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THREE JOHNS

A feature at the annual dinner of the Ancient Society of College Youths is the concluding toast, in which the respective Masters of 100, 200 and 300 years ago are remembered. Mr. E. Alex Young, who since the death of Mr. J. Armiger Trollope has been the society's historian, delved into the past and gave sidelights of these three worthies, all of whom were christened John, when the 310th anniversary dinner was held on Saturday.

In 1847 the Master was John Bradley, who was one of those energetic men of the middle of the 19th century and was a contemporary of John Cox, who during Bradley's mastership was the leading conductor of the College Youths. Bradley joined the society in 1840, and at the time he came in he rang a peal of Oxford Treble Bob.

John Hardham, who held office in 1747, has been much in the news this year in view of the Ancient Society's visit to Chichester this summer. Chichester was his birthplace, and the town he endowed in a handsome fashion by his will. He succeeded Benjamin Annable as Master, having rung his first peal in 1725, and also stood in the record peal of Maximus. Mr. Young described him as 'a reliable man and one who did not push himself to the front.' In business as a tobacconist and snuff purveyor, he was a man of substance. His shop remains to this day at Fleet Street, and 'Hardham's Snuff Shop' is still to be seen on the fascia of the premises.

John Bayes, the Master in 1647, was elected a member a couple of years before, and he never filled the office of steward. There was no question that he was a man of standing, as the composition of the College Youths in those days was largely professional men or law students. His predecessor, John Houghton, was a writer of learned books and dealer in coffee, chocolate and other luxuries 'against the Ship Tavern in Bartholomew Lane.'

This pride in the achievements of the past and the maintenance of continuity is ever constant among the College Youths. Shades of past performances undoubtedly were present on the occasion of the peal by the society recorded this week at Southwark Cathedral. From those distant Stuart days when the society was formed until to-day it is doubtful if any great royal occasion has passed by without appropriate ringing. And next Thursday will be such an occasion when the bells of Westminster Abbey will express the rejoicings of the people on the occasion of the marriage of Princess Elizabeth, the heir to the throne, and her gallant sailor bridegroom.

BELFRY GOSSIP

After ringing a peal at a Sussex church, the ringers were surprised to find a gallon of beer in a brass jug on the steps outside the belfry door. It was from the local landlord with his compliments. Writes the conductor: 'Although I have read all about the bad old days and would not recommend the consumption of beer in the belfry, this beer tasted better than any I have had for some time.'

The first anniversary of the dedication of the treble at Mulbarton, Norfolk, was commemorated by a peal of Minor. The occasion was marked by two first peals—by Miss Nancy Hall aged 15, and Mr. Herbert Nichols, aged 63. May succeeding anniversaries be similarly commemorated.

There has always existed a very warm spirit of friendliness between London and Birmingham ringers, and this was further strengthened recently when seven members of the St. Martin's Guild were invited to take part in a peal of Stedman Cinques at Southwark.

Under the capable conductorship of Mr. H. Langdon, course after course rolled by without incident and a very good peal resulted, free from any mistakes. In pre-war days, this ring was easily one of the best in the country, but the work done on them has brought a new beauty and resonance.

The peal of Doubles at Winhill, Burton-on-Trent, replaces one lost after 2½ hours' ringing through losing a clapper on September 2nd. This was to have marked the 86th birthday of Mr. Charles Brown, who has just retired after being a ringer at the church for 77 years.

It is pleasant to read that at Wisborough Green, Sussex, on October 26th, the local ringers were thanked at evensong by the Rector for their work, and a course of Grand-sire Triples was rung on handbells in place of a hymn. After the service the Rector invited the ringers to the Rectory for light refreshments and a chat.

COLLEGE YOUTHS' 310th ANNIVERSARY

A YEAR OF PROGRESSIVE ACCOMPLISHMENT THIRTY-SEVEN NEW MEMBERS FOURTEEN HALF-CENTURY MEMBERS PRESENT

FOR the 310th anniversary of the Ancient Society of College Youths at Pimms, Bishopsgate, London, on Saturday, a dinner was substituted for the war-time expedient of a mid-day meal. The limitation of the company to 100 through Ministry of Food regulations meant many disappointments; nevertheless, there were 14 Youths with over 50 years' membership present to give that loyal support to the reigning Master, Mr. G. W. Cecil, the secretary, Mr. A. B. Peck, and the hon. treasurer, Mr. A. A. Hughes, J.P., after his tour of Canada and the United States.

The Master, in proposing the toast of 'The Church,' said they as churchmen-ringers owed a great deal to the Church—in fact, they might say they owed to the Church the very existence of their Exercise. During the last 50 or 60 years there had been developed a better understanding between the clergy and the ringers, and that probably dated from the time of the formation of the Central Council in 1891. Since then, particularly in the last 10 or 12 years, they had seen a greatly increased interest between clergy and ringers. It had been a great pleasure and honour to be Master for the past year, and he would like to thank his fellow officers and members for their advice and help during his period of office.

Canon Jocelyn Perkins, of Westminster Abbey, who replied, said he was sure that the ringing of bells must have an uplifting effect on people even if they were not conscious of the purpose. He recalled that when a glorious ring of bells was sent from the Whitechapel Foundry to Victoria Cathedral, British Columbia, he received most amazing letters about them. People stood in the streets with tears streaming down their cheeks, not having heard the sound of bells since they left England—in some cases 50 years.

ABBEY'S TRIBUTE OF LOYALTY.

He would like to pay tribute to the ringers of Westminster Abbey, where for 25 years he had had among his duties that of superintendent of the belfry. They were all great fellows. 'May the Abbey belfry successfully accomplish its tribute of loyalty next Thursday week to the bonny bride and the gallant sailor to whom she has given her heart' (applause).

Mr. E. H. Lewis, who proposed the toast of 'The Society,' said he would like to congratulate the Society and its officers on reviving the dinner. It was a pity that circumstances over which they had no control limited their numbers to 100 when they ought to have had 200. He would also like to congratulate them on the reopening of Southwark bells, and what a noble ring they were, especially after the little 'tickling' they had received. Another matter of congratulation was the little event at Chichester. It was a happy inspiration to celebrate the 200th anniversary of John Hardham being their Master.

There was one other event to which he would like to refer, and that was how sorry they were to hear of the passing of the historian of the Ancient Society. He felt that Mr. Trollope did a great deal in writing that masterly history of their Society. Whatever his failings, he had a great talent for historical research, and he did not think they should let his death pass without a tribute.

They were pleased to have with them Mr. J. C. Mitchell, and he would like to thank him for the opportunity of joining in the celebration of the 60th anniversary of ringing Holt's Original in hand, silent. Another striking thing during the past year was that they had admitted three new members from Western Canada (applause).

That day they missed one who for years had proposed that toast—Canon Coleridge—and he hoped the Society would send him a message on his 90th birthday.

Membership of the College Youths had gained for him friends in all parts of the country. In 1906 he was in Lancashire and could not get to London, so four of them had their dinner together. There was John Aspinall, George Newton, who was still going strong, and William Davis, who was apt to get very excited and would cry out in his Welsh accent, 'Now listen at them.' Another old Lancashire worthy was Jack Eches, and he remembered attending a meeting at Wigan where the bells were pretty lumpy. Jack came into the belfry and said, 'Eh lads, what's t'matter? Is it mean or bells?' After a pause he added, 'I think 'tis men.'

Mr. A. B. Peck, the hon. secretary, whose name was coupled with the toast, said they had still four towers—St. Michael's, Cornhill, St. Paul's, Southwark Cathedral and St. Dunstan's, Stepney—and at all these four they rang the bells every Sunday. The Society had held 13 business meetings during the year and 43 ringing meetings, including a visit to Chichester, which was a great success. He thought with the help of Mr. Young they could arrange something similar during the coming year. Their visit to Chichester was to mark the 200th anniversary of John Hardham; perhaps in 200 years' time they would be going to Stepney!

CANON COLERIDGE'S MESSAGE.

From his dear friend Canon Coleridge he had received the following letter: 'An unexpected attack by some unknown germ was made on me when I was on my way to Exeter for the Central Council meeting six months ago, preventing my attendance. It is not a germ now, but weak knees and bad feet, which I am sorry to say will keep me from the 310th anniversary of the College Youths. I can only hobble about with the aid of two stout sticks to keep me up. As I must be here on Monday I don't want to be taken to hospital in case of an accident and disappoint many of my friends here (Crowthorne).

'I know many will be disappointed at my non-appearance at Pimms—but no one more

so than myself. I can't tell you how disappointed I am in being forced to "give a miss" on Saturday—but I remember the old proverb, "Discretion is the better part of valour," and feel that I ought to show it. I have not missed many—if any—anniversaries of the College Youths for quite 50 years, and I feel that I should like to stand up with others during one's 68th year of membership of the Antient Society and in person offer my best wishes to all members present, in particular yourself, the Master and Stewards coming first—and also to the new officers to be elected next week.'

Mr. Peck said he had also received a letter from his old friend, Albert Walker, who had been a member for 51 years.

During the year the Society had rung the following peals: Chelsey, Berks, Stedman Triples; Trowbridge, Wilts, Stedman Cinques; Balcombe, Sussex, Cambridge Major; Southwark Cathedral, Stedman Cinques; Hornchurch, Bob Major; Croydon, Stedman Cinques; Stepney, Grandire Caters; Crayford, London Surprise; Harlington, Stedman Triples; Cheltenham, Cambridge Maximus; Southwark, Stedman Cinques.

ment of suitable material to carry on the art. There was a tremendous wastage which they would do well to analyse. He would say that it was no longer safe or desirable to treat youngsters as they were treated in his young days. He was reminded of a story concerning John Day, of Birmingham, who was very pompous. Seeing a stranger in the belfry, he went up to him with a patronising air and asked him where he came from. 'Walsall,' replied the youth. 'Can you ring 12?' asked John. 'No, I can only ring one!' was the rejoinder.

The other problem was how they could practise their art without giving annoyance to other people. He asked them all to give special attention to that problem.

SOMERSET AND WALES.

Mr. J. T. Dyke, who replied, said in Somerset they definitely looked up to the College Youths not only because of their high standard of ringing, but of the personalities in the Society. His earliest recollection of College Youths was in 1910, when he came to London to take his matriculation. In Somerset they were very bellminded and they liked to get about and ring, but he was afraid that owing to the decision of His Majesty's Government they would be stuck for some time.

Mr. J. W. Jones (Llandaff and Monmouth) also replied, and expressed his delight at being present. He had the pleasure of ringing a peal the previous Saturday and he was now 82.

The toast of 'The Ringing World' was submitted by Mr. J. A. Waugh (senior steward), who announced that there would be a cordial welcome at Southwark Cathedral to any young ringers coming to London.

The Editor, in his reply, in calling attention to the popularity of peal ringing, mentioned that two peals of Doubles had been rung in New South Wales. November 19th was an important anniversary in the history of the Society. Sixty years ago Holt's Original was rung in hand for the Society at St. Albans by John C. Mitchell 1-2, G. W. Cartmel 3-4, W. H. L. Buckingham 5-6, and Albert Barnes 7-8. All those four members were still alive.

Essex Association

A HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL ADVENTURE.

The 'Crusaders' of South-West Essex completed a two years' programme on October 25th, when 40 ringers met at Hornchurch and participated in touches of many of the standard methods.

The movement, initiated by Mr. G. L. Joyce, began in May, 1946. Twenty or so experienced ringers promised their support, and the average attendance has been eleven, augmented by visitors, numbering from twenty to forty, the number varying according to the weather and accessibility of the tower. To date the following towers have been 'covered': Brentwood, Loughton, Dagenham, Rayleigh, Barking, Romford, Woodford, Langdon Hills and Hornchurch, with district meetings at Woodford, Epping, Leigh-on-Sea, Stamford-le-Hope, West Ham, Bentley (South Weald), Fyfield, Prittlewell, with Thorpe Bay. (The 'Crusade' meeting arranged for Chigwell Row in September had to be cancelled at the last minute due to a fete nearby.) This collection of towers comprises rings of five, six, eight and ten bells.

The officers of the district are grateful for the wonderful backing received from the 'Crusaders,' drawn from various towers in the district. Their loyalty, enthusiasm and forbearance have been outstanding, and many contacts have been made which should be treasured in the days to come. Also thanks are extended to the incumbents and the steeple-keepers—without their ready co-operation the scheme would have failed.

While some questions have been asked and answered on matters theoretical, it must be confessed that the burden has not been so heavy as might have been expected. The writer does mildly wonder why it is that more do not boldly ask to be allowed to try calling this or that touch. Are they too shy, or don't they aspire to conduct?

The district secretary, Mr. J. H. Crampion, 7, Cedar Avenue, Chadwell Heath, would be only too glad to hear from anybody who thinks that the conduct of the meetings could be bettered. By criticism only can improvements be introduced. The 'visitor' of to-day becomes the 'Crusader' of to-morrow! J.C.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Wakefield Peal Boards

Dear Sir,—I feel sure that all who visited Wakefield for the dedication of the Cathedral bells went home with the conviction that a really magnificent job had been made of the restoration. Indeed, some may have departed with feelings of envy.

We often hear it said, 'Nothing is as good as it used to be,' but this cannot be said of the new ring at Wakefield. All concerned are to be congratulated on the result, particularly the founders, who have made a notable addition to their already long list of beautiful rings in the County of Broad Acres.

In the Wakefield Cathedral Magazine, the Provost, the Very Rev. N. T. Hopkins, writes:

'I have had the large unsightly boards in the ringing chamber, recording the peals rung during the past 100 years or so, removed; they occupied an unjustifiable amount of space in the chamber, they darkened the place and, though perhaps possessing some interest to a very limited number of people, were of no particular antiquarian or historical value.

'Nevertheless, I have taken care that the records inscribed on the boards shall be preserved and, for this purpose, a rather beautifully bound book has been procured and all the various inscriptions which have now disappeared from the walls have been inserted in the volume. An account of the present restoration of the bells and their dedication will also be included, together with any notable peals which may be rung in future years. I shall have the volume preserved in a dust-proof case in the ringing chamber.'

There will be many ringers who, whilst being thankful to the Provost for his good work in connection with the bells, will not see eye to eye with him with regard to the old peal boards. He must realise that the very limited number of people to whom the old boards were of interest are the ringers, who are the only people who use the ringing chamber.

One feels when ringing in a chamber with its walls covered by old peal boards that one is ringing against a background of history; history made by our predecessors in days when ringing knowledge was not what it is to-day.

The removal of the boards is to be deplored, but we get a few crumbs of comfort from the knowledge that the old records have been preserved in a book: a book, however which, no matter how beautifully it may be bound can never replace the old peal boards.—Yours truly,

The Loughborough Attempt

Dear Sir,—I hesitate to indulge in the washing of dirty linen in public, but I am so filled with righteous indignation at Mr. Clift's gallant but misguided attempt to excuse and condone the fiasco at Loughborough that I cannot refrain from one or two comments.

Excellence, as I would judge it, is a quality seldom experienced in ringing. If excellence is to be the standard, far less than one per cent. of the peals at present rung should be published. Certainly none of the ringing we heard at Loughborough was in that class. For one thing, there was a tendency for the treble to be rung just a shade slow at hand. For another, the first two courses were a trifle too slow (17 minutes a course) even for such a majestic peal of bells. But taking it all round, the ringing was good average stuff until the first trip of the attempt occurred. This trip could, and should, have been stopped at a missed dodge as it occurred at the easiest possible lead of the course (the third lead). Even so, the bells were right well within the lead, and with a proper effort at the back end to keep the beat going, an immediate recovery would have been possible.

Right or wrong, my opinion is that the conductor, having omitted to put the bells right himself, resented the fact that someone else did. It ought not to take 2½ hours to find out whether or not ringing is good enough for a peal, however excellent the bells, and in any case there are occasions when private feelings should be subordinated to the claims of common courtesy. As the popular song would have it, 'It ain't what you do, it's the way that you do it.'

In conclusion, may I say that I hope I shall have the pleasure of ringing a peal with Mr. Clift under more propitious circumstances at some future date. He can be assured that I, for one, having started for a peal, will make every effort to play my part in ringing it. This is the least that can be demanded of any ringer.

The opposing opinions having now been put in public, I trust the matter will be dropped and that an incident best forgotten will not be allowed to mar the pleasant memories and friendships of a very happy week-end.—Yours faithfully,
