St. Giles' Church, Lincoln

WHEN the redundant Church of St. Peter-at-Arches in the centre of the city of Lincoln was closed in 1928, the need for a parish church in the suburb of St. Giles was very apparent and it was decided to use as much as was practical of the fabric for this project. Care was taken during demolition to letter and number all the stones so that they could be used together with red brick in the building of St. Giles' Church. The classical architecture of St. Peter's was followed but the new church was made one arch span longer.

This was during the pre-war depression and it was decided that the fine ring of eight bells should be divided into two fours for two other city churches. However, much pressure and hard work on the part of the Lincoln Diocesan Guild over a number of years resulted in the ring remaining intact and being given to the new church.

This was a tremendous job since the work of rebuilding had been stopped several times through lack of funds, and to strengthen the proposed tower to hold the bells added another £1,000 to the cost without the rehanging charges. The new church was, however, dedicated in 1934 and the retuned bells rehung in 1938 by the Loughborough Bell Foundry.

The old St. Peter-at-Arches Church had been the Civic Church of the city and each of the bells was inscribed: "The Gift of the City of Lincoln" and were cast by Abraham Rudhall in 1728. It is an interesting fact that the 18 cwt. octave travelled from Gloucester to Lincoln by canal barges and were hung the same year.

The ringers were engaged by the City Fathers and were known throughout the life of St. Peter's as the City Ringers. The first peal on the bells and in the city of Lincoln was "Garthon's" Triples rung on June 20th, 1756, and this was followed by Grandsire Triples on August 13th, 1758. Both these peals were conducted by John Foster.

It was just prior to the turn of the century that great progress was made in ringing in Lincoln and in this tower in particular, when the band included Gabriel Lindoff, Arthur Craven and J.

B. Fenton. This band rang 5,088 Superlative Surprise on November 11th, 1896—composed and conducted by Gabriel Lindoff—and was the first peal of Surprise in Lincolnshire. Several similar peals followed. Later Mr. J. A. Freeman became conductor and Stedman was rung in 1911 by this company.

When the new ring of eight was hung in Lincoln Cathedral in 1914, and change-ringing introduced, it was from St. Peter's that most of the ringers came. This formed a great liaison between the Cathedral and St. Peter's which has continued with St. Giles' through to the present day. At least 75% of the present Cathedral Company of Ringers have been members of St. Peter's or St. Giles' belfry, and it is hoped that this will be a continuing process.

When the bells were hung at St. Giles' a new band was taught, and the first peal, Grandsire Triples, was rung in 1940. Since then some 90 peals have been rung in 45 various methods, including 261 firsts or firsts in methods. There has been maintained the tradition of service ringing. St. Giles' is, and it is hoped will always be, a "teaching tower", for it is generally agreed that this policy will keep it one of the most progressive ringing centres in the diocese. Long may this continue.

PURITON'S NEW BAND AT SUPPER

During the last 18 months the bells of Puriton, Somerset, have been thoroughly renovated by the local tower captain, Mr. Louis Pope, helped initially by the writer. Firstly, the clappers and chiming hammers were removed and the clappers rebushed by a local carpenter. After a general tightening up and greasing, etc., the clappers were replaced, and the bells rang out for the first time on October 4th, 1967.

Since then they have been rung regularly for both Sunday services and for Thursday practices. Louis has completely repainted the frame and fittings, decorated the ringing chamber and successfully carried out 101 other jobs, all this work being carried out at no more cost to the church than for a set of ropes. A young band has been formed, now progressing well with Bob Doubles.

This period was terminated on January 16th, when the annual ringers' supper was revived. This proved highly successful and thanks are

due to all who donated and helped by preparing and serving the meal. This served as a dual occasion as the Vicar, the Rev. E. Rogers, is leaving for Australia on February 1st. He was presented by the ringers with a framed photograph of the church and tower.

Some 22 ringers and their wives and friends sat down to the well-prepared meal. Other people present were Mr. M. Stone, chairman of the Bridgwater Branch of the B. and W. Association, who endorsed the Vicar's praise for the way in which the local ringers have done so well with regard to Sunday service ringing. The evening ended with some slides taken on a recent trip to the Channel Islands and with tunes by the local handbell ringers.

I think we may all echo the Vicar's remarks by thanking Louis for the work he has done for the tower and for the way in which he looks after his ringers. We all hope that this standard is maintained, together with the team spirit enjoyed by the new band. G. N.

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Ancient Society of Purbeck Youths' Best Ever New Year

THE best A.S.P.Y. reunion yet from any point of view was held in Wareham over the New Year. A tough programme of peal attempts had been arranged, with four peals arranged each day for three out of the first four days.

The start was on Friday, December 27th. Five of the band for Sherborne warmed up in a peal of Minor at Thornford and two more were in a fast peal at Bridport. The eighth merely travelled 300 miles to be there. In the afternoon Cambridge was lost at Lyme Regis in unfortunate circumstances, but this allowed the band to hear the last two hours at Sherborne Abbey, where we had now settled into a good rhythm, so bringing appreciative comments from the former A.S.C.Y. Master outside. George Thoday deserved our congratulations for making a splendid job of the tenor.

On Saturday we split, one contingent going west to East Coker, where Grandsire Triples was well rung, with the other band scoring Yorkshire Royal at North Stoneham. Some furious driving enabled the exchange of two from each band to be on time, and Rutland was rung at Wimborne St. Giles, while the band was bullied into ringing the Society's first peal of London at East Tytherley. All met up in Ringwood feeling rather pleased with our efforts so far—seven out of eight.

Sunday was a bitterly cold day. Ringing was at Wareham and Swanage in the morning. The parsnip wine at Kingston was a welcome fortification against the cold before the Society's first peal of Bristol on the beautiful octave, during which there were two amusing incidents, when the second jammed over the balance for about a blow, and the other when Philip Mehew fell off the tenor box. Perhaps the good ringing had lulled him to sleep!

NEVER BOTH!

Immediately after the peal the A.S.P.Y. doubled the congregation for the nine lessons and carols service, during which four ringers played three carols on handbells, and Bob Bellamy had us in stitches by singing either the right words or the right tune, but never both! Toasted sprats, "Lily the Pink" and parsnip wine are the chief memories of a splendid evening spent in front of a roaring fire.

The success story carried on through Monday. An excellent peal of Lincolnshire was rung at Thorncombe, while Cambridge Minor at Piddlehinton enabled one of the band to complete the Cambridge family during December. Yorkshire was rung twice in the afternoon, at Litton Cheney and at Cattistock, where Ted Collins, although he could have given over 35 years to anyone else there, rang the tenor beautifully, giving his namesake, the Dorset Wonder, a bit of a chase on the 7th.

Tuesday, New Year's Eve, wasn't much warmer than Sunday, but at least we got a lie-in. At Poole, after an unavoidable hold up, we rang a very relaxed and enjoyable peal of Bob Royal. The dinner being in the evening, all but the keenest had a rest in the afternoon. The keenest, however, going for Cambridge at Lytchett Matravers, couldn't get further than a 720. This was only the second loss in 15 attempts.

LADY TOWER CAPTAIN'S HONOUR

The dinner itself was up to the high standard of previous meals, after which, as usual, we got a warm reception from Mick Shelton at the New Inn, responding with handbells and other music. The New Year was rung in with the traditional Bristol and 12 strokes on the tenor by the lady tower captain.

Back at the hotel the party was soon in full swing, going on till about 3.30 a.m., when the organiser was heard being suitably rewarded by our elder statesman for her hard work. In fact we gave Mary, or more correctly her car, a much-needed service as a token of our appreciation.

New Year's Day had no peals arranged because of previous years' experiences. Instead several towers were visited, the first of which was at Blandford, ringing again after a long lapse. This was George Bonham's first new tower of the year, and cost him £2 ls.—the shilling for the car park and £2 to fix his headlamp, damaged when he tested the strength of a wall with his car.

SOME FAILURES

With many of the party by now back at their daily grind, all the remaining peals were entrusted to Philip Mehew. Cambridge unfortunately fired up twice on Thursday, at New Alresford and Overton, and Pudsey was lost at Fordingbridge on Friday morning because of a "Spot my deliberate mistake" in the calling. Amends were made in the afternoon with an excellent peal of Lincolnshire at Ringwood, followed by a good social evening.

The last peal attempt of the week, Yorkshire at Wareham, was successful at the third attempt on Saturday, after which all descended on the local Branch meeting. In the evening the management at the hotel proved even better hosts than before, the convivial evening ending about 2.30.

Sunday saw all at Communion, then at Alpha Cottage for lunch, and then farewells were said. We are grateful to Mary, whose organisation went off perfectly, to the incumbents and local ringers for tolerating us, and to all others who helped to make this a memorable New Year. **BONIS.**

EXPORTING IS FUN? — THE TALE OF A BELL

IT all started when Bishop Douglas Wilson, the present treasurer of Wells Cathedral, was invited to revisit his former diocese in Trinidad. On return his jottings about the trip were published in the April, 1967, edition of the "Bath and Wells Diocesan News". One item was: the fact that the headmaster of Trinity College for Boys, Trinidad, Peter Helps, from Beckington, wanted a bell for his new school—a Somerset bell. Did we have any offers?

Well, the Bath and Wells Association of Change Ringers held its A.G.M. on Easter Monday, 1967—I was newly elected secretary—and the Master, the Rev. H. F. Warren, then brought Bishop Wilson's appeal before us. It meant that I had a job, and this sort of thing escalates.

We asked the 11 branches for their thoughts on the matter and it was duly discussed. A collection to buy a bell was vetoed and we didn't really think much of sending our bells overseas—no, we didn't have any lying around spare. I went to the Frome Branch and heard about one or two unused bells that might be available. Then I went to the Cary Branch meeting at North Cheriton, having a nice little ring of five—Bill Stote had come all the way from Coventry to ring on them and we were pleased to see him. At the meeting the subject of the bell came up. Prebendary Skipwith, the Branch chairman, knew of a bell in a disused chapel and he was sure we could have it. Bill Stote suggested that a stable bell from a big estate would be a good solution and be easier to obtain. It turned out that he was right, but first we had a try for Preb. Skipwith's bell.

Harry Sanger went and saw it where it lay in the chapel porch, and it seemed just right. Being about 70–80 lb. weight and with most of its fittings we could easily visualise it in use to call the boys in from the valley playing fields at Maraval, Port of Spain. The Rev. Richard Gregory was approached and was agreeable, as were the P.C.C., but some parish-

ioners weren't keen on losing their bells to foreign parts. Anyway we tried to get a clearance order made for the bell and meanwhile the general committee of the Association endorsed a suggestion that we donated £10 to the P.C.C. Branch collections were made towards this end and realised £10 10s.

In February, 1968, we heard that the Diocesan Chancellor had refused to grant a faculty for removal of the bell, so everything had to start again. Having informed the committee of the setback it was only a short while afterwards that Mrs. E. S. Powell informed the Rev. H. F. Warren that there was a bell at Batheaston Court which was no longer required to call in the estate staff. Mrs. Wyndham, its owner, was agreeable that it should go to Trinidad, so we were again "in business". Mr. Warren inspected the bell and agreed it was suitable, about 40–50 lb. in weight and with a good tone. There was also a wheel attached to the stock.

Having told Bishop Wilson that we should accept this bell I eventually heard that Peter Helps was agreeable, and so we went ahead. Mr. Warren collected the bell and carted it across Somerset to the Association A.G.M. at Taunton, where we all saw it. Some work was necessary on the clapper and Raymond Arcsott volunteered to do this and also clean the whole thing up, hang it in a frame and put a packing case around it. The results were impressive and the bell gleamed. At last all was ready and Mr. Warren took the bell to the Diocesan Conference to show Bishop Wilson. I undertook to arrange transport to the docks where a free passage to Trinidad was guaranteed by virtue of Mr. Helps' directorial contact in the Harrison Line. I obtained quotations for transport and insurance and gave British Road Services the go-ahead to take the bell from Taunton to West India Docks, where H. Langridge and Co. would ensure transit through Customs, etc., on to the M.V. Linguist, sailing on October 19th.

No one mentioned papers, so it was a surprise that B.R.S. refused to take delivery without the "dockets". A hurried form of shipping note was forwarded to all interested parties, and since the dock tally clerks were working to rule the sailing date was delayed so that the bell sailed on the right boat. I forwarded the shipper's receipt to Peter Helps and eventually he got the bell through Customs (duty free) at the end of November. So that was a happy ending to a story that began nearly two years earlier. I tell it here so that due credit can be paid to all who helped to make it possible, and perhaps for the assistance of any others who may be involved in a similar task. **JOHN H. GILBERT.**

Amendment of Rule 17:—

It was resolved that the word "four" be substituted for "five" in the fourth line.

Decisions.

It was resolved that the following be added to the Decisions of the Council:—

- (1) In the case of Doubles only a variation be defined as the use in a plain method only of calls other than the standard calls for that method. The resulting bobbed or singled lead must not by itself constitute a plain lead of another method. Each variation to be given its own name.
- (2) The variation must by itself be capable of producing the 120 true changes. Peal reports must draw a clear distinction between methods and variations, either by separate listing, or, for example, "Plain Bob, New Bob, Old Variation, Eynsham Variation, etc."
- (3) One variation with one or more methods, or two or more variations with or without methods, may be rung in one extent, provided that the plain courses of all the variations and methods in the extent are different from each other, and that there is included at least one of each of the plain lead and different calls for each of the different variations and methods rung in the extent.
- (4) The arrangement or composition (as the case may be) of record multi-method (or multi-method variation) peals in the case of Doubles only shall be submitted to the Editor of "The Ringing World" at the same time that the peal is submitted, and shall be published in "The Ringing World" before the 31st January in the following year.

"BLUE PETER" FILM

Dear Sir,—Re Mr. Jenkins' letter (page 42), the "Blue Peter" film was made in November, 1966, and shown one month later. About 14 ringers from Frensham, Putney and Kingston were involved and one of the Frensham ringers was "tower captain" for the day.

John Noakes had received approximately ten lessons in bell control before entering Kingston belfry; but many young ringers who come to ring at Kingston are less experienced than Mr. Noakes. The ringers at Kingston were taught how to handle a bell over a period of three to six months. A high standard was set by our tower captain and accuracy in raising, lowering and controlling a bell all had to be achieved before we could even attempt rounds.

The filming for the "Blue Peter" presentation lasted 12 hours—and all for a six-minute film. The utmost safety precautions were enforced and ringers co-operated with the technicians all the time.

Prior to Mr. Noakes' effort to chime the 27½ cwt. bell he ascended the stairs to see the bells (the others having been lowered). An observant viewer would have clearly noticed through the louvres that outside it was dark and street lights could be seen. So there were no ropes which could have caused a bell to "turn over" if caught by Mr. Noakes' "flying feet".

Many children must have been interested in watching their "well-loved hero" attempting to be a bellringer.

I must say that the original film was cut a great deal for the television presentation, but one must realise that "Blue Peter" is a children's programme, and to see just a formal display of bellringing would not be very enjoyable for small children.

However, the film was mentioned in the Central Council report of 1967, but as far as I can recollect there were no complaints about it.

Incidentally, Kingston ringers possess a copy of the film, and if the Central Council wish to investigate the matter further they can borrow the film from Kingston upon Thames ringers.—Yours faithfully,

THE REV. H. LAW JAMES

Dear Sir,—I was pleased to see in your issue of January 24th the article by the Rev. B. F. Sheppard and the accompanying letter. When I was requested to write about Gabriel Lindoff it came to me suddenly that we had reached the end of 1968 and had forgotten to commemorate Henry Law James and three other notable ringers of his age. I feel grateful, therefore, for Mr. Sheppard's salutary reminder of one of the great intellects of the ringing Exercise.

I willingly accept his reproof. More time for reflection would have led me to reject "cocksureness". It is not an elegant word, and it is likely to be interpreted in a derogatory sense, which is far from what was intended.

Nevertheless, a characteristic of Law James was, as it were, an assertive self-confidence. It was as if he often decided that a theory was correct or a proceeding the only right one, and that there was no more that needed to be said on the matter. There was even, sometimes, a suggestion of impatience that his view should be queried. The debates of the Central Council (so fully reported years ago) and the correspondence columns of the ringing press provide interesting evidence, and quite good examples are found in the great London Surprise controversy of 1907 and the long-drawn-out correspondence with Joseph Parker that occupied a great part of the first volume of "The Ringing World". Both these are highly instructive.

These considerations by no means diminish the greatness of Law James. We know that pastorally he brought many blessings to Surfleet, and his fame as a practical ringer and composer stands secure. The great value of his attitude and persistence in controversy seems to me to be that it drove his contemporaries (sometimes in sheer self-defence) to a close examination of their own theories and to a deeper delving after the great mathematical truths upon which method construction and composition are founded. The fruits of all this we enjoy today.—Yours sincerely,

BROTHERS IN RINGING

The well-known family of that day was the Pye brothers—William (Bill), Ernest and Robert (Bob). William was the composer and conductor and was the nearest man to the 2,000 mark until it was finally achieved by the late Ernest Morris. Ernest and Bob were most capable and experienced ringers and were a great asset to any band.

There were also the other well-known Essex brothers—the Charge family, consisting of Cornelius, George and Reuben. Cornelius was also a composer and a good conductor. George and Reuben were also excellent ringers and it was my privilege to ring 100 quarter peals and several peals with these two men.

Then there were the Mellar brothers, John and Henry, and also Norman and Edwin Tomlinson, all of whom were of Christ Church, Southgate. They learned to ring together in their early teens, stayed together, and three of them were past the 70 years mark when they set their bells for their last "That's all!". The Mellar brothers died under tragic circumstances in the ringing room—John from a stroke and Harry from a heart attack.—Yours faithfully,

OBITUARY

MR. F. BERNARD DITCHER

The death occurred on January 17th of Mr. F. Bernard Ditcher, of St. Ives, Cornwall, and formerly of Ranmoor, Sheffield. He was 71 years of age.

Born at Eckington, Derbyshire, he lived there until his marriage, when he moved to Sheffield. He was in the R.A.M.C. in the First World War and saw service in France. By profession Mr. Ditcher was an accountant.

The writer does not know when Bernard first took up ringing, but in 1922 he was invited to join John Flint's Surprise band, and in 1924 took part in the first peals of Pudsey and Rutland Surprise. The writer joined the band in 1924 and rang his first peal with Bernard in October of that year. He was a first-class ringer and striker, and before the Second World War had an impressive variety of peals to his credit.

When the restrictions on ringing were further relaxed in 1944 Bernard agreed to join a young Surprise band that was being formed, and he and the late Jack Brothwell were the backbone of the band. Good progress was made, and eventually the goal that had been aimed at was reached and peals of London, Bristol, Spliced and new methods were rung regularly. The band owed a lot to Bernard not only for his ringing experience and ability but also for the example he set at all times and under all circumstances, and above all for his unflinching loyalty. He could be forthright, but it was always with dignity and without rancour.

For more than 40 years he was Ringing Master at All Saints' Church, Ranmoor, Sheffield, and for a long period was an official of the Sheffield and District Society.

He retired to St. Ives in 1963. A widow, daughter and two sons are bereaved. Many ringers in South Yorkshire will join the writer in offering their deepest sympathy. J.E.C.

Note.—In Mr. Bernard Ditcher's peal book the first recorded is Kent Treble Bob Major at Eckington, Derbyshire, on February 11th, 1922. There are 179, the last being an officers' peal for Sheffield and District Society of Yorkshire Surprise Major rung on April 21st, 1956.

AN APPRECIATION

Mr. F. Bernard Ditcher retired to Lelant, Cornwall, after an active career in advanced ringing in Yorkshire. For some time he rang with the young ringers at Carbis Bay, and occasionally he joined with us in the ringing at Lelant.

Ill-health caused him to give up ringing, but he was still most interested in it and always listened to ringing (with a critical ear) whenever possible. He always read with great interest and pleasure each copy of "The Ringing World" and eagerly looked forward to its arrival every week.

A few years ago, when the Universities Association ringing tour was based on Sheffield, Miss Lidgey and I visited Ranmoor Church one Sunday to take part in ringing for the service. We were highly amused when we saw no less than 34 new stays in the ringing chamber, and when Mr. Ditcher saw how interested we were in that big supply of stays he told us that they were for visitors—his own ringers never broke stays!

MR. JOHN PARES

Many ringers in the Slough and Bushey area will remember John Pares before he came to live at Kingsclere in 1959, as it was there that he learned most of his ringing. His death was under tragic circumstances, when his car was in collision with a stationary lorry whilst he was going to work on January 20th.

The funeral was the following Friday, and that evening fellow ringers from Kingsclere, Burghclere and Highclere rang a quarter peal of Grandsire Triples to his memory, the bells being half-muffled. The band was M. Goss 1, D. Goss 2, P. Murduck 3, R. Crocker 4, C. Butler 5, B. Murduck 6, G. Dodd (cond.) 7, D. Murduck 8.

John Pares will best be remembered as the man through whose enthusiasm the two trebles were added to Kingsclere. The old six then went badly and presented a challenge to any band to ring them. There was no regular band then and John set about teaching new ringers. With the help of Bill Hibbert and David Papworth this band scored their first quarter in 1961.

In January, 1962, work started on the bells, and about this time Philip Murduck joined the band and introduced Plain Bob. It was in this method that John Pares scored his first peal of Plain Bob Doubles in July, 1962. Peals of Bob Minor at Burghclere and Bob Triples at Kingsclere (the first on the eight bells) followed that year. He remained as captain at Kingsclere until 1968, when he felt it was time to hand over to a younger man.

May he rest in peace.
