"THE RINGING WORLD" EDITORSHIP

MR. C. W. DENYER APPOINTED

RINGERS who attended the annual festival of the Oxford Diocesan Guild and readers of the account in our issue of July 18th will know of the forthcoming retirement of our much esteemed editor.

We need a man with a sound knowledge and experience of the newspaper world, if possible technical as well as editorial; a ringer of sufficient distinction to know what to publish and when the problem of the problem of the problem of the problem. tinction to know what to publish and what not to publish; a man known to ringers as one of themselves; a man willing to give up his employment while he still has his full health and strength and vigour to cope with a new job, which in the nature of things cannot prove the stepping stone to a career or bring him into the super tax bracket. On top of all this he must, while present arrangements continue, live near to

the Guildford office.
On August 9th, at a meeting of the full
Committee at Rugby. I am glad to be able
to write that "The Ringing World" Committee were able to appoint, with effect from October 1st, a man who fulfils each and every one of these requirements. What has seemed unrealistic for so long has now been achieved and we have great pleasure in telling our readers that Mr. Charles W. Denyer. of Farnham, Surrey, has accepted the appointment.

Charles Denver was the subject of a "Servants of the Exercise" article in September, 1960. He will find that this title will become even more appropriate in the

PEAL WITH J. S. GOLDSMITH

Charles Denyer was born at Tongham. Surrey, on March 25th, 1911, and the following year his family moved to Aldershot where their father. William Denyer, was employed in the printing trade. At the age of nine he and his two older sisters were taught to ring by their father and the late George Gilbert on the ring at Aldershot. which had newly been augmented to eight.

Mr. Denyer was 13 when he rang his first peal, but his ambitions have never included a high peal total. Of about 100 peals he has conducted 25 and his total includes a handbell peal with J. S. Goldsmith, the founder of "The Ringing World," and one with the late A. H. Pulling. He was secretary of the Farnham District of the Guildford Guild from 1928 to 1948 and District



Ringing Master for the next five years. In 1953 he was made a Vice-President of the Guild and from 1958 was Guild Master for four years. He represented the Guild on the Central Council 1960-63 and from 1962 to 1966 served as churchwarden at Farnham Parish Church. His organising abilities were tested when he organised the national appeal for the Pulling Memorial Bell, which was exhibited in Guildford Cathedral for many years and now forms part of the ring of ten. He also organised festivities in the Guildford area to celebrate the Golden Jubilee of this journal.

Our photograph shows him with his wife. Edna, when they celebrated their silver wedding last year. With them are son Michael, aged 19, now completing his apprenticeship as a lithographer with McCorquodales at Basingstoke, and Janet. 17, a trainee nurse at the Treloar Hospital at Alton. All of them can ring. Indeed, as well as his father and a grandfather, the ringers in his family have also included two sisters, two brothers, two brothers-in-law, a sister-in-law, three nieces and two

Mr. Denyer's career provides further evidence of his suitability for his new position. In 1927 he was apprenticed as a compositor In 1927 he was apprenticed as a compositor to Messrs, E. W. Langham, "The Herald Press," Farnham. After serving for five years in the Royal Artillery during the war, with service overseas, he and Mrs. Denyer moved to Farnham in 1949, when he was promoted works manager of "The Herald" Press.

To me, who through a former editor, the late J. Armiger Trollope, had connections with Mr. J. S. Goldsmith, founder and first editor of our paper, it is of great interest to note that in the 1930s Mr. Denyer and his

father used to visit Pyrford to help Mr. Goldsmith with proof reading, etc., for "The Ringing World." Mr. Goldsmith's then expressed hope that young Charlie would one day be connected with the production of our journal and Mr. Trollope's constant attempts to obtain my own interest in the paper have now borne perhaps unexpected fruit in the close relationship which is now necessarily starting between us in our common concern for "The Ringing World.

EXPERIENCE AND "KNOW-HOW"

It was, I believe, Sir Winston Churchill who said he had not become Her Majesty's principal minister to preside over the dissolution of the British Empire. In a humbler sphere may I say that I did not agree to become convener of "The Ringing World" Committee to accept the resignation of Tom White from the editorial chair. But it has had to be and I feel confident that Charles Denyer has the experience and "know how," the drive and the energy and the connections with the ringing Exercise which will enable him to prove a worthy successor to our previous editors. confident that, as our editor, he will prove to be also the friend of all readers of our journal. Readers will be glad to know that at our request Mr. White has agreed to act as consultant editor for at least three months to help with the changeover, and I hope that all readers will help Mr. Denyer in his task by increasing circulation and by their contributions to the paper's contents. I can promise him the full support of the members of "The Ringing World" Committee and I look forward myself to working in close harmony with him.

TOM INGRAM'S "BELLS IN ENGLAND"

WHEN a man undertakes to write an article, essay, or book on the subject of bells and bellringing his first task is to present to himself what may be called a declaration of intent. By this we mean that he must decide for what readers he is to write, whether for the general public, for the bellringers themselves, or for both. To write for ringers, provided a man knows his subject, is perhaps the least difficult. The author is mentally in touch with his readers and there is common knowledge of the mechanics of ringing, the production of changes, and the technical terms essential to the exposition. To write for the uninitiated is, as we all know, an exacting task; for whereas in art, music and the common sports the public is not troubled to perceive how the activities are pursued, in change-ringing there is the element of mystery, and the difficulties of explaining how changes are rung are enhanced by the fact that there is nothing to which to compare the process.

To attempt the third task is, for many of us, the most hazardous venture, for that which is needed by the general public is, in the main, a superfluity for the practical ringer, and what is of value to the ringer may be unintelligible to the layman. In this perplexity many a writer has found the task of achieving the double aim too great.

For Mr. Tom Ingram no such perplexity has existed. He has simply taken the central subject, BELL, and in a series of diverting essays has discoursed freely (and gaily) on a multitude of subjects, customs, traditions, events and people, all of them in some manner, sometimes quite remotely, connected with bells and bellringing. A second edition of his book "The Bells of England" (first published in 1954) has now come from the publishers, Frederick Muller, and we are glad to have the opportunity to look once again at this unusual work.

The opening chapters lead us from the early uses of bells to the development of organised ringing fostered by the evolution of the bell wheel, and so on to bellringers themselves, their habits past and present. the growth of reform in belfries and the work of guilds, associations and the Central Council. The chapter "Ingenious Noted Ringers" introduces change-ringing and something of the normal routine of the belfry, and here Mr. Ingram interrupts his theme to insert some accounts of accidents in the belfry, paragraphs that we feel are out of place at this point and which warrant some special and less casual treatment. The chapter also repeats the error that the first peal on tower bells by a lady (Miss Alice White) was in 1912, a possible confusion with the first peal to be rung entirely by ladies. In a later chapter we have a similar error, where the inventor of the first change-ringing machine is given as Henry instead of John Carter.

But the author has cast his net of research very widely, and he has been lavish in the distribution of his catch. Succeeding essays deal at great length with every use of bells—bicycle bells, train bells, fire bells and even bells used in advertisements. Nothing found in the interstices of the net seems to have been found useless, and the whole is dealt with in a highly diverting manner. The style is often loose and there

is much rambling, but the digressions are delightful. It is perhaps rather disconcerting to find oneself suddenly switched to some by-way of thought, but the by-way often proves so picturesque and attractive that it is with reluctance that we find ourselves shot back to the main path. So, one must not be surprised to find oneself turned from a consideration of the Passing Bell to a discourse on the condemned cell and the conduct of an execution, from the Market Bell to some lines on mediæval markets, from the Pancake Bell to a full and complete account of the Olney Pancake Race, or from bicycle bells to the Penny-Farthing, how to ride it and how to dismount from it. It is a trick reminiscent

of that charming essayist Robert Lynd and, if it has not Lynd's consummate mastery, it is in his manner of working, and it would doubtless have pleased him to read it

In "Bells for Skulls and Markets" Mr. Ingram gives us an excellent and well-knit essay on the Baroness Burdett-Coutts and her social activities in Bethnal Green. We must be grateful for the light he sheds on this philanthropic lady and her earnest work for the poor and depressed. From this the author moves on to clock jacks, and from there, abruptly, to chimes and carillons, dismissing these in a paragraph of less than 20 lines. We cannot but feel that a whole chapter might well have been given to this important branch of bellring-

ing, both for the benefit of the general public and for the education of many ringers.

The most carefully constructed section of this intriguing book is "The Bell Foundry", where we are given an authoritative and detailed exposition of the casting of a bell and the process of tuning. In the tracing of each step in the work the author's close observation is instructive on many minor points and is likely to provide the answers to questions arising in discussion.

Two appendices, one dealing with Henry Irving's great acting in "The Bells" and the other a study of the psychic phenomena of the ringing of the bells at Bealing House are vaguely connected with the main subject, but are interesting and entertaining. The bibliography, slightly enlarged since 1954, occupies eight pages and is one of the most comprehensive we have seen.

Barbara Jones' drawings are full of life and humour and fully match the vigour and vitality of the text. This is hardly a book to read through and return to the library. It should be on our shelves, to use as a reference, to bring inspiration when we are faced with the task of lecturing and where we may find, as we shall in each chapter, some refreshing diversion. We are grateful for the enterprise that has produced this second impression.

An excellent tea was afterwards enjoyed in the Village Hall, prepared and served by Mrs. F. Gray and helpers. At the meeting which followed the chair was taken by Mr. J. Sankey, of Calne, in the absence of Mr. W. Hacker (chairman, Calne Branch). He extended a warm welcome to all, stressing the need for ringers not to lose sight of the first duty of the craft—to ring for church services and to the glory of God. Mr. G. Newman (chairman, Marlborough Branch) suitably replied. Thanks were expressed to the Vicar for the use of the bells and to Mrs. Gray and her helpers for their hospitality.

Ringing in various methods of Doubles and Minor was then resumed, under the direction of Mr. Allan Keen (Ringing Master) until 8 p.m. It is hoped that more of these joint meetings may be arranged in the future, as they provide a valuable means of keeping the Branches in touch with each other.

M.U.G. Flotilla's Adventures on Grand Union Canal

THE 1969 summer tour of the Manchester University Guild started in the Bell at Long Eaton, Derbyshire, on June 28th. As the company gradually assembled at lunch-time we had our first ring at the parish church, St. Lawrence's; here we were only able to ring the back six of the 10 cwt. eight as the trebles were under repair.

The party moved cagerly to the boatyard at Trent Lock, for once again the M.U.G. fleet was about to take to the water, this time the upper reaches of the Grand Union Canal. We found our pre-ordered provisions and two of our hired barges waiting for us, while Captain Poly had to take his crew to find the third boat somewhere upstream

A.:r reluctantly forking-out our returnable (d.v.) deposits on "Delphinuim," under Captain Munday, and "Jim Hawkins," under Admiral Sherwood, we hastily completed our inventory check and then cheerfully cast off. Fortunately the boats were easy to handle and also really very comfortable, having six berths, gas cooker and fridge, water-heater, shower, toilet and even fitted radio! We soon learnt the technique of locks, and so Kegworth was reached without incident, where we moored for the night, conveniently close to the "local." Captain Poly and crew arrived later with "Lister Lady," which appeared to be the grandmother of the other two boats, and had reputedly been brought out of retirement for our benefit.

ENSIGN A GOLD BELL

Despite the first of Poly's short-cuts, which involved a weir and private land and gardens, we rang for Matins at St. Andrew's, Kegworth, with the local ringers. Returning to the boats we hoisted the ensign on the flagship (gold bell on blue background) and started the day-long run in magnificent weather down towards Quorn. After entertaining a holiday crowd with manoeuvres thread Barrow's Lock we moored and took me long walk round by the road to Quorn Church, where we had a very enjoyable ring on this typically fine

14 cwt. Taylor eight in an immaculate ringing chamber. After attending Evensong we cast off again and moved down to Mountsorrel for the night.

A leisurely rise on Monday morning was welcome, especially for the unsuccessful midnight blackberrying group. After some delay in the tower-opening arrangements we tackled the bells of St. Peter's, Mountsorrel, a strange, heretical Gillett and Johnston light eight, only four miles from Loughborough, and sadly no competition for Taylors' bells in respect of "go." Yorkshire, Little Bob and Stedman were scored.

Our only mention in the press, as far as we know, resulted from this visit—a small slightly distorted paragraph in the "Leicester Mercury" entitled "Bellringers Travel by Long Boat." Sailing on towards Cossington we stopped for lunch at the nearest point, and then took the long walk across the fields to the church. Ringing on the 11 cwt. minor five was a refreshing change. The Rector, himself a three times graduate of Manchester, very kindly gave us a most welcome tea in the village hall.

Moving on southwards we found ourselves faced again with a fair walk, taking the longest route again, to Syston for our evening ring on the 15 cwt. Taylor eight. We admired (enviously) the newly-refurbished ringing-chamber, but failed to bring anything round except Stedman. Our photograph, taken outside the west door here, witnesses the intensity of the evening sun.

INTO LEICESTER

Another slow rise on Tuesday caused some of the neet to be breakfasting still as we sailed towards Leicester, where the weather was much less fine. However we arrived punctually and, as the admiral was forced to admit, by lucky navigation, at the right place to ring at St. Mary de Castro's. While waiting for the adjacent law-courts to take their lunch recess (or Wimbledon watching?) we were privileged to see inside the church with its massive oak cross beams, and unusual tower base separate

from the church walls. We then enjoyed ringing on the sonorous 15 cwt. eight. Another impromptu handbell display on the river was given before leaving for the afternoon's cruise to South Wigston. Rain en route did not add to the doubtful beauties of the backwaters of Leicester. Furthermore the flagship, "Jim Hawkins," the fastest and newest of the fleet, ignominiously broke down in a reed-bound stretch which had presumably fouled the propeller, and had to towed the last mile by stolid old "Lister Lady," whom we suspected was propellerless anyway! Nevertheless, we were not too late to ring at St. Thomas's, South Wigston. Back at the boats, a detailed (i.e. underwater) investigation of "Jim Hawkins's" mechanics revealed an obstruction round the prop-shaft—a medium-sized carpet! The evening finished peacefully and traditionally in the not-so-convenient "local."

An even more leisurely rise was allowed on Wednesday morning, for there was no ringing programme, both towers applied for being under repair, so we cruised with somewhat better weather to Saddington tunnel for the experience of sailing through its half-mile length. We finally moored at Great Glenn,

Thursday was our day of misfortune, for dear old "Lister Lady" refused to start in the morning, and so had to be towed by "Jim Hawkins" to Wigston Magna. We arrived on time to ring on the 16 cwt. eight and we were very impressed by the tone and "go" of the bells. Our ringing was well up to form too, and Bristol. our homework for the week, was conquered for the first time. A forage in the supermarket followed, and meanwhile "Lister Lady" was being repaired—a fresh battery worked the cure apparently. We were now behind with our time-table, and despite the order for "full steam ahead" we regrettably missed our next two towers. However, we did reach Leicester in time to join in the Cathedral practice night.

NAMING MINOR METHODS

Dear Sir.—I write about minor matters. First it would seem that inquiries made by Mr. Bishop in issues No. 3015 and No. 3020 have so far gone unanswered. In the first one, the 2nd and 6th place Delight methods listed are unnamed, with the exception of the following:—

-34-16-12-1236-14-16 6th is Cadoxton.
-34-16-12-1236-14-56 2nd is Finchampstead.
34-34.16-12-1236-34-36 2nd is Warsop.
34-34.16-12-1236-34-36 2nd is Coddington.
36-34.16-12-1236-34-36 2nd is Barnby-in-the-Willows.

Also unnamed is

-36-16-12-1236-14-56 2nd

King Charles 3rd P.D. was first quarterpealed at Wonston, Hants, on August 17th,
1968, and first pealed at Barton Stacey,
Hants, on May 11th, 1969.

In the second query on Surprise Minor methods the 2nd and 6th place methods listed are unnamed, with the exception of the following:—

-34-14-12-1236-34-16 6th is Marchington, 34-36.14-12-1236-12-36 6th is Graphy

Also unnamed is __34-_14-_12-_1236-_14-_36 2nd.

Fawley Surprise was first quarter-pealed at Fawley, Hants, on January 9th, 1969, and first pealed at Bradfield, Berks, on February 3rd.

More recently the peal of Minor which I conducted at Longparish, Hants, on March 1st and that conducted by Mr. G. Dodd at Woolton Hill on March 22nd seems to have caused Mr. G. Dodds much distress. The correspondence printed so far (No. 3029, p. 362; No. 3032, p. 423; No. 3034, p. 474. No. 3036, p. 502) can be summarised as follows:—

- (a) Winchester Bob Minor is nasty because Mr. Dodds wouldn't like to ring it.
- (b) Winchester Bob Minor cannot be so named because there is a Winchester Bob Major already in existence.

A certain amount of background information has, however, not been disclosed by Mr. Dodds:—

- (i) Winchester Bob Minor is one of the many Minor methods which cannot be extended. Thus a second type of Winchester Bob Major cannot exist because of certain rules, which Mr. Dodds could have stated.
- (ii) The present Winchester Bob Major is -14-38-18-18 2nd and it has been pealed once, in 1924 at Willesden. This very popular method, however, cannot be reduced to Minor.
- (iii) Mr. Dodds is a member of the Methods Committee which did such sterling work recently in revising Decisions of the C.C. on methods

and peals. In issue 3030 he contributes half a page about them.

(iv) One of Mr. Dodds' accepted decisions requires that Winchester Bob Minor must now be called Winchester College Bob Minor (and similarly for the Christchurch and the Portsmouth); this will prevent any confusion with the Winchester Bob Major, although Mr. Dodds carefully avoided saying so.

This attempt by Mr. Dodds to bully myself and Mr. Dodd round to his point of view with lucid rhetoric appears to be another attempt, similar to that disclosed in the alarming letter by Mr. Whiting, to stifle freedom of the individual. This letter, in issue 3038 (p. 542) suggests that methods named after a peal were altered by the C.C. in the 1920s, for no satisfactory reason, and that unethical procedure was employed to rid itself of a committee set up to investigate such matters. It would seem to me that the time has come to rescind any unconstitutional steps, and I should hope that the band concerned, Norbury, will press for an investigation and a return to the names decided upon by their forebears.

IS THERE A STIGMA TO NON-ASSOCIATION PEALS?

Dear Sir,—I entirely agree with Richard Youdale when he says that the completely non-resident band at Overton has dashed the Spliced ambitions of two resident W. and P. bands. Of course the Guild can still set a new resident record, but what is more sad than to read "First of —— by a resident band" because some outsiders have swept the board?

It is surely time to consider the position of non-Association peals, of which, at the moment, some ringers seem to disapprove. In times of easy travel more and more peals are rung by people who have travelled many miles to ring (we recently read in Belfry Gossip of a hand who had come from Cambridge, South Wales, London, Norwich, etc., for a peal attempt), and if a peal such as this is rung for the local Association it is no credit to it (although it may aid its coffers). The peal of 32-Spliced at Overton was a case in point.

Did this peal really have to be rung for the W. and P.? The Guildford D.G. has recently stated that it does not mind if peals rung in its territory are not rung for it, and at least two officers of the W. and P. are of the same opinion and in fact would rather have seen this peal rung "non-Association".

Perhaps the stigma non-Association peals have is the very title "Non-Association" at the top (although the first peal at Washington was so rung). My own opinion is that peals without a common Association should be published without any Association heading. After all, we see plenty of these now, when two or more from one Association are printed. Those genuinely by an Association would be printed with the usual heading, perhaps in a section "Association Peals", and all others, possibly the majority, in another section.

This would result in a non-Association peal being the non-event, rather than the unusual event it is at present, which would be beneficial, I believe, to the Exercise.

Finally, I would like to make clear that I do not blame Mr. Peake and his band for their action. They acted, I am quite certain, in good faith and in accordance with normal conventions. It is these conventions which need changing.—Yours sincerely,

TREBLE BOB SIXTEEN "IN HAND"

Dear Sir,—Where have I seen this in print before John Mayne and his remarkable band recently rang a peal "in hand"? In Chapel Avenue, quite close to my address, a well known ringer carries on his business. He is W. H. Coles from Hillingdon, and he recently brought his recorder here and treated us to 12, 14 and 16 bellringing on handbells. This brought me to the title of this letter, and I quote William Snowdon who writes: "In 1824, when only in his seventeenth year, he gave a peal performance which took 3 hours and 21 minutes,

consisting of plain courses. Then to complete the 5,186 a plain course of 960 changes of 'Treble Bob Sixteen In' on 16 bells." This young man in his teens was Elijah Roberts who was a brass founder by trade. In 1837 he tapped 5,016 Stedman Cinques in 3 hours 24 minutes, and also a 19,440 Kent T.B. Maximus in 13 hours and 43 minutes! I wonder if J. W. Snowdon's notes are still available?—Yours sincerely,

Wessex Ringing Week-12 from 14 Success Story

Yorkshire was conducted at Bovey Tracey by Katharine, her first in charge. It was thoroughly umpired by Tim, from outside the tower, who declared it to be "a most excellent true peal". He then demonstrated his own skills by calling

Cannon's (sorry, Heywood's) Double Norwich for the ihird time this year, as he constantly reminded us (and then we him) for the rest of the week. Nevertheless the peal was well up to our previous standards and it is worth drawing the Double Norwich King's attention to his "up and coming" rival.

The next morning we were fortunate to be allowed an hour's ringing at Buckfast abbey, due to the efforts of Aubrey Benard and the co-operation of Father Paulinus, to whom we are indeed grateful.

Tuesday was a successful day in terms of quality of ringing, with Ron setting an excellent beat to Superlative at Plympton St. Mary—the best effort of the week, marred by only one trip. We celebrated with a much-delayed meal and congratulated ourselves on a 12 from 14 success story. The tour abroad experiment was well justified, a very cordial atmosphere prevailing throughout.

OBITUARY

MR. TERRY FITZGERALD

Merseyside ringers have suffered a severe loss by the sudden passing of one of their number, Terence Michael Fitzgerald, at the comparatively early age of 34. His death occurred on July 20th at the Liverpool Royal Infirmary where a week or so previously he had undergone what had appeared to be a successful leg operation, but unfortunately, as was afterwards revealed, there had been serious complications.

Three years ago Terry decided to give up his work as a qualified male sister at this same hospital in order that he could enter the ministry of the Church. He was accepted as a student at St. Aidan's Theological College, Birkenhead, and for the past three years he had been in training there preparatory to taking Holy Orders. In September, he would have been ordained and he was to have commenced his ministry as deacon at St. David's Church, Childwall.

Learning to ring at St. Luke's, Crosby, Terry quickly became a reliable ringer and excellent striker. He also rang at Halewood and the Church of St. Nicholas, and took part in several peals in and around his native Liverpool. For two years up to 1966 he was a very capable Assistant Ringing Master of the Liverpool Branch of the Lancashire Association.

In addition, he was an outstanding and devout leader in parochial matters and his many friends believe he would have made valuable contribution to the ministry of the Church he loved so well.

The funeral service was at his parish church. St. Faith's, Crosby, on July 24th, when the Rector, Father Charles Billington, officiated, assisted by the Rev. Michael R. D. Harford (a ringer and Vicar of St. David's, Childwall) and the Rev. Arthur Widdis (Principal of St. Aidan's College), who delivered a moving and inspiring address. The chief mourners were Terry's brother Pat (organist at this church, who played for the service), another brother, Maurice, and his sister Ann.

Among the large number also present were the churchwardens and members of the P.C.C. of St. David's, Childwall, and the Lancashire Association was represented by Miss Lucy Hopkins, Messrs. E. C. Birkett, J. N. Brown, J. Dunbavin and T. R. Butler.

After the service, the cortege proceeded to Thornton crematorium and there on this beautiful July day, in a peaceful country setting well within distant sight of the towers of Aughton, Sefton and Liverpool Cathedral where he had rung so often, we paid our last humble tribute of respect to a faithful friend and colleague who will always be remembered with the highest esteem and regard.

I came under Mr. Gosling's influence in 1946 after mastering the treble to Grandsire Doubles and Bob Minor. He had taught a band of my own age to ring 120 Grandsire Doubles and offered to teach me on an "inside" bell if I continued to give help after I had mastered the method.

I was grateful for that early help as ringing in my own tower was limited to call-changes. In those early days I could not see how I would be able to return that help, but later Mr. Gosling came weekly to my tower to learn the inside of Bob Minor and Stedman

Throughout the years our paths had crossed many times and he joined us on outings. But striking was his main interest and concern, and the fruit of his success was when his tower won the District striking contest three years in succession and received the cup he gave himself to the District.

The quarter peal rung to his memory in the method he knew so well would, if he could have heard it, have pleased him greatly. I am glad to have known him and grateful to the early start he gave me in ringing.

FIRST PEAL AT APPLEBY

With the recent first peal on the bells at St. Lawrence's, Appleby, Westmorland, all rings of bells in the county have been rung to peals.

The Appleby peal came after four attempts, the first being in March, 1968. Appleby is the county town of Westmorland, and the bells were hung in 1833 by Mears of London. The successful peal lasted 2 hours 33 minutes and so at last set up history on the little-used difficult six.


L.C.A. IN S.W. LONDON
