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'SYMBOLS'

'SENTINELS of England' might well describe the church towers and steeples at our great ports. They are indeed a visible sign of man's aspiration after God and many a traveller has rejoiced to hear the bells telling the simple message in that unmistakable English fashion associated with change ringing. Of these great churches of our docks an honoured position was held by St. Mary's, Southampton. Its destruction during an air raid in November, 1940, was a calamity; it was left a ruin amid surrounding desolation.

This tower was one of many great losses to the country and also to the Exercise. Ringers throughout the country held St. Mary's in warm affection not on account of antiquity, as the original ring of eight cast by J. Taylor and Co. was only dedicated in 1914, just before the outbreak of the first world war, the tenor being 22 cwt. 1 qr. 7 lbs. in E flat. In 1934 two trebles were added, and the privilege of ringing a peal at St. Mary's was, in those days, highly treasured.

These bells have been restored and rededicated for the use of the church. The weight of the tenor is now 21½ cwt. in E flat, and the ringers present at the ceremony testified to the fine tone of the ring. The louvres have been bricked up nearly to the top, and this has made a marked difference to the volume of sound within the precincts of the tower. The ringing chamber has also been improved by an additional floor between bells and ringers. Of interest to ringers is the fact that the first step in the rebuilding of this church was the restoration of the bells. They are thus able to give 'a stirring symbol of recovery begun,' to use the words of the Bishop of Winchester read at the service.

In the big rebuilding programme before both the Church and the State, the same vision as Southampton has displayed is needed. The placing of bells in the honoured position of 'symbols of recovery' ought well be followed in other centres where circumstances permit. But there must be men and women to sound the symbols. While St. Mary's, Southampton, bells have been silent for eight years, the art has been kept alive at St. Michael's, where keen and progressive ringers have regularly assembled. London, with its big programme ahead, needs its St. Michaels. There is much spade work needed in the Metropolis in the training of bands. The harvest indeed is great but . . .

DEDICATION OF BELLS IN RUINED CHURCH.

I witnessed from the belfry window the dedication ceremony of the first ring of bells in this country to be restored after being brought down by enemy action. It was the first stage in the restoration of the burnt out Church of St. Mary, Southampton, when the ten bells, recast by John Taylor and Co., were dedicated by the Assistant Bishop of Winchester, the Right Rev. Bishop Lang, in the presence of Bishop Lovatt, who was Rector when the original ring was installed in 1914.

The service was preceded by a procession of clergy, choir, ringers and other church workers, headed by the children from the Sunday Schools, marching from the deanery to the church. Then there was the moving sight of the crowds filling to capacity the great ruined church, and in the chancel the robed clergy and mixed choirs, the Southampton Police Band, the Bishop standing in front of the damaged stone altar, the crowds outside the church, exceeding the number inside, listening to the service through loud speakers.

After the hymn, 'O God, our help in ages past,' the Rector, Canon Spencer Leeson, read a message from the Bishop of the Diocese, Dr. Mervyn Haigh, who, after regretting his absence through duties in connection with the Lambeth Conference, congratulated all concerned on the completion of the first stage in the restoration. He wrote, 'The sound of St. Mary's bells will indeed be a stirring symbol of recovery begun and will seem like a herald of yet fuller recovery to be.'

'Many dangers still menace us. But the sound of St. Mary's bells ringing over the old town will assuredly quicken pulses and strengthen the resolve of the men and women of Southampton. If the bells draw more of us to lift up our hearts in thanksgiving and prayer to God and to join in public worship, then, come what may, we shall be given more of that faith which triumphs over difficulty and makes the worst things material for the shaping of the best.'

Bishop Lang, in his address, said it was a memorable occasion for all of them, and an occasion of thanksgiving throughout the diocese. For the first time in eight years the bells were to ring out across the town and over Southampton Water. The bells would sound out a message of hope and love, and they would all feel the strengthening of their spirits.

After the closing hymn, 'Praise, my soul, the King of Heaven,' the Bishop dedicated the bells and pronounced the Blessing. And then, what has been described as 'a tremendous climax to a memorable service,' the eight years' silence was broken by the ringing of rounds by the local band, 'echoing through the hushed ruins and crashing away into the sunshine over Southampton.' And what a thrill to see those hundreds of faces all upturned towards the belfry.

The Rector told the company of 80 ringers and friends at tea, when he thanked the local captain, Mr. J. W. Faithfull, for his untiring efforts, 'It is a great day.' Only those who have known of the eagerness that has been generated and the obstacles surmounted before the completion of the work can fully realise the significance of those remarks, 'It is a great day.'

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

SUPERLATIVE DETHRONED

Dear Sir,—Before rushing into print with deftestable puns and elephantine facetiae, which certainly are no compliment to the intelligence of your readers, your correspondents should have read the article they set out to answer. I am not in search for any alternative to Superlative; on the contrary, I pointed out the impossibility of even considering an alternative name for the method.

Moreover, I am by no means the first to comment on its dethronement. There was a remark to that effect by the late J. A. Trollope in your columns about the end of 1939 which passed unnoticed by the champions of the method, and I have heard a number of ringers in the very first flight deprecate what is virtually a seven-pull dodge occurring four times in every course. I remember well, in the first peal I ever rang in the method, being disconcerted by another defect—the incongruous combinations of bells in the long dodges—particularly 4-5, which to my ear is a highly unmelodious association, and it is an unavoidable one. Even in the plain course the incomparable 6-4 music of the second lead is at once followed by 6-7's—another unfortunate dodging combination, and in the third lead the 6-7's are linked to 5-7's as well.

The peal analysis says much more than any individual ringer can about the relegation of superlative. Not alone were there more than twice as many peals of Cambridge as Superlative rung in 1946—the method only barely maintained second place among Major Surprises, and it looks as if in the 1947 analysis Yorkshire will be promoted at the expense of the former queen.

Superlative is deservedly a favourite method among ringers, and one that we all enjoy ringing, but it acquired its reputation—it is not too much to say it was venerated—in days when there were only Cambridge and London to compare it with. The advent of many more competitors has ousted it from the commanding position it once held, and, however we may deplore that fact, it is indisputable.—Yours faithfully,

THE CORS OF ALDBOURNE

Dear Sir,—In reply to Mr. O. E. Hill regarding the above founders, I am unable to trace many bells during the period the Cors operated the Aldbourne foundry (1696-1713). The 2nd at Bromham, Wilts, was cast by William and Robert Cor in 1706, and the treble at Rowde in the same county is also by these joint founders in the same year. At Barton Stacey, Hants, there remain four bells out of an old ring of five all dated 1725, which came from these little known founders. Regarding hand-bells the position is different, for these pass into various hands without any records being taken.

HAMPSHIRE RECORDS

Dear Sir,—With reference to a correspondent's query re Cor, of Aldbourne, this founder is known in this area and four of his bells can be found at Barton Stacey, Hants, in 2, 4, 5 and 6, which bear the inscriptions as follows:—

2. Cor of Aldbourne, 1725.
3. N. C. Wingworth gave five guineas. Cor of Aldbourne, 1725.
5. Martin Wright, Esquire, gave ten guineas. Cor of Aldbourne, 1725.
6. Nicholas Elliott and John Edwards, C.W.O. Cor, 1725.

The earliest known bell in Hampshire from this foundry is dated 1693. Cor was apparently succeeded by R. Wells, also of Aldbourne, whose bells are dated around 1800. Hungerford, Berks (3-8) has six by this founder dated 1816.

A still earlier founder whose bells appear in Hampshire and is apparently unknown leaves only his initials, 'R.B.' The 4th at Bishopstoke, dated 1589, and the 4th at Bosham, Sussex, dated 1572, are examples of his craft. Can we have some light on him, please? Another early founder is also found at Hursley, Hants, 6 and 7, dated 1616, bearing initials only 'I.W.', and again at Owslebury, Hants, 5th, 1622, and 6th, 1619, again identity hidden behind initials.

A NEW SURREY SIX

A new ring of six (tenor 10 cwt. 3 qr. 5 lb. in A flat) was dedicated at Send on June 16th by Bishop C. H. Golding-Bird. The three original bells (two Richard Phelps 1711 and the tenor Thomas Mears 1803) were recast and three more added, giving total weight of 39 cwt. 12 lb. They have been rehung with new fittings and framework by Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, Ltd., and a chiming apparatus added. The total cost of the scheme was £1,050. The bells are a thankoffering for victory and to the memory of those who died in the wars of 1914-1918 and 1939-1945. The second bell is inscribed 'In memory of F/O Robert Philip Dixon, R.A.F., killed whilst flying near Silloth, Cumberland, 13th Nov., 1943.'

The opening touch on the bells was rung by C. E. Smith, A. E. Harman, A. C. Hazelden, G. L. Grover, W. Loader and A. Walker. Ringers from a wide radius attended the service and favourably commented on the bells. Mr. B. Newton represented the foundry.

Outings

NORWICH DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION'S TOUR.

The next tower was Cardington, with a fine eight, tenor 21 cwt., also a memorial vividly recalling the R101 disaster of October 5th, 1930, when 49 lost their lives. With the bells ringing, the organ playing and a girl rubbing a fine brass in the chancel, one felt the church was being well used.

At St. Albans some rang Grandsire Caters at St. Peter's and others attended a beautifully sung Evensong at the Cathedral. After a good tea at the Waterend Barn Restaurant came a long climb to the ringing chamber at the Cathedral. This might be described in Frank Smythe's mountaineering language thus: 'First we negotiated a high and gradually narrowing chimney, then after a disappointing traverse to a dead end, we discovered another traverse higher up. After a fairly easy run along a narrow ledge, a considerably narrower chimney eventually brought us to a short ledge where lay Camp Five, our objective.' Beams in the ringing chamber added to the fun of picking out the ropes.

Later there was ringing at Hatfield (fine 10, tenor 23½ cwt.) and All Saints', Hertford (an- other good 10, tenor 26 cwt.) and Bengoe (8, tenor 7½ cwt.). We arrived home at 2 a.m. tired, but extremely grateful to Nolan Golden, our organiser, and to the various kind friends en route. A.G.G.T.

A pleasant supper party at Shere capped the day, and reluctantly the party turned homewards, but not before the organiser, Miss E. Lonnen, was thanked for arranging such an enjoyable outing.

Surprise Handbook

No advanced or progressive ringer can afford to be without '370 Surprise Major Methods,' collected by Andrew J. Corrigan. Nothing like it has been previously published and it is a model of compactness and careful planning.

Some 240 of the names of methods in the Table of Surprise Major Methods are those in the collection prepared in 1935 for the Methods Committee of the Central Council by the late Mr. J. A. Trollope and Mr. E. C. S. Turner.

Interest in this work has been very wide, and Mr. Corrigan acknowledges contributions to the present series from Messrs. E. A. Barnett, H. G. Cashmore, Nolan Golden, F. C. W. Knight, Ernest Morris, A. J. Pitman, G. E. Plater, E. W. Tipler, W. W. Wolstencroft and G. F. Woodhouse.

The problem of alternative names had to be faced and a decision made. The lead given in the book in regard to nomenclature could with advantage be adopted. Mr. Corrigan has used the second name of each pair as his choice in his table: Albion—Acton; Bellthorpe—Thorpe; Burton—Brighton; Horsham—Ealing; Emerald—Double Dublin; Ewell—Shoreham; Gloucestershire—New Gloucester; Leek—Adelaide; Lune—Bolton; Marden—Boston; Moorside—Essex; Norbury—Sandringham; Ruby—Radnor; Stoke Poges—Clevedon; Victoria—Southall; Wicken—Huntingdon.

NORTHAMPTONSHIRE BELLS

With reference to the letter from Mr. P. Amos in the last issue of 'The Ringing World,' and in fairness to the late Rev. E. S. Powell's 'Inventory of Bells for the Diocese of Peterborough,' the following facts should be given:—

There were then 372 rings of bells in the two counties of Northampton and Rutland, and a circular asking for particulars was sent to each of the incumbents concerned. Approximately half the forms were returned filled in (accurately or otherwise), and for the remaining half Mr. Powell was dependent on branch secretaries involved and on personal investigation. Failing all these Mr. Powell referred for the information to North's 'Church Bells of Northampton and Rutland.'

An enormous amount of patience, time and trouble went into the production of this pamphlet, and it is safe to say that where the Rev. Powell made investigations personally they were always most carefully and accurately recorded.

The Editor does not propose to enter into any further correspondence on this question of the weights of bells in the Diocese of Peterborough. The Rev. Powell's contributions to the advancement of the art of ringing earned for him the respect and affection of a wide circle of friends, and only those associated with publications know of the innumerable difficulties connected with inventories of this description.

BRAMPTON VISITED.

Brampton, one of the isolated towers of the Cumberland and North Westmorland Association, entertained recently ringers from Shotley Bridge and district, members of the Western Branch of the Newcastle and Durham Association. The occasion was noteworthy in that it was the first effort of Brampton ringers to entertain outside towers and also the first extended ring on the bells (6) since they were hung in the late 1800's. Contact with the outside world being established, we hope soon to report a visit to Shotley Bridge. The Rev. G. W. Chetwynd was responsible for the invitation.

ST. MARGARET'S, IPSWICH.

A party of 37 on June 5th, ringing at Great Waltham, Felstead, Dunmow (musical quality of bells beyond praise and also a good lunch), Hatfield Broad Oak, Harlow Common (also tea), Harlow St. Mary the Virgin and Wriffle. All agreed that the outing had been outstanding in the history of St. Margaret's excursions.

RECORD LENGTH OF STEDMAN CATERS

On April 22nd, 1922, a record length of Stedman Caters was rung at Appleton, for the Oxford Diocesan Guild and the Ancient Society of College Youths, conducted by Mr. H. Langdon. The composition was published in 'The Ringing World,' May 5th, page 281, but unfortunately an error was made in printing. The figures as published at this date were also repeated in Morris' 'History and Art of Change Ringing.'

In the interests of accuracy the peal is now republished with the error rectified. All those in possession of the figures as published are asked to amend the error, which occurred in the turning course (2), a bob at 5 being omitted.
