

St. Bartholomew's Church, Lyng, Somerset

THIS church constitutes the finest and most fitting memorial in Somerset to King Alfred the Great. It is situated eight miles east of Taunton on the edge of the Somerset Moors. When the parish was formed in 937 it was given the name Relengen, but at the time of William the Conqueror the name was shortened to Lenge. Two hundred years ago the village was known as Ling, and now it is spelt

Lyng. King Alfred was defeated by the Danes in 877 and took refuge during the winter on the Isle of Athelney, which is in the parish of Lyng. During this period of hiding he sent messages to the people of Somerset to prepare for the spring, when he emerged from his retreat and defeated the Danes. By the Treaty of Wedmore (878) Guthrum, the Danish king, and his (878) Guthrum, the Danish king, and his leading chieftains accepted Christian baptism and Alfred's kingdom of Wessex was secured. In gratitude for his deliverance Alfred founded Athelney Abbey, and it was the monks of this abbey who later built Lyng Church. Alfred died on October 26th, 899. The Abbey was dissolved by King Henry VIII on February 8th, 1539, and the site is marked by a stone pillar known as Alfred's Memorial.

Architecturally the church is between the

Architecturally the church is between the Decorated and Perpendicular periods (1360-1400), but it has been suggested that the windows are simply 14th century insertions in old walls. The chancel and nave are the oldest parts of the building. The tower is tall (60 feet) and light and the gargoyles on it are singularly fine. It has double windows on three sides but only a single window on the south side where the staircase is situated. The ancient clock has stone

The north window of the chancel is a fitting memorial to the Rev. A. H. A. Smith, who raised the money for the restoration of the church but died in 1903 before the work was done. It depicts King Alfred wearing his famous jewel in his crown, St. Bartholomew, and above St. George slaying the dragon. Alfred's jewel was found at Newton Park in 1693 and is now in the Ashmolean Museum at Oxford. It is about $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches long and $\frac{1}{2}$ inch thick and weighs $1\frac{1}{2}$ ounces. The setting of a sloping edge and flat back is of pure gold; the former carries in bold letters the words: "Aelfred Mec Heht Gewyrcan" (i.e., Alfred ordered me to be made). A replica of the jewel was given to this church by the late Mr. L. H. Hayter in June, 1947.

The 16th century bench-ends are remarkably fine and depict several curious designs. They were probably carved by the monks of Athelney. The front two are said to be the narrowest in the country. The Norman tub font is probably 12th century. Pictures of Moses and Aaron are hung on the walls of the tower: the latter is robed as described in Exodus 28.

THE BELLS

According to "The History of Somerset", by Collinson (1791), Lyng Church not only had a ring of five bells but also had taken possession of the three bells from the disused church, now in ruins, on nearby Burrow Mump. One of these was loaned to Middlezoy to be the treble of that ring of six and, to quote Collinson, "the church-wardens of that parish having given a bond to the officers of Ling to return or produce it when required". The whereabouts of the other two, dated 1607 and 1625, is not

known, but they were stored in the clock chamber and not hung for ringing.

In 1905 the present bell frame was installed by T. Doble, of Taunton. It consists of oak timbers top and bottom, joined by cast iron verticals and was designed for six bells. The five bells were rehung on ballbearings in 1954, but at that time the parish could not consider having the tenor (which was cracked across the crown) recast be-cause of lack of funds. However, fundraising was started at the end of 1966 and as a result the five bells were taken to the Whitechapel Bell Foundry during Easter Week this year. It is expected that the following six bells will be hung in the tower at the beginning of August.

The original treble bell, which was too flat to be included in the new ring, was cast by George Purdue, of Taunton, in 1609. It is to be kept in the church and will probably be used as a sanctus bell. The weights are not yet known, but the old tenor weighed 15 cwt. 2 gr. 15 lb. The new ring of six will be mounted on cast iron headstocks as a result of the generosity of the Barron Bell Trust. They will be dedi-cated on Saturday, August 23rd, the day before the patronal festival.

MR. ALFRED BALLARD'S 1000 PEALS

AS we see a gathering momentum in the number of ringers who are completing their 1,000th peal in a comparatively short time, one cannot be insensible to those who have reached the goal over a longer period of time and are to be considered truly servants of the Exercise. Such a person is Alfred Ballard, of Hinckley, Leicestershire, who has completed his 1,000th peal over a period of 40 years, and during this time there has been a sustained effort to keep alive the Exercise and service to his church.

He was born in Stoney Stanton, Leics, on December 14th, 1908, and was taught to handle a bell in 1925 by the Rector, the late Rev. R. P. Farrow. His first peal followed two years later on March 19th, 1927—a peal of Doubles in three methods, conducted by Ernest Morris The opportunity for peal ringing was still very small, but Alf, keen to improve his standards and to satisfy his enthusiastm for the art, went out and about to find the ringing. One of his pleasures was to meet Redvers F. Elkington, of Anstey, the teacher of so many young ringers, who arranged a number of peals for him and also introduced him to Frederick H. Dexter and Harold J. Poole, both of Leicester Cathedral. The peal total now began to grow, Harold J. Poole started an interest in handbell ringing and soon followed his first handbell peal, Stedman Caters.

A halt was called to his activities due to the war, but at the cessation of hostilities Alf returned to "Civvy Street" and to his ringing. He was once more pedalling the 15 miles to The Wayside to continue where he had left off and was soon to achieve the distinction of ringing in the first peal of Cambridge Maximus on handbells. It is in this "tower" that he has completed 156 of his 1.000 peals. As can be seen from the list of his peals they have been most varied and although he only conducted a small number of them he is most competent in this field.

During all of his ringing career, however, he has concerned himself with the teaching of many ringers and has travelled miles in their interest. At his own tower he continues to struggle to maintain a local band and in the Diocesan Guild he was District Ringing Master for a number of years and was one of the Guild's representatives on the Central Counci! (1945-1953).

Alfred Ballard is yet another ringer to pass his 1,000th peal, which was Stedman Cinques rung at The Wayside and conducted by Peter Staniforth. We congratulate him and thank him for his services given, besides the honour that he has obtained, and we hope that he will be able to spend many more years in enjoying the pleasure of being in the company of ringers and ringing. CENTENARY OF ST. MARY'S SOCIETY

TN 1868, Canon A. H. Bridges, the then Rector of the 14th century Parish Church of St. Mary, Beddington, Surrey, started a scheme of comprehensive restoration of the church. It was recommended that the old five bells should be "recast into a ring of eight with added metal and this was duly done. Two trebles were added in 1877. The St. Mary's, Beddington, Society of Ringers was formed in 1869, and it was to celebrate their centenary that 41 people—members of the Society and their

the Windmill, Wallington
This happy occasion was presided over by the Master of the Society, Mr. R. J.
Cook, who was supported on the top table by the Rector, Rev. J. H. Read, and the two churchwardens. Mr. S. F. Kimber

acted as toastmaster.

After a most enjoyable meal, Mr. Robert Hinde, a former member of the Beddington band now living at Meopham, Kent, pro-posed the toast of "The Parish of St. Mary's, Beddington". He said that he had come to Beddington ten years ago and "been evicted after three years". Bedding-"been evicted after three years". Bedding-ton was to be remembered by the friendly welcome it extended to all young ringers, which was one reason for the strength of the band. Mr. Hinde expressed the Society's thanks to the clergy and churchwardens for allowing a very valuable part of the church equipment to be used at virtually no fee. He spoke of the encouragement the Society drew therefrom and the Society's gratitude for such generosity.

Replying to the toast, the rector's war-den, Mr. Thomas Robson, said that when arrangements were being made for any church events it was always necessary to remember that Thursday evenings-the Society's practice nights — were sacrosanct; they dared not compete! He affirmed that the Rector and churchwardens would do all that they could to perpetuate the happy at-mosphere of St. Mary's, Beddington. A touch on the handbells of Grandsire

Triples (which was brought round with a call that would not be recognised by the Central Council!) was then rung by N. Thomson 1-2, S. F. Kimber 3-4, R. J. Talbot 5-6 and R. J. Cook (cond.) 7-8.

The toast of "The Visitors" was proposed by Mr. Frank Jennings, a past Master of the Society. He spoke of the pleasure it was to meet once again those who had

been friends of a lifetime.

He asked the company at their centenary celebration to recollect all the long line of visitors to the tower in the past century. Where would the Society have been but for them? In the past 100 years 380 peals had been rung on the bells and included in the records of these peals were the names of many illustrious ringers who had helped to bring the Society to such a peak; indeed, among the total there were only a few entirely "local" peals.

Mr. Thomas Cook, the Master's father,

replied, and referring to the happy occasion of the centenary, said: "We congratulate you and think you are a remarkable Society." It was not often one had the It was not often one had the opportunity of attending a centenary celebration; in this connection he reminded the company that the bells were there before them

nd would be there when they had gone. He also congratulated the Society on all they were doing for the art of change-ringing. "I myself have never struck a bell in anger," he said, "and indeed I cannot tell a Stedman's Powder from a Double Bob Martin, but I can at least claim that I was responsible for both my sons becoming

ALL FINES TO THE RECTOR

The last toast, "The St. Mary's, Beddington, Society of Ringers", was proposed by the Rector, who said he had looked at the original rules of the Society: there were 16 of them; one referred to swearing and three to liquid refreshments! He was pleased to see the rule which stated that "all monies, see the rule which stated that "all monies, gratuities and forfiets should be collected by the leader and handed to the Rector"!

It was nice to think that his ringers were so well known; he would, for his part, work hard to preserve the bells of Beddington. Plans for development near the church included an extension of the M23 motorway, with a flyover carrying traffic past the church some 30 feet in the air. He hoped that the sound of the bells would remind

motorists as they passed of "the things of eternity". At the end of his speech part of a tape-recording of the 1964 "Christmas bells" broadcast was played. The company heard the announcer describe the Beddington ringers as enjoying a high reputation in South East England, followed by some well-struck Stedman Caters.

In reply the Master said he felt it was a great honour to be Master of the Society

in its centenary year.

Recounting the history of the bells, he told the company that there must have been at least one bell in the church as far back as 1454, as a certificate of the Rector's expenses for that year included an item
"Bell ropes, Is, 8d." In the Inventory of
Edward VI was shown "v belles in the
steeple and saunce belle." The five were recast into eight in 1868 and two trebles were added in 1877. The ten bells were rehung in 1928. The first peal on the bells was Grandsire Triples in 1872 and the first on the ten, Stedman Caters, was rung in 1877 by a College Youths' band. In 1914 was rung a peal of 7,777 Stedman Caters. In the period between the wars the Beddington Society reached a very high peak; the band included such men as Frank Darby, Charles Kippin and Frank Jennings, and they rang the first peal of Spliced Surprise Royal at Beddington in 1936

The Master also quoted from some of the old rules. He thought that the one which laid down "a fine of 2d, for non-attendance without due cause" might profitably be reintroduced, but he was less in favour of another rule which said that "no part of the monies so received shall be spent in feasting and drinking". Finally, one old rule which he felt would still apply today was "Every ringer engages to live a sober, virtuous and Christian life and to set an example of good conduct to the rest of the parish."

OXFORD DIOCESAN GUILD STRIKING CONTEST

THE Oxford Diocesan Guild striking contest was held this year in the South Oxon area. The first semi-final was held at St. Helen's. Berrick Salome, where the bells are hung in a small wooden tower and the weather-cock is reputed to nod down and touch the ground when ringing is in progress. Here Thatcham, St. Mary's, Reading, and East Hagbourne competed, with Mr. A. R. Peake (Glouceser and Bristol Association) acting as judge. The other semifinal was held on the back six of the light eight at Warborough, where Miss Mary bliss (chairman, Gloucester and Bristol Association) judged the ringing of Lane End, Headington and Sonning.

Before the final all the ringers met at Benson Village Hall and enjoyed a good tea. after which the judges gave their re-ports on the contest so far. Miss Bliss, discussing the ringing at Warborough, said that the standard had not been as good as she had expected from the Oxford Diocesan Guild, much of the ringing being uneven. Lane End and Headington had rung Grandsire Doubles and incurred most of their

faults through uneven ringing. Sonning had rung call-changes and had lost points through not changing frequently enough or ringing sufficient changes. Lane End and Headington, with 86 and 93 faults respectively, were selected to go through to the

Mr. Peake then reported on the other semi-final. He said that, unlike Miss Bliss, he had to report that all the ringing had been very even, without any mistakes at all. He gave Reading 17 faults and East Hag-bourne 27 faults. Thatcham, with 36 faults, had lost points through the tenor pushing too much.

The final was held immediately afterwards on the back six of the anti-clockwise eight at St. Helen's. Benson. At the conclusion of the contest all the company assembled in the church to hear the judges' verdict. Miss Bliss said that the first team (Lane End) had rung Bob Minor, and she commended them for being the only team to attempt anything other than Grandsire Doubles. The striking had been a little un-even and she and Mr. Peake had given

them 140 faults. The second team (St. Mary's, Reading) had 63 faults. The leading of the third team (Headington) had been uneven and the tenor had been driven too hard, with the result that they had collected 115 faults. The final team (East Hagbourne) had taken a little while to settle down but had only incurred 66 faults. She felt that another year the teams ought to attempt to ring more advanced methods. It had been a great pleasure and honour for her to visit the Oxford Diocesan Guild: she had received much help from Miss Cross in the past.

Rev. C. Elliot Wigg then announced that St. Mary's, Reading, were the winners of the 1969 contest, and thanked Miss Bliss and Mr. Peake for acting as judges. A short service followed, ringing subsequently

taking place till 9 p.m.

This is the second year in succession that St. Mary's, Reading, have won the Guild striking contest. Another noteworthy point is that East Hagbourne have rung in every final since the contests began in 1964.

RECORD PEAL SEQUENCE

Dear Sir.—As the person responsible for encouraging the recent Rutland peal at Barnes, I must correct the impression given by the letter in your current issue from Mrs. Williams, of Putney Vale, which is, incidentally, several miles from Barnes and completely out of earshot.

First, the correspondence mentioned was in one paper only, which publishes various

slightly different editions.

Secondly, the correspondence came from one lady in Barnes who lives about 100 yards from the tower; one man who merely says he lives in Barnes, but as far as one can discover nowhere near the church: Mr. Uphill, from Putney, presumably the "Putney Ringing Master", whom I had for very good reason in 1964 to ask not to visit the tower and whose statements are very questionable; Mr. Freeman, of Sheen, presumably the "Mortlake Ringing Master", who attacks my defence of the peal rather than the peal itself and whose points are again easy to answer.

There was also a somewhat muddled editorial which eventually came out against long peals, though only one such peal is

allowed each year.

That was the total correspondence against, but there was also a long letter in

favour.

In addition I have received adverse com-ment personally from three people, including the first correspondent above. I have also received very many - 30 at the last count—comments in favour of such peals, particularly during the peal itself. Many are particularly pleased that young men and women should be prepared to go to such effort to maintain and promote an ancient and beautiful (to most people) art. After all, it is in parallel with the developments in other branches of music and physical prowess

5.152 YORKSHIRE SURPRISE MAJOR

Dear Sir, - It was perhaps unfortunate that it was decided not to publish in full the composition of Yorkshire appearing on page 456, as the part omitted was by far the more significant.

It is well known that there is a set of 36 courses with the tenors together, true to Yorkshire, consisting of 6 in 6ths+, 6 in 5ths- and half each of 6 in 2nds+ and 2nds-. The point of submitting this composition was to show how these courses can be reduced to a 23-course true round block containing the maximum "combination roll-ups" with no -82s or -83s, which some conductors apparently consider musical: the important part was the set of courses to be included, not one of the various ways in which they can be joined, which can be deduced by anyone having the slightest knowledge of composition.

HANDBELL COMPOSITIONS

Dear Sir,-In his letter on July 4th Mr. Robert B. Smith accuses me of failing to read other people's letters carefully before I reply to them. But anyone who reads the correspondence—his letter of May 23rd and mine of June 13th-will see that it is not I who have failed to read his letter but Mr. Smith who has failed to read his own. am blamed for leaving out words which, in fact, he did not include.

The idea of keeping certain pairs coursing for long spells during a peal is not new. Bankes James used it to enable the Cambridge University Guild to score the first real of Double Norwich ever to be rung "in hand" as long ago as 1891. I have rung in, and called, a number of peals of this type, not only on handbells but in the tower, because I like the sound of 5-6 coursing in Major. I explained this idea in "Change Ringing on Handbells", which was first published 20 years ago.

Now, at the risk of bringing down fire from heaven, I would like to give my own opinion.

The experienced handbell ringer will ring his pair just as easily when parted as when coursing. The learner, on the other hand,

may find the parted positions very hard indeed and will not manage them without great concentration. This involves strain and after a course or two he may start making trips or in other ways eroding the beat, so he should be given a spell of coursing in which he may recover

Composers are always striving to include the maximum amount of any quality they consider desirable in their compositions. We see peals with "the extent of the 6th in sixth's", etc., etc. This is admirable. But in teaching anyone to ring a pair of hand-bells the "desirable quality" is not coursing in itself but rather an even mixture of coursing and non-coursing. For he will never learn the parted positions by ringing his bells only in course. I think this, and no more, is what John Mayne intended to express when he wrote his somewhat un-fortunately-worded letter.

Of course, if you just want to be certain of getting peals, good enough. But Mr. Smith—all honour to him—is training bands. But if coursing alone is wanted I suggest the following idea to end all special peals for handbells: put your learners on the back bells. but give them 7-9. 8-10 and 11-12. Ring Kent T.B.. using the Granta variation, alias Kent Little Court, to keep them out of the slow. They will then course throughout and never be separated by more than two other bells!

Finally I want to express my very sincere hope that this little discussion will not impair good relations between handbell ringers in Cheshire. Hertfordshire or elsewhere.—Yours sincerely, C. W. WOOLLEY.

700th ANNIVERSARY OF A COTSWOLD CHURCH

700 years ago, on June 9th, 1269, the Bishop of Worcester dedicated the Church St. Mary, Meysey-Hampton, Glos. It is of a simple design, in the form of a cross, with the tower in the centre. The tower is typically Early English, low, with battlements. It has sound holes of pairs of Early English lancets and at its corners are fine "grotesques" to throw the rainwater clear of the stonework. There are six bells, five of which were cast in 1708 and one in 1825. They were re-hung in a new frame in 1929 when the fifth was re-cast.

The peal and quarter peal columns will show that the anniversary was duly recognised by the ringers, for a peal was rung on June 20th, and a date touch prior to the service celebrating the occasion on Sunday, 22nd, when the Bishop of Glouces-ter attended and preached. A memorable week-end, indeed.

If ever an event was celebrated in an ecumenical way, this was it. The villagers (with outsiders too) united to make it a success; and success did indeed crown their efforts.
