## THE RECORDS OF 1913.

As we anticipated, the peals rung in 19:3 have surpassed the enormous total reached in igi2, and this leads us to grive our readers some details as to what has been achieved. For instance, it is not uninteresting to compare the monthly totals. They are as follows :-

The December figures may not, even now, be complete, and the total for g I 3 may rise still higher. Altogether about 2,350 peals have been, up to now, recorded as rung in 1943 , an increase of just over 20 upon the preceding year. It will be noticed that 300 were rung in December -the first time on record we believe that that number has been rung in a single month. What the relative position of the Associations is remains to be seen, when the official analysis appears, but it is fairly safe to say that those Associations which were in the top places in 1g12, will again occupy prominent positions, for they have kept up the peal performances with remarkable consistency.

And what applies to the Associations, applies also to the leading ringers and conductors. Several promising men are "coming out," but those who for some years past now have occupied conspicuous positions still continue to hold their own. Among individual performances, of course, that of Mr. Alfred Grimes, stands out pre-eminently, for his 136 peals in twelve months, and 250 in two years, is a world's record. These peals have been rung out of sheer delight for the Art, and although Mr. Grimes has been fortunate in all the circumstances which have enabled him thus to excel the previous best, his enthusiasm is something much to be admired, and his success a matter for hearty congratulation.
Those two well-known ringers, Messrs. W. Pye and Keith Hart, run each other very close for second place, the former having rung 77 peals during the year and the latter 76. Others with over 50 to their credit are Messrs, $F$ Benzett 7 I , E. Pye 70 , A. H. Pulling $\sigma_{3}$ (of which 42 have been on handbels), B. Prewett 62, J. E. Davis $57, \mathrm{R}$. Sanders 55, C. T. Coles 52, W. D. Janes 51 \& I. G. Shade. Mr. K. Hart heads the list of conductors with 6:, Mr. A H. Pulling being next with 59 (41 of these having been on handluells), and Mr. W. Pye next with 53 .

The latest addition to the peal ringing ranks of the ladies is Miss Elsie Matthews, whose frst peal rung on handhells, at her home at Soublifids, we recorded last week. She is the daughter of Mr. John D. Mathews, late Master of the Royal Cumberland Youths, and only attained her fourteenth birthday in August last. By ringing $7-8$ to a handbell peal of Boh Major she has gained the distinction of being the youngest lady to ring a peal on eight bells.

She commenced ringing about a year ago, when her father purchased a peail of handbells, and without any outside help started to coach his three children, aged respeclively If, isand ir. l'ractice, however, was very limited, and sometithes weeks passed without the opportunity presenting itself. However, about six montis ago, the four rang threc courses of Boh Major. Some three months

since, with the help of Miss Elsic Bennett and Mr. F. Hairs, an attempt was made for a peal with Mr. Matthews and his daughter. This was lost after 25 courses, and another atempt recenlly was lost alter ringing a quarter. Just before Claristmas two fathers and two daughters made an attempt, Mr. and Miss Mathews and Mr, and Miss Rennett, but this alsc unhappily canc to grief. On the last Saturday is the year, however, with the assistance of the brothers Shepherct, Miss Mathews reaped the reward of perseverance and scored her lirst peal. An effort was made to ring wo peals in the day. One in the afternoon was lost after nine courses, and then, after tea, the first peal was rung. Another attempt was then made, but came to grief after i hr. and yo mins. good ringing, through no fault of the young lady. We hope soon to see her in a peal in the company with her brothers, who only need a fow more good praclices to make them really competent.

Indeed, his ringing would have done credit to a much older and more experienced hand, and he is provings thus eatly a worthy member of a great ringing family.

In view of the fact that the peal rung on handbells by the Cumberland Youths at Clapham on Saturday week wais the first handbell peat of Stedman Caters by this old socicty, it is interesting to recall the fact that the first peal of Stedman ever rung in hand was a peal of Triples by the Cumberlands. This was on December igth, IS5s, and the ringers were John Cox, Thomas Powell, Henry W. Haley, and Thomas Britten. John Cox was the conductor, and the lime was $a$ hrs. 40 mins.

The bells of Wye Church, Kent, are to be retuned and rchung. The peal of eight (tenor 21 cwt.) are now at Messrs. Warner and Sons' Foundry for the restoration, and the church authorities, with an eye to the future, are having the new steel frame constructed for ten bells, so that two trebles may be added as soon as funds allow.

Mr. A. H. Pulling, of Guildford, has set up another record, by leeng the first to ring 200 peals on handbells.

Mr. J. Houghton writes to say that there was an error in the footnote to the peal of Superlative rung at Finedon on December ${ }^{1} 3^{t h}$. It was mot his Gotls peal in the method, as he has one more to ring before he reaches the half cen1ury.

The first peal in seven methods at Thurmaston, Leicester, was not that reported in our issue of December igth, but was rung on lanuary i8th last, by members of the M.C.A., conducted by Ernest Morris.

The Rev. H. Law James informs us that the quickest peal on tower bells was one of Stedman Triples, which he conducted, at Quedgeles, on July i8th, rgo6. This occupied only 2 hrs. 22 mins. The tenor is a bell of 9 cwt . For the information of a correspondent we may say that the quickest peal on eight handbells occupied i hr. +4 mins.

In reference to the Spitalfields Foundry staff peal of Caters at Shoreditch we are asked to say that it was not claimed as the first by a foundry band, but it was believed to be the first by employes of a bell foundry. At the same time the inquiry is made as to whether there had previously been a peal on ten bells by workmen in one employ. Perhaps some of our readers can tell us.

About twelve months ago there was a split in the camp, but it was file best thisg that could have lappened. Some wanted to start change ringing, and others supported the call changes, but ultimately the followers of the lattor left, the company. Then came a struggle, but after a few months' practice, Grandsire Donbles were mastered. It was, however, in the last half of the $y$ ar that the real improvement seti in. One or two change ringers happened to take up residence in the vicinity, and Grandsire Triples was attempted and rung successfully. Long touehes were hardly advieable owing to the bad going of the tenor, but this mater was aired in the columens of tho local Press, and the reanlt was that the Vicar (the Rev. F.W. Walbrand-Erans) gave instructions for the bell to be thoronghly overhauled. This has been dono by Mesars. Maskell, who, like lhe rest, are doing well in method ringing.

Aflerwards, the ringers were fortanate enongh to find a train that brought them to tolnes in good lime for an excellent ten, and then, by the kindress of Mr. FE, Manley. they were enabled to enjoy a rigg ois the gratad peal of eight, probubly the finest in the connty. Stedman, Grandsirm and Plain Bob were linpped in splendid style, and the bells dempreat in a manmer that croked favourable comment from the local men, who, like most Devominms, aro experts at raining and [allinc, but unfortunately rather despise half-pull ringing. Songa and hambells reliewert the monolony of the railway jouraeys, and Plyyonth was reached ulter one of the pleasautest lrips in the anuals of llymouth ringers.

## 250 PEALS IN TWO YEARS.

## MR. A. W. GRIMES' REMARKABLE PERFORMANGE. $A$ WORLDS REOORD.

Whey, in 1912, Mr. Alfred W. Grimes rang 114 peals in the year, it was looked upon as an extraodinary porformance, but in 1913 he has adieved an even more remarkable record, for between January lsf and Decenber 31st Le ramg no fewer than 136 peals, which easily conatilutes a world's record for ono man. In the two years he has thus been in exactly 250 successful attempts, and nothing approaching this has ever been previously accornplished.
It is true that Mr. Grimes is excentionally well placed for indulging in this hobly, for at the prasent time thero are facilities for ringing in and around Lrondon, which have at no time been excelled. But even London would not have provided him with all the opportanities which would lave been necessary for this great record, and we fud that the peals in 1913 were rung iu no fewer than Il counties, wiz., Middesex, Suffolk, Surrey, Kent, Cambridge, Huntingdon, Carnwall, Devoushire, Sussex, In riford and Essex. Tho performances were, moreover, spread ower 71 different towers, hnd the pats warc called by 22 different conductora, of whom Mr. Willim Pyo was the alrief, ho having conductod 47 of them. The societies under whose auspices the peals were rung were tho Niddlesex, the Callege Youlhs, the Eooden County, Norwich, Kint, Sturrey, Espex, Hertford, Ely, Sussex, Devoushire, and the St. Margarel:", Westminster.
The handbull peala, which numberct 24 , included the recort ( 6,063 ) 4 Stedman Cinques " in hand," the first peal of Stedman Cinques on handbells in Cambridgeshire, the first ponls of Kent Treble Bob Royal and Yajor for the Kent County Association (botil of which Mr. Grimes corduoted), and an "all couducted "peal of Bob Major. Tho most notewortay performances on tower bells inchded the first peals of (lambridge, Bristol and Loadon in Cornwall, the first peal of London in Devon, tho first peal of Cambricige Maximus in Cambridgeslire, the first peal of liristol in thio Oity of London, the first peal of Cambridge Royal in Essex, ami the first peal of Brigliton Surprise ever rung-a

truly astonishing record for one twelvemontl, that almost takes one's breath away. Further, it is not uninteresting to add that during the year, Mr. Grimes rang two peals in a day on nine oocasions. He also took part in 25 unsuccessful attempts.
It will probably be ulang time befora Mr. Crimes' porformnuee is beation, and all we cnn say is that the man that does it will lave a very lyusy lime.
