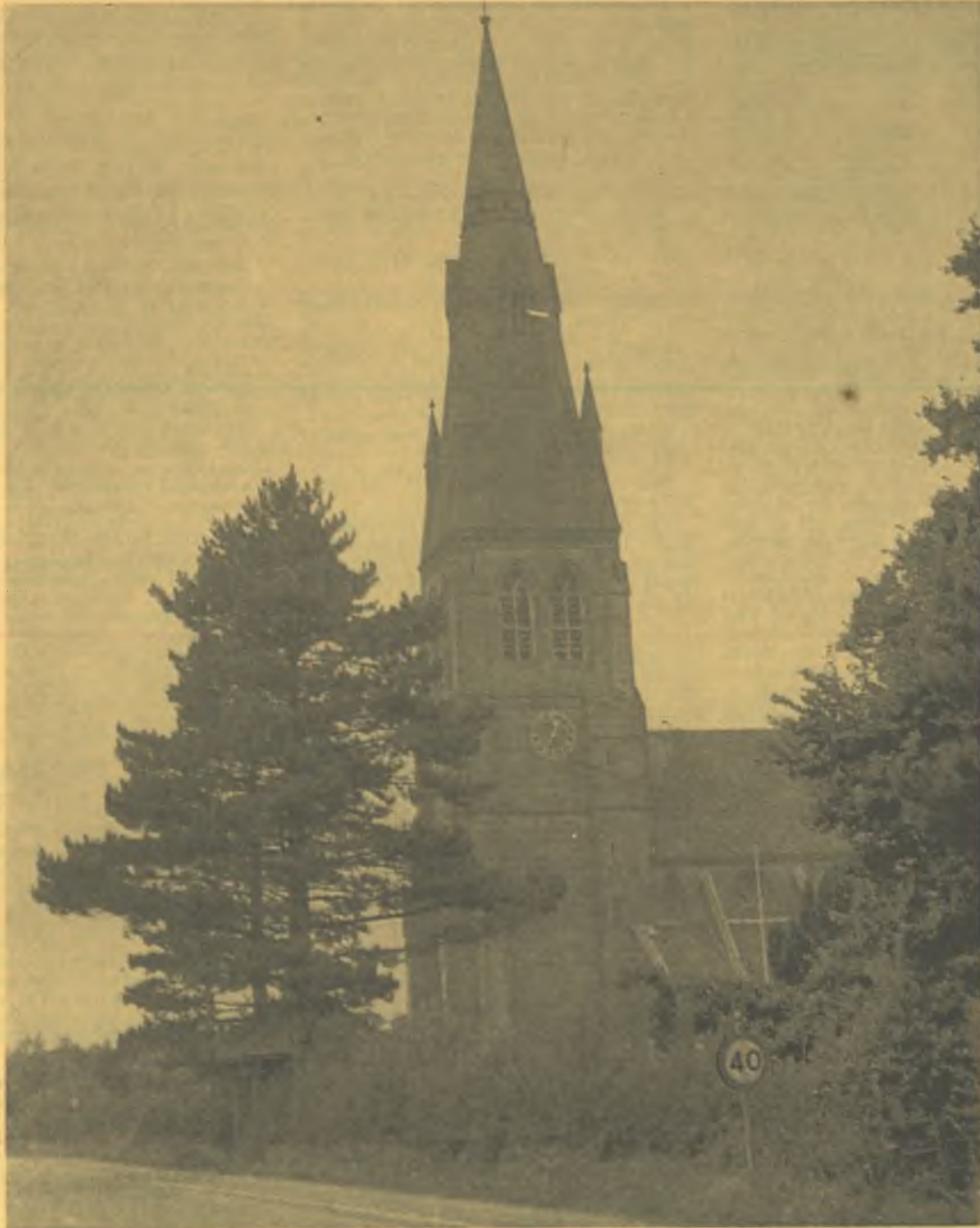

## SS. Philip and James, Hallow, Worcs.

THE Parish Church of Hallow, three miles from Worcester, celebrates its centenary in May, 1969. There were two earlier churches in the village. The first, a small building on the bank above the River Severn, was said by the Worcestershire historian Nash to contain Saxon work. It was demolished in 1830 and replaced by a building of plain and simple construction, until the present church was built on a new site in 1869.

In those early days Hallow was part of the parish of Grimley, but became a separate parish when the present church was a few years old. Later the village of Broadheath was separated from Hallow to form its own parish.

In 1552 the old church was said to have three bells, one being "a little sacrynge bell" and one "a little lych bell". In 1740 there were said to be five bells, but two of these had disappeared before 1814. The only survivor seems to be a bell which is now in Christ Church, Broadheath. This is a "Royal Head" bell with alternate heads of kings and queens between the words of the inscription, weighing 8½ cwt. The inscription reads: DUM SONAT HOC SIGNUM HOSTEM FUGAT ANNA MALIGNUM. (All the S's are reversed.) It is believed to have been cast in a foundry at Sidbury, Worcester, about 1420. It was still at Hallow in 1900 but was later removed to Broadheath.

The present church is built of a local sandstone and is a good example of Victorian Gothic, designed by Mr. W. Jeffrey Hopkins, a Worcester architect. The flying buttresses which support the roof are a notable feature of the design, but these proved so costly in construction that it was not possible to build the tower until 1879.

The church contains a canopied reredos of the Crucifixion, carved in alabaster and marble. This was given in 1872 by Earl Beauchamp, whose family then owned the adjoining Hallow Park. There are also memorials on the walls taken from the old church. The most interesting of these is one to Sir Charles Bell, who died in 1842 while on a visit to Hallow Park. He was an eminent surgeon, who treated the wounded after the Battle of Waterloo. He also made important discoveries in connection with the nervous system of the human body and gave his name to "Bell's nerve" and "Bell's palsy". He was one of the founders of the Medical School of the Middlesex Hospital.

The church was completed in 1900 by the addition of the spire, clock and bells. These were given by Mrs. Wheeley Lea in memory of her husband, Charles Wheeley Lea, who had been head of the firm of Lea and Perrins, makers of Worcestershire sauce.

The bells were cast by John Taylor and Co., of Loughborough, and were dedicated on April 14th, 1900. They are hung in a massive cast-iron H-frame and are a very sonorous ring when heard from outside the tower.

The inaugural peal, Grandsire Triples, was rung by the local band on February 1st, 1902, in 3 hours and 15 minutes. The total number of peals rung to date is 46.

The centenary celebrations will be centred mainly on the first four days of May, as May 1st is the patronal festival, the church being dedicated to St. Philip and St. James. May Day also sees annually the crowning of the May Queen on the Village Green and the traditional dancing round the maypole. It is hoped that the centenary peal will be rung on Saturday, May 3rd.

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## SALISBURY DIOCESAN GUILD

## Mr. E. E. Norris Resigns

With regret, members attending the quarterly meeting of the Devizes Branch at Melksham on April 12th heard from Mr. N. G. Knee that Mr. E. E. Norris had resigned his post as Branch Ringing Master owing to indisposition. Mr. Reginald Jones, of Longbridge Deverill, was elected by unanimous vote to fill the position for the remainder of the year. The chairman (Mr. C. F. Andrews) expressed the earnest hope that Mr. Norris might at some future time be able to resume his duties.

Mr. Weeks, of Devizes, called attention to the special service to be held at St. James', Southbroom, to commemorate the diamond jubilee of the addition of two trebles to that church. Attention was called to the Central Council's publication "A Tutor's Handbook," which would be of special use to tower captains.

A vote of thanks was passed to Canon W. A. M. Langdon for conducting the service, to Mrs. West, the organist, and the ladies responsible for the tea. Mr. W. C. West, Guild president, was responsible for local organisation.

## The Gloucester and Bristol A.G.M.

AFTER an interval of 14 years it was the turn this year for Tewkesbury to be the hosts for the Association annual meeting which was held on the Saturday after Easter. From ten in the morning very good use was made of the towers in the Branch, most of which were open again in the evening. A special draw was the new eight at Eckington, although outside our area. The donor of the new trebles, Ralph Perks, is chairman of the Tewkesbury Branch and readily got permission for their use on this occasion.

The meeting was held in the Abbey Mill, well known through "John Halifax, Gentleman", being the residence of Abel Fletcher. The attendance was up on previous years, 136 members being present with nine visitors from Newcastle-on-Tyne, Harrow, Sandbach, Kingston upon Thames, Wareham and Lyneham.

Apologies were presented on behalf of a number of members unable to attend after the chairman, Miss E. Mary Bliss, had opened proceedings with prayer and reference to those who had died during the past 12 months.

In his apology, Mr. F. J. Lewis, who has been a member for 73 years, expressed the hope that he would be able to welcome members to the next A.G.M. at Cirencester. There was little arising from the minutes of the previous meeting, it being stated that Mr. W. B. Kynaston had been co-opted on to the management committee on his retirement from the Central Council.

### SECRETARY'S MARATHON DRIVE

The printed reports were in the hands of many present, having come off the press at 2 o'clock on the Thursday, when the hon. secretary collected them from the printer in Bristol and on a marathon run of 226 miles delivered them to all 12 Branches by ten the same night. The Ringing Master (Mr. W. F. Scudamore) outlined some of the main points, and in the absence of the hon. treasurer the chairman dealt with the financial side of the report.

There has been some improvement in Sunday service ringing, which may be due to the ringing competition, and there have been restorations at Randwick, Winchcombe and Kemerton. For the future, Maisemore bells are about to be rehung after a silence of well over 30 years; the bells of St. Stephen's, Bristol City, are to be augmented and there is to be a new bell for Redcliffe. Wickwar and Coalpit Heath are possibilities for improvement in 1970. The Association dinner was a great success and another is to be held this year.

Perhaps some of the increase in attendance was due to an election for office of Ringing Master. Visitors B. J. Stone and R. G. W. Robertson acted as tellers and the result declared showed that W. F. Scudamore had been re-elected by a majority of 71 over his opponent, G. Land, who congratulated Mr. Scudamore on his victory. All the other officers were re-elected, there being no other nominees for any post.

Mr. P. M. J. Gray (Bristol City) outlined the work over many years given by Frederick W. Dixon, Hedley S. Gregory and Edwin J. Brown, and the meeting made them honorary life members.

With one exception, subscriptions are to remain the same, 5/- for those over 16, 2/6 for those under 16, but associates go up to 5/- in order to cover the cost of the report, this with effect from the end of the meeting. Parochial Church Councils can still affiliate for the sum of £1 1s., which is fixed for this year and next. There are now 136 P.C.C.s affiliated, which is a record number.

### BELL TOWERS IN NEW AREAS

A proposal from Swindon that diocesan authorities and architects should be asked to give consideration to the provision of bell towers for churches being built in newly-developed areas adjacent to existing towns, with particular reference to the proposed expansion of Swindon, was passed and an approach will be made to the parties concerned as soon as possible.

The Ringing Master outlined an award scheme which is designed to stop as much as possible of the drift away of young ringers by giving them something to work for. The Branches had been given full details of the proposed scheme and permission was sought to start with a pilot scheme in selected areas to get experience in how it would work out. This was given, there being eight who were not in favour. If the scheme works there are to be three stages with a certificate and possibly a badge for those who complete the course. There will also be provision for those who take up ringing at a more mature age.

Attention was drawn to the fact that it had been found that not only did insurance not cover the very young but that those over 70 were also excluded, and it was suggested that ringers should have a look at their policy to see just what was covered.

Special thanks were expressed to the secretary of the Tewkesbury Branch, Don Deakins, new to the job, who had made all the arrangements for the day in three days, the towers open, the room for the meeting, the tea and the service which followed. Tea was taken by those who had booked on another floor of the Abbey Mill, and the preacher at the Association service in the Abbey was the Rev. R. E. Hill, of Cirencester.

Many towers were open after the service, and it was found that the "go" of the six at Ashchurch had been greatly improved by J. Garle, who had forgone attending the meeting and had spent the afternoon working on the bells. A most pleasing feature of the day was the very large number of young members who participated, but one felt a wee bit sad at the number of those so familiar in the past who are no longer able to come to these meetings.

## NEW LOOK FOR WHITECHAPEL EXPO



A feature of the Lympne (Kent) festival of flowers and music, in aid of the bell restoration fund, was the Whitechapel Expo Belfry. Making its first public appearance of 1969, the demonstration tower was of slightly different form to that seen at the Sussex Expo, and there were some modifications to the fittings of the bells. A good crowd of ringers and spectators alike were there to see the bells in action, and the three trebles in particular soon sorted out the experienced from the novices, although the elders were not always the better in this respect!

The toll of broken stays remained indecently heavy—32 on the first day alone, and it was soon discovered that the lighter bells were most easily rung stayless. We reached our nadir with a touch of Triples with only one stay intact; nevertheless, it was surprising to see how quickly even the novices were at home on these light bells, and at least one well-known ringer was hard to pass comment that they handled rather better than those at another secular campanile.

Other items of the festival of interest to ringers were the demonstration of the original method of casting a bell (on the site of an actual bell casting pit, which had recently been unearthed after 400 years, and had been excavated for the occasion); an ingenious working model of a six-bell tower, complete with ringers manipulating the ropes; and the handbell ringing in the great hall of the beautiful and ancient castle.

The festival was well-organised, of interest to all, and blessed with fine weather, and the people of Lympne deserve the success they are hoping to achieve. N. J. D.

## POINTS FROM PEALS

**T**HIS article, which covers peals in the last six months of 1968, is later than usual. This is partly due to the number of peals which, apparently, were not sent in for publication straight away. May I make a plea, not only for the sake of my own records but also on behalf of the Peals Analysis Committee (of which I am a member), to all conductors to be more prompt in submitting their peals? Also, those who are concerned about space in "The Ringing World" will have noticed the waste of a small amount through the Editor having to insert "1968 Peals" and then "1969 Peals".

But now for the peals in the last half of last year. The 13th peal on Christmas Eve at Long Stratton having been accomplished in 1967, I expect there were no worries about the 14th on December 24th last. Anyway, it was duly accomplished to keep the sequence going. I thought at one time that the Loughborough Bell Foundry was going to beat its own record for the number of peals in one year, for there had been over 30 in the first six months of the year. However, it was not to be, and the final total was 51 for the year—none at all in December it would appear. Although my next remark really belongs to the next article, I have noted that there have been no less than 15 in the first two months of this year—a rate of 90 per annum—and that the 1,300 peal mark has been passed. So we may see their record yearly total beaten this year.

### FIRST IN THE TOWER

I confirm that the following towers have appeared for the first time in the peal columns: Crawley, North Lydbury, Shap, Angersleigh, Linkinhorne, Pawlett, Laneast, Lesnewth, Shinfield, Pagham, Wavendon, Much Cowarne, Winterbourne Whitchurch, St. Giles-in-the-Wood seems also to have had its first peal on the bells although this was not claimed. The peal at Grosmont was not only the first peal since rehangng but appears to have been the first peal in the tower as well.

It would seem that rather fewer towers than usual passed various landmarks. Thus Bridgend claimed, quite rightly, I think, that they had rung the 150th peal on August 23rd. The first peal was in 1898 and there had been 15 before the First World War. Between the wars peal were rung every year except in 1920. The most in any one year was 7 in 1931 and the total rung was 84 in the 20 years concerned. The first peal after the last war was the 100th on the bells, and so there have been 51 in the last 25 years or so—a rather smaller average per year. But peal ringing has been quite consistent all through this century at this average rate of 2 or 3 a year.

Two towers reached their centuries—Cadoxton (which was claimed) and All Saints', Leicester, which was not. In the case of the former, most of the peals have come since 1945 and there are now usually 7 or 8 a year there. The first peal was in 1914. The second was in 1921 and there were 13 in the 1920s. In the 1930s there was one more than that—14. Thus there have been 72 since 1945. All Saints', Leicester, had its first peal in 1920 and there had only been 5 before the last war. Of

course, it was a 6-bell tower then and remained so until 1952. But it was a very popular 6-bell tower after the war, for no less than 41 peals were rung from 1946 to the augmentation—a yearly average greater than since the trebles were added. The last 54 peals to complete the century have taken 16 years to ring.

Several towers passed the 50 mark. I confirm the claims of two of them to have done so, viz., Holme Pierrepoint and Petersfield. The others are Staines (St. Peter's), Southwell Cathedral, Bury St. Edmunds Cathedral, Chapel Allerton, Rayne, Salford, St. Patrick's Cathedral (Dublin), Wormingford, Blythburgh, Broughton-in-Furness, Hythe and Whitworth. Of these, Hythe has taken by far the longest time to reach this modest total—over 150 years in fact! I have recorded 22 peals before "The Bell News" commenced in 1881 and 28 since. The most peals I have in one year is 4 in 1845 (there were 3 last year). Obviously, there are long periods without a peal at all. At the other end of the scale are Holme Pierrepoint and Chapel Allerton. The former had its first peal in 1921, but all the remainder have been rung in the past ten years. The latter did not have its first peal until 1955. All Blythburgh's peals have also been rung since the last war.

### INFREQUENT VISITORS

We now come to infrequent visitors to the peal columns. I think there are rather fewer than usual of these also. Two towers were last seen there in 1927. They are Brinklow (which I confirm) and West Bickleigh. In both cases the 1927 peals were the only previous ones on the bells. This is not the case with the next tower, Rotherhithe, where I confirm that the last peal was 40 years ago in 1928. The Eastern Scholars rang the first peal there in 1749, and so it has a very long history even though it hasn't yet reached the 50 peal mark! The main period of activity seems to have been in the 1920s when 17 peals were rung. Next came the 1880s with 6 peals. Perhaps we are beginning another burst of peal ringing there. The peal at Winchcombe on October 2nd was thought to be the first on the bells. I fear it was not so, for I recorded one there in 1929—the only previous one. Also in that year was last saw mention of Bewdley, as claimed. But the claim for the first of Major does not appear to be correct. I have a peal of Bob Major there in 1782! The only other three peals there have been are Grandsire Triples in 1887 and Stedman Triples in 1894 and 1929. If Old Cleeve had claimed the first of Major on the bells it would have been correct. Only three peals had previously been rung on the eight—all Grandsire Triples in 1925, 1926 and 1930 (the last previous peal). However, there had been four on the six before augmentation—two in 1908 and two in 1910.

I confirm that both Darwen and Dalston had their last peals in 1933. In the former's case it was the only previous one. In the latter's there had also been peals in 1927, 1928 and 1931. I confirm Chalford's claim not to have had a peal since 1934. Before that year peals were rung in 1889, 1914, 1924 (3), 1925 and 1926. Rockland was also last heard in a peal that year. I have recorded peals here also in 1911 and 1912

(2). Both Orcop (only previous peal) and Epping Upland last had a peal in 1935. The latter had peals in 1920 (2), 1921, 1922 (2), 1932 and 1934 as well. I confirm Greinton's claim for the first peal since 1937. Another peal was rung here in 1905. Yateley also claimed correctly a silence of 30 years as far as peals were concerned. The most active period in this tower was in the 1890s when two peals were rung in each of the years 1892, 1893, 1894 and 1899. Only six peals were rung after that before the recent one—in 1907, 1909, 1913, 1930, 1932 and 1938. Finally amongst the infrequent visitors is Llanbedr where the only previous peal was in 1940.

### INCORRECT CLAIMS

Other items of interest which I noticed together with some footnotes which I feel I should correct are as follows: Houghton's claim for the first peal on the augmented bells was correct. There had only been one in the tower before—in 1953. I confirm that Branston had its first peal of Doubles on the bells (168 methods/variations, too!). What wasn't noted at the time was that there had been 71 peals of Minor before that. The claim at Litton for the first of Minor was not correct. The first peal on the bells in 1922 was Bob Minor. I confirm the claims of Consett and Newton-le-Willows to have had their first peals of Double Norwich Major—the first tower in a peal total of 23 and the latter 32. Drayton (Oxon) had only had one other peal this century until the recent one—in 1959. There were peals here in 1887 (2) and 1888. Worcester Cathedral had a peal of Yorkshire Maximus in 1962, so the recent one was not the first. At Halliwell I confirm that the recent peal was the first since 1948 and the first in any other method than Grandsire Triples (there had been nine such).

### BATH AND WELLS

#### STRIKING COMPETITION

The seventh annual striking competition was held at the recently-restored church by the River Chew at Publow. The nine teams rang the usual test piece of "120 changes of Doubles or Minor, with not more than 12 whole pulls of rounds before or after", and this was judged by Mr. Arthur Reed, of Taunton.

When all the teams had rung, those present adjourned to the Village Hall at Pensford (opened by none other than Mr. Acker Bilk, a local lad, in 1965), where Mr. and Mrs. Ken Cobb welcomed the party with an excellent tea.

The Vicar was able to join us after tea, when the judge gave his comments and announced the results. These were: 1st, Long Ashton, with 8 faults; 2nd, Backwell, 16; 3rd, Nailsea, 20; 4th, Portbury, 24; 5th, Winford, 24; 6th, Wrington, 26; 7th, Publow, 39; 8th, Yatton, 50; and 9th, Kingston Seymour, 68. Mr. Reed commented on the faults incurred due to not setting bells and said that he felt the ringing generally was good.

Thanks were expressed to the Vicar and all who had contributed to such a successful occasion, and general ringing was then enjoyed at Compton Dando. M. J. H.

## South Wales Proud of Sunday Ringing

Two important pointers to progress were contained in the annual report of the Llandaff and Monmouth Diocesan Association presented at the A.G.M. at Cardiff on April 12th—the highest number of peals ever rung in a year (86 against 77 previous highest in 1965), and “We can be justly proud of the efforts made in maintaining a good and regular standard of Sunday service ringing in our churches.” Aberdare and Llandaff Cathedral were congratulated on the number of quarters rung for Sunday service. Both these bands scored peals in their own towers.

Ringing took place during the afternoon at St. Mary's, Whitchurch, and at St. John's, Cardiff. The service was held in St. John's Church, conducted by the Vicar, Canon W. E. C. Thomas, who in his address spoke appreciatively of the work carried out by ringers throughout the two dioceses and reminded them of their duties as members of the Church.

An ample tea had been provided in the schoolroom above Wood Street Congregational Church by Mrs. Pryor and her band of willing helpers. Members who had earlier attended the Rugby International match with England joined in the tea, and the fact that Wales won assisted in making the ensuing meeting a very pleasant one.

The business meeting followed, under the able chairmanship of Canon Thomas. Members stood in silence as a tribute to the memory of Benjamin T. Davies, for 60 years an organist and ringer at Llangynwyd, and David L. Hughes, for over 40 years a ringer at Bridgend.

The hon. secretary, in his report, made the following comments: Membership consisted of 370 ringing members, one honorary member and five hon. life members. This showed a decrease of 23 during the year: the published list did not include any who were two years in arrears with their

subscriptions. A great improvement would result if tower secretaries would collect subscriptions.

The total assets had fallen by £9, but as they had contributed £50 to Grosmont for their restoration work it could justly be claimed that losses had been limited. The Universities Association sent a contribution of £9 to the Bell Restoration Fund at the conclusion of their tour. About 100 members were in arrears with their subscriptions and the Branch secretaries would welcome the assistance of each tower in keeping up to date in this matter.

During the year “Change Ringing”, by W. G. Wilson, had been purchased for the library and Mr. F. J. Hannington had made another gift to the library of an album containing prints of most of the towers in the Association's area.

The report also referred to the Bishop of Llandaff, a joint president, being elected Archbishop of Wales, the restoration of Grosmont bells and the 75th anniversary celebrations of the Association.

In the absence of the hon. treasurer, the hon. secretary presented the accounts, which were adopted.

### NEW MASTER

Mr. W. T. Petty, of Bridgend, was elected Master for the year and was invested

with his badge of office by the retiring Master, Mr. R. J. Stewart. He thanked Mr. Stewart for the able way that he had carried out his duties and particularly at the anniversary dinner in October. The remaining officers were re-elected as follows: Hon. secretary, M. J. Pryor; hon. treasurer, Rev. I. J. Richards; hon. auditors, Rev. R. C. Lucas and T. M. Roderick.

Three resolutions were placed before the meeting on the recommendation of the management committee, as under:—

(1) That the Rev. A. W. McAdam be elected to honorary life membership in appreciation of the work he so ably organised in the rehanging of the bells at his parish church of Grosmont.

(2) That Mr. D. J. Llewellyn be elected as peal recorder to the Association.

(3) That the subscription for ringing members be increased from 3/- to 5/- and from 1/6 to 2/6 for those under 18 or over 65 years old. The new rate to be effective from January 1st, 1970.

All three resolutions were carried unanimously.

Mr. L. Bainham proposed and Mr. R. J. Stewart seconded a motion thanking the secretary for his work in arranging the 75th anniversary dinner and requesting that it should be minuted. The members expressed their appreciation by passing the motion.

The Master proposed a vote of thanks to all who had assisted in arranging the meeting, and the ringers dispersed for further ringing at St. John's, Cardiff, and at Llandaff Cathedral. The ringing covered a very wide scope, including a touch of Spliced Surprise Major in seven methods by resident members.

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## Letters to the Editor

### A "RINGING WORLD" PEAL-SUPPLEMENT

Dear Sir,—My solution to the problem of finding space for the publication of peals is very simple. It also has the merit of solving the question of cost and of releasing the uninterested reader from the irksome chore of bypassing the pages of peals. It is this: that the peals be published as a supplement, weekly, fortnightly or monthly as proves convenient. "The Ringing World" could then be obtained with or without the supplement, so that those not interested in the peals may purchase a plain "Ringing World" at a price of, say, 9d. or 6d. or whatever it costs. The peal supplement is then printed in the old pre-1964 style, just as we peal ringers want it, and is charged at an economic price of, say, 9d. or 1/- if the extra packing work necessitates this. The peal ringers will then be absolved from the recurrent charge of being mean by comparison with the quarter peal ringers, the Gratefully Acknowledged column will become redundant and, if desired, slightly more space could be given to letters, articles and quarter peals.

I think it might be quite surprising how many copies of the supplement would be sold. Personally, I would be glad to pay an economic price for the supplement: 1/- or even 1/6 weekly. This is right and proper if that is the cost. What I would not gladly do is to pay a levy of 6d. a rope in order to get the peal published. This is not a question of personal cost, as a short calculation will show, but one of principle.

### Editor's Comment

The scheme submitted by Mr. Mayne of divorcing peals from "The Ringing World" is uneconomic. It would multiply office work, increase production charges and create problems with the newsagents.

A 16-page "Ringing World" would mean the surrender of the cover. The paper is printed in units of eight pages. It is impossible to produce a cover and 12 pages without a big increase in cost.

Since the beginning of the year more than five pages a week have been devoted to peals. Set in the old-fashioned style with all the trimmings, and allowing a page for compositions, there would be an 8-page supplement most weeks.

Three types of subscribers would have to be dealt with: "Ringing World" with supplement; peal supplement; "Ringing World" without peals.

Assistance would be required in editorial work, accountancy, postal subscribers and newsagents. The cost of the extra work would not be less than £500 a year.

An 8-page supplement would have to be entirely self-supporting and its selling price would be between 9d. and 1/- a week.

A 16-page "Ringing World" without cover and without "Gratefully Acknowledged" would not be less than 1/-. The two together could not be sold for less than 1/6 excluding postage.

Then the gain, no appeal for donations for peals or quarter peals. The other side—an unattractive "Ringing World" that will be a perpetual headache to produce and a constant economic uncertainty to the Committee. It is not a job the Editor could or would tackle.—T. W. W.

### THE EVOLUTION OF MINOR

Dear Sir,—Minor methods have evolved over the years to give the structurally satisfying collection given in the Central Council's book. All other methods were not quite up to standard.

Now, find methods having single changes (Cambridge Major has four places in a change, so why not in Minor?), 5-6 places without the treble (to guarantee 65s at back—musical, I suppose, to some ears), and you have Rosehill, Hanney and Radley, named in 1967.

Next, give the methods irregular lead-heads (do they matter, anyway?) and we have the three things called methods named (politely) for the first time in the peal at Longparish on March 1st, 1969.

The first method cannot be called Winchester Bob as that name is given to a much more worthwhile method in the Major stage. The double version, called "Portsmouth", is as near plain changes as is allowed under modern rules. I wonder whether "Winchester" or "Christchurch" are actually the reverse of already named irregular methods? If so, then these two unfortunate places need not be lumbered with the names.—Yours sincerely,

### UNIVERSAL COMPOSITIONS

Dear Sir,—Regarding recent correspondence on Mr. Humphrey's Universal Composition (appended below), I should like to make the following comments for the benefit of anyone seeking compositions for new methods with unusual false course heads. With the singles rung in 3-4 at the Home, the composition is true as stated, to the following groups of f.c.h.'s (after Baldwin): B.I.L.N.O.P.R.S. a, b, c, e.

In this form it is true to Yorkshire, Lincolnshire, Bristol and Rutland of the "standard eight" and has the 3rd in 3+ and 4-, or the 4th in 4+ and 3-, depending on whether the composition is rung forwards or backwards. By the simple expedient of ringing the singles in 5-6 at the Home, the composition becomes true to a slightly different set of f.c.h.'s. These are:—

B.G.H.I.L.M.O.R.S. b, c, d, f.

In this form it is true to Pudsey as well as Yorkshire and Bristol and has either the 5th in 5+ and 6- or the 6th in 6+ and 5- with the same proviso as above.

With regard to the length of this composition, I do not see that omitting a pair of adjacent singles (as suggested on page 242) will reduce it from 5,376 to 5,152. Firstly, a different part-end is produced, and secondly some course (either + or -) would contain calls at both Middle and Wrong, which I would have thought conflicted with the basic construction of this type of composition. Mr. Baldwin's variation, on the other hand, is reducible as the singles to be omitted are not separated by other calls. I assume Mr. Humphrey's other variations may be reduced as he suggests.

Other examples which may provide food for thought include the 5th in 5+ and 4- or the 6th in 6+ and 3- true to B.C.E.G.I.L.M.N.R.S, d (this includes Superlative), and the 4th in 4+ and 5- or the 3rd in 3+ and 6- true to B.C.D.I.L.N.P.R.S, d (includes London).—Yours faithfully,

## HILDA MASSEY'S PEAL WEEK

IT all began with a letter from David to Mum, telling her that a friend from Leicester would be on holiday in Somerset for a week during the Easter vacation. Could he stay with us, and could Mum please arrange a few peals? Despite the short notice—less than a month—Hilda set to work to provide a full ringing programme for the week. Ignoring those Jeremiahs who spoke of the impossibility of getting enough towers in Lent, and who pointed out that it would certainly be impossible to get enough ringers on working days, she wielded pen and telephone to such effect that there were soon 14 peals available for the week, two for each week-day and at least 19 ringers wishing to participate. It was surprising how many ringers were able and willing to take time off from work for the occasion, and Roy and Wally Rice decided to take the whole week.

Despite the cold weather, the week started well with a quick peal of Surprise Minor on the light, easy-going six at Butcombe, a tower chosen because Hilda had not rung there. In the afternoon Roy and Wally Rice were playing on their home ground at Banwell, with a peal of Gainsborough Surprise which produced a rash of footnotes recording 25th peals together, especially for Roy. We were sad because this was a memorial peal for the local stalwart, Jack Ellsbury, whose 90th birthday we had celebrated here only a few months ago.

After a quiet Sunday, our successful progress resumed on Monday with peals at the two neighbouring light eights of Drayton and Huish Episcopi. None of the band complained about Mr. Middleton's composition being used twice on the same day, and David was able to claim his first of Major as conductor as well as adding a "Q" to his Surprise Major alphabet. While these peals were in progress, Hilda was coping with a crisis. An unexpected service was to prevent the planned Tuesday morning peal at Melksham. The problem was solved when Mr. Durston, the kindly rector of Hemington, willingly offered his bells for their second peal within three days, and the Melksham attempt was postponed until the next Saturday.

### WARMINSTER CLAPPER BROKE

Tuesday continued cold, but Surprise Minor was rung at Hemington, and Eric at least was warm on the slow-turning tenor which needs more effort than one would expect. This church, dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary, was a most appropriate choice for a peal on Lady Day. The afternoon brought our first disappointment of the week when, after nearly an hour of Superlative, the seventh clapper at Warminster broke to end the proceedings. After a meal we were able to join in a practice at Evercreech, and enjoyed some very well struck Yorkshire Royal.

On Wednesday morning we were honoured to ring at Chilcompton, which has the leading Surprise Minor tower in the diocese, and succeeded in a peal in seven

Surprise Minor. Hilda met us after the peal with the afternoon's reinforcement, and we set off on the long trek to the extreme south of Somerset and the quiet village of Winsham. Here the eight bells, hung in 1894, are in a central tower and are rung from the chancel. Before ringing it is necessary to remove all the choir stalls (which are extremely heavy), a process which tends to discourage service ringing. A peal of Islay was scored on these difficult bells. Ronnie Beck was particularly pleased with a peal in this tower, his 125th in the county. Peals at Winsham are very rare, this being only the second to have been rung in the last half century. Such is the madness of ringers that, from the Dorset border, we rushed to the extreme north of the county to hear the end of a quarter peal at St. Michael's, Bath, and to enable our guest to grab the tower.

Thursday was planned as a "rest" day, with two light eights at East and West Coker to be pealed, but it proved much more of a rest day than we intended. The morning peal of Rutland came to grief after an hour or so, when George foolishly called a Middle that should not have been there. In the afternoon London was flowing nicely at West Coker when, after 40 minutes, the treble rope parted below the sally. Although the rope was repaired before we left, an early replacement was recommended. Once again Bath was the evening venue, this time the practice at St. Mary's, Bathwick.

### CHARLIE ANDREWS' 250TH

Friday saw a return to better luck with a peal of Yorkshire on the light eight at Christ Church, Bradford-on-Avon. There was a shortage of Salisbury Guild members in the band and, because we were uncertain about the local rules governing belfry elections, it was reluctantly decided that the peal would have to be credited to the Bath and Wells Association instead. The afternoon found us on the fine eight at Urchfont, near Devizes. Charlie Andrews was with us now to deal with new members, and a peal of Havant (that alphabet again) was recorded for the Salisbury Guild.

It was a pleasure to ring in Charlie's 250th peal. The magnetic attraction of Bath proved unfortunate this night, when Hilda's car was involved in a slight accident with another vehicle. Although the other driver was entirely in the wrong, he was probably unjustly accused of having imbibed too freely. At least Hilda, on two orange juices, was safe on this score, whatever the state of her passengers. Fortunately no serious damage was done, and the evening passed happily.

Saturday saw the postponed attempt at Melksham, and a good peal of Lincolnshire was rung on the very pleasant bells, despite the long draught and ever springy ropes. This was the last peal on Hilda's programme, as the afternoon attempt was a long-standing fixture at Wincanton arranged by David Orledge. Sad to say,

### ST. MARTIN'S GUILD

The quarterly meeting held at Tanworth-in-Arden on April 19th was very well attended by over 60 members and friends. The Master (Miss Muriel Reay), who took the chair at the meeting, proposed votes of thanks to the Vicar, to Mr. Jim Corbett and to the ladies who had prepared the tea.

Under "Matters arising from the minutes" the secretary (Mr. J. A. Ainsworth) said that had he been able to be at the annual meeting in January he thought it possible that he would not have allowed his name to be proposed for the office of secretary and treasurer in the particular circumstances. He said that he was a ringer because he wished to give a service to the Church and because he loved ringing, but that he was not willing to play "power politics". He had decided, therefore, to proffer his resignation. It was decided to hold an extraordinary general meeting at St. Martin's on May 20th at 7.30 p.m. to elect a temporary secretary and treasurer for the remainder of 1969.

The Ringing Master (Mr. Clifford Barron) deplored the fact that Mr. Ainsworth, who had done a tremendous amount of work for the Guild in the past nearly six years, had been driven into taking this decision.

Mr. and Mrs. P. Randall, Miss S. J. Titchener and Messrs. C. Bough and W. B. Ellender were all elected as resident members. Messrs. D. J. G. Bates, C. I. Rowson and P. G. Holden were elected as life members.

Discussion took place on whether college students resident in Birmingham for a short period each year should be elected as resident or life members. Some members voiced opposition to the previous custom that they should be elected as resident members and transferred to life membership or leaving the area.

It was decided to hold the next Henry Johnson dinner at the Civic Hall, Solihull, on March 7th, 1970, no member voting for the dinner to return to the city centre.

Derby Surprise Major crunched out after an hour, the only attempt of the week to suffer this fate. We returned home to swell the numbers at the Frome practice, followed by a post-mortem in the Three Swans.

The final peal score, therefore, ten out of 14, was very satisfactory, especially as two of the four losses were from causes beyond the ringers' control.

Sunday was a day of rest after a very exhausting but very enjoyable week, and also a day of farewells. It remains for us to thank all those who made the tour such a success, both incumbents and ringers. The major credit must, however, go to Hilda Massey, for without her organising ability the peal week could not have happened. In addition to all the planning, Hilda, as non-playing captain, maintained a strict discipline, ensured that we were always on time, and drove many miles ferrying ringers from tower to tower. She had little opportunity to ring with us, but managed to find the time to join us in the evenings. G. W. M.

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## OBITUARY

### MR. OLIVER E. G. BARNARD

Mr. Oliver E. G. Barnard, tower captain, Stowmarket, died on February 6th, very unexpectedly. Friends, some of whom I believe to be in Berkshire and the Melton Mowbray area, may still receive the news with surprise. It has taken some time to discover details of his ringing career.

A press cutting of 1929 mentions his longest touch to date of Grandsire Triples. That was soon followed by a quarter peal on the tenor of St. Margaret's, Ipswich, an early indication of his liking for the back-end when he was a fit man. He rang No. 10 to a peal of Little Bob Maximus at St. Mary-le-Tower, Ipswich, in 1946, in honour of the late King George VI's 51st birthday. He also spoke of a proud memory of ringing at St. Paul's. Mr. George W. Pipe gives information that he rang 30 peals for the Suffolk Guild; notable for him was the ringing of the tenor (32 cwt.) to Major and Maximus at St. Mary-le-Tower, Ipswich, the notorious 7th at Hadleigh and the tenor (37 cwt.) at St. Peter Mancroft, Norwich. Of his several peals at his beloved Stowmarket, the last was in July, 1958, prior to the restoration. He frequently conducted his peals.

During his last few years the richest colours of his personality showed up rather like the leaves in autumn. He lived to see the fruit of his labours in the restoration of Stowmarket bells, for which he had raised funds through jumble sales, waste paper collections and every other possible means. He trained enough ringers from scratch, once the bells were returned, and these now ring regularly for Sunday services. His patience as a teacher was outstanding and he loved to impart knowledge on every aspect of the art. He was a churchman and a Sunday service ringer first and foremost, and unfailingly started that duty with prayers.

Two days before his death he was in charge of the Tuesday practice night, and it was remarkable that members of the Guild executive committee came over, Rougham ringers were present giving their ready help and Buxhall ringers also came. Only two months previously there had been a similar large gathering of friends to present him with their gift on the occasion of his second marriage, and this touched him more than anything I can remember during the ten years that I knew him in the service of his church and as a fellow-ringer.

At the funeral service Mr. George W. Pipe, then Ringing Master, read the lesson and, with H. Lister, E. Cracknell and H. Mitson, rang handbells at the graveside, as is the Suffolk custom.

# Bellfounders' Gift Page to 'The Ringing World'

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## BELFRY GOSSIP

**DONATED BY  
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### CENTURY-OLD BELLS DISCOVERED IN LANCASHIRE

Six steel bells have been discovered at the Church of St. Peter, Belmont, Lancs, a tiny village about four miles from Bolton. The bells were bought by Mr. John Hick, of Bolton, from Naylor Vickers and Co., steel manufacturers in Sheffield, on November 22nd, 1860.

A recent survey by Roy Jolley and James E. Andrews proved the bells to be hung at an angle of 45 degrees to the vertical on a large oak beam, three bells being on either side. A rope is fastened to the clapper, which rests on the lower lip of the bell, and passes round pulleys on the wall and floor before descending into the ringing room. Thus when the rope is pulled down the clapper is lifted from the bell, and on releasing it the clapper falls back on to the bell and creates the note.

The bells, with their diameters and weights, are as follows:—

- Treble: 30 in., 462 lb.
- 2nd: 33 in., 526 lb.
- 3rd: 37 in., 772 lb.
- 4th: 38 in., 794 lb.
- 5th: 42 in., 1,033 lb.
- Tenor: 45 in., 1,165 lb.

The total cost of the bells and fittings was £205 5s. 6d.

Unfortunately the bells are subjected to mists and rains which sweep down from the surrounding moorlands. This has had the effect of corroding the bells, causing them to sound out of tune, but hymns are still rung on most Sundays by three parishioners. R.J.

### TWO CRACKED BELLS IN KENT

In 1959 Messrs. John Taylor and Co. completed the magnificent restoration of the six bells (tenor 15½ cwt.) at Chislet, Kent, one of the great occasions of the Canterbury District. Alas, for no apparent reason, the fourth, one of the original bells in the 1729 Samuell Knight ring, has become cracked and cannot be used. Funds are in hand to have this bell recast.

At the same time another bell by Samuell Knight, the fourth of the heavy and difficult five at Ivychurch, which was known to be cracked in the crown, has become worse and must become disused for safety's sake. There is no local interest in the bells in this, the greatest of Romney Marsh's churches, owing to a lack of ringers, occasioned by the appalling "go" of the bells—a vicious circle. However, the Rector is seeing that the four sound bells continue to ring occasionally.

### CAMBRIDGE UNIVERSITY GUILD

At the A.G.M. of the Cambridge University Guild in Clare the following officers were elected: Alan T. Winter (Christ's), Master; Dale Barton (Selwyn), secretary; J. Roderick Lebon (Selwyn), steeplekeeper; Graham Band (Emmanuel), librarian.

The president, Mr. W. Ridgeman (Queens'), took the opportunity of thanking the retiring officers for their efforts on behalf of the Guild.

### RHODESIAN MASTER MARRIED

On April 12th the Master of the Rhodesian Guild of Bell Ringers and tower captain of Salisbury Cathedral, Ken Cross, was married to Miss Molly Bassett at the Cathedral. Some good 10-bell ringing was achieved during an hour before the service. In addition to all the local ringers, Mrs. Val Grossmith, from Umvukwes, and Mr. and Mrs. Harry Earle, of Que Que, were present. Because of another wedding ringing was limited to a quarter of an hour after the service.

Ken Cross has been ringing at Salisbury Cathedral since the bells were hung in 1961 and is one of the three stalwarts of the original band. At the inception of the Guild he was elected secretary, a post he held until this year when he was elected Master. Ken took over the tower captaincy of Salisbury in 1966, and of those who rang at his wedding five had been trained by him.

### LAKENHEATH TOWER CAPTAIN RETIRES

The annual ringing for St. George's Day at St. Mary's Church, Lakenheath, Suffolk, was a special occasion as the tower captain, Gerald Miller, was retiring after 42 years and 60 years as a ringer.

During this time he has taught many ringers, and his patience and tolerance will be remembered for many years to come. The local team showed their appreciation by asking the Vicar (Canon W. A. C. Ullathorne) to present him with an engraved tankard. May his work be an example to those who carry on and may he continue to ring for many years yet. His successor is Mrs. E. M. Peachey.

### PEAL OF 16 "IN HAND"

A great achievement in handbell ringing is a peal of Kent Treble Bob Sixteen rung on April 25th at Watford, conducted by John R. Mayne. This is the first peal ever rung on 16 bells and was rung at the first attempt. The conductor informs us that the only practice was two leads of Kent and Oxford immediately beforehand to get the feel of the compass. The time taken was 3 hours and 56 minutes.

### CITY RING SCRAPPED

The ring of eight bells in the lantern tower of St. Dunstan-in-the-West, Fleet Street, which has not been rung almost within memory, has been taken from the tower and sold for scrap. A single bell of 10 cwt. will replace them. The bells were cast by Thomas Mears, of Whitechapel, in 1832 from metal of the bells in the previous church, with a tenor of 19 cwt. Several peals are recorded in the porch, together with details of the bells, and it is to be hoped that these records will remain in position. The famous clock jacks will continue to amuse passers-by.

### REVIEW

#### "Death of a Dissenter", by Lynton Lamb

This is a cheerful detective novel which should appeal to many ringers. It is set in a small village, somewhere in or near Suffolk to judge by the idiomatic use of the word "do" in place of "if". One man is very much disliked: he wants to stop the bells ringing; he also confiscates cricket balls so that a match comes to an undignified end. When he is found dead in the ringing chamber no one is sorry, but the police investigations establish that only the well-liked Rector had the opportunity to murder him. P.C. Fell is a ringer, and from his knowledge of the behaviour of bells comes the solution.

Inevitably this book will be compared with "The Nine Tailors": it is a detective story in the classical tradition, with bells as an integral part of the plot, though only the most basic knowledge of bells is required here and the plot is nothing like so complicated. Still, it would be a pleasant addition to a ringer's holiday reading. It is published by Gollancz in their familiar yellow jacket, has 160 pages including a map; price 21/-. J.S.

### PRESENTATION TO GEOFF DODD

At the quarterly meeting of the Andover District at Stockbridge a presentation was made to Mr. Geoff Dodd by Mr. A. W. Alliston of a framed record of the District's history and peals rung for the 40th anniversary. In reply Geoff stressed that it was a marvellous team effort to score 35 peals in the District. He thanked all those who made it possible, with a special mention of Jack Wimlett, hon. secretary during the anniversary year.

A service touch of Cambridge was rung for a rousing service, conducted by the Rev. Mr. Kirkpatrick. After tea, at the business meeting it was decided to hold the striking competition at Goodworth Clatford on October 4th, combined with a quarterly meeting at Upper Clatford.

Evening ringing was on two fives—at Longstock and Leckford.

# Inner Story of Marlborough's Eight

By the Rev. ROGER KEELEY

ON Sunday, April 20th, the new bells making a ring of eight at Marlborough St. Mary's were dedicated by the Rector (Rev. Jeremy Walsh) at the Family Communion service before a large congregation and in the presence of the president of the Salisbury Diocesan Guild, Mr. W. C. West. The new trebles were cast from metal from the old ring of eight at St. Peter's Church, Marlborough, and have been inscribed "Peter" and "Paul". The tenor bell, cast in 1922, has been retuned.

do it! It was then that I rang Peter Minchin in Swindon, who nobly came to the rescue. The tackle arrived from London and, on a Saturday of August last year, we set to work. Immediately there were snags. No one had quite realised that the bells of St. Peter's hung 90 feet up in the tower, with no scope for erecting a second gib. A quick dash to firms in the town and half-an-hour spent on the telephone to obtain another length of chain produced no results. It was obtained by a local ringer making a special journey to London. Helping Peter Minchin was Allan Keen, from Aldbourne, while I spent most of my time acting as public relations officer. I remember spending a whole morning persuading the Rector to let us take down an old brick chimney stack in St. Mary's tower which was rather an obstruction, but we made a lot of dust which proved unpopular with a firm who were rebuilding the organ at the time.

For six months the local band rang the five remaining bells. Though my own departure from Marlborough came in September, it was encouraging that the scheme had got so far—at least to the point of no return. The new bells arrived on March 25th together with the tenor for rehanging. The question in all our minds at this stage was not how they would "go" but how they would sound. It was well answered when we were able to ring them, for the White-chapel Foundry have made an excellent "splice" and we have at last a very tuneful ring.

## JOINT MEETING

A joint meeting of the Marlborough and Calne Branches was held at St. Mary's, Marlborough, on April 19th, and it was a unanimous verdict that St. Mary's had a very fine octave. The curate (Rev. J. W. F. Hamblen) conducted the service and based his address on SS. Peter and Paul, with special reference to the new trebles.

After an excellent tea, prepared by Mrs. Hamblen and helpers, Mr. G. Newman, Marlborough Branch chairman, welcomed the guests. Officers of the Calne Branch present were Mr. J. D. Hacker (chairman), Mr. J. D. Sankey (secretary) and Miss Maundrell (Ringing Master). Mr. F. Slatford, general secretary of the Guild, and the Rev. Roger Keeley also attended. A glowing tribute to Mr. Keeley's hard work whilst in the Branch was paid by the chairman, and this was heartily endorsed.

Before ringing was resumed Mr. Hacker, on behalf of Calne Branch, thanked the hosts and said a return visit would probably be held at Broad Hinton in the near future.



The idea of making one good ring of eight for Marlborough began from a casual and possibly careless remark early in 1967. The P.C.C. were considering whether it could afford to employ a parish worker. As debate was reaching a stalemate I chanced to say that we had eight redundant bells in a semi-redundant church which must be worth a lot of money. Fortunately the diocese takes precautions against anyone disposing of church property, so the bells could not be sold to pay anyone's salary. But members of the P.C.C. and the newly-appointed Rector began to think what could be done with them.

It was clear from the start that to rehang St. Peter's bells and restore the tower at several thousand pounds' cost was a luxury we could not afford. Yet it seemed wrong that the daughter church which was only occasionally used should have more bells than the parish church. So the scheme took shape of putting two of St. Peter's bells in St. Mary's Church and selling the rest to cover the cost. It was a hard decision for no one likes to dispose of bells, but offers to buy the ring complete were not forthcoming.

## TOOK FRIGHT

Estimates for the work were obtained and we found that we could save a lot of money by lowering the bells ourselves. Two local men offered their services and help but, having surveyed the operation, took fright and said they would rather not
