CHRISTMAS QUIZ

THIS week we publish the solution of the Christmas Quiz, and there is no lack of evidence that the introduction of this feature and the Crossword created widespread interest. Not all of our readers enjoyed this innovation. Writes one whose opinions we respect: 'Please do not waste precious space on puzzles, quizzes and general frivolity. They may be suitable for less dignified journals, but a serious technical paper like ours may surely be spared. There may be some small demand for these things, but I think in this case "The Ringing World" can do some good educative work by forming taste and raising standards.'

On the other hand, the competitors have included leading personalities in the Exercise, men who give leadership. One, in offering his congratulations and thanks to 'Kewsett' for the interest and entertainment provided, adds that both have given rise to considerable discussion in his district. From one of our humbler ringers comes the following comment at the end of his paper, in which he returned seven out of ten correct replies: 'Not yet being (after years and years of hunting) off the treble to Grandsire, I can hardly hope that the foregoing will show anything more than a dismal ignorance of the art of ringing. I should, however, like to thank "Kewsett" for his very entertaining posers, which have given me much enjoyment during Christmas. And may it not be long before he's at it again.'

One other comment from an old friend of 'The Ringing World': 'Please give us some more; they can be very educational in the ringing field. . . . The quiz gave us quite a lot to chat about. One ringer, in fact, said to me on Christmas Eve, "If you can tell me the Welsh Cathedral with the detached campanile, I'll swop that answer for any other one in the quiz. I've spent hours scanning the Encyclopædia Britannica, and know it isn't Llandaff, Bangor, etc., but can't find out which it is!"' The Editor was impressed by the number of young competitors. Answers in some cases went to several pages and diagrams were introduced in regard to the peal at Westminster Abbey to show the axis of rotation and the axis of symmetry! The response has led us to conclude that it was a stimulating experiment that justified the space occupied, and the mathematically inclined among our readers are more numerous than we imagined.

BELFRY GOSSIP

December was a very successful month for the Southwell Guild in the matter of augmentations. They were Radcliff-on-Trent, 6 to 8, on Dec. 3rd; Warsop, 4 to 6, on Dec. 13th; and Rampton, 4 to 6, on Dec. 21st.

Mr. Sam Doplege, now in his 60th year, has scored his first peal at Taxal, Cheshire, where he learnt to ring over 40 years ago.

Chester Diocesan Guild have something to talk about with their first peal of Cambridge Surprise Maximus for the Guild. Nine of the participants have rung the extent of Cambridge from Minor to Maximus, and Mr. John Worth has called peals in the method accordingly. All are resident members.

In honour of the 65th birthday of Mr. Harry Brooks, a peal of Bob Royal was rung at Isleworth, in which eight of the company were members of the local band. Mr. Brooks has a 42 years' membership at this tower, and his daughter, Mrs. Kathleen Parr, rang the treble.

Chilvers Coton Sunday service ringers have now mastered Grandsire Caters with the first peal on the bells since the dedication of the trebles last May. Eight of company rang their first of Grandsire Caters.

A similar performance is recorded from Wisbech by the Sunday service band. With this peal Mr. F. Wigmore registered his 100th peal.

Warsop's Bells

DEDICATION OF A NEW SIX.

Saturday, December 13th, 1947, was undoubtedly a red-letter day for many of the parishioners of SS. Peter and Paul's, Warsop, if the number of non-ringers at the dedication service was any criterion, for the church was packed to capacity before service time.

The old four were of mixed origin, the dates being 1615, 1737, 1747 and 1812. Three of these were recast by Taylor in 1913, and now the addition of two tenors by the same firm has put Warsop in possession of a first-class six with a tenor 14½ cwt. in F.

The fifth was the result of a bequest by the late Mr. F. Rolling, a one time sexton of Warsop, and the tenor was subscribed for by the parishioners as a war memorial to the fallen of the parish.

The dedication was performed by the Bishop of Southwell, who, although not actually a ringer, is greatly interested in ringing, and loses no opportunity in his position as Guild president to stress the importance of concerted assistance to outlying towers.

A few rounds were rung after the prayers under the tower, and at the conclusion of the service a well-struck 720 of Kent Treble Bob by H. Kent 1, F. Flint 2, S. Slaney 3, C. Wright 4, T. Groombridge, jun. 5, and H. T. Rooke (conductor) 6, concluded the first part of the proceedings. Ringers of 1, 3 and 4 were from Bol-sover, 5 from Nottingham, 2 and 6 of the local company.

Tea in the Parish Hall was the next item where some 60 parishioners and church workers were joined by the Bishop and about 40 ringers, with Mr. Paul Taylor representing the founders.

The Rector (the Rev. R. G. Cornwell) in a short speech mentioned the pride of Warsop people in their new bells and congratulated the founders on their product. Mr.

Paul Taylor replied.—It was pleasing to note that the Rev. P. H. F. Sturdy, one of the curates, and Churchwarden Mr. F. Blackburn were among those who stood in for rounds during the evening.

On the following evening, December 14th, for evening service, a 720 Bob Minor was rung by five of the local band and a visitor, the first 720 by three of the band. OBITUARY

MR. FRANK LAWTON.

The death of Mr. Frank Lawton in hospital after a few weeks' illness is a grievous loss to the ringers of Moorside Church, Oldham. He was 64 and had been a ringer at Moorside for about 45 years.

Mr. Lawton had rung about 100 peals, one being the record for the bells of 10,000 odd Kent Treble Bob Major. He was the only ringer at Moorside who had his name on peal tablets for Plain Bob, Grandsire, Kent and Stedman, rung between 1905-1939.

Full of enthusiasm, he started to learn Double Norwich with the rest of the band about two years ago, and later Cambridge. Mr. Lawton was a perfect ringer and striker and gave that steady influence to the band. He was always present and punctual and attended the services he rang for, both morning and night. Up to his death he was a sidesman and also the Sunday School superintendent for many years. From this source he was instrumental in building the present band.

The funeral service was on December 29th close to the church and bells he loved. Four of his fellow-ringers acted as pall bearers, and as the cortege approached the muffled bells were rung full pull and stand. A course of Grandsire Triples was rung over the open grave: I. Kay 1-2, H. Barlow 3-4, V. Sykes 5-6, F. Dunkerley 7-8. Immediately after the funeral a fully muffled peal of Double Norwich was accomplished in three hours. I.K.
