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#### THE LINCOLN JUBILEE

THE thoughts of ringers throughout the country have been centred this week on Lincoln. Celebrations took place last Saturday in honour of the jubilee of the Lincoln Diocesan Guild, and through our columns we desire to express the congratulations of the Exercise to the Guild on reaching its half-century.

Although not by any means the oldest of our territorial Associations or Guilds, Lincoln has always enjoyed a place in the inner Councils. The first Master, the Rev. H. Law James, contributed much as a composer, and while it was at St. Michael's, Gloucester, that he and his brother spent their youthful days, it was as Vicar of Surfleet that he did his great work for the Guild. 'Spliced' ringing was not accepted without a fight, and it was in the Rev. H. Law James that it had an outstanding champion. His mathematical mind delighted in the new intricacies that were opened by this field of ringing.

His successor came also from Surfleet in Mr. Rupert Richardson. He toured Lincolnshire in a systematic manner in the fiulfilment of his duties, and by his open-hearted generosity attracted to the village the leading ringers of the day. Rupert was emphatically a man of action. He was one of the saviours of 'The Ringing World,' upon the death of the founder-editor, Mr. J. S. Goldsmith. Posthaste he travelled from Surfleet to Pyrford upon receiving news of the paper's difficulties and doubts about its continuance. When major difficulties confronted the Exercise it was to Rupert that people turned; his shrewd business mind might be concealed beneath an exterior of benevolence, but the brain was ever active, and the advice he gave was sound. A memorial to his work is to be found among the bells of Lincoln Cathedral. As long as the Guild lasts, so the name of Rupert Richardson will remain. He was a big man in every way.

Readers of 'The Ringing World' are familiar with the assiduity with which the present Master, Mr. J. A. Freeman, has created around Lincoln Cathedral a band worthy to ring in such an historic and wonderful centre of the Christian faith. In the realm of performance the Lincoln Guild has in the past set the Exercise a number of objectives, and while comparison is invidious the diligence of the Lincoln ringers, particularly during these postwar years, is a spur to those renowned provincial bands centred at Birmingham, Leicester and in Cheshire. Mr. J. A. Freeman has also the gift of organisation and understanding.

The real strength of a Guild is not to be found in one or two crack bands who are constantly adding laurel leaves to the victor's crown, but to the conscientious small town and village companies who faithfully perform their duty Sunday by Sunday and maintain a spirit of friendliness. Last week we published a letter from a Lincolnshire ringer, Mr. James H. Musson. Simple and directly to the point, yet between the lines could be read the story of enthusiasm and keenness. It is not the headline makers or the controversialists that provide live copy to our journal, but the humbler ringers, whose solid background is the basis of country ringing in this land. To them a quarter peal is an occasion, and it is in recognition of such that we endeavour to give them a rightful place in the columns of 'The Ringing World.'

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#### Memories of Canon Coleridge

After the ringing it was revealed that the ringer (Mr. B. Hawkins) who could not finish the peal had during the week been celebrating an important domestic event, which in due course got to the ears of the Rev. G. F. Coleridge. I remember very well he put to good use the time occupied in walking to Blackwater Railway Station with a lecture about the need and the value of personal discipline in all bodily functions when proposing an important performance in the House of God. I am now the only survivor of the little party who on that long walk in the dark heard his words of wisdom.

A GOLDEN SOVEREIGN FOR FIRST PEAL

Fifty-seven years ago the Rev. G. F. Coleridge handled the 8th bell at Exeter Cathedral in a course of Grandsire Caters, the first change ringing on the bells, and as a boy I proudly watched him reveal his skill on a heavy bell. This was in 1892, but prior to this date, during one of his visits, he promised me a golden sovereign when I scored my first peal.

In those days he was a problem when on a ringing tour, and I remember two maiden ladies coming to our home at Exeter late one evening in great distress, for the ringer they agreed to accommodate for the night had arrived, and they were certain their small single bed would not be large enough for the largest parson they had ever seen!

Two peals that stand out in my memory more than the other I rang with him are the 'Devonians' peal at Putney in 1901, and the 7,392 of Double Norwich at Chiddingfold in 1907. Yes, the Canon enjoyed ringing just as much as his other activities, and with it all, wherever he was, he was a parson and a man. Good striking was a strong point and when he gave advice it was always sound. He would say, 'Stick to it and show what you can really say, 'Stick to it and snow what do; stick together with one intention and purpose to do your very best, not only in the matter of excellency of striking, but also of goodwill one to another.'

One could write columns about our beloved Canon, but space is still limited; therefore, it is best to sum up his many virtues by one simple word—true. True to himself, to others and his arts; true to each work to which he laid his hand, and, above all, he possessed that true heart, ever faithful, ever loyal, always pressing on to the high mark of his calling.

#### The Return of the Native

ANOTHER PEAL AT STRADBROKE.

ANOTHER PEAL AT STRADBROKE.

Few ringers have to wait nearly 27 years after scoring their first peal before attempting one on the bells of their native village; such has been the misfortune of Mr. David Vincent, now of Hale, Cheshire, who from time to time has rung in most surrounding towers yet heard Stradbroke bells for the first time since bowlead days when they struck into time since boyhood days when they struck into rounds for the peal of Cambridge there on November 12th.

During these years the bells have been considered unpealable and the tower unsafe and no peal was attempted on them. However, when a party of Suffolk ringers visiting Cheshire in 1947 made a call on David and realised his disappointment they decided to explore the almost unknown on their return. The outcome is now well known, which resulted in a peal of Cambridge there in November that year when Mr. Ernest Pye so ably rang the tenor.

November was again chosen this year and permission graciously given by the Vicar, Canon K. E. Shaw, from a sick bed in the very shadow of the tower, a gesture much appreciated by all. For this attempt it was always felt the band should consist of old always felt the band should consist of old friends of county origin — be they Men of Suffolk or Suffolk Men. Great satisfaction was felt when the Guild secretary, Mr. Cecil W. Pipe, who had tackled the seventh in the previous peal, offered to ring the tenor, and Mr. Leslie G. Brett, the former conductor, moving round one to the seventh. What a pair were these 'back end boys' and how they worked, first for an hour on ropes and bearings, 'dispensing' enough castor oil to run a hospital, and later by the masterful manner they rang the method, bells and tower.

FULL FORCE OF GALE. Stradbroke did not miss the gale which swept the country that day and the tall massive tower took full force. Whether this added to the existing difficulty of swaying tower is uncertain; the frame is certainly level with the certain; the trame is certainly level with the louvres and often the bells did some odd unexpected tricks. Between these there were spells of fine ringing and the grand old ring could be heard at its best.

At no time did the skipper, Mr. Leslie C. Wightman, wear an anxious look (he never does), and when he finally called 'Stand,' congratulations were at once showered on 'Jim'

does), and when he finally called 'Stand,' congratulations were at once showered on 'Jim' Pipe for a magnificent job. Never once was the tenor allowed any liberty. The same, too, applies to Lester on the seventh, a bad going bell. #### Mr. W. W. Worthington

LOSS TO MIDLAND COUNTIES GUILD.

We deeply regret to announce the death of William Worthington-Worthington, M.A., D.L., J.P., of Maple Hayes, Lichfield, which occurred on November 25th. He was aged 77 years. This truly 'great' man will be sadly missed in the Midland Counties, where he did so much for bells and ringers and was president of the Midland Counties Guild. He was great in stature (being well over 6ft.), in business, in estate and in generosity.

In his younger days he took the keenest delight in ringing. Learning to ring a bell in his undergraduate days at New College, Oxford, he later at his home at Netherseale took up the art, and was never so happy as when taking a party in his car to the churches around and intertaining ringers, which he did in an elaborate style.

He took part in 50 peals, many in seven Minor methods as well as a number of Surprise on higher numbers. There are few towers around the Midlands district that have not a marblette tablet to some performance he took part in. One of his last is so recorded at Netherseale, when he got together the late brothers Pye, T. Coles, B. Prewett, I. Shade and others and rang a peal of Bristol Surprise. The tablet records each ringer's total peals thus: 50, 939, 1,065, 635, 984, 413, 332, 1,184, total 5,602. He used to say he felt like a 'sprat among the mackerel' over this peal.

Although he gave up actual peal ringing owing to business and other ties, every year he had a 'ringing day,' when he invited all his old friends from Burton-on-Trent and district, and after a tour round the neighbouring towers, a grand spread and a lively even-ing's entertainment were provided. The writer ng's entertainment were provided. The writer had the pleasure of partaking in one of the last of these 'do's.' He was also the donor of over 20 bells to many parishes, among which were Netherseale, Overseal, Burton (St. Paul's and All Saints'), Stoke Golding, Measham, Rolleston, Northlew, Thurlaston, Tutbury, Repton, Marchington and St. Albans Abbey, His greatest gifts were at Seale, where he was patron of the living. At Overseal he gave three bells to complete the octave in 1919, and at Netherseale he first wave a treble to make at Netherseale he first gave a treble to make at Netherseale he first gave a treble to make six, then shortly afterwards gave two more to make the octave in 1911. These were hung anti-clockwise, so in 1937 he had them all rehung the correct way, and also gave a fine oak screen to divide the tower from the nave. It will be remembered that when 'The Ringing World' issued its 2,000th number, Mr. Worthington wrote, 'I am one of those who took "The Ringing World" from the start. I don't ring any more, but I read every word of

took "The Ringing World" from the start. I don't ring any more, but I read every word of the paper. Best wishes.'
Christ Church, Lichfield, was packed with a distinguished gathering at the memorial service on November 29th, cremation having taken place the previous day. The Dean of Lichfield (Very Rev. F. A. Iremonger) and the Vicar (Rev. G. H. Maydew) took the service, and the Cathedral choir sang the anthem. The Mayor, Deputy Mayor, the Sheriff and all the leading business men and women of Lichfield were present, and representing the ringers were Messrs. J. W. Cotton (secretary), W. H. Curson (chairman). Dear Sir, — The mistake in the f.c.h. of Wordsworth Surprise Major has been pointed out hy more than one of my good friends, the correspondents whose co-operation has made the series of Surprise Methods possible. They did so, in fact, hefore the second edition was printed, but in the rush of getting that issue to press the corrections were overlooked. So far as I know there are three Major methods with wrong f.c.h. attached. They are Knebworth, which has 25634, 53624, 65432; Kendal and Wordsworth, which both have 24365, 52643, 36524, 65243, 46532. Among the Royals, Cambridge and Lindoff 83 have 24365 as well as the two shown, while Wakefield has 54632, 65324. A complete errata list will be sent with the next issue of the series, which is to be published early in January.

It should be pointed out, however, that in no circumstances whatever should anyone emno circumstances whatever should anyone embark upon the production of peal or other compositions without making his own tests for the f.c.h. of the method itself as well as for their absence from the peal. Indeed, it is hardly too much to say that the conductor as well as the composer of any peal should be capable of proving it, except perhaps in the case of spliced peals, the proof of which, like their composing, is emphatically a specialist's

province. Many correspondents have suggested that I should complete the series of methods with an issue devoted to Treble Bob methods other than Surprise. Before embarking upon the collection of material for this I should be glad to hear from ringers as to the possible usefulness of such a group. Contributors would save me a great deal of work if they sent me their methods in half-lead form, not in place notation, and if available a note of the f.c.h., first performance or progressive lengths and first performance or progressive lengths, and the composition. WORDSWORTH SURPRISE MAJOR

Dear Sir,—In reply to Mr. A. R. Pink, I should like to point out that the false courseends of Wordsworth Surprise are as given in 'The Ringing World,' and not as in Mr. A. J. Corrigan's book, where they are incorrectly given as 24365, 43265 and 32465. Actually they are 24365, 65243, 52643, 36524 and 46532, and

there seems to be very little chance of obtaining a peal in full courses. Happily, all the fa.se course-ends affect the lead commencing 18674523, so that if a hob 'Before' is called in every course, the method can be treated as one with a clean proof scale. The composition is a half-peal of Double Oxford Bob Major, and was composed by the late Mr. J. A. Trollope in 1894. The figures will be found in the C.C. Collection of peals (Plain Bob and Double Oxford) on page 265, peal No. 22.—Yours sincerely,

I think the composition really belongs to the late Arthur Craven; he produced several peals on the same Craven; he produced several peals on the same plan for Rutland Surprise some time in the early 1920's. However, the same composition was used to a peal of St. Clement's College Bob Major (doubled by singles, of course) at Thorne, Yorkshire, on Saturday, May 1st, 1948; but as I had no means of ascertaining who was really the first to obtain it, the composition was credited to J. A. Trollope in the Yorkshire Association annual report in accordance with the peal report sent in by the conductor.

Taking priority as the standard, as is usual

raking priority as the standard, as is usual in crediting a composition to a certain composer, it will be very difficult to prove who is the rightful owner in the absence of actual dates.—Yours sincerely,

During the dedication service the new local

band rang the first touches of rounds, and after the service a course of Grandsire Doubles was rung by the team from Rayleigh, where the local band had received their first instruc-

After tea the bells were rung under the supervision of Mr. J. Chalk (Master of the S.W. District), Mr. F. V. Gant (secretary) and Mr. F. T. Lufkin, of Prittlewell, with rounds for the beginners and changes for more ad-

vanced ringers. Among the methods were Grandsire and Stedman Doubles, and Plain Bob, Cambridge Surprise, Kent Treble Bob, Oxford Treble Bob, Double Court and St. Clement's Minor.

Owing to defects of the frame, the bells had not been rung since 1913, but there is a record of an old peal board of 1794, unfortunately no longer in existence, and the new hand has therefore something to emulate.

Ringing will be at 6 p.m. on Sundays and at 7.30 p.m. on Thursdays.
