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THE CHURCH BELLS OF OXFORDSHIRE

NO county in Great Britain, we can assert with confidence, has a better record of its bells than Oxfordshire. Last month the final volume of 'The Church Bells of Oxfordshire,' by Mr. Frederick Sharpe, was published. The six volumes have been written by one who is an antiquarian as well as a practical ringer, and the assembled datum of founders that accompanies the last volume is of great interest. 'The Church Bells of Oxfordshire' is a reprint of Volume xxxiv. of the Oxfordshire Record Society's Publications, and this Society was able to publish the work through the generosity of the British Council of Archaeology.

The compilation of the work has extended over 30 years, judging from the footnotes denoting the dates of the author's visits. No fewer than 297 parish churches and chapels have been described. An account has been given of the bells of the Cathedral Church of Christ, Oxford, and of those in 22 Oxford colleges. Details are also given of the secular bells at Blenheim Palace, Woodstock, Carfax Tower, The Clarendon Press and The Bodleian Library, Oxford.

Attention is called by Mr. Sharpe that 62 pre-Reformation bells constituting almost 4½ per cent. of the total is a lower percentage than the average for the English counties whose campanological history has so far been written. In these the average number of mediæval bells is about 6 per cent. of the total.

The oldest bells in the county are the early 13th century inscribed bell at Caversfield, uninscribed bells of the same period at Kelmscot and Shifford, and later 13th century bells at Hampton Gay, St. Clement's, Oxford and Goring-on-Thames. Interesting examples of 14th century bell-founding are at Adwell, Alkerton, Ambrosden, Broughton Poggs, Burford, Dorchester, Idbury, Newton Purcell, Stoke Talmage and Swyncombe. The best toned mediæval bells are those at Burford, Dorchester and Christ Church Cathedral.

An unusual feature is the high proportion of saunce bells, which total a little over 42 per cent., in proportion to the number of churches.

The largest bell is Great Tom of Oxford, which was recently rehung by Messrs. Mears and Stainbank and weighs 6 tons 4½ cwt. Christ Church, Oxford, has the largest tenor bell with a weight of approximately 30 cwt. and is closely followed by those at Bloxham and Merton College 28 cwt., St. Mary-the-Virgin's, Oxford, 27 cwt., Bampton 25 cwt., and Adderbury and Watlington 24 cwt.

As to the foundries which supplied the bells, Mr. Sharpe states that the majority of the mediæval bells in the county came from the foundries at Wokingham, Reading, Buckingham and London. The Exeter, Gloucester, Toddington and Worcester foundries are also represented.

In the 17th century most of the bells in the north of the county came from the foundry of the Bagleys at Chacombe; the Keenes of Woodstock monopolised the centre; and the Knights of Reading supplied most of the bells in the south. The Neales of Burford were active in the west, but did less work than the others. During the Commonwealth, Michael Darbie set up furnaces in Oxford and cast many bells for local churches.

With the exception of the Bagleys all the above-mentioned foundries had disappeared by the 18th century, during which time the chief founders at work in the county were the Rudhalls of Gloucester and the Wells of Aldbourne.

In the first quarter of the 19th century the Oxford foundry was established by members of the Taylor family, one of whom afterwards removed to Loughborough, where he built the foundry which has subsequently become world famous. Over 150 bells have been made for Oxfordshire churches by the Taylors. The equally famous Whitechapel Foundry, established in 1575 or a few years earlier, has supplied over 300 bells to churches in the county. Some 50 bells have been supplied by the Croydon foundry and a similar number by the Cripplegate foundry. The only bell foundry in Oxfordshire in recent years was that of the Bonds of Burford, established just after the middle of the last century and finally closed on the death of Thomas Bond in 1947.

Mr. Frederick Sharpe has enhanced the value of these volumes by the splendid collection of photographs of old bells and other interesting features. To the student of old bells and founders' marks these volumes will make a strong appeal.

NORTH STAFFS ASSOCIATION

Many Young Ringers at Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the North Staffs Change Ringers' Association was held at Stoke on December 5th and was attended by 52 ringers from the following towers:—Broughton, Bucknall, Leek, Norton, Newcastle, Longton, Uttoxeter, Biddulph, Stoke, Allesley (Coventry), Lawton, Brown Edge, Wolstanton.

The bells of Stoke Parish Church were made good use of during the afternoon and evening, a good variety of methods being successfully accomplished. It was incidental that the bells were rung on a Saturday when the Stoke football team happened to win their match with Bristol.

The ringers were entertained by the Archdeacon, the Venerable P. Hartill, Rector of Stoke, who welcomed the ringers and stated how pleased he was to invite them and to see so many young ringers present. This was a good sign for change ringing in the area. He told the gathering that the Bishop of Lichfield had accepted the invitation to become a patron of the Association.

Mr. R. S. Anderson, in replying to the Archdeacon, said that he wished to thank the Archdeacon for the use of the bells and for the tea which he had provided. This showed his continued interest in the Association. He informed the company that the bells from St. Giles', Newcastle, had now been taken to the works of Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, Croydon, and he hoped that the rehanging of the bells would be done as soon as the repair of the fabric of the tower had been completed.

CHIME EFFECTS ON THE PIANO

Many ringers have attempted to reproduce on the piano the five notes of a bell. Miss Peggy Spencer Palmer, B.Mus. (London), in the 'Pianist's Book of Chimes' (price 3s. 6d., Ricordi), has provided a book of chime effects for the piano which we are sure will be received with much appreciation by all pianist ringers.

From her childhood days Miss Spencer Palmer has been exploring chime effects in trying to imitate on the keyboard the sounds of the pealing of bells and the chiming of clocks.

This interest developed in an unexpected manner. After having accompanied the singing in a 'Sunday Half-Hour' broadcast from Bristol, the B.B.C. officials asked Miss Spencer Palmer to 'play them out' at the end. In the course of her concluding voluntary on the piano—an ordinary upright one—she introduced some 'chimes' into an extemporisation on hymns and carols which lasted, to her surprise, four and a half minutes, instead of the few seconds she had anticipated. The sequel was a number of letters from strangers asking for 'the title, composer and publisher of the piece(!)' played at the end, and several inquiring also what instrument was used for the bells.

The practical way of producing bell effects on the piano is to use a chord of five notes. The right hand is always played two octaves higher. The damper (loud) pedal must be depressed throughout the whole of the piece so that the chords vibrate against each other as long as possible, as do the bells in a belfry. In the music the strike notes are shown in larger type, and these are to be emphasised slightly.

Music is contained in 'The Pianist's Book of Chimes' for rounds on six, eight or ten bells, Queen's, Plain Bob Minor, Stedman Doubles and Grand sire Triples. There are some 34 hymns, carols and national community songs and also a nursery rhyme section.

HIS CHRISTMAS GREETING

This bell we know, though upside down,
Would Joyous Christmas' ring.
But 'Peace on Earth' will be assured
'Cos bloomin' bell won't ring.!

SYNTHETIC BELLS

Correspondence in a National Newspaper

Synthetic and recorded bells have been the subject matter of correspondence in the columns of 'The Daily Telegraph.' Mr. E. A. Barnett, hon. secretary of the Central Council, contributed the following letter:—

'Sir,—I do not think the Rev. Barnard Croft is quite right in implying that there are fewer ringers in the country as a whole than there were years ago.

'It is unfortunately true that not every church with bells has the ringers to man them, but this has always been the case, as the membership records of any territorial bell-ringing association would show. Nor is the presence of women in the belfry an innovation—indeed, there has been a Ladies' Guild in existence for the past 40 years.

'Nevertheless, I join with Mr. Croft in regretting that the Church Assembly did not even vote on the motion deprecating the introduction of synthetic and recorded bells. Where a church already possesses both bells and ringers, the idea of installing recorded bells becomes ridiculous. Yet an application of this nature is shortly to come before the Chancellor of Wells.

'This is the kind of thing which, if continued, can only lead to the silencing of real bells and the extinction of what the Dean of St. Paul's once called "one of the few surviving folk-arts," that of change-ringing in the English style—something which is unknown outside English-speaking countries.

'The case against synthetic and recorded bells was well put a few months ago by the chairman of the Ripon Diocesan Advisory Committee. "If mechanical bell-ringing," he asked, "why not mechanical choir-recording, or indeed mechanical worship altogether? To hear a 'ring' of bells from an obvious one-bell turret strikes any thoughtful person as an imposture, unworthy of a church which stands for truth."

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THE GUILD OF DEVONSHIRE RINGERS

A Note of Optimism From Exeter Branch

The annual meeting of the Exeter Branch was held at St. Mark's, Exeter, on December 12th. Votes of thanks were heartily accorded to the Rev. C. J. Poulton, the organist, and to all assisting in arrangements for the meeting.

Under 'Any Other Business' ringing for service at St. David's (Exeter) until the new band was proficient was discussed. It was decided that Mr. F. Wills should endeavour to fix ringing whenever possible.

This concluded the meeting. The afternoon's programme continued with ringing at the Cathedral, Heavitree and St. David's.

This was the Vicar's 100th peal on the bells of his own church, the only other incumbent who has accomplished this being the Rev. F. E. Robinson.

(Mr. Pearson, who died in 1942 at the age of 82, was the founder of the Cambridge University Guild. He rang altogether about 150 peals on the bells of Henley Church, of which he was Vicar for 47 years.)

MR. SAM QUINTRELL'S 98th BIRTHDAY

Mr. Sam Quintrell, who is still recognised as captain of the tower at St. Colum Major, Cornwall, was 98 on December 13th. This being a Sunday, the Rector, the Rev. A. Gordon Cooke, made special reference to the notable occasion at the services, and the local ringers rang a special 'peal' after evensong. On the afternoon before, eight members of the Truro Diocesan Guild attempted a birthday peal of Grandsire Triples, but unfortunately this year the peal came to an abrupt end just after half-way.

Mr. Quintrell rang last for the Coronation, and he would still be able to lead a good 'peal' up and down if he could get into the ringing chamber, but the stairs beat him at the moment. He is still active, and this grand old man of ringing in Cornwall has followed the progress of ringing so closely that he appreciates good ringing whatever it may be—stone or scientific.

LADIES' GUILD Western District

The quarterly meeting of the Western District of the Ladies' Guild was held at Portsmouth on December 12th. Good use was made of the bells during the afternoon and evening, and though the gentlemen outnumbered the ladies by about two to one, members of the Guild were able to enjoy a wide variety of methods from rounds to Cambridge Major.

During the service, which was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Gill, a special board was dedicated to commemorate a peal rung as a tribute to the work of Mrs. E. E. Edwards.

OBITUARY

MR. RANDALL G. PORT

Ringers in East Kent will learn with regret the sudden death of Mr. Randall G. Port, of Canterbury, which occurred on December 18th. Mr. Port, who was 68, had been a member of the Kent County Association for a number of years, and during the years 1945-50 occupied the position of Ringing Master in the Canterbury District, and became very popular during this time. He had been a member of the Cathedral band since 1944, and was instrumental in forming the band at St. Dunstan's, Canterbury, after the war.

Probably the first to acknowledge his limits as a ringer, he was a master of chess. He joined the Canterbury Club in 1908, and was one of the strongest players in the club. He was secretary of the club from 1926 to 1946, and in 1950 was elected a life member. He helped the club to win the county championship on three occasions, and had also played for his county on many occasions.

The funeral took place at St. Stephen's, and ringers were present from both St. Dunstan's and the Cathedral. During the evening the bells at the Cathedral and St. Dunstan's were rung half-muffled to his memory.

MRS. W. W. WOLSTENCROFT

Mrs. Wolstencroft, wife of Mr. W. W. Wolstencroft, of Stoke Poges, died on December 21st at the age of 81 years, and on Wednesday afternoon, December 23rd, she was interred in the peaceful old churchyard at Stoke Poges, which she had come to love in her later years.

The service was taken by the Vicar, the Rev. D. H. Bryant-Bevan, who in a few words of comfort to the mourners referred to her lifetime of work for the Church which she had served so faithfully in so many ways, including singing in the choir, teaching in Sunday School, Moral Welfare work, the Mothers' Union, the Girls' Friendly Society and ringing. Among those attending were Mr. W. W. Wolstencroft (widower), Mr. and Mrs. T. G. Hawkins (son-in-law and daughter), Mrs. A. D. Barker (representing the Ladies' Guild) and a number of ringers from local towers. The traditional last honours to a Church bellringer were given by the ringing of a course of Triples at the graveside by Mrs. A. D. Barker 1-2, Mr. W. Welling 3-4, Mr. W. E. Judd 5-6, Mr. R. I. Shepherd 7-8.

After the service an impressive quarter peal of Bob Minor was rung on the half-muffled tower bells by the following—F. R. Scott 1, W. E. Judd 2, Mrs. A. D. Barker 3, W. Welling 4, R. I. Shepherd 5, W. Birmingham (conductor) 6.

Mrs. Wolstencroft's ringing career began in 1914 when she became one of the band of ladies who took over the ringing at St. Peter's Church, Ashton-under-Lyne, throughout World War I, under the leadership of Mr. Wolstencroft. She took part in the ringing by an all-ladies' band for the Armistice on November 11th, 1918, and continued as a regular service ringer until 1942, when age and infirmity intervened. She did, however, summon sufficient strength to ring on VE Day and VJ Day, at the age of 73.

During her active ringing period she took part in nine peals in which she rang the treble steadily and reliably. One of these was rung for her own silver wedding, when she took the place of an absentee at a moment's notice.

At the formation of the North-Western Branch of the Ladies' Guild she was elected the first chairman, and when this Branch later became part of the Northern District she was invited to be president, but had to decline on account of her removal to the South. She was also a member of the Lancashire Association, the Chester Guild and the Oxford Diocesan Guild.

THE SOCIETY OF UNION SCHOLARS

We present some extracts of the manuscripts relating to the Union Scholars, established 1713, together with a number of early peals. Reference was made to the records of the Society on page 562 of the issue of August 28th, 1953.

ORDERS TO BE OBSERVED BY THE SOCIETY OF UNION SCHOLARS.

IMPRIMIS. It is Order'd,

That on the first Monday in May yearly (being the year's peal) election be made of three members, one of whom to serve the office of Master and the other two the office of Stewards for the year ensuing, and upon refusal of such persons so elected they shall forfeit five shillings to the use of the Company. N.B.—That election be made of a member to serve the office of Master according to his seniority.

Order'd:—

That the two persons so elected to officiate as Stewards together with the Master, determine such matters or things as shall be for the good and credit of the Company.

That no man be admitted except he is a civil man and a sufficient ringer. For approbation, he shall ring a bell with the Company, and if approved of, on his paying one shilling at his entry to the Warner shall be admitted by the Master at a publick meeting of the Company.

Order'd:—

That on the first Monday in May, yearly and every year, the Company meet together at such convenient time and in such place (within the City of London) as to them shall seem most proper, the Stewards to provide a Dinner, and in order to defray the charge of this Dinner, the Stewards shall receive of each member two shillings and sixpence, and for the better hindrance of excess it is further ordered that the year's forfeits be disbursed towards the overplus (if any such there be) of this expense. The Stewards to expend no more than any other member and—

It was unanimously agreed,

That a weekly peal be kept on every Monday, the time appointed for meeting is precisely at 7 o'clock in the winter and at 8 o'clock in the summer. N.B.—The place of meeting not to be out of the City aforesaid.

Order'd:—

That at all such weekly meetings, each member expend sixpence and if the reckoning amounts to more the Stewards shall pay it.

That, if any of this Society being timely warned at any extraordinary meeting shall fail in his appearance, for such neglect shall pay sixpence, save on a very emergent occasion.

That as Gaming is considered a growing evil and tends manifestly to the Prejudice not only of this but of all other Societies—

Resolv'd therefore:—

Whosoever shall be found guilty thereof shall forfeit for the first offence one shilling, and if afterwards the Person so found guilty commits the same fault, he shall be expell'd the Society.

Order'd:—

That since no Society, whether for Gain or Pleasure can well last without having due respect to the Divine Being, whereby 'tis presumed things may be better regulated for the reputation of this fraternity, it is

Resolv'd—

That if any Member at any Meeting of Ringing or other assembly shall curse, swear, or vainly utter the name of God whether it is owing to his Ebriety or any other unseemly Quality, for every such Fault shall pay two-pence, and if by too frequent a practice of the same shall be deem'd a Corrupter and Expell'd the Society.

Order'd—

That the Stewards shall keep a brief Abstract of all Forfeits to the end, that they may be capable to Inform any one of his offence if Scrupled or Denied.

That the Company shall Elect a carefull honest Man to be their Warner, who, upon the Instructions given him by the Master or Stewards, shall give notice to such part of the Society so intended to meet, for the Execution of which office the Stewards shall collect one shilling per man throughout the Society, to be paid him on every Feast Day yearly.

That these Orders be in the Custody of the Master and shall be Read by him or his Order at the Entrance of any New Member, whereof, if he fail he shall pay one shilling.

And lastly, it is further order'd, agreed and concluded upon.

That if any Dispute should arise, touching or concerning these Orders or Rules or anything Therein contained, the matter so in dispute shall be refer'd to the Master and Stewards who shall Decide the same, and the person or persons concern'd not submitting to their Determination shall be Expell'd the Society."

FROM THE APPENDIX.

Mr. Osborne having at length described the doings of this Society, we purpose therefore only to make mention of such points of interest as may suggest themselves in connection with the different ringing performances of the Union Scholars.

No. 1. In the note book of Benjamin Annable, now in the possession of one of the writers, there is a method called "Gawthorne's Hic Triples," which is Grandsire with third and fifth place bobs, the "Hic" being used to denote the latter call. We therefore consider that there can be little doubt that this was a Grandsire peal of this description; whether however it was Garthorn's original peal there is no means of ascertaining, still we think the evidence points to this conclusion. In Annable's book the ordinary method of Union Triples is given under the heading of "Baldwin's Union Triples," this gives strong confirmation to the Hick Triples being Grandsire with fifth place bobs, as in all probability the author of "Union Triples" was the same Robert Baldwin who rang the seventh in this and the following peal, and from his presumed abilities and his station at the seventh we may not be considered rash if we point to the probability of his having conducted both peals.

No. 2. Although the calling of this peal is 5120 B. W. H. not given in the peal book, it has been 35264 handed down to us 56342 and so far back as 64523 36245 2 2 1788, it is stated in the *Clavis* that the annexed peal is the one here recorded. Perhaps however the most curious fact is the statement of the authors of the *Clavis* that it was not until fifty years after the time when this peal was rung that the discovery was made of the necessity of further proof than the truth of the treble leads in this method, which it is perhaps hardly necessary to state is that now known as Oxford Treble Bob Major.

No. 3. As the first peal of Bob Royal was the one rung by the College Youths at St. Bride's, on November 22nd, 1725, it is probable that the real meaning of this very decided claim to the first peal is only to be taken to signify that this was the first on the bells or by the Society. All these ancient records are very indefinite in such matters.

No. 4. This is one of the unexplained mysteries connected with the statement so tenaciously adhered to by some persons that the first peal of Grandsire Triples was not performed until 1751.
