## BELL FRAMES AND TOWERS.

At length there is a promise of getting reliable information, based upon modern scientific research, brought to the notice of responsible authorities, upon the important, if somewhat abstruse, subject of the stresses and strains placed upon towers by belis in motion. A fortnight ago we published an article upon the practical engineering side of the question by Mr. J. H. B. Hesse, and last week Mr. E. H. Lewis added the results of his valuable and interesting investigations which, considering the complexity and highly technical nature of the subject, were remarkably lucid as well as concise. This week another member of the Special Committee appointed by the Central Council to go into the matter, contributes a view from the architects' standpoint. Mr. Young shows that tower troubles are not always the fault of the architect, and in this, of course, those who have given consideration to the subject, will agree.
The committee have two objects before them. One is to endeavour to convince the Society for the Preservation of Ancient Buildings, that rigid bell frames properly designed and constructed are no detriment to the stability of a tower. Cases have occursed where the interference of the society, prompled no doubt by the best of intentions, but nevertheless, as we believe, by mistaken notions, has led to serious obstacles being placed in the way of bell restoration upon lines which would render the bells practically useless for the purposes for which they should be hung. If with the investigations that have now been undertaken, and the experiments being made, they can be shown that their alarm for the safety of ancient fanes is based upon misconception a valuable work will have been done in the cause of ringing.

The second object of the committee and the one which is particularly a question for the architects, is the relative position of bells to the louvres, so that the sound-carrying power of the bells is not affected but the noise in the immediate vicinity of the tower is reduced to a minimum. We have not yet learned what action has been taken in this matter, but the well-established facts, so well-known to ringers of experience, will doubtless be brought to the notice of the Royal Institute of British Architects, when the other phase of the subject with regard to strains ano stresses is also laid before them in conclusive form at the completion of the investigations that are heing made. It is, moreover, exceedingly gratifying to learn that the whole question is to come before the Institute, for though the subject is one rather outside the realn of campanology, it nevertheless has an important bearing upon our enjoyment of our Art, and for that reason is one which ringers should, as far as possible, make themselves acquainted will.

## SIXTY YEARS A RINGER.

To few men is it given to take an active part in ringing for more than sixty years, yet at the advanced age of 8r, and with more than six alecades of ringing in Kingston belfry behind him, Mr. fohn Wright is still able to take his place at the ropes. Mr. Wright was born at King-ston-on-Thames on January $291 \mathrm{~h}, 1833$, in what was called in those days the Horse Fair, now known as Wood Strect, and when a boy he used to spend all his spare time, when ringing was going on, listening to Bob Singles and Doubles, which were called at that time. There was no Sunday ringing in those days, only chiming, but when Mr. Neaser became Vicar the bells were rung for morning service. Mp. Wright first became a chimer and gradually learnt to ring a bell. In 1852 he took part in ringing with the bells muffed for the death of Mr. Gundy, the Vicar, and also for the Duke of Wellington's Funerat.


In 1853 , he entered a situation as gardener at Kingston T-ill, ind lived there till 1879 . He took part in his first peal of Grandsire Caters on Easter Monday, 1857 , and rang the 8th. In 1868 lie took part in a College Youths peat of Stedman Caters, ringing the gth at St. Clement Dines. About the same time he took part in another peal of Gratudsire Caters with the St. James' Socicty. In 8874 he rang another peal of Grandsire Caters at Kingston, with the Waterloo Society, and sulsequently he took part in other peals at Kingston, Epsom, Carshalton, Battersea, Putney, Nortlake, Horley, Twiekemham, Walton and Molesey, ringing about 30 peals in all, including the first peal rung for the Surrey Association.

On Sunday, func $q^{4 h}, 19{ }^{3}$, he took part in a quarterpeal of Grandsire Caters al Kingston, and rang the $4^{\text {th. }}$ and on October $\mathrm{z} 2 \mathrm{~h}, 1913$, he rang the and to a touch of to08 of Grandsire Triples, and conducled it. Mr. Wright
is as keen on ringing as ever, and there are very few Sunday mornings in the course of a year that do not see him in Kingston belfry to ring for service, while on Tuesday evenings he is regularly present at the practice. He is an excellent striker, and even now, at his advanced age, it is the rarest thing for hin to make a bad blow. He is hale ant hearty to-dlay, and always has a genial smile when one meets him. As already recorded, the recent peal of Grandsire Caters rung at Kingston was in honour of his 8 ist birthday, and it was also one of his compositions. May he long be spared to take his part in the Sunday service ringing, which is such an important part of the service of the church.

For the first time in history the Exercise can boast of having in its ranks a Lord Chief Justice, Lord Justice Cherry having been elevated to the position of Lord Chief Justice of Ircland. He has reached this exalted office after a distinguished career, both in law and politics, and the Exercise will join in congratulating him upon reaching one of the highest offices open to his profession.

The now Lord Chief Justice, whenever his duties have permitted, has taken his place in the service ringing at St, Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin, and has taken part in several peals. He has identified himself very intimately in the aflairs of the Jrish Association, at the head of whose executive he still remains.

The 'dedication of All Saints', Daresbury bells, Cheshire, took place on Sunday, and before evening service a peal was rung on the bells. The ring is a new octave, with tenor $16 \frac{1}{2}$ cwt., and they have been installed by Messrs. Warner and Sons, two of whose bell hangers took part in the opening peal.

Several interesting musical features are embodied in this work of restoration, and in view of the various opinions of well-known ringers with regard to the position of the main girders, it will be found that the main girders, as generally known in bell work, have been entirely eliminated. Messrs. Warner's new steel frame is only supported at the four corners of the tower by diagonal steel set-offs, thus taking the bearing at the strongest point of the tower, and also ticing all four walls together.

The recent performance which we noted at Newcastie Cathedral, where a visitor from Gosforth raised the tenor ( $37 \frac{1}{2}$ cwt.) in 5 mins. 35 secs., recalls the occasion when Mr. James H. McCraken raised the tenor single-handed at Edinburgh Cathedral ( 42 cwt. 2 grs. 21 lbs.) in exactly two minutes, timed by Messrs. W. R. Fyfe, J. R. Robertson and J. Whitson. This was on Jantary 25th, I9II.

Is the ring at Brant Broughton the heaviest peal of six bells in Lincolnshire? For the information of the band who rang a peal of Minor there on Saturday perlaps some of our Lincolnshire readers can tell us.

To a correspondent. There is unquestionably an advantage in using a "box" when ringing a heavy bell.

## BELFRIES AND TOWERS.

Doublless your readers hate read wifh interest your article and the letters which inspirent it. Sometimes, it is Irue, the lower storeg of umple foumlations is put im , and reminns for yeare as a melancholy reproath and appeal standing there with its temporary "Fhen there is the case of tho dower built pernajs to contain oue bell ant a clock and strong onough to rexist wind pressure only, this is nuite insufficient to withstand the additional stresses seif uly when, its after years, witheut the advice of an urchitect, an enterprising Ficar and bell founder, instrall a peal of bells.
Following on the above, however. I know that there are cases where, under the supervision of an urchitect, lawers liave been erected willi an insufficient martin of the streugth that is required where bells
