## IN AMERICA

The picturesque language in which the writer in the Boston Transcript" recently painted the reception of the English ringers in America was, it seems, hardly justified by the real facts. From the extracts which we quoted from the article in our issue of March 6th, our readers will have seen how the American writer, with the subtle genius of his kind, drew a somewhat alluring picture of the position which the ringers hold in the eyes of the Boston public, and of the advantages which they enjoyed in that land of democracy as compared with the status of the ringers in England.

In this issue we have "the other side of the shield." A frank le,ter from Mr. E. E. Randall, formerly of the St. Albans' Cathedral Society, shows that a good many of the statements that appeared in the "Boston Transcript" were the product of the writer's fertile imagination working upon "the limited truths that were placed before him by those in authority." Despite the promising outlook when Dr. Nichols endeavoured to get a band together capable of planting our Art on the American continent, the men, according to Mr. Randall, do not all seem to have improved their prospects, while the facilities for ringing have been curtailed rather than extended. In both respects this information is sincerely to be regretted, and must be a source of much discouragement to Dr. Nichols as well as to those who sought to make a new home, and, perhaps, lay the foundations of fortune, across the Atlantic.

As to the condition of the labour market in America we, of course, know nothing. We cat only lament that any of those who left these shores with the dual purpose in view, should have failed, up to the present, to "make good." All ringers in this country will hope that fortune may quickly smile upon them. Equally we trust that the difficulties which seem to have arisen in the way of ringing may soon be removed. The Boston Gutd do not seem to have had opportunities of overdoing their practice, but the Art, which seems indiginous to English soil alone, has not yet appealed, apparently, to the soul of the American -and Italian. That the efforts which Dr. Nichols is making may not be eventually wasted is our sincere wish. So far as bells are concerned, he is introducing a veritable revolution in Boston, and rebuffs at the outset were, perhaps, only to be expected, but the closing of belfries, as Mr. Randalt tells us has already been done in one case, will effectually put the extinguisher upon all effort. We hope that what has happened in regard to the ringing is only a temporary and not a permanent set-back to a condition of things that at one time seemed to promise well for our Art in America.

## INTER=AFFILIATION.

## WARWICRSHERE GUILD SECLEEARY'S VXEWS.

Dear Sir, -I biak it must be borne in mind that any sctumg of inter-uffilition which may be put into operation will necessarily be, at first, experimental. It ought, therefore, to bo us simple as pessible. Tha lerms of the resolution published by Mr. Atwell in your issue of Docember $12 i \mathrm{~h}, 1913$, present too many complications, in my opicion to be looked upon with moch favour yet awhile by these responsibte for the working of an Association. Much tho samo applies to Mr. Pigott's suggestions in your lust issuc.

In this I believe wo shall do bether to walk before we attempt to ran. The wholo subject, worked out cantiously through different stages of experisnce, will tave more chance of doveloping inio something likely to gaic general ncceptance, and to be of permarent benefit to ringers. I, for one, feel that there are great possibilities in front.

At present, however, I think wo must confine our attention to the visiting ringer, who desires to ring a peal or attend io meeting under un Association of which ho is not a member, For the large majority now the premitm upon tho onjoyment of such an occasional peal is too high; the ringer may never vikit the area controlled by that Associatipu again. What we want to gain, then, is that he should nat feel barted from all opporlutity in the new locality he is visiting of obtainius that enjoyment out of the art which is reality his dueif the members of the Exereise are one great unity. The question of tha Association's fimane, af course, will seam to sland in the way of any scleme But here 1 am gong to suggest that members of Associalians shall prepare themselves to face, if need be, a littlo diminution in the income derived from chance life-members. It has yet to be proved that under some such scheme of inter-affiliation as I submil below, this will not be more than counter-balanced by tho attraction of a laryer number of affiliated mombers. At all events, tite possibility might be put to tho test of esperience for one, or two years at leasst.
I believe that inter-affilintion is practical without at first being necessarily universal. Some Associations miglit adopt it without in tung way interfering with thoso who do not. My point is that, if it whe fonind to be advantngeous, or ruther let us say, not detrinenfal, to the few it would soon come to be recognised by the many. Only let us get something simple approved and tried first, and be content to allow the mare compieated eystems to come nlong when we aro more certain of pll ground.
I would like the following to be considered:-
1.-That for a fea of $6 d$. a voucher (which might be the ordinn'y form of receipt specially headed) be isterd by the Assocition to which the visiting ringer dasircs to become afliliated. Such voucher to bo availalile for sis monilhs.
2. That the Assoctation in question bave ihe right to tho whoto of the fee
3. That in the event of a penl being rung, a distinctive sign be placed against the affiliatenl momber"s name in the record. (This is MIT. Pigott's suggestion.)
4.-That members so ariliated shall not lave the prixileges of foll members, and shall not be entitled to voting powers.
5.-That to be eligible for affilititon a riuger must be at full practisinge member of a duly recogrised Association.
It, no doubt, goes without saying that those Associntions whicla adope a schema must all adopt the same selneme. But I would urge that something simple EE adopted, even if only by a fow Associalions to lucgin with, and that whatever scheme bo approved it be given at least a two years" test.
It is to bo hoped that something proftable will result from the discussion of the matter by tho Cenirul Courcil, and that the oppordunity will be given to someone to lend the was. - Yours frithfulty,

Anober stakemont bint ${ }^{\prime}$ their position as the ouly musicians of thein kind ou thas continsu is uniqua＂is cortainly worthy of publica－ tion．We wet so much mractice，flat if we soore a 504 of Grandsirg Triplus it is equal to riugity a peal of stednam ato loase，when the diftentiles under which we work are conaidered．So far，we lane met four tincs this yeal－three times at Wforlown，flve miles away，ind once at Hingham， 18 miles awiy，At Waterlown liey allow ns to ring onoe a mouth，on a Sunday morning or publie holiday，for a period of 30 to 45 miuntes．

USZ OF BELLS REFUSED
The bells at Eingham are thot pealable．The longest length we have laent able to ring on them is 1 ，boo elanges，and this，after m hat physical struggie．In l\}oston our posilion ecrtainly is "unique" as we have no bels to ring on．Chrisk Church wilh ths fine ring of eight by Itudthat，has been denided us．This church is in the North end，in the midst of the Italinn gharter．In an earlicr publichtion of your papar a statement was made that we could ring here all day if we wanted to，as the Italians Fikerl the bells．This statements lowever， las not been confirmed by subsequent ovents，as two petitions bave been presented tof the Bishop proying that the bells be stopped，because they were a musanec，although wes had onl rung there for perions of half－an－hout．The last one was successful，and no more do those bells zwing round to Grandsire and＇Treble Bob．This is not the only peal in Boston that is silent．There es another peal nt the Chureh of th．Advent，which has been silent for ten years．These we hoped to get going，but all advances on our parl were met by refusal．

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## BELLS OF FAMOUS CHURCHES.

## CHELTENHAM.

The other day we recorled the first peal on the twelve neells of Cheltenham 1'arish Chureh-a peal of Grandsire Cingues. Such a performance is of more than passing interest, and serves to recall some noteworthy achievements in this tower. Originally the peal of four or five bells there were reast by Ruchath, of Gloucester, into a peal of cight, the tenor beng 22 cwi. 2 qrs. i6 lbs. in E flat. In 1836 and onwards various peals of Grandsire (including

Tholt's Original on Novenber 5th, 1828 ) and Treble Bob were rung by the local company, at whose sote expense the bells were augmented to ter in the year 1833 , and rehung by James I'uty, of CheltenTam. On September 23rd of that year Gooo of Trelste Ten was rung, the peal being conducted by Elijah Roberts, of Birmingham, of peallapping fame, one other Birminglham man, named Hopkins, being in the peal, the rest, apparently, being local men.
${ }^{13}$ rogress in the Art fluctuated in the succoeding vears: but about 1873 Stecman was practised and a peal of Triples in this tuethod was rang about i 874 by the local
band, conducted by J. Belcher. In 1876, they rang a 5079 Stedman Caters, but the composition turned out to be false. In 1883 two of the bells were recast and the ring rehung, and on the opening day the Rev. F. E. Robinson conducted a true peal of 5079 Stcdman Caters upon them. A few years later two famous peals were rung on the bells, viz., $\mathrm{J}_{3,054}$ Stedman Caters in 8 hrs. 16 mins., on May 12 Ist, 1888 ; and $\mathrm{I}_{5}, 227$ Grandsire Caters in 9 hrs. 43 mins., on April 23 nd, 1889 . Both peals were composed by Henry Johnson, of Birmingham, and conducted by W. T. Pates, who, at that time, had had practically no practice in calling Stedman Caters, and none whatever in Grandsire Caters. Both these were excellent peals.

It was in igIz that the betls were augmented to twelve, by the gift of Alderman and Mrs. Winterbotham, of Cheltenham, the two trebles being added and the rest tuned, re. hung in an iron frame, and quarter turned by Messrs. Mears and Stainbank. It is most gratifying to see that the band at this tower is matntaining the traditions of the past, and we hope that before long further performances of Cinques and Maximus may be recorded on these bells -the lightest twelve hung in a church tower.

## SELT=ALIGNING BEARINGS. <br> Ta the Rolion.

Bir, - Ufader the above heading, Mr- Fiughes writes to jou that this class of bearimg is quite tumedessary and malikaly to prove permanently subistaciory.

As regards the fist contenlion, ho mav be right it metal frames are usod-thoagh eron so I an disposed to think lint the gimbal principla will be fonm to give the best Icsults-but, wilh timber frames, whicin continually if slighty vary their alignoment with orery change of thamıdity, the self-adjusting benring is a most defmite advantage, for with it, so far as my experience poes, bells reur equally wrell from Fear's ond to foar's ond, wil honly oil as a lubricant,
ds to tbe second contention, I can only say that vearly thirty sears Ggo I burs our two tenors laere iu bearings, the extet counter-part of tha one which I was shrprised to see illustrated in yout journal; the Bth and 9th in a modification of the same, will castiren in placo of gun metal steps-few peopld know that the coeficient friction is less between steel and castriron than betwedn steel amd gur metat-and tho remainder its a simple cost-iron cup and ball norangement in two picoes only. Al nre lubricated by oil-saaked bumehes of catton wick. which
 altended.

Hie have never had the slightest troable witl any of ihe bells, nar has thare evar been any tendency to the sloppinoss which Nir, Hughes prophesies, nind when I last examined them some two years ago, I could detect no appreciable delerioration.

I may add that these bells aro rumg for an hour and a lialf avery Sunday, in addition to the two handred or so of peals that luve been schieved or attempted.-Yours fattlufully.

## MATHEMATICAL PROOF ASKED FOR.

## To the Editor.

Dear Sir,- $\mathrm{I}_{11}$ the account of the opeving of York Minster bells in your issue of April 3rd, I read " self-aligning bearings whicht eliminate alt shook to the framework and consequently to the tower." A mero ringing engineer would tike to see a proof of this statement. In the first place, in a rigid frame there is no shock to eliminate, except that due to the blow of the clapper. rille resulting impulsive reaction is very small. In the case of a bell of 12 ewt., which I recently have worked out, this blow on the frame due to the action of the chapper acted almost vertically downwards, and was egniznaleut to that due to a weight of one pond falling three inches. Seendly, if there is slock it is due to faulty workmanship oither in the frame or bearings, or to faulty steeple-kecping, which has allowed frame or bearings to work loose. In cition ense, how is it to be eliminated by a sulf-aligying beatint?
I can quite see the paint of a self-aligning bearing in a timber frame, whith is liable to twist under varions atmosstheric conditions. At the presert time I nin irying to collect all possible uscful information as to frames in relation to towers. That is my reason for troutling you with this guestion. $A$ statement of opinion is of no use to me, unless backed by strict mathematical prof.-Yours; ete.,

Thure is one point of special interest in the peal recortis, and that is that the total reached by the Association on December 31st, 1913. Wis exactly 3,000. Last year, as on Lwu presious occasions, the Associalion caried of the distinction of a "doukse first," being first in number of peats rung and in point ralue. This record of 3,000 peals is another unigue distinction, for no other Association luas yet reached this total, althontroth fwo or threw are well on the way. The towers which have contribuled most langely to the aggtegate are: Debenlam, 147: St. Mary-le-Tower, Ipswich, 135: Leiston, 123: Fenley, 117: Diss, 96: Framlingham, 92: Pulhan St. Mary Magdolewe, 92: Pulhmm St. Mary-the-Firgin, 87: Redrnhath. 83: Thormbm Magna, 82: Felmingham, 81: Framlingham and Kelsale, 74 each; St. Poter Mancraft, Norwich, and St. Margaret's, Ipswich, 64 each; and Lye andi Snxtingham, 52 each.
