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SIXTY YEARS ON

Last Saturday, the 60th anniversary of the first ringing of Holt's Original peal of Grandsire Triples on handbells silent, was commemorated by a supper party given by one of the ringers, Mr. John C. Mitchell, J.P., and attended by another of the survivors, Mr. W. H. L. Buckingham. This silent peal was rung at the Goose and Gridiron, London, on March 11th, 1887, and it was originally planned for the commemoration supper to be held on March 8th, but owing to the very severe weather conditions it was postponed. Guests of Mr. and Mrs. Mitchell on this happy occasion were Mr. E. H. Lewis (president of the Central Council), Mr. E. G. Fenn (past-master of the Ancient Society of College Youths), Mr. A. A. Hughes, J.P. (treasurer of the society), and Mrs. Hughes, and Mr. A. B. Peck (secretary of the society).

The story of this peal, in which the order of ringing was J. C. Mitchell 1-2, W. H. L. Buckingham 3-4, C. F. Winney 5-6, G. F. McLaughlin 7-8, was told in reminiscent vein by the survivors. The idea of attempting such a performance dawned upon Mr. C. F. Winney, the well-known ringer, after a peal of Holt's Original on January 25th, in which Messrs. Mitchell and Buckingham took part. These two ringers, whose ages were then 19 and 20 respectively, came from St. Albans daily to London for business. The first practice took place on February 9th, the condition being no calls, but mistakes corrected without stopping. On February 25th, this being the eighth time of meeting, the band met at the residence of Mr. Winney, and upon the arrival of Mr. Mitchell, who had been detained at business until 10 p.m., it was decided to commence the peal, which was successfully brought round at 1.20 a.m.

The public performance at the headquarters of the Ancient Society of College Youths was a different proposition. A demonstration that the band was equal to the task was given on March 2nd, when two-thirds of the peal was rung. Another start was made on March 8th, when 4,600 changes were rung, and the clock of St. Paul's struck eleven so hard that one of the band thought he counted 13 and in consequence came to grief! The peal was finally accomplished on the 11th, the day being the 33rd anniversary of the silent peal of Stedman Triples, which was rung at the Whittington and Cat, Bethnal Green, by Messrs. Cox, Cooter, Haley and Wood. The peal was umpired by Mr. W. Barron, of the Royal Cumberland Society, and Mr. J. W. Rowbotham, of the

Ancient Society of College Youths, who took down each lead as rung.

Of the survivors, Mr. Buckingham celebrated his 81st birthday last Tuesday. He joined the Abbey Guild at St. Albans Cathedral in 1884, was elected a member of the College Youths in 1885, and has some 400 peals to his credit. A prominent Freemason, he is a Past Grand Standard Bearer of the Grand Lodge of England and a Past Grand Registrar of the Province of Hertfordshire. Mr. Mitchell joined the St. Albans Society in 1885 and was elected a College Youth in the same year. He had the distinction of being elected the first honorary member of the Central Council. His business life was spent in London Transport. Upon retirement in 1933 on the construction of the London Passenger Transport Board, he was secretary and treasurer to the London General Omnibus Company, Ltd., and allied companies. Since 1923 he has been a J.P. for the City of London. He is a Past Master of the Worshipful Company of Coachmakers and Coach Harnessmakers, and in Masonic circles is a Past Grand Deacon of the Grand Lodge of England and a Past Senior Grand Warden of the Province of Hertfordshire. Of the other two who have passed over, Mr. Winney died in 1940, having been elected a College Youth in 1879, and Mr. Geo. F. McLaughlin was elected a College Youth in 1881, Master in 1886 and died in 1929. The anniversary is one which we can recall with just pride, and the coincidence is that it has been celebrated in a vintage year of handbell ringing with the first peal of Cambridge Surprise Royal in hand—a happy omen for the future of this side of the Exercise.

DERBYSHIRE ASSOCIATION

Lowe were all re-elected, and the quarterly meetings fixed as follows: July, Peak district; October, Ilkeston; January, Chesterfield; and Easter, Derby. Ringing continued until 8.15 at St. Peter's and 8.30 at the Cathedral.

Touches brought round included Bristol Surprise, Superlative Surprise, Kent and Oxford Spliced Treble Bob, Little Bob and Plain Bob Major, Stedman and Grandsire Triples.

Southwell Diocesan Guild

FIRST ANNUAL MEETING.

For their first annual general meeting the Southwell Guild visited their newly-formed Newark District on April 12th and were rewarded with an attendance in the region of 60.

Ringing was indulged in on Newark's heavy ten from 2.30 to 5, when the entire company assembled at the Barnbygate Restaurant for tea, where they were joined by the Guild president, the Bishop of Southwell.

The Bishop expressed his pleasure at meeting the members of the Guild in force for the first time and emphasised the need for spade work in isolated districts where instructors are hard to find.

The meeting in the belfry was conducted by the guild chairman (Canon Wilkinson). After having accepted the secretary's and treasurer's reports, the members had a hard nut to crack with the problem of supplying each member with a report which would cost about 2s. each to print for an annual subscription of 1s. 6d.

After an exhaustive discussion it was decided that a report must be printed of this first year's operations, during which the membership had grown to 230, 31 peals had been rung ranging from Grandsire Doubles to Kent Treble Bob Royal and much fresh ground broken. The secretary was instructed to proceed with the compilation of a report which should be as concise a record as possible and be as nearly as possible a directory of the towers in the area.

It was further decided to make a charge of 6d. for this report when available with a recommendation to tower secretaries to ask those who could to pay 1s., and to increase the annual subscription to 2s. 6d. in 1948 to include a free report. No charge was made in the general officers, the Bishop, Canon Wilkinson, Miss Thompson and T. Groombridge, jun., being re-elected en bloc as president, chairman, hon. treasurer and hon. secretary respectively. Canon Wilkinson and Miss Thompson were elected trustees, and Messrs. F. W. Brown and P. E. Ball auditors. The sum of three guineas was voted from the Bell Restoration Fund to Rampton, where an augmentation is in hand.

Mention was made of the Leicester Guild's outstanding success in scoring the first of Surprise Royal 'in hand,' and the secretary was asked to convey to the band the congratulations of the meeting on such a meritorious performance.

In conclusion, the chairman noted the progress of 1946, not measured in any spectacular achievement, but in the opening up of new ground and getting the far ends of the area together, in short, the benefits of organising on a diocesan basis, which could never have been hoped for on the far flung basis of pre-1946 days, and looked forward to the day when the Bishop's exhortation to cultivate the village towers had borne fruit and every tower was an active unit of the Guild.

A hearty vote of thanks to the Rector for the use of the bells, to the local officers for the facilities given, and to the local district secretary (Mr. Raithby) for his excellent arrangements concluded the meeting and ringing was again the order till 8 p.m. T.G.

OXFORD DIOCESAN GUILD

East Ilsley's outing on Easter Monday was enjoyed by some 30 ringers and friends. Chipping Norton, Slipton-under-Wychwood, Wifney, Clanfield, Bampton and Appleton (Berks) were the towers visited, and the ringing all day was quite good.

The Ilsley ringers are most grateful to Mr. Harry Farmer for his splendid arrangements, and feel very honoured that Dick White with his records was quite happy to be with the Ilsley boys and girls, and that two branch secretaries, the deputy master and general secretary of the Guild found time to spend a very pleasant day with them. Guildford Diocesan Guild

GOLDSMITH MEMORIAL BELL.

An announcement was made at the annual meeting of Guildford Diocesan Guild on April 19th that the sacring bell for the new Guildford Cathedral, which is to be the ringers' memorial to Mr. J. S. Goldsmith, the first secretary of the Guild, will be handed over on the anniversary of Mr. Goldsmith's death in June.

Mr. G. L. Grover (secretary) explained that the diocesan authorities had received a licence to complete the crypt into a chapel and had notified the Guild that the bell would be required. An order for the bell had been given to Messrs. Mears and Stainbank and delivery had been promised about the anniversary of Mr. Goldsmith's death. So far £56 had been raised towards the cost of £70, and contributions were invited. About the anniversary, in the first week in June, the Guild hoped to stage some ceremony for the handing over of the bell.

The Rev. K. C. Davis, who presided, said the Bishop felt that while there were so many people homeless, the work of completing the Cathedral should not be put in hand. It might be possible to start again in two years' time.

The report of the Executive Committee gave the strength of the Guild as 430 ringing members (70 life and unattached, 41 Service members and 95 honorary. As to restorations, Chertsey (8) and Merrow (6) had been rehung; Dunsfold (6) and Hascombe (5) recast and rehung; Walton-on-Thames (8) rehanging in progress. Restoration work at Shere, Womersley, Ash and Bagshot was contemplated, and at Sand the church authorities intended to provide a peal of six as their war memorial.

Losses by death included Major J. H. B. Hesse (first Master), the Rev. A. C. Tranter (Egham), Mr. H. Baldock (Cobham), hon. members; Mr. A. E. King (Farnham) and Mr. H. Harris (Guildford), ringing members.

During 1946, 46 peals were rung against 52 in 1945. This slight falling off was more than counterbalanced by the fact that there were 20 first pealers compared with 12 in the previous year. Five of the peals were rung outside the diocese and 16 diocesan towers claimed one or more of the remaining 41. Although there were 10 conductors once again, unfortunately there were no claims to 'first as conductor.'

The balance sheet, presented by Mr. J. Corbett, showed that the balance in hand had increased from £47 2s. 5d. to £58. The Benevolent Fund stood at £83 13s. 5d.

The report and accounts were adopted. The Master (Mr. A. Harman) reported the death of Mr. James, of Cobham. In his memory a new Surprise peal had been dedicated Cobham Surprise. The Master also made acknowledgment of the services of Mr. W. H. Viggers in connection with the Guild's new peal book, and Mr. A. C. Hazelden mentioned that the Guild was indebted to Mr. Harman for making a fine box for the custody of the book.

Mr. A. C. Hazelden announced a valuable addition to the Guild library by Supt. Hilton (Surrey Police) of a copy of 'Campanologia Improved,' by C. A. Bettesworth, dated 1733. It was a third edition and the book had been restored by Mr. Viggers. A welcome addition was from Mr. Shuker (secretary of the Lancashire Association) of instructional books issued by his Association.

There was only one change in the elections. Mr. R. Hasted being succeeded by Mr. Leslie Hunter as hon. auditor. In appreciation of his services in the Farnham District the Guild conferred on Mr. Hasted a vice-presidency.

The Guild service was held in St. Nicolas Church, the Rev. K. C. Davis giving the address and Mr. W. A. Dollimore (Aldershot) read the lesson. Tea was served in St. Nicolas' Hall, and ringing took place at the Guild churches and Merrow and Shalford. Those who contributed to the success of the meeting were thanked.

OBITUARY

MR. WILLIAM C. JAMES.

Captain of the Cobham (Surrey) band for over 40 years, Mr. William C. James died on April 8th, aged 69. He started ringing at Cobham in 1903, was elected captain in 1906 and continued in office until last year.

Cobham ringers earned the title of 'the happy family'. With Mr. James they were always prominent at Guild meetings, and this same friendliness prevailed in the village where there were over 30 honorary members of the Guild recruited mainly by Mr. James.

Mr. James was very methodical. He kept records of practice and service ringing and was a good instructor.

The funeral service was on April 11th, the Guildford Guild being represented by Mr. A. Harman (Master) and Mr. Arthur Smith (secretary, Leatherhead district). The bells of the Parish Church were rung half-muffled. Cremation was at Woking.

MR. J. J. PRATT.

As briefly announced in our column, we regret to report the death on April 5th at the Hillingdon County Hospital of Mr. Joseph J. Pratt. His wife, who had been ailing for some time, did not long survive her husband, and died on April 8th. They were both buried together in Hillingdon Cemetery on April 11th.

The interment was preceded by a service in St. John's Church, conducted by the Vicar (the Rev. A. M. Bashford), and was attended by many parishioners and over 20 ringers. A course of Grandsire Caters was rung on handbells over the open grave by A. R. G. Twinn 1-2, F. G. Baldwin 3-4, F. W. Goodfellow 5-6, W. H. Coles 7-8, T. G. Bamister 9-10.

At the express wish of the family, the bells at St. John's were not rung on the day of the funeral, but the following day an attempt for a memorial peal of Grandsire Caters on these bells failed after about three hours through a shift-course. A peal of Bob Major, however, was rung as a tribute to Mr. Pratt's memory at St. Andrew's, Uxbridge, on April 19th, at which tower he had done much ringing, including his first peal on April 16th, 1894.

Jack Pratt, as he was affectionately known, gave long and faithful service to St. John's Church for nearly sixty years, and for the last 21 years had been a popular and respected captain. Just before the war parishioners and ringing friends presented Mr. Pratt with an armchair, and his old friend William Honor a clock, as mark of appreciation of the 50 years' service of each in St. John's belfry. Mr. Pratt did a good deal of ringing locally and in neighbouring districts.

No accurate record of his peals is known at the moment, but it was found about a hundred. Steps have been taken to see that Mr. Pratt's ringing papers and his handbells are not lost to the Exercise.

Jack Pratt endeared himself to all who knew him. His kindly disposition, dry humour, patience and understanding made him well fitted to lead the ringers. He was particularly popular with the youngsters, who held him in great esteem and regarded him with undisguised affection. F.W.G.

AN OLD EVESHAM BELL FOUNDRY

As far back as 1690 Matthew Bagley, a member of the noted founders of Chacombe, Northants, set up a foundry in Evesham. He was followed by Clark and Bushell, who carried on business as bell founders in Evesham at Merstow Green. It was about 1705 that rings of bells cast by this firm became apparent, and two noted rings in the district, viz., Hinton-on-the-Green and Badsey, were cast by them. The Hinton bells were a ring of five, now augmented to eight by Taylors in 1931.

There are several individual bells bearing Clark's name or the founder's trade mark in Worcestershire and Warwickshire. This consisted of a square or oblong surmounted by the symbol IHS with a cross rising out of the H.

On a bell at Hinton enclosed in the square is a Latin inscription: 'Me RenoVaVit. Q.V. Clark I.V.V. Vs DaVi VVarrenI et pro VoItis' (William Clark recast me at the orders of David Warren and in fulfilment of vows).

Arranging the capitals as Roman numerals, we arrive at the date of casting, 1705. This clever and ingenious chronogram, as trade mark and inscription, is both unusual and interesting, and is peculiar to these old craftsmen, whose only memorial now is the tuneful ring of bells still in use in certain of our church towers.
