THE CENTRAL COUNCIL AT NEWCASTLE

THE wettest Whitsun for fifty years did not prevent members of the Council from having a most enjoyable time during their stay at Newcastle, and those whose first visit to that city it was must have come away very favourably impressed both with the city itself and the surrounding countryside.

As this was the first session of a new Council, much of the actual meeting was taken up by elections and re-elections. The decision of Mr. Lewis to stand again for the presidency was warmly approved, although he hinted that this must be for the last time. To find a worthy successor will be no easy matter, and much thought will no doubt be given to this problem during the next three years.

Two well-known names were added to the honorary members, Messrs. J. T. Dyke and C. W. Roberts, both of whom had ceased to be representative members and whose services the Council did not wish to lose. Miss P. J. Ayris was also added in recognition of her services in undertaking the sale of publications. Three new names appear on the Standing Committee, where Mr. W. B. Cartwright replaces Mr. Gilbert Debenham as a representative of the legal profession, and Messrs. John Freeman and Fred E. Dukes come in for Alderman Paddon Smith and Mr. Albert Walker. The retiring members deserve the thanks of the Exercise for their many years of valuable service to the Council. The relief of the secretary and his assistant that no ballot was necessary for this committee did not escape notice!

Of the other changes, the main one was the setting up of a separate Broadcasting and Television Committee, which, consisting as it does of four members who already have active contact with one or other of the B.B.C.'s regions, leads one to hope that this may usher in a period of youthful co-operation with that body. The Rev. F. Ll. Edwards, who with Alderman Paddon Smith had been a member of the Literature and Press Committee for thirty years, and who had, one noticed by chance, suggested this splitting up of the committee at the 1933 meeting, presented his report for the last time, and he and his colleagues—Mr. Walker being the other—received the thanks of the members for all they have done. Mr. Edgar Shepherd is an admirable choice to succeed him as convener of the committee, and Mr. Fred Dukes, editor of 'The Irish Bell News,' is well qualified to assist him.

Naturally, the meeting was not without controversy; but no worth-while meeting is. After Mr. Harold Poole, in the regretted absence of Mr. J. F. Smallwood for domestic reasons, had presented with his customary efficiency the report of 'The Ringing World' Committee, together with a number of further recommendations (the main one being that the price should remain unchanged for the time being, until the outcome of the present drive for additional postal subscribers can be properly judged), a lively discussion followed on the motion regarding anonymous letters. Eventually an amendment by Mr. G. W. Fletcher, acceptable to both sides, was carried without opposition, the outcome being that it will be left to the Editor to consult the committee when in doubt.

The result of the debate on the report of the Analysis Committee was less satisfactory. The committee could point to the fact that Bob Triples has been officially considered irregular for fifty years, and several members, including Mr. Percy Johnson, who spoke with his usual forcefulness, urged that the decision should be enforced, however belatedly. Against this, however, was the view that to do so without warning, as on a previous occasion, would cause considerable resentment, and eventually the particular section of the report was shelved; but notice was given on behalf of the Standing Committee that in future all peals not conforming to the Council's decisions would be excluded from the Analysis, although—and this is the main point—they will be published in this journal. By this means it is hoped that a grievance felt by a number of ringers will be removed. As has often been said, the Council does not dictate what shall be rung, but does decide what it will recognise.

And so to the close, with the President recalling that he had given the first report of the Towers and Belfries Committee (which had earlier been paid a well-deserved tribute by Mr. J. H. Crampion) at Newcastle forty-one years previously. He asked others present on that occasion to stand up, and the Rev. F. Ll. Edwards with Messrs. A. A. Hughes and P. J. Johnson responded. There were many new faces at the meeting, but many old friends were missing. May the newcomers render to the art of ringing the same service as many of those whom they replaced. They could not do better than keep before them the example of the four whose membership of the Council goes back more than four decades.

Stonham Aspal, Suffolk

Canon J. J. Raven, in his 'Church Bells of Suffolk' (1890), records that 'the first ten 'ever to he heard in Suffolk were Stonham Aspal's, about six miles east of Stowmarket.

For the last 20 or 30 years the eighth of this fine ring at the Parish Church of St. Mary and St. Lambert has been cracked. Now yet another restoration in Suffolk has taken place.

For a long time Mr. William J. Button, captain of the tower, had been seriously considering launching a restoration fund appeal, but it was not until May 24th, 1952, following another prompting from his ringer friend of 30 years—Mr. Cecil W. Pipe (secretary, Suffolk Guild)—that things were really set going.

Sufficient money came in from dances, jumble sales, competitions, socials and a collection in the parish as well as a general appeal so that, by the end of 1953, the work was put into the hands of Messrs. Gillett and Johnston (Croydon). The eighth was recast and, with the help of a few pieces of silver thrown into the boiler by Mr. Button and the Rector, it is now a finetoned splice, born again.

The other nine have been retuned and generally renovated, one new headstock has been installed and all are now on ball bearings.

and all are now on ball bearings.

The dedication service was held on May 22nd. The church was filled for the service in spite of a dull, cold, rainy day

The Rector (the Rev. J. W. H. K. Greenway) conducted the service, and Mr. Malcolm Fisk, a lay reader, led the procession of clergy from neighbouring parishes. One lesson was read by Miss Muriel Pipe, a local ringer, and the other by Mr. Michael Howard, a director of the contractors. Mr. Button handed the rope of the recast eighth to Mr. S. P. Turner, people's warden and he, in turn, handed it to Canon L. Babington, Vicar of St. Mary-le-Tower, Ipswich,

who dedicated the bell. At the request of the Rector's warden, Mr. C. Tydeman, Canon Babington then rededicated the other nine bells and later gave the address, taking 'Thine is the Kingdom, the Power and the Glory' as his

He congratulated the Rector and the parishioners on the work they had done in raising all but £60 of the total cost (£742). The undertaking was a great one, coming so soon as it did after much effort by the church and parish had been spent on the work which had been done to the church school—it showed the vitality of church life there.

After a few touches by the local ringers, every-one went to the nearby Village Hall for tea. To a crowded assembly the Vicar expressed thanks for all their work and support. He was happy to be able to announce that the collection just taken in church had brought the deficit down from £60 to £40, and this was later in the day reduced to £20.

Mr. Button said that Messrs. Gillett and Johnston had made a splendid job of the restoration and their two employees, Mr. Dyer and Mr. Gifford, had worked in the chamber from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. to get the work sufficiently advanced for the bells to be rung on the day of the Queen's return from her Commonwealth tour on May 15th.

Mr. C. W. Pipe said that this was the 27th restoration in Suffolk since the war. It seemed restoration in Suffolk since the war. It seemed as if restoration in the county was a little contagious and he hoped it would get more so—there was a lot to be done. 'But if we go on like this, we shall have bells second to no other county.' He thanked Mr. Button and Mr. and Mrs. Russell Parker (local ringers) and all others who had helped. He noted that Mr.

Richard Deal, from St. Paul's Cathedral, and other ringers from Essex and Norfolk were present with so many Suffolk ringers. These visits made for good relations.

Mrs. Deal, Mr. John Crampion (Woodford), Mr. David W. Beard (also from Essex) and Mr. Charles J. Sedgley (from Ipswich, Suffolk Guild Ringing Master) were amongst the company of ringers, estimated to be well on for 100, who gathered during the afternoon and evening.

Beckford, Glos.

After being silent since October. 1952, the bells of St. John-the-Baptist, Bcckford, are once more pealing their music from the ancient tower of the beautiful old church. On May 27th, during evening service conducted by the Rev. W. W. Baker, late Vicar of the parish. the three new bells and the new frame were dedicated by the Vicar of the adjoining parish of Alderton. Following the service the bells were rung to Grandsire, Plain Bob, Kent and Cambridge Surprise by visiting ringers from the surrounding district. Some 50 ringers were present representing 20 different towers.

The work of recasting the bells and installing the new frame was carried out by Messrs, John Taylor and Co., of Loughborough, and they are to be congratulated on an excellent job; the 'go' of the bells leaves nothing to be desired.

Ringers will recall reading in 'The Ringing World' some 19 months ago the report of the fire which destroyed the old wooden frame and cracked two of the bells.

NEWCASTLE'S GREAT WELCOME TO CENTRAL COUNCIL

LOYAL GREETINGS TO THE QUEEN - HON. SECRETARY'S CONTACT WITH OUTSIDE ORGANISATIONS - ROLL OF HONOUR APPROACHING FINALITY

THE warmth of the welcome to the Central Council to Newcastle after an absence of 41 years could not have been surpassed. large number of towers were placed at the disposal of visiting ringers, and at the conclusion of the meeting a civic reception was given by the Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress in the beautiful Laing Art Gallery.

The 27th Council (57th annual meeting) was held on Whit Tuesday in the Cathedral Library and proceedings were opened by a welcome from the Lord Mayor and the Bishop of Newcastle (the Right Rev. N. B. Hudson). They were received by Mr. E. H. Lewis, the president of the Council, and with them were the Provost (the Very Rev. N. M. Kennaby) and the president of the Durham and Newcastle Diocesan Association (Mr. R. A. Gofton).

The Lord Mayor said he had come to the conclusion that the art of change ringing was a very complicated one and one which he himself would not endeavour to try to learn. During the war the bells were silent and he knew they had a lot of hard work to get their teams together and start the bells once again. To-day they had a great difficulty once again. To-day they had a great difficulty in getting teams together, partly because the young men started off and then had to go on National Service and then start again. He hoped they would all enjoy their stay.

The Lord Bishop, in his welcome, said it was a great occasion for their Association because they had not visited Newcastle for 40 years. For 15 years he had been patron of the Dur-ham and Newcastle Diocesan Association and, so far as he could recollect, that was the first time he had done anything as patron.

For his information their secretary sent him particulars of the Council meeting and from it he was impressed by two facts: the determina-tion of all concerned to keep high the art of campanology (if that was the correct word), and that behind it there was a determination to do their best to the glory of God. convinced that once this art or any other art is divorced from the spiritual life of the Church it degenerates.' He would like to pay a humble tribute to that work and the motive behind it.

The second point was that those who offered this service were worshipping church workers

and not people outside the Church.

The President thanked the Lord Mayor for his civic welcome and the Lord Bishop for his ecclesiastical welcome. 'We always feel,' said Mr. Lewis, 'that we are connected with both Church and State and workers for both.

As regarded the word 'campanology,' it was

often used, to their regret. They liked purity in all things: they did not like words that were a mixture of Latin and Greek.

It was 41 years since he attended the last Central Council meeting at Newcastle. It was the coldest Whitsun that he could remember.

There was one interesting thing about most

There was one interesting thing about meeting there. The earliest mention in English literature of bells was made by the Venerable Bede, who lived just across the river. It was mentioned in connection with St. Hilda at Whitby.

He thanked the Provost for allowing them to meet in the Cathedral Library and for conducting the service that morning.

REPORT OF THE HON. LIBRARIAN
At our meeting last Whitsun I was appointed librarian, and the Rev. E. S. Tarrant agreed to house the library in Launton Rectory. We are greatly indebted to him. Miss Ayris agreed to continue to run the sales section of the library for me, and had it not been for kindness in relieving me of so much work, I could not have accepted office. The indexing of the books and manuscripts is proceeding slowly: I am in urgent need of files and bookcases, but am reluctant to ask the Council for them in view of the financial situation. view of the financial situation.

The borrowing of books of reference appears to be limited to a few who are engaged in research. In regard to sales, 'Village Bells' is the best seller, with 'Hints to Beginners' a good second, Sales of 'Change Ringing on Handbells' and 'Doubles and Minor Methods'

are also very good.

'Double Norwich Court Bob Caters.' 'Collection of Peals, Section II.' and 'Variation and Transposition' are sold out, and a decision on reprinting them is required. A decision on the reprinting of 'Doubles and Minor Methods' is also needed as stocks are almost exhausted.

Stocks of 'Preservation and Repair of Bells' are very low and, as convener of the Towers and Belfries Committee, I am able to report that the committee recommends it be reprinted, subject to minor revisions.

The fact that the library is expected to pay £20 for advertisements in 'The Ringing World' is expected to pay has made the balance sheet look unhealthy; and to offset it I recommend that the prices of the undermentioned publications be increased of the undermentioned publications be increased as follows: 'Major Compositions,' from 2s. 9d. to 3s.; 'Change Ringing on Handbells,' from 2s. to 2s. 6d.: 'Preservation and Repair of Bells,' from 1s. 2d. to 2s.; 'Cambridge' Method sheets from 4d. to 6d.; 'Bristol' Method sheets from 4d. to 6d.; 'Plain Major Methods.' from 3s to 3s. 6d.

I also recommend that no discount be allowed on quantities of 'Village Bells.'

A grateful acknowledgment is made of the gift by the relatives of the late Mr. A. J. Corrigan of his publications on change ringing, a limited number of which are available for sale. Mr. A. N. Wood, of Northampton, has once again rebound several copies of 'Bell News' and 'The Ringing World,' and in some instances has inserted copies where the originals were defective or missing. Our sincere thanks are tendered for this valuable work.

During the year the library has received the following gifts: Copies of 'The Irish Bell News' from Mr. F. E. Dukes: 'St. Martin's Youths' from the author, Mr. E. C. Shepherd; 'Notes for Beginners' from the author, Mr. W. G. Wilson; and I have placed in the library a copy of volume IV. of my 'Church Bells of Oxfordshire'. Oxfordshire.

The report showed that 949 publications were sold for £313 7s. 7d. Best sales were: 'Village Bells' 223, 'Hints for Beginners' 164, 'Handbells' 116, 'Doubles and Minor' 82, 'Preservation of Bells' 57.

The hon. secretary reported that the Standing Committee recommended that 'Preservation of Bells' and 'The Minor Collection,' with amendment, be reprinted, and that 'Double Norwich Bob Caters,' 'Collection of Peals, Section II.,'

Mr. J. Seager regretted that they had no publication dealing with Spliced Triples. He was the compiler of the Four Ways Tables and he hoped that in the reprinting of 'Minor Methods' there would be a rearrangement. He regretted that the sales of the Four Ways Tables were disappointing. He was prepared to put down a lump sum so that a copy of the Table could be sent free with the remaining 66 books of Minor. 66 books of Minor.

Mr. Felstead promised to consult Mr. Seager when the book was revised. The report was

adopted.

THE ACCOUNTS

Presenting the accounts, Mr. E. A. Barnett said there was an excess of expenditure over income of £53 on the general account which was largely due to a donation of £50 to the Canon Coleridge Memorial Fund. The affiliation fees of £37 10s, would be doubled next year, which would give a margin on the right side. The publication account showed a loss of £3 15s. 7d., which was due to the payment of £20 to 'The Ringing World' fund for advertisement

Mr. F. E. Dukes questioned whether some of the £1,486 cash at bank and in hand could not be invested. He noticed that £800 had been invested in 3 per cent. Defence Bonds.

ROLL OF HONOUR

Mr. H. Miles said that in 1949 at York he was asked to compile the Roll of Honour; it was now 1954 and was approaching finality. There were 32 pages in the first Roll of Honour and 23 in the second, and the photostat copies would cost 6s. per page, making a total of £16 10s. The binding of the photostat copy would be about £3 10s. The site of the Roll of Honour had been agreed. It would be near the library in St. Paul's Cathedral and passed by thousands of people on their way to the Whispering Gallery. CLERGY AND PEAL-RINGING

Dear Sir,-I was pleased to see my friend, the Rev. R. J. St. J. Smith's reply to your 'Forty Years Ago' comment. When I read the latter I thought on exactly the same lines as he did-our lack of opportunity to-day as compared with our predecessors' 40 years ago. I forget the exact figures, but roughly, whilst the population has increased from some 35 to 45 million since 1914, the number of clergy has decreased from about 19,000 to under 15,000. Comparisons are certainly odious in this case. I suppose I live in an area which gives me a greater chance of peal ringing than any of my brother clergy ringers, but it has taken me nearly 10 years to ring my 50 peals, simply because my time is so occupied that I cannot stand in peal attempts except the occasional one at my own church. (I have to limit them because we are in the middle of a town.) I know the other clergy similarly lack opportunities.

After reading your comment, I actually had a quick count of clerical peal ringers last year and found that 19 of us rang 55 peals between us. I noticed only one peal where two clerics were in the band, thus we stood in 54 peals. The 145 peals of 1913 must be reduced in number quite a lot, for on many occasions there were more than one agreen in the extreme. there was more than one parson in the attempt. I haven't had time to go through the lists except to notice that in the Cambridge University ringing week up to six clerics took part in any individual peal. Actually, too, the proportion of peals conducted by a parson was greater last year than in 1913 (the Rev. A. S. Roberts heading the list).

heading the list).

I don't know how many ringing parsons there were in 1913, but the Clerical Guild has now nearly 70 members and there are very many parsons whom I know personally who can ring a bit but are not members. With the changed circumstances, I don't think the position is as bad as your comment suggests. It is interesting to note that one name appears on the peal list in both years—the Rev (now Canon) C. C. Cox, the president of the Guild. Two others, the Rev. (now Prebendary) E. V. Cox and the Rev. R. P. Farrow, were present during our recent ringing week. The Exercise owes a great debt of gratitude to them, and other members, for their long service.

Einally may I say that Mr. Smith is too

Finally, may I say that Mr. Smith is too modest in his final statement, for it was he who conducted, so admirably, the peal of Cambridge in 1949. May I add, too, that we had hoped to ring the first peal of London by eight parsons last year, but Mr. Smith's valiant efforts to find a suitable time when we could all muster to make the attempt failed. I don't say it couldn't have been done 40 years ago, but it certainly wasn't.—Yours sincerely,

FORTY-TWO SURPRISE MAJOR METHODS TO A PEAL

'Correct in Every Detail,' Says Umpire

As briefly announced in a recent issue, a new record has been established in Spliced Surprise Major ringing by the first peal in 42 methods. This was rung at Handsworth, Sheffield, on May 29th, by the same band that established the record of the peal in 36 methods on February 13th ruary 13th.

To umpire the peal Mr. J. Segar, of Retford, broke his holiday at Skegness. His report is

as follows:—
'I confirm that I sat in Handsworth Church to-day throughout the peal, and at each of the 159 leads I heard the name of the next method called correctly in accordance with a checking sheet prepared by me for my use as umpire. also checked the calling of the 90 bobs.

'As the belfry is very small and I did not wish to cause the slightest distraction. I sat in the church, but as the belfry is open to the church and could be called a ringers' gallery, there was no disadvantage. I was able to check by ear the accuracy of the figures of every lead of the peal. As it is impossible to ring a bad peal so complicated as this, it is hardly necessary to say that it was a good peal and correct in every detail.' in every detail.

Knight (conductor) 2, H. Springate 3, F. Cheal 4, T. Beaumont 5, R. E. Norris 6, G. Kenward 7, C. E. J. Norris 8. This was the first quarter of Plain Bob on the bells since they were resert in 1923.

OXFORD UNIVERSITY SOCIETY

Easter Tour at Gloucester

A LARGE attendance, glorious weather and a peal of Stedman Caters were notable features of the annual tour of the Oxford University Society, which was held in the Gloucester district at Easter.

About 20 resident members and 10 former members arrived on the evening of Easter Saturday. This provided a transport problem for the organisers, as only two of the five expected cars turned up, together with three motor-cycles. Fortunately several members brought bicycles and offered to use these on some of the journeys, and the position was somewhat cased by hiring a car for three days. Even so, some 'ferrying' had to be done between towers and, where suitable, bus and train services were employed.

On Easter Sunday morning about ten ringers joined the local band at Gloucester Cathedral to ring from 9.15 to 10.30, while the remainder divided their activities between St. Mary de Crypt (Gloucester) and Churcham. In the afternoon a group assisted the local ringers at Churchdown, where evensong was held at 3.30, and afterwards spent a lazy hour admiring the view from the hilltop. Later, members joined the local bands at St. Mary de Crypt, Westbury-on-Severn and Barnwood.

On Monday an inauspicious start was made by breaking a stay at Barnwood. The eight at Upton St. Leonards, which followed, proved a little difficult to handle but a course of London came round. We arrived at Painswick only to find it apparently devoid of food on Easter Monday, and so we made our way to Cranham for sandwiches at the local hostelry before ringing on the very fine twelve at Painswick. We then moved on to the six at Woodchester, where a youthful villager was heard to remark, 'Them bells be all right if only thou'st could do 'em.' The Society obviously 'couldn't do 'em,' handbell ringing seeming more popular. After tea we were joined by our president at Stroud, where unsuccessful attempts at Cambridge Royal produced scathing comments from a distinguished member not taking part. The last tower of the day was Quedgeley, and was followed by a tedious journey through Gloucester among the Bank Holiday traffic.

Tuesday's ringing began at Leckhampton, where the eight are rung from in front of the altar. A course of Spliced Surprise was rung before we moved on to Charlton Kings, which provided a sterner test for our bell-handling. Lunch in Cheltenham was followed by ringing on the twelve at St. Mary's. Here Cambridge Royal was more successful than at Stroud, and several resident members welcomed the opportunity of practising Stedman Cinques. After a short ring at Prestbury ten members set off for Tewkesbury, where a peal of Stedman Caters was rung at the Abbey. This was Peter Border's first peal of Caters as conductor, and was the first peal of Stedman Caters for five of the band. Since the peal was not begun until after 5.30, and the bells had to be down by 9 o'clock, a good pace had to be set, and the peal was completed in 3 hours and 15 minutes, the bells being lowered with five minutes to spare. The striking was good throughout, although the course ends provoked some adverse comment over the supper table. While the peal was being rung the remainder visited Bishop's Cleeve and Badgeworth.

On Wednesday the president unfortunately had to leave us, and transport arrangements were further complicated by the hired car blowing an oil seal. However, everyone was able to complete the day's programme, which was the most extensive of the tour. During the morning we visited Sandhurst, where a course of Bristol was completed, and the beautiful Saxon church at Deerhurst, where the

tower is separated into two compartments, the ropes of the five smaller bells falling on one side of the partition and the tenor on the other. The hired car rejoined us at Upton-on-Severn, where, after a sandwich lunch, we were greeted by Mr. Charles Camm, who joined us in a course of Cambridge. There followed an enjoyable hour's ringing at Malvern Priory, and after tea we visited the detached tower at Ledbury. Here a course of Yorkshire was rung but the long draught proved troublesome for the beginners. The day's ringing was concluded at Ross-on-Wye, where the eight were so popular that we exceeded our time by half an hour.

An attempt at a peal of Stedman at Ruardean on Thursday morning was lost after about 50 minutes, and was followed by a quarter peal of Kent Major, conducted by Rodney Meadows, whose efforts were rewarded by the omission of his name from the local Press report. Meanwhile the remainder visited Minsterworth and Westbury-on-Severn, where it took two members ten minutes to get the tenor up right. The two parties met again at Newnham-on-Severn, where several members seemed reluctant to leave the comfortable chairs in the lounge after lunch at the Victoria Hotel, and it came as rather a relief to hear that we would not after all be able to ring there, as one of the bells had slipped from its bearings on Easter Sunday. Having admired the beautiful view of the Severn from Newnham churchyard, we moved on to Littledean. Here they obviously have some very small ringers, the sally on the second being so low that one member rang it on his knees and others sat in a chair. After an excellent tea we visited the sixes at Longhope, Blaisdon and Huntley.

Some members departed on Thursday evening but the remainder stayed until Friday morning, when a peal of Spliced Major (Plain Bob, Double Bob, Little Bob and Gainsborough) was rung on handbells, with Wilfrid Moreton as conductor. The tour closed with four members ringing handbells while returning to Oxford by bus from Cheltenham.

We would like to express our sincere thanks to all the vicars and tower captains for their ready co-operation in making the tour a success, and in particular to Mr. Leslie Barry for his invaluable assistance. D. H. N., P. J. H.

SALISBURY DIOCESAN GUILD A Telegram of Greetings to the Queen

Approximately 150 members attended the annual general meeting of the Salisbury Diocesan Guild held in the Assembly Rooms, Salisbury on May 22nd. The Master (Canon C. C. Cox) presided, supported by the hon. secretary and treasurer (Mr. W. C. West), the Rev. F. Ll. Edwards (vice-president) and Mr. F. Slatford (assistant hon. secretary).

The chairman opened the meeting with prayer. An apology was received from Lord Shaftesbury (president of the Guild).

In his report the hon, secretary stated the membership as being 1,070. Twenty-eight peals were rung, including four for the Coronation. The losses by death since the last annual meeting totalled twelve, including Mr. E. F. White (vice-president), Messrs. G. W. England, O. Claridge, T. Bailey, C. S. House, J. Salter, L. A. Perrett, J. Tomkin (both fifty years as ringers), E. C. Mills, Canon Clare and Miss Markby, the meeting standing in silence as a tribute to their memory.

The statement of accounts was read, and showed a balance of £194 6s. This was considered satisfactory and together with the report was unanimously adopted.

In his remarks the chairman stated he had sent, on behalf of the Guild, a telegram of congratulation and welcome to Her Majesty the Queen, worded as follows.—The Salisbury Diocesan Guild of Ringers, assembled for their annual festival in Salisbury, offer their heartfelt congratulations to your most gracious Majesty upon the happy completion of the tour of the Commonwealth, and extend their loyal welcome home to your Majesty, for whom the church bells throughout the Diocese were rung in celebration of your Majesty's safe return.'

This reply was received from Buckingham Palace:— Please convey to all members of the Salisbury Diocesan Guild of Ringers the sincere thanks of the Queen for their kind and loyal greetings.'

Canon Cox continued with a forceful appeal for more subscribers to 'The Ringing World,' and suggested that at least two members from each Branch should work hard to persuade those who did not take the paper to do so at once. He did not wish criticism reminding those present the paper was the official organ of the Central Council, to which the Guild belonged.

OBITUARY

MR. ERNEST W. BEADSMOORE

With deep regret we record the passing of that grand old ringer, Mr. Ernest William Beadsmoore, of Ashby-de-la-Zouch. His place will be difficult to fill for he was not only one of those 'ever ready' ringers who could always be relied on for a peal and to attend meetings, but his generosity to his church and all connected with it was unbounded.

all connected with it was unbounded.

His life had been spent in Ashby and the registers there show the family connections for generations back. He was connected with the belfry for over 65 years and joined the old M.C.A. in 1890, ringing his first quarter peal in 1902 and calling his first peal in 1904. In 1910 he conducted the first peal of Stedman Triples by a local service band, and altogether had taken part in some 160 peals.

On the division of the M.C.A. he became a leading light in the Midland Counties Guild and at meetings could always be found in his place. He took part in the only 'Ernest' peal when eight Ernests rang; another acted as umpire, and the composition was by yet another Ernest. His last neal (in which he stead to Ernest. His last peal (in which he stood to oblige at a moment's notice) was Double Norwich at Netherseale in December, 1953. It

was but a few weeks ago his 81st birthday was commemorated by a peal of Stedman Triples.

The funeral was on June 3rd, and Ashby bells were rung half-muffled as the cortege arrived and left the church. The Vicar (Canon H. D. Hanford) conducted the service and paid H. D. Hantord) conducted the service and paid a high tribute to his shining example as a true churchman and Christian gentleman, who rang the bells not only as a call to others, but who answered the call himself. Floral tributes were sent, and representatives of the Midland Counties Guild were present from Overseale, Netherseale, Repton, Measham and Ticknall, as well as many church organisations, who have lost a very dear friend.

AN APPRECIATION

As one who rang 84 peals with the late Mr. Ernest W. Beadsmoore and claimed his friendship for 30 years, I should like to pay a last

tribute to his memory.

His passing is not only a severe blow to his church but to the Midland Counties Guild, as he was an energetic member who was always in attendance at meetings. His familiar figure and cheery voice will be missed by his many friends -not only in the Burton-on-Trent area, but in Derby and Leicester.

For over 60 years he was regular for service ringing at Ashby-de-la-Zouch Parish Church, where he had seen many changes, but somehow he did not change, even with advancing years: he was alert and ready to assist in any
