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THE CHURCH'S PENNY

Last year the Church paid the writer one penny for every occasion he rang for a service, and in consequence in the eyes of those who regard ringing as a sport he lost his amateur status. Probably most Sunday service ringers come within the same category. 'Don't ring like an amateur' is a saying frequently addressed to young ringers who have temporarily fallen from grace. The inference behind the observation is that professionalism denotes a certain grade of efficiency, a pride of craftsmanship or ability. Payment denotes a contract, and by the acceptance of the penny the individual becomes the servant of the Church.

Now there are types of professionalism in ringing which are viewed with disfavour by a number of guilds. Ringing for prize money has been condemned. In the areas of the Devon and Salisbury Guilds the opposition is definite, and in Cornwall competitions among call change ringers have been regarded with displeasure. The Salisbury Guild intervened in the matter of an Australian legacy which had as its objective the offering of prizes at ringing competitions in a Dorset town. It has been replaced by a ringers' festival, the legacy being devoted to providing a tea.

In the realm of sport the Amateur Athletic Association have laid down this definition of an amateur: 'An amateur is one who has never competed for a money prize or monetary consideration in any athletic sport or game . . . who has never engaged in assisting in or has taught any athletic exercise for pecuniary consideration or in any way exploited his athletic ability for profit.' Between the amateur and professional they establish a great gulf. In the history of change ringing there are probably not more than a dozen men whose livelihood has been gained from change ringing, but there are thousands who, like the writer, might be classified as being within the ranks of semi-professionals and have received some remuneration for their ringing.

This semi-professionalism in ringing fortunately causes no heartburns and raises no question of status. The fee or reward is infinitesimal when compared with what an enthusiastic ringer spends in furthering his art and in securing his maximum measure of enjoyment from the fellowship of ringing. There can be no qualms of conscience in taking the Church's penny. In a sense it should be regarded in the same light as the parable of the hiring in

the market place, where the reward was in accordance with a definite contract. The primary object of all guilds in affiliation with the Central Council is to ensure that Sunday by Sunday the church bells of our land shall be rung faithfully and well. By the acceptance of the humble penny a contract has been entered into, and what finer or nobler service than that of His Church!

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THE PASSING OF MR. RUPERT RICHARDSON

Ringers in all parts of the country received last week with deep regret the news of the death of Mr. Rupert Richardson, at Glyn Garth, Surfleet, Lincolnshire. His death followed an illness of nearly three months' duration. He was 64 years of age.

Rupert Richardson was born at Meanwood, Leeds, on August 21st, 1883. He came to Surfleet with his parents when nine years old, and later learnt his ringing under the Rev. H. Law James, Vicar of Surfleet. A farmer and bulb grower, his business frequently took him to Covent Garden, and he made many ringing friends in London. He took part in ringing tours throughout the country, and he was a member of 39 associations in the British Isles and six in Australia; these last he joined when taking part in the famous 'Great Adventure.' On this tour he rang what he always considered to be his most important peal, one of Grandsire Cinques at Melbourne Cathedral, in which six English and six Australian ringers took part.

His great work for the Lincoln Guild will long be remembered, and he was a familiar figure at meetings all over the diocese. On the death of the Rev. H. Law James he was appointed Master, which position he held until his passing. He represented the Guild on the Central Council for 44 years, and had attended 34 meetings, being absent on three occasions only (meetings of the Council were abandoned during part of the two wars). He had served on the Standing Committee since 1936.

In 1923 he married Miss Annie Parkin, a ringer of Woodston, Peterborough, and his only child, Mrs. Enid Wayman, has also followed in her father's footsteps.

THE FUNERAL.

He was the lucky possessor of a great sense of humour, and that, combined with his natural kindness and modesty, endeared him to all. We mourn the loss of a good man, truly one of the outstanding characters in the ringing fraternity. 'O blest man, let this praise be given: Heaven was in him before he was in Heaven.'

Such a loss can never be replaced, but we can follow the example he continuously and so obviously set by realising the joy of making and seeing other people happy.

Our kind thoughts turn to Mrs. Richardson and Enid in their great loss, and we trust that God may grant them health and strength to carry the tremendous burden which has fallen upon them.

In welcoming members, the Chairman said he could not say how grateful he felt towards those members of the Guild who, Sunday after Sunday, maintained their contribution to the traditions of the churches in the land. It was, he added, the bells which called the people to church, and if the congregations were sometimes small, it was not the fault of the ringers.

The Society rang on Monday, the Eleventh day of May, 1761, a true and complete peal of 5,040 Bob Major Single in 3 hours and 25 minutes, being the only one ever rung there. Bells cast by Lester. Francis Wood treble, William Matthis 2, George Partrick 3, William Lister 4, Michael Purser 5, Richard Hilson 6, Samuel Wood 7, Robert Wight tenor. The Bobs were called by Sam Wood, peal 45.

JOHN R. SHARMAN AND CHARLES R. LILLEY.

Dear Sir,—As an old Bedford ringer I was much interested to read the article about this association in 'The Ringing World' of Jan. 3rd.

In the reference to the leading ringers I missed the names of John R. Sharman and Chas. R. Lilley. J. R. Sharman, who was born on June 9th, 1876, had learned to manage a bell before going to Bedford in 1893. He rang his first peal, 5,088 Kent Treble Bob Major, at Irthlingborough on March 31st, 1894. By the time he left Bedford in April, 1895, he had learned to ring Stedman, Duffield, Double Norwich and Superlative Surprise besides the easier methods.

When Mr. Sharman moved to Crawley, Sussex, he was fortunately able to join James Parker and his band there. On May 25th, 1895, he rang his first peal of Superlative at Cuckfield, and on Sept. 30th the same year his first of London Surprise Major at Crawley. In 1897 he moved to London, and, joining William, Ernest and George Pye the next year, he rang with them many peals of Stedman, Double Norwich, Superlative, Cambridge and London Surprise. Mr. Sharman has rung about 350 peals and conducted a good number on 8, 10 and 12 bells. In 1922 Mr. Sharman left London, returning to his old home at Cogenhoe, a village some four miles from Northampton. Since then he has had little opportunity to ring peals.

An account of C. R. Lilley's career as a ringer was included in 'The Ringing World,' March 24th, 1939. He died December 10th, 1942.—Yours truly,
