## DIVISION OF AREAS.

In more than one Association there is at present an unsethled feeling arising out of the recent diocesan divisions, and the reorganisation schemes of various societies. The difliculties which might arise in connection with the altered circumstances brought about by ecclesiastical changes in regard to several dioceses were touched upon in this column some time ago, and it looks as if the troubles may possibly materialise, although we sincerely hope that nothing will arise to disturb the friendly relations which exist between ringing organisations throughout the country

The division of the dioceses of Ely and Norwich, with the consequent constitution of the new diocese of St. Edmundsbury, is one in which the societies, which cover the arca concerned, have been brought " face to face with a difficult situation," to put it in the words of the Ely Association report. The strongest and most active part of the Ely Association is the Sudbury Archdeaconry, which contains more than half of the affiliated towers, and quite half the members, to say nothing of the fact that in this branch, which includes Bury St. Edmunds itself, more than half of last jear's peals were rung. It is easy to understand, therefore, the feeling witl? which the Ely Association would view the lopping off of this, their strongest limb, if any change takes place. The Nonwich Assaciation's meeting at Eye was strongly in favour of retaining the Association in its present form, that is, to avoid any division of the area which has hitherto been covered. If this feeling is representative of the Association-and, coming from the district chiefly concerned, there is no reason to doubt that it is-it means that the larger portion of the diocese of St. Edmundsbury will remain with Norwich.

Under such an arrangement, unless the actual geographical area is prescribed, the possibility of overlapping and friction between the two organisations has got to be faced. If amicable relations are to be maintaned-and in the interests of the Art and its objects it is devoutly to be wished that they may-the matter will need very careful handling on both sicles. It is a subject which, we believe, will be better met and dealt witt rather than that the Associations should allow it merely to drift in the hope that it may settle itself. That is a policy which, sooner or later, is bound to be disastrous, whereas if it is handled at once, and with tact, anything in the shape of unfriendy rivalry may be avoided.

We had hoped that this might have been the case in Yorkshire, where the county Association's reorganisation scheme is being put into operation. From the trend of opinion at the Cleveland and North Yorkshire Associafion's meeting, however, it does not appear that the relationship of the two societies in the North Riding is altogether amicable.

Now they eame into in diocese, part of which was organised on county lines, and lip was quite sure all wished that there shoutd he some close bond between the Iwo Asscciations (hear, hear). What shapra it would lake was, of course, a matter for cunsideration. Wosi of them had personal friends among tho ringers in Herts. He hoped the new-Bislop would accept the position as patron of the Association. As one of the Rural Daus of the new diactse he was bidden to St . The success of the lady ringers at Portishead should be an inducement to other bands to enlist the services of the ladies.
