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A DEDICATED SPORT

FROM time to time editors receive anonymous letters without a clue as to the identity of the writer. No editor summarily throws such a missive into the waste paper basket. At times these letters contain information or comment of more than passing interest, but the general rule for the conduct of all newspapers is that the name and address of the sender must be sent to the editor, though not necessarily for publication. Recently we had a controversial letter from an anonymous writer which, because of its interest, we would have considered for publication; we made an appeal in the following issue for the sender to forward his name, but although many weeks have elapsed there has been no response to our request.

The theme of the letter was one that has been frequently ventilated in our columns—the relationship of peal ringing to the vocation of a bellringer as a servant of the Church. The writer stated that he became a ringer under the impression that the purpose of bellringing was to summon people to worship or to celebrate some event in connection with the Church; and that the bells being the property of the Church, the ringing of them should be confined to these occasions, together with such practice as might be necessary to attain proficiency in this direction.

The writer goes on to say: 'It comes as rather a shock, therefore, on turning the pages of "The Ringing World" to find details of large numbers of peals which are apparently rung for neither of these reasons, or worse still, for no reason at all. Even more disconcerting are the many peals bearing such footnotes as "A's 100th peal," or "The first peal in the method on the bells," giving the impression, rightly or wrongly, that these peals were rung solely for the purpose of enabling "A" to ring his 100th peal, or whatever the reason might be.'

No peal ringer is going to be so pharisaical as to suggest that his ringing is exclusively in the interest of the Church

and is solely dedicated to that purpose. The blunt fact is that we ring bells because we love ringing. The art of change-ringing developed as a secular sport, and the sporting side of ringing with the pleasure of individual attainment in peals and the variety of methods rung as well as in good striking is as real today as in the early days of ringing for wagers and prize money. Peals are almost exclusively rung for the pleasure provided for the individual, although happily on many occasions there is a secondary reason, and in the public or Church's eyes a justifiable purpose for the ringing of the bells.

The art of change-ringing must have a standard of proficiency, and the peal or quarter peal has by custom been the recognised medium. The constitution of a true peal in performance and composition is a matter of no little concern to the Central Council of Church Bellringers. All peals are recorded in our columns and tabulated by a special committee. There are theorists—composers who expend their skill in creating on paper a true peal and in splicing various methods into a peal. They set a challenge to the skilled ringer that requires mental concentration of a high order. Spliced ringing is not service ringing; there are not half-a-dozen towers in the country that have an 8-bell Spliced Surprise Sunday service company. But it is all part of the evolutionary process that has gone steadily on since the days of Fabian Stedman.

Fortunately the art of change-ringing has a second side; it is probably the only known sport that is dedicated to the service of the Church. Almost without exception the great men of the Exercise are Sunday service ringers, taking their place with the rank and file, and ringing with them one of the four standard methods. 'We were made to honour the Lord' runs the title of an ode to the bells of a Suffolk village. And in humbleness of heart as we ring on Sundays as part of our act of worship, let us be conscious of the fact that the practical experience gained and enjoyed in advancing 'the sport' of the Exercise is dedicated like all true vocations. Yes, we, like bells, are 'made to honour the Lord.'

A member of the recent peal band, Mr. A. Mitchell, recalls the joyous occasion when the new ring was first rung out by ringers from other towers in the city.

Eric Critchley, of Doncaster, has now called this composition from all the eight positions. He believes this to be unique.

To the memory of the late Mr. Harry Morgan, a hymn board has been given by his widow to Bilston Parish Church.

Mr. J. H. Musson, of Silk Willoughby, has 'circled' his own tower to peals of Surprise Minor.

The peal rung at North Stoneham on November 30th was a non-Association peal and not for the Winchester and Portsmouth Diocesan Guild, as published.

For the first peal on Theberton bells, Mr. Alan R. Bridges invited five members of the Leiston company to stand in. It was at this tower he learned to ring, ten years ago.

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'WE WERE MADE TO HONOUR THE LORD'

Story of Theberton Bells

Saturday, December 14th, was a memorable day for the village of Theberton, Suffolk. There have been bells at Theberton from the days of the Reformation. According to the late Dr. Raven there was one dated 1553, another of 1594, which bore the arms of France and England, the Royal initials E.R. and the inscription 'nos sumus instructi ad laudem Domini.' The others were two of 1614 and one of 1663 by John Darbie.

The earliest bell had disappeared when, in 1875, Messrs. Mears and Stainbank recast the four bells into a ring of five with a tenor of 7 cwt. in A. These bells, alas, were rehung by a local blacksmith, and as two of the bells hit each other in their revolution only chiming could be done. In 1943 the bells were regarded as unsafe and were taken down.

It was when Canon J. R. Chapman was rector that a bell restoration fund was started, and then, under the leadership of the present incumbent (the Rev. J. W. H. K. Greenway) the sum of £1,175 was collected as the result of a gift day.

The work of restoration has been carried out by Messrs. John Taylor and Co., and this included the retuning of the five bells and the provision of a new treble bell, the gift of a parishioner as a memorial to his wife. The inscription on the new bell reads: 'In memory of my wife, Alberta Louisa Wright, died 4th January, 1944.' The tenor now weighs 6 cwt. 2 qr. 6 lb. in the note of B. flat.

There was a large congregation present for the service of dedication performed by Canon J. R. Chapman, now Rector of Great and Little Wheltenham. During the singing of the hymn 'Angel Voices' Canon Chapman, preceded by Mr. A. Bridges (captain of the ringers), the churchwardens and clergy, processed to the tower, where the new bell was dedicated and the old bells rededicated. In handing the ropes to the Rector, the Canon repeated the dedication charge:—

'Receive these bells, which have now been solemnly set apart from profane and unhallowed uses, as a sacred trust committed unto thee, as the appointed minister of Christ in this church, and take care that they may be ever and only used in God's service and for His glory.'

As the procession returned to the east end, six members of the Suffolk Guild rang rounds: A. R. Bridges (Theberton) 1, A. S. Ling (Blaxhall) 2, L. G. Brett (Framsdén) 3, J. M. Bailey (Leiston) 4, C. W. Pipe (Grundisburgh) 5, J. W. Blythe (Halesworth) 6.

FIVE-YEAR PLAN

In his address, Canon Chapman described the service as being one of thanksgiving for the culmination of a five-year plan, when he became Rector, five years ago. Much had been done in rethatching the church, but the walls of the interior were in a deplorable condition, and there was much more to be accomplished. First the choir was re-formed and robed. Then the church was redecorated and the lovely pews removed from the Doughty Chapel to the chancel. Then a fund was started for heating the church and restoring the bells. Now they thanked God all these things had been completed. The purpose of the bells was a call to prayer, and he asked his congregation to resolve another five-year plan and, as they heard their music, to draw the younger generation to God's house and the consecration of their lives to His service. 'May the sound of the Theberton bells help all who hear them to dedicate their lives anew to God's service,' he said.

As the congregation left the church a touch of Cambridge Surprise Minor was rung.

A cordial welcome to the visitors was made at the tea by the Rector, and Mr. C. W. Pipe, in reply on behalf of the visitors, recalled that he was present only three and a half years ago at the dedication of Stoneham Aspal bells when the Rector was their present incumbent (the Rev. J. W. H. K. Greenway). He presented the Rector with a cheque for £5 5s. from the Suffolk Guild Restoration Fund.

Mr. A. R. Bridges has been training five boys and a girl at Leiston to ring Theberton bells. Assisting him have been Mr. J. Bailey and Mr. S. Bailey. During the last four years Mr. Bridges has raised £200 for the Bell Restoration Fund.

THE GLEANING BELL

Until about half way through the last century one interesting custom still held its own at Theberton — the gleaning bell, when the poor were allowed to glean after harvest. Parish bills show that from 1815 to 1849 a gleaning bell was paid every year.

The following lines are quoted from 'Suffolk Largess' (1865). The speech is fairly well rendered:—

(Morning)

Why! listen, yow be quiet, bo—the bell is tolling eight.

Why don't yow mind what you're about?
We're allers kind o' late!

Now, Mary, get that mawther dressed—oh dear! how slow you fare!

There come a lot o' gleaners now. Maw, don't stand gawkin' there!

• • • • •

(Evening)

Dear me! there goo the bell agin—'tis seven I declare.

And we don't fare to have got none—the gleaning now don't fare

To be worth nuthin'; but I think—as far can tell

We'll try a coomb somehow to scratch, if we be live and well!

YORKSHIRE ASSOCIATION

50th Anniversary of Queensbury Bells

December 14th, 1907, was a memorable day for the ringers of Holy Trinity, Queensbury, for on that day their newly rebuilt tower and augmented ring of eight bells were dedicated by the then Bishop of Ripon, Dr. Boyd-Carpenter. On this occasion a 'date touch' was rung by eight prominent members of the Western District, namely: J. Hardcastle, J. E. Jenkinson, J. Cotterell, J. S. Ambler, J. Barraclough, T. B. Kendall, G. B. Bollard and J. Broadley. On March 21st, 1908, these gentlemen rang the first peal on the bells—5,088 Kent Treble Bob Major, conducted by J. Cotterell.

It was, therefore, most fitting that the final meeting of the Western District in 1957 should be held at Queensbury on December 14th, even though, at the time this was suggested, no one was aware that the date coincided with the 50th anniversary of the dedication ceremony.

Ringling commenced at 2.30 p.m. and continued until 5 p.m., when tea was served in the Co-operative Assembly Rooms, followed by the business meeting in the schoolroom. Methods rung during the day ranged from Plain Bob and Grandsire to Spliced Surprise Major.

The vice-president, Mr. P. J. Johnson, presided at the business meeting, supported by the Vicar of Queensbury, the Rev. A. Ridings. A comprehensive vote of thanks to the Vicar, churchwardens, local company and other helpers was carried with applause.

The Vicar formally welcomed the visitors to Queensbury and expressed pleasure at seeing so many ringers present on this particular occasion. He praised the work done by ringers in summoning people to church, but stressed that this in itself was not enough—this act of worship must be completed by attending the service to which they had called others.

Following the business meeting, further ringling brought to a close a most successful meeting.

Eastern District

The winter meeting of the Eastern District, a combined one with the Beverley and Selby Societies, was held at Goole on December 21st and was attended by over 60 members and friends representing 21 towers.

The Vicar conducted a short service in church. An excellent tea was provided by Mrs. Taylor, who also made a Christmas cake, which was cut by Mrs. Pomsher, wife of the Vicar of Snaith. After tea Mr. L. M. Woodhead read a letter of congratulation and best wishes to those present and especially to those with over 50 years' membership of the Yorkshire Association, in answer to a letter sent on behalf of those veterans by Mrs. J. J. Taylor to Her Majesty, conveying loyal greetings and best wishes for Christmas.

The vice-president, Mr. A. C. Sellers, presided over the business meeting. Mr. James Thompson, of Patrington, and Mr. Ronald R. Worford, of Selby, were elected members. Bridlington was selected for the next meeting. The usual votes of thanks were passed. The business of the Beverley and Selby District Societies was then proceeded with. Mrs. Taylor was most heartily thanked for all she had done for the success of the meeting and the comfort of those present.

A social hour and a sumptuous tea followed the peal at Blankney, Lincs, on December 21st, in honour of the birthday of Mr. G. Leonard Thompson. The event, arranged by Mr. Thompson, came as a very pleasant surprise to the peal band.

SATURN TREBLE BOB DOUBLES

Dear Sir,—The combination of changes rung as Saturn Treble Bob Doubles does not constitute a method, since its plain course is not true to itself, there being repeats when the treble is in thirds.

It is obvious that any four-lead Treble Bob Doubles method on this treble plan must have a single change when the treble makes thirds. This would mean that a bell would have to lie still for three consecutive blows. This is, of course, permissible in the case of Doubles.

If, however, it is desired to have no more than two consecutive blows, then a three-lead slow course type of method is possible, there being two of these. I suggest that they be named Ockham and St. Mary's.—Yours sincerely,

More than 40 years ago I framed this hunting course and experimented with it for a long time in attempts to produce a six-score. In one of my scribbling books of that time I find it dated November, 1916, and a note beneath says: 'See note book.' The 'note book' is unfortunately lost, but I recollect that my experiments were inspired by Law James' Treble Bob Caters which, not long before, had set all the method experts chattering and had caused much controversy in the Exercise.

I can find no example of the use of this hunt in any of the old books. The nearest approach to it appears in a queer manuscript book of the last century called 'The Five- and Six-Bell Peals of Mr. Richard Valentine,' and in this book we find two six-scores of Doubles, one called 'Double Grandsire' and the other 'The Dream.' In each of these the treble describes a complicated path, as follows:—Four blows at lead, two in seconds, two in thirds, treble bob work behind, two in thirds, two in seconds, and so to the four blows at lead again. This produces a treble lead of 40 changes (as in Saturn), but most of the work of each 120 is highly unorthodox.

My own experiments, although extensive, were purely empiric, and were directed chiefly to attempts to secure the 60 in-course rows, with a view to doubling to 120 by the use of two singles. The idea of a 12-score does not seem to have occurred to me. I have often thought, however, that someone skilled in method construction might from this material make something worth while for Doubles ringers.

I wonder if Mr. Moreton or Mr. Leale would be good enough to let us know who arranged the Doubles, or from what source they came for this occasion, and also if any six-scores (as well as 12-scores) are available for use.—Yours sincerely,

COMPOSITIONS

Dear Sir,—Reading the correspondence appertaining to compositions brought back to my mind a remark by the late H. W. Wilde at the Central Council meeting held in Chelmsford in 1929, when reporting the finding of the Peal Collection Committee. He stated that he didn't know how many his colleagues had done, but he himself had gone through over 800 compositions of Major during that year. He added a rider, 'Good, bad and indifferent.'

This report gave me the impression that to try and find something original would be a waste of time. There is in the Central Council's library an unrivalled collection of peals of Treble Bob proved by the Rev. H. S. T. Richardson and typed by Mrs. G. W. Fletcher. It must be an almost impossible task to tabulate the whole of these, but the committee have done a grand job in selecting good ones and putting them in book form. Surely there are sufficient good compositions to supply the needs of all.

We keep getting withdrawals on account of falseness; there should be no need for this. Since the war I visited a certain district. A ringer approached me with a view to calling some of his Major compositions. He produced a pocket book: on every page was a new (?) composition. As he turned over the pages I noticed a date at the top of each page: they were produced (?) at the rate of one a day. It only needed a quick glance to see that heads had been cut off and put at the feet, and vice versa.

The development of splicing has certainly opened out a new channel. I like to see the footnote: 'C.C. Collection No. . . .'. It is to achieve such things that our Central Council has been built up.

CARTER'S ODD-BOB PEAL OF STEDMAN TRIPLES

Dear Sir,—Congratulations to Mr. Alan Ainsworth on calling Carter's Odd-Bob peal of Stedman Triples. He correctly assumes that there are two versions of this peal. The original composition was first rung on tower bells at Selly Oak on May 5th, 1902, and on handbells in Birmingham on August 20th, 1902, both conducted by William H. Barber. The figures of the peal were published in 'The Bell News' on October 18th, 1902. John Carter later revised the peal and the simplified version was published in 'Stedman' by Jasper Snowdon and the later edition by J. A. Trollope.

I gave Mr. R. G. Leale the figures of the original composition, which he subsequently called, and I shall be pleased to let Mr. Ainsworth have them also when I am in Newcastle early in the New Year. He will find the original composition more difficult but I wish him and his northern band every success in trying to emulate the achievements of his friend in the Home Counties.—Yours sincerely,
