## THE CLERGY AND RINGING,

The suggestion that was put forward last week for reaching the clergy through the various official diocesan publications, with the influence of the bishops behind them, bas brought a letter from "An Old Riaging Parson," whose experience in the past was not of an encouraging nature. There will be many association secretaries to-day ready to endorse the view that the clergy, as a body, are difficutt to move in most things connected with ringing. Direct appeals to them only have an effect in a small minority of instances, and it was the hope that the method we suggested last week would facilitate the a wakening of interest which induced us to put it forward. There are probably few parishes where the clergy have not got their hands constantly full, and they hesitate to enter upon anything which appears likely to involve further distraction from their work. Yet one really wonders how they can, for instance, draw any distinction between the care of the organ and the demands of the choir-which seldon fail to find a sympathetic spot in an incumbent's heart-and the care of the bells and the requirements of the ringerswhich not infrequentiy are largely neglected.

It is true that slowly the work of the associations and individual ringers is bringing to the clerical mind a larger interest in matters that appertain to the belfry; but, unfortunately, there is still in existence in many quarters the spirit of which our correspondent speaks, when be says,
"No class of men are so jealous and suspicious of interference from outside as the parochial clergy." For that reason it seems to us that there is something to be gained by approaching these incumbents through a channel which they are likely to view with less disfavour. "An Old Ringing Parson"-has found that clerical intervention, however well intentioned and tactfully made, is not always welcome, and his long experience places his opinion beyond question. His suggestion that the object in view might be better attained by the ringing laity therefore merits attention, especially when it becomes a matter of direct appeal. We doubt, however, whether in a publication like a diocesan gazette, the contribution of, say, an average ringing layman would carry the weight which would be given to an article by one of the clergy. But be that as it may, we hope the effort will be made to influence the bishops to permit diocesan ringing matters and subjects of real general importance relating to bells to be dealt with with some regularity in those official publications. The result certainly could do no harm to the cause of rimging, and it certainly has the possibilities of much good. At any rate, we are convinced that the various associations would be well advised to make some effort in the direction advocated, and few ought to be at a loss to find a correspondent with sufficient knowledge, interest and weigth willing to undertake this light service.

do not now think that Serlonstone Stedman is likely to conmend itself to ringers in the first flimht, but it is ensy to ring, and ite mursion 1 quatities-it having five musical course ends to every notational course $\rightarrow$ shonld make it accepiable, tonth to the non-ringing listeners, and to Whose ringers who are unahle to approciate delicate musical effects. Oe course, long lengths of multiple donging are not pleasitsg when'discordiant pairs of bells are together behind, and it is aform of Stedman that offers great seope to compogers slauld it come into use ns a step-ping-stone from Grandsire to the ordiarry Cambriage form of the methom.

## ＊REACHING THE CLERGY．＂

## To the Editor．

Sir，－To enlist the interest of the clergy in the care of their beilg and encouragement of their ringers is an ohject as neeestary as it is desirable；but how dificult，none but those who have tried it know． lior some 20 years，as one of the chiof officials of a County Associn－ tion，I did my bosi，by correspondence，as opportunity offered，and by circulating among the clergy of our leading towers the excellent re－ port of the Central Council on＂The Care and Preservation of Boils＂： but with disappointing result．Few of those to whom I sent the panphlet read it carefilly；most of then never read it at all．Onn very leading Rector（who afterwards beenmo an Archdeacon and Suf． fragan Bishop）told me plainly that＂le conld not see what ohange vinging had to do with the Charch＂r mad when I pleaded for its en－ couragement in his own belfry，then given over to a＂stony＂bard， he intimated politely that I bad bettor miud my own business．It nevar occurred to me，I confess，to appent to aur Bishop．But had 1 done so，he would first have taken counsel with that wary incumbenf， who was his right－hand man in diocesan matters．Both of them，I may add，have since passed awry．

It is prossible that the object of＂reaching the clergy＂＇may bo better attained by the ringmg laity．No class of men are 60 jealous and suspicious of interference from outside as the parochial clergy： and udvice on a matter within their own control from the ciargy of other parishes，however tatfully offered，is not always weloome．If Bishops will take the matter up，they may succeed better．Meampile， I hope that the ringing clergy of the present day may have fetter shecess with their brethren than wo of an older generation enjoyed．－ Yours，etc．，

## THE＂CLOCKING＂OF BELLS．

To the Editpr．
Deny Sir，－I notice in your issue of August 10th a letter upon tho above subject from Canon Papillon（to whom an apology is due from mo for neglecting his proper designation in my last letter－I wroto in haste）．The list of names be quotes，logelher wilh his own position and standing in the Exercise，claim from all ringers a deferentinl re gard for any opinion upon the tase（or abuse）of bells with which they are associated．But，for nll that，I slill hold that even a good case may be weakened by over－statement or tho reverse，and my ？celing is that the arguments which lave been used againgt＂clocking＂go too far in one direction，and not fay onough in auother．Why，for instance， shouk only this particular method of chiming be attacked？It seems to ne that other methods are open to the same class of objection，wix． that they place the bell and its fittiugs at the mercy of the chimer． Chiming with the ropes lends itself to very varied modulation，and the force of the blow，as well as the wear and tell of gudgeons，bear－ ings，and ropes，is dependent in Ereat measure upon the discretion of tho operator．I have shudderod somelimes af the thumps administered by the heavy－handed，the jouthful，snd the vigorous，in chining by this method，especially upon small bells，while our friend，the villaga sexton（not every sexton，of course，bus the particular type which Canon Papillon you，sir，and myself have in our mindsl，alwaye scem to profor to pull his rope on tho slant at an angle of about 45 degrees from the mousehole，thereby giving it far greater wear than any ring－ ing rould do．

My suggestion，to come to a practical point，would be either to abolisk chiming altogether，or to point out carofully its possibilities and its dangers，and to insist upon the necessity of safeguarling ita use，whatever method may be adopted．A cet of rules and cautions placed in a promiment position in every tower，might bo a means to wards this end．

One great danger，which yolir article of fuly 27 th dial not mention， that which comes from the hammers of clocis，which owing to the steel springs being out of adjustment，or cortoded by the dampnoss of the air（this is especially the cabo near the seaside），are often allowed to lie flat upon the bells，to the detriment of the sound，and the danger of the bell．It is quite astorishing to notice how often clock hammers are suffered to offend in this woy through negiect．I cout quote numerous instances，but have already trespassed too much upar your space．－Fours faillifilly

The veteran's practical ringing conmenced as fir buck as 1840. i'revious to that he used to chime the curfew at eight o'clock at aighl, hils period of ringing being well over 77 years. His frst peal of 5040 changes was rung in three hours, at Mansfield Parifh Church, in 1868 . A peal was considerod n rare achievernent in those days. During his ringing career he has taken part in peals of Grandsire Triples, I'reble Bob Major. Double Norwich Major, and Siedman Triplcs. Mr, Gosling atill takes an active part in ringing, and enjoys all his faculties, except for a wealeness in his legs, ibe result of an accident two years ago.
He has heen a member of the Midland Counties Aseociation for many yeare, and has rung in most of the towns in the Midands. His last peal wrs at Strnford-cn-Soar. on the occasion of his 86th birthday

## BELL ROPES CUT AT ECTON.

Owing to the mischicrous and, apparenily, objectless act on the part of some visitors to Ecton Church last week, says ihe "Northampton Daily Chronicle," the usual chiming of the bells for service on Sunday could not take place. The tower und belfry have no mans of approach from the church itself, but are approached by a separato enfrance from the churchyard, and the Eey of the door at this entrance is kept by the sexton. When the place was locked up on Sunday night rebel, everything appeared to be in order, but on Tuesday it was found that the yofes of ithreo of the sis bella had been eut clean thiongh high up in the tower.
The authors of the misclicief have not ut present been discoverci. but the matiter was this arcel placed in the hands of the police at Wellinghorough, gutd steps are being taken which it is hoped will lead in their being found.
It has trauspired that several parties risited the church on Bank Eoliday, and that some of them went to the tower, borrowing tho key from the sexion for that purpoce.
Since the above paragraph appeared, the following letter has been published in the same newspaper:-

Sir,-Regarding the cutting of bell ropes it Eeton Church last week, I am prepared to pay the sum of $£ 1$ (one pound sterling) to the person who shall give suchi information to the police as shall lead to the conpiction of the offender or affenders, my reason being that my boy was there as a boy scout; end this, I trust, will either clear or convict the Boy Scouts.-Yours truly,
