## WHERE ASSOCIATIONS MIGHT HELP.

Speaking at the meeting of the Yorkshire Association Archdeacon Kilner gave voice to some very pertinent suggestions which might be taken to heart by a good many of our ringing organisations. He was referring to the difficulties which sometimes arise in regard to bells and ringers, and in these matters he urged that the associations should take up the position of advisory bodies. That they are ready to do so we have not the slightest doubt, but very few of the associations go out of their way to make it known among incumbents that their assistance in this respect is at the service of any who desire to take advantage of it. We do not refer so much to the question of disputes between church authorities and ringers-- these, perhaps, are best left for settlement by those chiefly concerned, although even here there might be scope for iudicious mediation on the part of an association.

There frequently occur, however, instances in which, particularly with regard to bells and the organisation of local companies of ringers, the practical advice which could be given by the committee or officers of an association would be of immense value to an incumbent, but more often than not it does not occur to him to consult the ringers' organisation. It seems to us, therefore, that the associations might do good work if they took special steps to bring to the notice of the clergy within their respective spheres of influence the fact that advice and help, so far as it can be given, are avallable on all matters appertaining to the belfry.

The question of rules for ringers, in the formation of which an association might also play a useful part, was also touched upon by the Archcoacon. This is one of the matters upon which local circumstances have an influence. Conditions which might be readily acceptable to one company, could not be enforced with another, but associations might do more than they do, perhaps, to secure the general adoption of the model rules for local companies, as drafted by the Central Council.

Other points were touched upon hy the Archdeacon, and may well give many executives of associations food for thought. There is plenty of scope still for bringing church authorities and ringers into closer town with the county diocesan and district ringing organisations, and the more intimate their relationship the better it will be for the Exercise, and the stronger will be the associations. It is not sufficient merely to draw members into affiliation, there are many practical ways in which the ringing organisations can be of real value, and a little enterprise and judicious effort in giving help along lines such as were suggested by Archdeacon Kilner to the Vorkshire Association would brove bencficial not only to church authorities and ringers individually, but to the ringing societies in their collective capacity as well.

## "THE CRAZE FOR BELL RINGING."

## To the Editor.

Dear Sir,-Kindly allow me, in reply to Mr . Prewett, to state that the Rector of Acton was not "absent-minded " when he gave permission for the peal which was rung by the College Youths in April last, as he simply fulfilled a promise of some months' standing, made in fact before the formation of the Acton Guild. The conductor on this occasion considerately fixed the date to suit the convenience of the locals. Under these circumstances there were no grounds on which to protest; but if there had been, the protest would certainly have been forthcoming, whether the band belonged to the College Youths or the Middlesex Association. I am a member of both Associations, and I would like to add that nearly the whole of our band are being proposed as members of, and the tower is being affiliated to, the latter. I may also inform Mr. Prewett that it was owing to the vigorous protest made by the locals that the Rector gave them another night for practice, and this was some considerable time after I appealed to Mr . Harding. I further submit that Mr. Prewett would not have put off his attempt for the peal if we had not been granted this concession.
I accept Mr. Trollope's statement so far as to believe that he himself had no thought of interfering with the local ringers' rights, but am afraid he is not entitled to include thought-reading among his many accomplishments. Air attempt was made by one of his band to undermine the loyalty of our steeplekeeper, who is also a member of our band, by pointing out to him that he was losing money as steepleage while the tower was closed for peals. I, therefore, think that Mr. Trollope's wisdom would have been well' employed if he had made further enquiries into what he wrongly described as a dispute. While the authorities of Acton Church see fit to retain my services, I shall use to the utmost my privileges in order to combat such methoals as this. I heard soon after I came to Iondon of similar tactics being employed in securing towers for peals, but being an unsophisticated countryman, I hardly credited these reports; but now that I have experienced something similar I begin to think there is something in them after all.
I must remind Mr. Trollope that other bands besides his have been in the habit of ringing peals for years past on Acton bells; but if the local band is to have a chance at all to progress in the Art, it is obvious these attempts by visitors must cease, at least for a time, as we do not intend to purcue a dog in the manger policy.
I would like to make further observations on the matter of peal ringing, but am afraid I am encroaching on your indulgence. However, before closing, may I be permitted to suggest that as regularity and good ringing for Sunday services constitute the highest duty of ringers, some system of acknowledging this might be introduced by the Associations awarding each year a certificate suitably inscribed, to the bands in each district showing the lighest percentage of attendance and best performances for Sunday ringing. I venture to think that such a competition would instil a more proper rivalry mongst ringers than peal ringing, without further introducing the methods of the Football Association.

## ST. MARTIN'S GUILD.

BIRMINGHAM MEN AT BOLDMERE.
The last quarterly meeting of the current year was held on Saturday last at Boldmere, and was well attended by members from Birmingham, Aston, Erdington (Parish Church), Handsworth, Harborne, Smethwick, Sutton Coldfield, Tipton and West Bromwich.
The Church of St. Michael, Boldmere, is comparatively "young " as churches go, having been built only about 55 years ago. It is prettily situated, about four miles from the centre of the city, and the tower contains a musical ring of eight, tenor $13 \frac{3}{4}$ cwt. in $F$, by Barwell, installed in 1906. Ringing was commenced early in the afternoon, and at 5.30 a substantial tea was partaken of at "Ye Olde Gate" Inn. This was a very enjoyable function; none the less so because the room had apparently been " mado to measure," and would not have accommodated another single person over and above those who had expressed their intention to taking tea.
The business meeting was held under the chairmanship of the VicePresident, Mr. Samuel Reeves. -The business was purcly formal, several new members being elected. Later, while some remained to enjoy a social hour, others re-visited the tower, and kept the bells going till about nine o'clock. During the clay ringing in the following methods was indulged in, several men taking the opportunity of ringing their first touch in one or other: Grandsire, Plain Rob, Stedman, Treble Bob, Cambridge and Superlative Surprise
The ringers wish, through the medium of the "Ringing World," to thank the Vicar for so kindly placing his bells at their disposal, and Mr. Wm. Anker for making such excellent arrangements for tea, and for having the tower in such good order.

## WORCESTERSHIRE ASSOCIATION. WESTERN BRANGF OHFICERS ELLECTED.

On the extreme edge of the county of Worcestershire and of the Western Division of the Association, the parish of Strensham is situated. Away from the village the Parish Church is to be found, after a walk through winding lanes and across fields. It stands out in noble form, isolated, but a good land mark for miles around. Suckley, Malvern Link, - Madresfield, Upton-on-Severn, Castlemorton, Welland, and Strensham. - Malvern Link was selected for the next quarterly meeting, on January 25th, and arrangements were made for the quarterly peal to be attempted at Strensham, Mr. W. C. Jones to be conductor.-The Rector consented to become an hon. member, as did Mr. T. C. Santler, of Malvern Link. Two new performing members were also ndded.-Mr. W. Page was re-elected Master, and Mr. R. G. Knowles, secretary.-Mr. W. C. Jones, of Worcester, was appointed to represent the branch on the Central Committee.
The Rector promised to convey the thanks of the meeting to Mr. A. J. Taylor for providing such an excellent tea, and in acknowledging a vote of thanks, said he was very pleased to meet the ringers. 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## "AMONG THE BELLS."

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## THE ROBINSON MEMORIAL SCREEN FOR DRAYTON CHURCH.



We give above a picture of the screen which is to be placed in the west end of Drayton Church as part of the memorial, provided by the ringers of England, to the late Rev. F. E. Robinson. It will be remembered that the original intention was to provide a chancel screen for the church, and thus complete a work which the deceased gentleman had intended to carry out himself. He had executed some beautiful carving for the clergy and choir stalls, and he had designed a screen which he hoped to execute. This, however, his failing health prevented.

The committee responsible for the memorial had hoped to complete the work thus begun, but sufficient funds were not available for this larger scheme, and modified pro-
posals had therefore to be adopted. The memorial is now to take the form of the screen illustrated above, which is to go at the west end of the church. It is to be eleven feet long and nine feet high, and will be executed in oak. The actual cost will be about $£ 124$, and, after meeting the other expenses incurred, the balance of the $£ 204$ subscribed will be devoted to a memorial tablet, or given towards a new service of communion plate at Drayton Church, or to some other purpose that commends itself to the committee. The screen has been designed by Mr. C. J. Hare, architect, of London, and the work is being carried out by Mr. Reed, the well-lknown carver, of Exeter.

## GLOUCESTER AND BRISTOL ASSOCIATION.

A meeting of the Cirencester branch was held at Titbury on Thursday week. Long Newnton was visited during the afternoon, and some good tapping was done in various methods of Doubles on the handy ring of six, which are in good going order. Tetbury was then visited. The bells here are a sweet-toned peal of eight in good going order. Some good touches of Grandsire Triples were rung, and a good practice was held in Stedman Triples and Bob Major. At the tea and business meeting only nine mombers were present. Cirencester was chosen for the annual meeting of the branch on Boxing Day. A social hour was afterwards spent with the local ringers. Although the attendance was small, those who attended spent in rery pleasant afternoon.

## ODD CHANGES.

Owing to the great pressure on our space by peal reports, etc., several items are unavoidably held over.

In the October issue of St. Michael's, East Teignmouth, "Parish Magazine" appears a reference to the peal of Superlative rung at that church by the Cambridge University Guild. The Vicar adds that he has received the following letter from the Guild hon. secretary (Mr. W. D. James) :-

I write to thank you on behalf of the Cambridge University Guild of Ringers for the use of your bells for a peal on the 4th inst. The peal was a great success, and the bells were very much admired. As it was the first peal on the bells, and the first peal in a difficult method rung by the Guild, it is hoped that you will permit us to leave some permanent record in the belfyy in the form of a emall peal board. I enclose a rough sketch.

By the way, these bells were all cast at the foundry of Messrs. Llewellins and James, Bristol.

The proposal that the male members of the Exercise should commemorate the ladies' peals at Cubitt Town by erecting a suitable tablet recording the performance, has met with general approval. Already contributions are coming in, and we would request those who intend to subscribe to send along their subscriptions as soon as possible to the Editor.

The band that rang a peal of Minor at Yattendon on September 22nd wish to apologise for having claimed it as " the first peal on the bells." A peal was rung there in 1886 by the Caversham Band.

Dr. A. B. Carpenter writes under date October rith : I notice in to-day's issue of "The Ringing World," on page 239, that a peal rung at Mitcham is described as
composed " by me. I am sure Mr. Lambert will forgive me for pointing out that I am not the composer, and never claimed to be. The peal in question is Thurstans' fourpart composition, varied by beginning the calling in another place.

Another lady has joined the ranks of the peal ringers, the second of the family. Last Saturday Miss. Hilda Willson, daughter of Mr. W. Willson, of Leicester, rang the treble to a peal of Grandsire. She is only 13 years of age, and is probably the youngest girl ringer to ring a peal on tower bells. Congratulations to the young lady and to Pa . He must be a proud man.

There are several variations of Mr. J. J. Parker's famous twelve-part peal of Grandsire Triples. The one rung at Bolney last Saturday has the $2 n d$ as the fixed bell. The calling runs in the following order: O at $2, \mathrm{Hs}, \mathrm{B}, \mathrm{I}, \mathrm{O}$ at I, B, I, O at $2, \mathrm{Hs}, \mathrm{I}, \mathrm{O}$ at $\mathrm{r}, \mathrm{Hs} \mathrm{B}, \mathrm{H}, \mathrm{I}$, the part end ( 243756 ) coming up at the next plain lead. This variation, by Mr. G. Walder, of Bolney, is, in the opinion of Mr. Parker himself, " more interesting than the one with the 7 th as observation."

A fortnight ago we asked who could beat the record of the Wool ringers, who have rung four times every Sunday for the past five years. Mr. D. G. Taylor, of Ilminster, writes that the band at St. Mary's, Ilminster, have rung regularly for two services every Sunday since 1902, whilo Mr. Lawrence points out that at Little Munden the band have rung twice every Sunday for 15 years.

## THE BEGINNERS' CORNER.

A few hints on calling Cambridge Surprise Minor is what W. A. (Gainsborough) has asked for. Well, there is no royal road to calling this method. The conductor should carefully study the method, and he will find that his investigation will help him a good deal when it comes to practical work in the belfry. As examples of the guides which may be found in this way, I would just call attention to the fact that the bell going to the places up takes up the work in 3-4 from its course bell, while its after bell is doing treble-work. From this, it follows, of course, that when the conductor's bell is doing treble-work his coursebell is doing places in $3-4$ up, to be afterwards taken out of the work by the bell which this course-bell is following. An ability to transpose the work of the different bells from some such observation as this enables the conductor to set any hesitating ringer on his work again.
Among other points that help to keep things going is the fact that in Cambridge Minor the bells come up behind in proper coursing order. Then the last dodge of the bell doing treble-work is with the bell coming to do the same work for the next lead, and that bell is the bell in front of your course bell. Only four bells come behind between the departure and the return of the treble: The first is doing treble-work behind and going to 3-4 places down, the next is doing intermediate work after treble-work in front, the next is doing intermediate work before treblework in front, and the last has come up to treble-work behind. These are just a few of the points which the conductor would do well to remember.

As to the actual calling, the transpositions are the same as in Bob Minor, the only difference being that the leads do not come in quite the same order. The " Home," of course, is at the course-end, but the "Wrong," instead of being at the first lead as in Plain Bob, is at the third lead. A 720 can be got as follows :-

## VETERAN RINGER'S DEATH.

A PIONEER IN BERKS AND BUCKS.
As briefly recorded in our last issue, Mr. Robert Smith, a veteran ringer, has passed away at Boyn Hill. Maidenhead. The deceased, who was in his 89th year, was one of the oldest ringers in the Oxford Guild, having been one of the first to start the Guild, and having remained a member ever since. He was born at Kingselere, Hants, and served in the Metropolitan Police, spending the greater part of his time at Devonport Dockyard, and retiring on an inspector's pension 42 years ago. He kept no records of his peals, but a record exists of a peal of Grandsire Triples rung at the Dockyard Chapel, Devonport, on Saturday, November 2nd, 1867, in 2 hrs. 55 mins., conducted by W. Banister, in which Mr. Smith took part. This was the first peal in the Western Counties. The deceased has also taken part in seven peals for the Oxford Guild.
He was the first to introduce change ringing in the East Berks and South Bucks district. starting at Boyn Hill, where he met with a good deal of opposition from the old stoney band. But once started, he kept on until he had a band to ring 120 Grandsire Doubles. He then visited all the towers in the district until he aroused sufficient interest to form the old East Berks and South Bucks Society, which eventually became the Oxford Diocesan Guild. Mr. Smith had not taken an active part in ringing for several years, but was always pleased to meet ringers and talk of the time when men would walk miles to ring 120 Grandsire Doubles. The funeral took place on Friday, October 4th, at St. Luke's Church, Maidenhead, Canon Drummond, Vicar of Boyn Hill, officiating. In the evening, at All Saints' Church, with the bells halfmuffled, a quarter-peal of Stedman Triples was rung in 45 mins.: L. Copsey 1, A. Walker 2, A. W. Garaway 3, A. Walker 4, C. Smith 5, J. Eldridge 6, G. Martin (conductor) 7, H. Jones 8.

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## NORWICH DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION.

## annual meeting at norwich

## GREAT PROGRESS RECORDED.

A large and representative gathering of members attended the annual meeting of the Norwich Diocesan Association at Norwich, on Thursday week. The bells of St. Peter Mancroft (12), St. Giles' (8), St. John-de-Sepulchre (8), St. Gregory (6), and St. Peter, Permentergate (5), were open for the use of the visitors throughout the day, and the opportunities for ringing were very largely taken advantage of. Divine service was held at St. Peter Mancroft, the Hon. Secretary and Treasurer (the lhev. C. L. Kennaway) reading the special prayers and collects, and the Vicar of Mancroft (the Rev. F. J. Meyrick), the special lesson. A large number were present, and the singing of hymus and special psalms was quite a feature of a hearty and inspiring ser vice. A particularly appropriate address was delivered by the Bishop of Thetford, his lordship's remarks being based upon the text, "There are, it may be, so many kinds of voices in the world, and nonc of them is without signification.
At the close of service, luncheon was served in the Mancroft Mission Hall. The Rev. C. L. Kennaway presided, and was supported by the Revs. F. J. Meyrick, E. C. J. Bowen and E. C. Hopper, Messrs. W. J. Howson, D. Hayward and T. Fitzjohn (district secretarics), D. O. Holme, G. P. Burton, J. E. Burton, A. Coleman, and C. E.' Borrett (secretary), ctc.
After the health of the King had been loyally drunk, Mr. G. P. Burton returned thanks, in the form of a toast, to the Bishop of Thetford for his admirable address in church, and to the incumbents who had placod the towers of their churches at the disposal of the mombers. -The Rev. E. C. Hopper gave the toast of "Success to the Association," and this was responded to by the Chairman.

## THE ANNUAL REPORT.

The Secretary then read the annual report as follows: "It is our good fortunc to be able to announce in the opening words of this, the thirty-fourth, annual report, that during the last twelve months our progress has beon more rapid and extensive than in any other year of our history. In our early days progress was mainly measured by the number of menbers on the books, but now that we have practically reached high water mark in this direction, we must measure progress by what our members do in the way of actual ringing. The amazing increase in our peal performances during the last twelve months (and especially during the last nine months) is, therefore, particularly gratifying. We record, with deep regret, the death of one of the founders of the association-Dr. Meadows, of Otley. He was one of the small circle of enthusiasts (the late Rev. G. H. Harris, Capt. Moore, and Mr. Gervace Holmes were of the number) who met at Ipswich in 1876, and discussed the possibility of starting a ringing society for the diocese of Norwich. The direct result of that discussion was the meeting at Norwich on February 10th, 1877, when this association was formally constituted. Dr. Meadows was the last survivor of those who attended the conference at Ipswich, and in 1906 he was unanimously elected one of our vice-presidents. The number of our original members has also been further recluced by the death of the Rev. Canon Ripley, and the North Elmham band has lost one of its oldest members by the death of Henry Betts.

## A RECORD IN PEALS

Our finaucial position is thoroughly sound, the statement of accounts for 1911 showing a considerably increased balance over that of 1910 . We regret to announce the resignations of three district secretariesMiss Constance Meadows (of Woodbridge), Mr. Henry Hopson (of Beccles), and Mr. J. W. Sedgelcy (of Lynn). All three have been at the head of their respective districts for a number of years, and have rendered invaluable services. An encouraging amount of restoratiou work to bells and belfries has been carried out in the diocese since our last annual mecting. Mention has been made of the great increase in the number of peals rung since the last anmual meeting. In the analyais for 1911, compiled by the Central Council, wo occupied third place according to point value, although we actually scorcd 23 peals more than any other association. Solely through the fault of those taking part in them, three of our peals were unfortunately not recorded in the ringing papers, nor in our own printed report. Had they been published in the usual way we should have been second in the analysis instead of third. Our printed report for 1911 contained particulars of 181 peals, to which must be added the three unpublished ones already referred to. This great number constituted a record for ourselves or for any other association-our own previous best being 159 rung in 1904. Since the beginning of 1912, up to the present date, we bave rung no less than 180 . It is to be hoped this great increase in peal ringing is not done at the expense of our chief duty-that of ringug the bells for Sunday services. All over the country increasing importance is given to this obligation of ours, and the clergy are rightly arging it upon us at every opportunity. The first rule of our society begs for the recognition of ringers as office-holders in the church. That has beon accorded long ago, and it is for us to show, by our regular attendance in the belfry on Sundays, that such recognition was not undeserved. If we ringers are Church workers, as we claim to be, can
thero be any doubt as to what our duty is on Sundays? And there is a very practical side to the matter, too-as the custom of Sunday ring ing increases, the number of uncared-for belfries will correspondingly decrease, for the authorities must then consider it a bounden duty to keep the tower and its contents in proper order. Whilst there is already a great amount of service ringing done in this diocese, there is room for more. Let $u_{6}$ work for the extension of it for all we are worth.
The re-election of all the officers, the election of new members, and a vote of thanks to the Ghairman concluded the business part of the rneeting. Members then once more adjourned to the various belfries of the city, and the bells were kept going until a late lour
In all ways the festival was a great success, and the members pre sent spent a most enjoyable day.

## MEMORIAL BELLS AT LOWER PEOVER. NEW RING OF SIX DEDICATED.

The parishioners of the ecclesiastical parish of Lower Peover paid a tribute to the memory of the late Rev. Arthur Guest on Sunday week, when a peal of six bells was dedicated to the honour and glory of God, and in memory of one who for the long space of thirty-four years had rendered faithful service within and without the venerable church. It may be remembered that on Thursday night, Sept. 28th last year, the reverend gentleman, who was one of the most popular harvest festival preachers in the Northwich and Knutsford districts, had a preaching engagement at the Marston Church harvest thanksgiving service, and was on his way to fulfil the engagement, when he met with injuries which proved fatal. The tragic suddenness of the call to the grave filled all with sorrow, and especially was this the case in his own parish, where he had lived and laboured for the greater portion of his life. It was only a ratural sequence on the part of the parishioners to plan some scheme wherein the memory of so worthy a pastor should be permanently identified with the church which he loved so much; and when subscriptions were iuvited there was such a generous response that the Memorial Committee had no hesitation in embarking on the heavy cost of re-casting and re-tuning the bells, which inad done service for so long a period. Accordingly the well-known London firm of Messrs. John Warner and Sons, of the Spitalfields Bell Foundry, was commissioned to execute the work, and this they havo performed to everyone's utmost satisfaction, the splendid tone of the new bells being especially admired.

## THE SERVICE.

The bells were dedicated at a commemorative service in the presence of a large congregation, including many old friends of the reverend gentleman from a distance, as well as a number of relatives, including Mrs. Guest, Mr. T. Guest (brother), and Mr. Spurrier (brother-in-law). It was also appropriate that such an old friend as the Rev. II. A. D. Surridge, Vicar of High Leigh, should take an important share in the impressive service, including the delivery of the pulpit address. The service was intoned by the Rev. H. H. M. Lefroy (the Vicar), and the lessons read by the Lev. E. G. Auden, Rector of Byley. After the singing of the hymn, "For all the saints who from their labours rest," the clergy went in procession to the belfry, where the Rev. H. A. D. Surridge read the introductory prayer. The Vicar then recited the dedicatory prayers, which included the following: "To the glory of God and as a last memorial of His servant. Arthur Guest, priest of this Church and Parish, these bells after being recast and restored, are now dedicated by his parishioners and friends in sure confidence that he has been called from earth to Refreshment, Light and Peace, in the Paradise of God.
Following this the bells were rung, and the clergy returned to the altar. The memorial office was then recited, and prayers were read by the Vicar of High Leigh. An impressive service closed with the singing of the hymn, "Abide with me."

THE BELLS
The new bells are a ring of six, with a $12 \frac{1}{4}$ cwt. tenor in the key of G , and are lhung in a steel frame with all the most modern fittings. The inscriptions upon the bells are as follow:-

2nd.-Mrs. and Miss Groves, Mrs. C. Bell, Mrs. C. Burgess

5th. Thess bells were hung in 1853. Rev. Joh $n$ Holme, Incumbent. . C. Bancroft, Isaac Goodwin, T. Atherton, George Leech, Wardens. Tenor.-These six bells were recast in 1912. In memory of Rev. Arthur Guest, M.A., Vicar (1877-1911).

## ESSEX ASSOCIATION.

The annual meeting for the North Hastern District of the Essex Association was held at Dunmow, on Saturday week. Tea was served at the Angel and Harp, and at the meeting which followed, the Rev. J. Evans (Vicar of Dunmow) presided. At the election of district officers, the Master, Mr. D. Elliott (Coggeshall), and the Secretary, Mr. A. Shufflebotham (Braintree) were prevailed upon to continue for the ensuing year. Four ringing members were elected, and the meeting closed with votes of thanks to the Vicar for his address at the service, which had been held previous to the meeting.

## YORKSHIRE ASSOCIATION.

## ARCHDEACON KILNER'S EXCELLENT ADVICE

The lovely weather which prevailed brought forth a good attendance of members for the September meeting of the Yorkshire Association, at Gargrave. A peal of Treble Bob was rung in the morning on the bells of the Parish Church, and various methods were rung afterwards throughoul the day. During the afternoon many members availed themselves of the privilege of looking over the vicarage gardens, also those of Gargrave House, Eshton Hall, and Flasby Hall. About 200 partook of tea in the Parochial Hall, and the business meeting followed under the chairmanship of the president, the Rev. C. C. Marshall.

A cordial invitation was received from the Selby branch to hold the annual meeting there, and emphasising the claims of the historic Minster so soon after its wonderful restoration and addition. The invitation was backed up by the sincere wish of the Vicar, Dr. Sollowway, that the Association would hold its annual service in the Minster. -It was unanimously resolved that the invitation be accepted.
The President proposed a very hearty vote of thanks to the Vicar, the Ven. Archdeacon Kilner, M.A., for the use of the bells, schools, and parochial room, and expressed, on behalf of the members, the great pleasure it was to visit such a beautiful spot on such a lovely day.

Replying in a most interesting speech, Archdeacon Kilner spoke first of all as Vicar, and intimated what a real pleasure it was, both to the churchwardens and himself, to welcome the Association to Gargrave. He had always liked ringing, and had always regretted that he had not learned the Art when he was younger. But he also wished to speak, he said, in his capacity of Archdeacon. As such it was one of his duties to visit churches, and he always made a point of inspecting the towers and ringing chambers, and he had often been able to point out the need of repairs and improvements. Sometimes difficulties as regards bells and ringers were brought before him, and he thought that the Association might do much in the way of giving advice upon points of difficulty. There was the question of rules for ringers, scale of fees for ringing when time at work had to be broken, insurance of ringers, and the advisability of having a yearly meeting with the Vicar present, also the election of a foreman or conductor. All such points he would like the Association to consider, as representing the best interests of change ringing, so that they might be appealed to in cases of difficulty. As regards people wanting the bells stopped owing to their noise, he bad always made this rule: "If you want the 'bells stopped, please bring me a doctor's certificate." For himself, the ringers always had a warm place in his heart, and he trusted they always would have.

The Chairman thanked Archöeacon Kilner for his very interesting specch and suggestions.-A hearty vote of thanks was accorded to the local branch for their arrangements, and to the ladies for so kindly and efficiently looking after the tea.-To this motion, Mr. J. McKell suitably responded.-Votes of thanks were also passed to Mr. J. W. Coulthurst, Sir Mathew Wilson, and Mr. J. H. Preston, for kindly allowing members to walk through their gardens.
A notice of motion was handed in, to come up for decision at the next meeting, to the effect that canvassing, on behalf of any candidate for election, should disqualify such candidate for a seat on the com-mittee.-A vote of thanks to the Chairman concluded a very pleasant meeting.

## KENT COUNTY ASSOCIATION.

The members of the Canterbury District met at Hernhill on Saturday week to hold the special meeting decided upon at the annual gathering in May last. Members began to gather soon after three oclock, having walked, cycled or motored, and one and all agreed that place and weather were everything to be desired for such a gathering. -The Rev. A. Clark (Vicar) opened the meeting with prayer, and very heartily welcomed those present to his parish. Various touches in the standard methods were rung before tea, which took place in the school, and was provided by the local members-a phrase explaining much to those who know the district.

The Rev. F. J. O. Helmore proposed a very hearty vote of thanks, firstly to the Vicar for the use of the bells, etc., and expressed the delight of the ringers at his presence during the afternoon; and, secondly, for the tea which was so well catered for and enjoyed.-This was seconded by Mr. W. E. Pitman, and carried! with acclamation.Both votes wert suitably responded to.

Mr. E. G. Buesden proposed that another special meeting be held at Selling during January, and this was carried nem. oon.- A return to the tower was then made, and the bells were kept going till 9 p.m. in various methods, including Superlative Surprise.

## ELECTRICITY APPLIED TO CHIMEG.

A chime of eight bells, weighing 53 cwt ., is to be erecetd at Dunecht House, near Aberdeen, the seat of Lord and Lady Cowdray, by Messrs. John Warner and Sons, of the Spitalfields Foundry, London, at a total cost of $£ 1,000$. The bells are to be operated by Messrs. John Warner and Sons' patent electrical apparatus, which combines a mechanical device for tune playing, with a clavier or keyboard to be operated by hand. The Carillon will be worked from the electric lighting mains, by current, which is generated upon the premises. Some of the many ringers who visited Messrs. Wamer's stand at the Festival of Empire

Exhibition, Crystal Palace, will remember the electrically rung bell which was shown there.

These bells are a great boon for small ohurches, where it is impossible to erect a ringing bell, and also for schools and public buildings. Messrs. Warner have just erected a 4 cwt. bell at St. Matthia's Church, Tulse Hill, and they have a 6 cwt . bell in hand for the Church of the Holy Spirit, Clapham, and also others for Swansea Training College, and Schools at Kilburn (2), Tottenham (4), Enfield (2). Other bells have been erected at Southall ( 3 cwt ), Southsea ( 3 cwt .), Hornsey ( 3 cwt .), St. Helen's, Lancs; St. Augustine's Convent, Westgate-on-Sea; Wimbledon, Gravesend, Tonbridge, Ealing, and Westminster.

## CORONATION BELLS. <br> DEDICATION OF TWO TREBLES AT WHITECHURCH

 CANONICORUM, DORSET.So long ago as 1887 the work of restoration and augmentation of the bells in the tower of Whitechurch Canonicorum, Dorset, was commenced. Foilowing the restoration of the fine perpendicular tower, which is 28 ft . square and 75 ft . high, came the rehanging of the peal of five, bells. These are all of ancient date, and bear the following. inscriptions:-
Treble: Harke when I Call
Come To Corch All
Come To Sarve God
Or Come Not At All
Ani x No x Do x Mi x Ni 1669 W.L.H.C. C.W.T.P.
Second: ANNO . DOMI . NI . 1603 R.P.R.M.
Third: ANNO DOMI . NI 1603 R.P.
Fourth: Give Thankes to God 1641 . IL . IG.
Tenor: Plebs omnis plaudit ut me lam sepius audit.
(in old English lettering).
This is a bell about 21 cwt. in E flat.
The committee carrying out this work had the foresight to have a frame for eight crected and the five bells rehung. Then in 1904, as a memorial of the Coronation of the late King Edward they added a sixth bell, which carries the inscription: " Ring in the Christ that is to be, 1904.'
Now, eight years later, the people of this picturesque Dorset village have seen the consummation of their efforts; for as a memorial of the Coronation of our present King they have completed their octave.

These two new bells bear the following inscriptions:-
Treble: " Hear my voice, O God."
Second: "May all in breath and harmony rejoice
To honour Church and King with heart and voice.
To commemorate the Coronation of King George V. 1912.
The work has been efficiently carried out by Messrs. John Warner: and Sons, of the Spitalfields Foundry, who have made a truly excellent splice." The work reflects the greatest credit upon the firm.
'I'hureday weak was the day set apart for their dedication, and at the service there was a large congregation. The surpliced clergy present were: The Venerable Archdeacon of Dorset (the Rev. C. L. Dundas), the Revs. E. If. H. Lee (Vicar), W. M. M. Sellwood (curate), F. J. Lory (Wootton Fitzpaine), E. H. Greenhow (Chiclcock), S. E. Simms (Charmouth), and the Rev. D. H. Stubbs. There were also present the Revs. C. F. Langford (Bradpole) and E. D. Maynard. (Marshwood). The service opened with the singing of Psalm 31 as the surpliced choir and clergy passed down the nave to the tower, where the Archdeacon received the keys of the tower from the hands of the churchwardens. Following the prayers of dedication, the local ringers rang the bells in rounds while the choir and clergy returned to the chancel. Then followed evensong, with special lessons, psalms and hymns, $i_{B}$ which the congregation heartily joined.
Taking as his text, "Endeavouring to keep the unity of the spirit in the bond of peace :" (Eph. iv. 3), the Arehdeacon preached a most practical and helpful sermon, emphasising the need of unity in these restless times amongst all classes of Christians, and showing what could be done when a parish was united-as the completion of the bells bore witness.
After the service ancl during the evening, the bells were rung in changes by a band drawn from Bradpole, Bridport, etc. These were the Rev. C. F. Langford, T. H. Beams (conductor), C. Barrett and A. Hile (Bradpole). W. and B. Northover and J. Zealley (Bridport), F. C. Webb (Cork), T. Taylor (Whitechurch), and J. Double (Marshwood). At 4.30 a tea was held in the schoolroom, while later in the evening the same building was utilised for a dance.
Thus ended a memorable day in the amnals of this old-world parish.

## PECKHAM RINGERS ENTERTAINED.

On Wednesday evening, October 9th, the Vicar of St. Michael's, East Peckham (the Rev. G. C. E. Ryley) entertained the ringers at the Vicarage. After dimner, the Vicar presented Mr. G. Bell, one of the band, who has recently been married, with a brace of pipes in case, a wedding present from the Vicar and his fellow ringers. The gift was suitably acknowledged.-The Vicar then proposed the health of the band. He thanked them for their services in the past, and hoped they would get higher into change ringing.-Mr. T. Saunders responded on behalf of the band, and thanked the Vicar for his kind hospitality and the way in which he had entertained them. The remainder of the evering was spent with songs and other.amosements.

## THE BELLS OF AN ESSEX VILLAGE.

 NEW TREBLE DEDICATED AT SIBLE HEDINGHAM.What may not inaptly be termed a ringing week took place from Sept. 26th to October 3rd, in the little village of Sible Hedingham, Essex. On Thursday, Sept. 26th, a party of ringers from various towers in the district, together with some of the villagers, assembled at the church to ring and hear for the first time a peal of six bells sending forth their music from this tower. Through the generosity of the Misses Webster, tho old five bells have been rehung in a new iron frame with all latest fittings, iron headstocks, etc., the old treble and fourth being recast, and a new treble added. The tenor is $18 \frac{3}{4} \mathrm{cwt}$. in E , and the work has been admirably carried out by Mr. A. Bowell, Ipswich. The first touch on the bells was a 720 Oxford Treble Bob, by: L. Wiseman 1, O. H. Howard (conductor) 2, F. Clayion 3, H. H. Cooper 4, A. Shufflebotham 5, A. Saunders 6 .
On Sunday, Sept. 29th, the bells were dedicated by the Rector (the Rev. W H. Warburton), a course of Oxford being rung on this occasion, while ringing was also continued during the afternoon and evening, and included 720 Cambridge Surprise, by: A. Saunders 1, E. Newman 2, A. Shuflebotham 3, F. Claydon 4, E. W. Beckwith 5, D. Elliott (oonductor) 6; and 720 Double Court, by: E. Newman 1, L. Wiseman 2, II. Cooper 3, A. Shufflebotham (conductor) 4, H. E. Bower's 5 , A. Saunders 6. On the following Tuesday, which was practice night, several touches of Bob Minor were ring, some of the local ringers taking part, and on Thursclay an attempt for a peal proved successful, as recorded elsewhere.

## SHEFFIELD DISTRICT MEETING.

The October meeting of the Sheffield District Society was held at Dore, on Saturday, and proved very successful. The beautiful ring of eight bells (tenor $11 \frac{1}{4}$ cwt.) at the Parish Church were raised about 4 p.m., and were kept going with short intervals till eight o'clock. About 25 members were present from Dore, Dronfield, Eckington. Killamarsh, Norton, Ranmoor, Sheffield Parish 'Church, and St. Maries' (R.C.), Rotherham Parish Church, and Worksop. Some good striking was heard, the methods rung being Oxford Treble Bob Minor, Grand sire and Stedman Triples, Plain Bob, Double Norwich and Superlative Surprise Major. A short business meeting was held in the tower during the evening. In the absence of the President and Vice-Presidents, Mr. W. Biggen (Norton) was elected to the chair-Five new members were elected, viz., Messrs. T. Thorp and J. Atkin (Sheffield Parish), and Messrs. A. Hague, J. Monks and C. Ryder (Rotherham Parish).-A vote of thanks to the Vicar and to the local company for granting the use of the bells and making all arrangements was carried unanimously, Mr. G. Thorpe suitably replying.-This closed the proceedings.

## CHURCH BROUGHTON BELLS.

The tower of Church Broughton formerly contained three bells, one of which was cracked. This has now been recast and two new bells added, the whole peal being hung in a new iron frame with new fittings and room left for another bell, which it is hoped will soon be forthcoming. By the kindness of the Vicar, permission was given to members of the Midland Counties Association to try the peal on Thursday, October 3rd. After the bells had been raised in peal, a number of 120's were rung by: J. H. Swinfield and W. J. Smith (Burton), L. Smith and J. Topley (Rollesten) and F. Weeks (Sudbury), each one having a turn at conducting. A large number of parishioners, including several ladies, soon came flocking to the church, and were very interested in the proceedings, it being the first time they had had the opportunity of seeing any change ringing. The Vicar and a rumber of promising young men are forming a band, and it is hoped change ringing will soon flourish in this beautiful Derbyshire village. The whole of the work has been executed by Messrs. J. Taylor and Co., of Loughboro', and the "go "of the bells is all that can be desired.

## DEVON GUILD MEETING.

The annual meeting of the Archdeaconry of Totnes division of the Devon Guild was held on Saturday week at Lifton, where there is a nice peal of eight with a tenor about 24 cwt. Bands were represented from Three Towns, Kelly, Lifton, Walkampton and Holbeton, and the bells were kept going the whole of the afternoon, several touches of Stedman and Grandsire Triples and Doubles being nicely struck. Tea was provided at the Arundel Arms, and was presided over by the Rev. M. Kelly (President of the Devon Guild). There were also present: The Misses M. E. and W. U. Kelly, Mrs. and Miss Keagh, who kindly presided at the tea urns; the Rev. A. Keagh (Rector of Lifton), the Rev. G. D. Symonds, the Rev. E. S. Powell, and 34 ringers.-A hearty welcome was given to the Rev. M. Kelly and his daughters, and they were also thanked for their interest in the meeting and their presence. Thanks were also accorded to the Rector of Lifton for the use of the bells, and to the secretary for organising the meeting.-The votes were suitably responded to.

With an enthusiastic and unanimous vote, the Rev. E. S. Powell was chosen as representative for Totnes Archdeaconry on the committee of Devon Guild. Tavistock and Plympton were both proposed as the next place of meeting, and, on being put to the vote, Plympton was selected by a substantial majority. It was acknowledged on all hands that the meeting was a perfect success.

## BELL RESTORATION AND AUGMENTATION.

 BRISTOL FIRM'S EXCELLENT WORKMessrs. Llewellins and James, of Bristol, have recently completed oome important bell contracts, and their work has been executed to the utmost satisfaction of the authorities concerned.
At Slymbridge, Gloucestershire, they have rehung the peal of five, recast the treble and tenor, the latter a bell of 24 cwt ., and added a new treble to make a peal of six, which have been placed in a new steel and iron frame, with all new fittings. The old bells were taken to the foundry and retuned, and the Rector (the Rev. J. O. H. Carter), in complimenting the firm upon the successful completion of the contract says, "Everyone is delighted with the bells, and the ringers are enthusiastic at the ease with which they can now be rung. The whole work of providing a new frame, a new treble, recasting the old treble and tenor and rehanging the bells, has been carried out to the complete satisfaction of the churchwardens and myself."
At Oxenhall, near Newent, Messrs. Llewellins and James have just finished the restoration of the three bells, the tevor having been recast, and the whole rehung in a new steel and iron frame. They have also provided a new floor, and a top frame for an extra bell. In this case also the church authorities have complimented the firm upon the prompt, efficient and satisfactory execution of the work.
The four bells of Upwey, Dorset, have also been to the foundry. The treble and tenor have been recast, and the others tuned. Two new trebles have also been added to make a peal of six, and the whole of the bells have been rehung in a new frame.

## RINGING CONTEST.

## halifax association's compentition.

The general meeting and eight-bell contest of the Halifax and District Association was held at the Halifax Parish Church, on Saturday last, when the bells and schools were kindly placed at the disposal of the members by the Vicar (the Rev. Dr. Burn). Six companies entered for the contest, each set ringing 672 changes, preceded by three leads for practice. The judges were Mr. Broadley, of Bradford, and Mr. Snith and Mr. Whiteaker, of Halifax. During the afternoon tea was served to the visitors, who numbered about 110.
The general meeting was held in the school after the ringing, the President (Mr. Cotterill) being in the chair, supported by the Vicar and the society's cfficers.-Six new members were elected, and on the motion of Mr. Hardy, seconded by Mr. Sharman, the place of next contest was left in the hands of the secretary.
A hearty vote of thanks, passed to the Vicar and churchwarclens for the use of the bells and schoolroom, was proposed by the Chairman, seconded by Mr. Lawson. The judges' decision was announced as follows by Mr. Bioadley: Earlsheaton, 210 faults; Pudsey, 357; Lightcliffe, 302; Liversedge, 355 ; Bradford, rung out; Brighouse, 348. Earlsheaton were, therefore, declared the winners.
The Vicar, in presenting the cup to Mr. Hardy, the conductor of the winning team, said he was pleased to see so many ringers present, and he had enjoyed listening to the ringing that afternoon.-Mr. Hardy suitably thanked him on the team's behalf, and proposed a vote of thanks to the judges.-This was seconded by Mr. Drake, and carried.
A vote of thanks was proposed by Mr. Johnson to the local company for the way they had entertained the visitors. -Mr. Dransfield seconded, and Mr. Rylands, having replied, a very successful meeting was brought to a close.

## THE LANCASHIRE ASSOCIATION.

Tea was afterwards partaken of in the schoolroom, where the business meeting was also held.-Three new members were elected, and a vote of thanks was accorded to the Rev. E. W. W. Payne for conducting the service, presiding at the meeting, and for giving the tea, and to Mr. Atlay for officiating at the organ.-Touches of Grandsire Doubles and Triples were rung on the handbells, and then a return was made to the tower, where touches of Grandsire and Stedman Doubles and Plain Bob were brought round.
