ten years' time others will have superseded them as the hopes of the future, just as they have taken the place of others.

'It would be a thousand pities,' said 'The Ringing World' not long before the recent war, 'if a canker were to develop in the very district which is richer in the promise of youth than almost any other district in any Association in England, and were to lead to decay.' The Leicester Diocesan Guild can fairly claim to-day to possess just such an abundance of youthful talent which, let us hope, will meet with no such obstacle to its development as befell those to whom 'The Ringing World' referred, who sacrificed at the very least what should have been their most carefree and formative years. Let the young men of to-day, therefore, make the most of their opportunities and not fritter them away with unnecessary squabbling.

Mr. Cecil W. Pipe has rung his 250th peal. 'Not being a great peal snatcher,' he writes, 'it has taken me 30 years to reach this modest total.' It was the 40th peal he had rung with his son, George.

Mr. Stephen L. Parry, at Ashton-under-Lyne on November 12th, completed Kent from Minor to Maximus.

A contract for a ring of ten, tenor 21 cwt., has been placed with Messrs. Mears and Stainbank for British Columbia.

An 80th birthday compliment was paid at Irthlingborough to Mr. Anderson Y. Tyler, who has been towerkeeper here for over 50 years and a ringer at St. Peter's for 56 years.

Mr. P. W. Cave, hon. secretary of the Liverpool Branch of the Lancashire Association, will be resigning his office next month on account of the transfer of his office to London.

The peal at Lullington, Derbyshire, was the 50th peal together by William H. Curson and Joseph W. Cotton, whose first together was also at Lullington on November 19th, 1927.

Mr. N. V. Andrews, of Andover, who has rung over 100 peals on six, eight, ten and twelve bells, has now rung his first quarter of Grandsire Doubles.

Friends of Mr. Harrison Smith, of Wickham-breaux, Canterbury, will be sorry to hear of the death of his wife on November 12th after almost 60 years of happy married life.

Mr. James F. Laker, through the medium of 'The Ringing World,' thanks all those good ringers who made it possible for him to do 'a little ringing' while on a short visit to the 'old country.'

The conductor of the peal of Rutland Surprise at Biddenham, Kent, on November 5th, writes correcting the time of the peal to 3 hours and 4 minutes, and not 2 hours 48 minutes as stated.

BELFRY GOSSIP

We regret to learn that Rev. E. V. Cox, president of the Devonshire Guild of Ringers, has had to undergo an operation in Ottery St. Mary Hospital. He will have the good wishes of his many ringing friends for a rapid and complete recovery.

Mr. W. E. Clarke has completed 'the circle' of Boston, Lincs, tower.

A quarter of Stedman Cinques was lost in the last three sixes at St. Laurence's, Reading, on November 13th. It was being rung in honour of the birth of a son to Mr. and Mrs. R. Purton, who are both service ringers. Mr. R. Burton was the conductor.

We have received a progress report from Mapledurham, Oxon, where Mr. R. Hunt had trained a band of learners for service ringing, starting last Easter. The company have now scored their first quarter.

'The Northampton Chronicle and Echo' has recently given a considerable amount of its space to a number of articles upon bells written by 'Treble Bob,' who is a well-known Northampton ringer. 'The Peterborough Diocesan Leaflet' and several deanery and parish magazines contain similar articles.

The peal at St. John's, Leicester, was specially arranged as near Armistice Day as possible. The composition, now rung for the first time, had 89, 96, 68 and 978 'at hand' in every course. Prior to the peal a recording was made of the muffled bells, and will shortly be issued on gramophone records.

A long break in peal ringing by Messrs. East and Penfold was broken when both scored a peal at Chigwell Row, Essex. Mr. T. East rang his last peal on Easter Monday, 1922, when he rang two—at Blewbury and Dorchester Abbey, while Mr. Penfold's last peal was rung at Bethnal Green in 1925. It is hoped another successful run has begun.

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Change Ringing in Arkansas

The University of Arkansas, at Fayetteville, has two sets of electronic bells, one English and one Flemish, given by the alumni as a memorial for the members lost in the two world wars. The workings of the electronic bells, as I understand them, are that hammers, actuated from a keyboard like an organ console in the control room, strike rods or strips of bell metal, tuned to the desired pitch, and the sounds thus arising are relayed and broadcast electrically from a speaker, situated, in our case, in the tower of University Hall.

This device is, of course, much cheaper than a ring of real bells; it can be operated from a keyboard by a single man, and it does not require a tower to house the bells. I was put off by the word 'electronic,' but when I heard them I had to confess that they sounded exactly like real bells. Furthermore, each bell is absolutely on pitch, and the whole ring has throughout a uniform pattern of harmonics. The English bells are tuned to the chromatic scale and have a range of something over two octaves.

Concerts of familiar hymns are played on the Flemish bells on Sunday afternoons. The English bells are controlled by a clockwork mechanism so as to strike the Westminster chimes through the day and at six o'clock to end the day with a hymn such as 'Lead, Kindly Light' or 'Onward, Christian Soldiers,' played alla marcia funebre from a roll like that of a player-piano. The volume of the Flemish bells can be controlled; that of the English bells cannot, and with characteristic American exuberance the men who installed the system set the English bells at the highest possible volume, so that they can be heard within a radius of some ten miles.

When I suggested that an attempt be made to ring changes on the bells I received the counter-suggestion that the attempt be made on the Flemish bells, set at a very low volume. To ring English changes on Flemish bells seemed little short of sacrilege to me, and I replied that I did not want to be held responsible if the Empire should topple, the Government fall, the pound be devalued, and Prince Charles come down with the measles. Grudging permission was accordingly given that I might try the experiment on the English bells on August 15th, the anniversary of VJ-Day, a fitting occasion for bellringing.

In preparation I picked a plain course of Bob Doubles and practised them in the ringing room (the mechanism has a switch whereby the sound can be diverted from the speaker in the tower and heard at greatly reduced volume only in the ringing room). I found that I could not ring smoothly and evenly from a row of numbers because I had not that sort of co-ordination of hand and eye. I copied the course in musical notation, using Middle C as the tenor, and found that I could ring smoothly from notes.

At noon on August 15th I rang a plain course of Bob Doubles. I was immensely gratified to know that at the sound of it an Englishwoman teaching over here during the summer term burst into tears in the Library Quadrangle. Thus encouraged, a few days later I rang four six-scores of Bob Doubles, choosing the hour of six in the afternoon as the one when the ringing would be least likely to disturb the university community.

I rang changes for the third time at the end of August, ringing, in addition to the Bob Doubles I had previously worked out, two touches of Grandsire Doubles. This was a clear, still evening, and people living in the vicinity of the tower protested that their houses were being shaken to pieces by the loud clamour.

Until a technician to diminish the volume of the bells can be found, further ringing has been postponed. It is satisfying, at any rate, to know that changes have been rung for the first time in Arkansas.

A letter was produced from Kingsteignton regarding the future use of their bells, and the secretary's reply thereto, and after a discussion it was resolved to leave the matter in the hands of the president.

The election of two members prior to starting for peals was confirmed, whilst three associate members were also elected.

The 1950 programme was adopted as follows: February 4th, annual meeting at All Saints', Babbacombe, Torquay; April 22nd, quarterly meeting at Lustleigh; June 24th, joint meeting with the South-West Branch at South Brent; July 22nd, quarterly meeting at Dean Prior; August 26th, special meeting at Highweek; September 16th, joint meeting with the Exeter Branch at Teignmouth; October 28th, quarterly meeting at Wolborough; November 25th, extra meeting at Brixham. All are subject to the necessary permission being granted.

A query from a member on the ringing of peals and complaints arising therefrom was answered by the president, and it was unanimously resolved that the Rector of Highweek be written and thanked for the use of his bells to the branch on Wednesday evenings.

A welcome was extended to the visiting ringers, and there was ringing at Berry Pomeroy afterwards.

BLEWBURY BELLS AGAIN

The rehanging of Blewbury, Berks, bells by Messrs. R. White and Son, of Appleton, is now completed and a thanksgiving service was held on November 12th.

The church was well filled with ringers and residents, and an inspiring address was given by the Rev. J. S. Amies, Vicar of Dunsden, near Reading.

A tea, attended by 160, followed. Afterwards came an exhibition of handbell ringing by that grand old veteran, Dick White, and his band, which met with great applause.

A return was made to the tower, where ringing ranged from Grandsire to Double Norwich with reports of a good job. Visiting ringers came from Oxford, Abingdon, Beedon, Ilsey, Hagbourne, Harwell, Farnborough (Hants) and Aston.

Sunday service ringing took place on the following day, and the local company was favoured by a visit for evensong by Capt. A. R. Poyntz, Deputy Master.

Method-Structure Lecture

There was an appreciative and representative Hampshire ringers' audience at St. Michael's Parish Hall, Southampton, on November 12th, attending Mr. York-Bramble's lecture on 'Grid Analysis (The New Look in Method Structure)', illustrated with projector slides.

The Vicar, the Rev. H. W. K. Felstead, at the opening, remarked that the material for this work had been derived by its author during many years of research, and that he (the author) had come to feel that the results might well be published to the Exercise. The nature of the subject, however, called for explanatory diagrams rather too costly for present-day publication in pamphlet form, so the author had conceived the idea of putting the material in lecture form with slides made from his drawings. The Vicar thought they were fortunate in having the opportunity of hearing the lecture from the author himself before it was despatched (as he believed it was intended) on offer to the Central Council for preservation and use within the Exercise.

The lecture traced the origin and development of the science of production of change-rows, through an analysis of the grid-like structure of the group of rows commonly known as a 'lead'; and showed how a method is completely contained within its plain course; and how the composition devices known as 'calls' (including the Single as a phase-reversing device) may be used to build up other courses for the composition of touches and peals.

There ensued an interval for an enjoyable tea.

Comparative diagrams of grid-patterns of all stages of various well-known methods from 'Original' to 'London' were shown, with the brief formula for producing each method on all appropriate numbers. The remarkable visual effect of grid-pattern comparison showed at once the correctness (or otherwise) of method extension or contraction.

A feature of particular appeal to the practical outlook was the brief instruction for ringing Cambridge on all numbers, given within only two short rules and exceptions.

At the conclusion the Master of the Winchester and Portsmouth Diocesan Guild, Mr. George Pullinger, who presided, in expressing the general appreciation of the lecture, remarked that it had shown there was far more in the subject than might be thought; and that he considered it might well be given, perhaps, before members of the Central Council. He thought, too, that lectures from conductors to ringers would serve a useful purpose.

Proceedings closed with votes of thanks to all concerned and, as they had begun, with more ringing at St. Michael's tower.

PRESENTATION TO MR. G. A. HUGHES

After evensong on November 6th, Mr. George A. Hughes, of St. John's, Stanmore, Middlesex, was presented with a cheque for £22 as a token of appreciation of his service to the church.

Mr. Hughes, who is 73 years of age, has been a ringer at Stanmore for 56 years, during 25 of which he was in charge of the band; he was also a member of the choir for more than fifty years. Recently he retired from the choir, but still attends in the belfry very regularly when the weather is not too inclement. While never a great peal ringer, he was one of that body of faithful service ringers who are the backbone of our art.

When making the presentation, Mr. C. V. Rouse (churchwarden) expressed the thoughts of all present in wishing Mr. Hughes 'many years of happiness and good ringing in the future.'

Before evensong, Mr. Hughes took part in a quarter peal of Plain Bob Major, ringing his favourite bell, the seventh. The remainder of the band were C. Wenban 1, D. Cattell 2, F. Cattell 3, G. Cheshire 4, A. Wenban 5, W. Wenban 6, E. J. Leversuch (conductor) 8.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

AN ANNABLE STORY

Dear Sir,—The great historians sleuthing into the past have done mighty things for bells and change ringing, and their discoveries have been established on a firm basis of fact. There is no positive evidence of the occurrence of the following incident, but truth is often stranger than fiction.

One time in the belfry an egregious learner left his corner and had the enormity to approach Mr. Benjamin Annable with the request, 'Beat me, Daddy, eight to the bar.'

A startled hush descended upon the ringers present and most of them caught their breath. Big Ben's reply is said to have been one of these three:—

(a) 'Sit down, Bud.'

(b) Taking a piece of chalk used for demonstrating the figures of Annable's London and marking a cross in the exact centre of the belfry floor, 'Accelerate, Rabbit—accelerate fiercely in any direction outwards from here.'

(c) Looking furtively round with evident apprehension and making a big effort to pull himself together, 'No, no—I can't do it. Eight to the bar? It's no use asking me. Short-circuit me in one lead if I'll have anything to do with it.'

Now reply (a) might be thought much too soft for the great man, but the learner had probably been sitting in his corner already for quite a time in those days and we have all heard of Chinese torture.

Reply (b) is more in line with tradition, but considerable doubt is thrown upon it. It is believed that Mr. John Holt was standing on the exact centre of the belfry floor auctioning the last few remaining copies of his broadsheet of peals, making it impossible to indicate a point from which all ways would lead quickly and decisively to the exit.

Reply (c) is the most remarkable of all. It would require some very serious consideration to orientate such a set-up. It is well known that Annable was intensely proud of the fact that we, the members of the Exercise at large, are the true, unchallenged originators of swing. Executioners have dabbled in it by way of the gibbet and it would be difficult to say whether the bellringers or the executioners thought of it first, but the latter never thought of adapting it to music.

Annable was also wildly excited at the almost exact similarity between the sound and spelling of 'Bob' and 'Bop.' Eight to the bar is intimately connected with such following consequences as the Medium Bounce, Fairly Bright Boogie and the Off-beat Stomp, all of which are of enough importance to have kindled his eyes brightly with satisfaction, as they must actually have done.

The only reasonable excuse for Big Ben's extraordinary funk is that there were six-bell men in the room, and anything done to increase the prestige of the eight-bell men, as any demonstration of eight to the bar would have, would add to the grievances the six-bell men already had to bear to such an extent that even Ben's iron nerve quailed at the prospect.

Mitcham Ringers' Service

OBITUARY OF THE WEEK

MR. J. H. BASTOW.

The Lancashire Association has lost one of its old stalwarts by the death on October 26th of Mr. J. H. Bastow, of Middleton, aged 77 years.

He had been a member of the Association for 50 years. For some years he rang at Oldham Parish Church and lived for a time in Mexico. On his return to England he took his former place with the Middleton ringers. Mr. Bastow was a keen peal ringer with a large number of peals to his credit.

The funeral service was at Middleton Parish Church and was conducted by the Rev. G. E. Gordon (Rector). Ringers from Oldham, Rochdale, Friesland and Middleton acted as bearers. Previous to the service the bells were rung fully muffled. He was held in esteem by a wide circle of friends.

MR. T. E. SLATER

The death took place on November 15th of Mr. Theodore E. Slater, of Glemsford, Suffolk, who had been in poor health for some time and been an inmate of St. Mary's Hospital, Bury St. Edmunds. He was the son of the late Samuel Slater, who was quite a figure in his day and a great ringing historian.

Mr. T. E. Slater had rung a number of peals of Minor and Major. He learnt to ring as soon as he could hold a rope and was, like his late father, an historian with a big library of ringing matter to which many present-day writers of ringing books have been pleased to refer.

His ringing career covered well nigh 60 years. His beloved bells at Glemsford are now out of order and it is much regretted that they cannot pay a farewell tribute to one who had done so much to keep them going. A.A.F.

MR. GEORGE TATUM.

The second well-known West Suffolk personality to die during the past week was Mr. George Tatum, of Sudbury, aged 82. He had not been ringing for the past few years.

Mr. Tatum had a number of peals to his credit and was noted for his high standard of ringing and his keen ear. His life was given to the church, 70 years a chorister and 50 years a finger, and for the past 10 years he was verger of St. Gregory's, Sudbury.

To the writer he had often said that he hoped he would die in his beloved church, and on November 10th, as he was preparing for a funeral, he had a seizure and died where he fell on the chancel steps.

A large congregation gathered at his funeral and during the evening the bells of St. Gregory's were rung muffled as a last tribute. A.A.F.

MR. WALTER WHITE.

It is with deep regret we report the passing of Mr. Walter White, of Cotgrave, Notts. For over 60 years he was a stalwart in the Nottingham District of the Midland Counties Association, and there are no towers within that area that knew not the name of Walter White and his late brother, William E. White.

Although Cotgrave possesses but six bells, on which the deceased was an expert conductor of many methods, he was also a safe ringer on eight or ten bells, and his passing will leave a serious gap in the ringers of the district.

He had rung some 80 peals for the M.C.A. and the Framland Society on all numbers from five to ten bells, conducting many of them. He was never so happy as when arranging a peal or ringing meeting and entertaining his many friends, and it was only his activities that kept the name of Cotgrave alive in ringing annals.

At his funeral on November 16th, Nottingham and district towers were represented, including Basford and Ratcliffe, with Mr. A. H. Ward, from Derby, and Mr. John Oldham, of Loughborough Bell Foundry. The Vicar of Cotgrave, in a moving address, paid a tribute

to Mr. White's sterling qualities as a man, a musician and a bellringer.

A course of Grandsire Triples was rung over the grave by A. H. Ward, Clement Glenn, F. Bradley and W. Nichols, and half-muffled touches were rung on the tower bells. Our sympathy goes out to his two sons and two daughters, and to Mrs. White, whom he so recently married. E. M.
