## THE SPITTLE MEMORIAL.

The announcement is mads today that the Spittle Memorial Fund is about to be closed, 60 that those who wish to subscribe should do so at once. It is fitting that the memory of such a fine old Churcbman and Ringer should be perpetuated in a manner which will remind generations yet to come of a long and active career of duty. loyally discharged, and of a life of simple faith, which closed full of years and honour. There were few better known ringers in the West Midlands than Mr. Spittle, and certainly none who were more highly esteemed.

Samuel Spittle was in 60 me respects a unique figure in his native district of Dudley. He was a type of which there are few survivals at the present day, and be was respected and honoured by his fellow townsmen to a degree which many might envy. It must be almost, if not quite, a record fot a man to hold one public office fot the unbroken period of 73 years, yet this is what Mr. Spittle did, for at the age of nine, while a chorister, he was appointed Junior Beadle of St. Thomas' Church, his duties being to unlock the old-fashioned pews for the pew holders and to see them comfortably seated. Up to the time of his death Samuel Spittle was Beadle of Dudley Parish Church, and in that long period of more than three-score years and ten he was absent from his duties less than half a dozen times-a record of fidelity and reliability as stimulating as it is remarkable.
He held other public offices, which he discharged with the same single-minded purpose as that with which he served the Church, but it is bis connection with ringing which more closely concerns those who, through the Dudley Guild, are being asked to subscribe to a suitable memorial. For sixty-six years at least Samuel Spittle was a bell ringer, and enthusiasm and enterprise marked his efforts in the promotion of the art, and his interest in it never flagged to the end of his days. He was one of those who recognised the value of the organisation of ringing, and he helped to Found the Worcestershire Association, of which he was the first Master, and to establish the Dudley and District Guijd, in which he held a similar office up to the time of his death. His help and his example largely made for the success of both these societies, and by their rise and advanco ringing as a whole has benefited. Indirectly, therefore, the whole Exercise owes a debt to Samuel Spittle, and there must be many outside his large circle of intimate driends who would like to take a hand in perpetuating his memory. It is not to late to help in swelling the fund, and those who would care to do sa strould tend on their contributions at orice, elther to Mr. Harry Mason, the present Master, or Mr. Herbbert Knight, the bon. sec.

## RINQER WINS MILITARY MEDAL.

Another ringer las gaiaed distinction on the field of lattole, the Military Medal having boon nwardecl to Pte. J. C. Dean, of the "Royal Weat Kents, ${ }^{\prime}$ for his gallambry is bringing in wotnded under heary slell fre at. Klein, on July 3let and August lat. Ho was miso recently awarded a certifierte for his reseue work undel fire. Ple. Dean is a nember of the Central Northats Asscciation, and bolonge to All Saints', Northampton, and wha proving himself a gifted ringer whan the war claimed his services. He las rung tweive peals up to the pro sent, his first peas (on lihs treble) having been rung on July $12 \mathrm{iL}, 1913$. His next peal was rung Soplember 64h, 1913, and in "Odd Changes" in " The Ringing World " of Sept. 12th, 1913, the following paragraphs appearext: "With many people the practical side of ringing, whit, indeof, is really rope sight, is quite agift. At Harleatone, Northants, last Saturday, Joseph C. Dean rang hig first peal with a bob bell. was a peal in three Minor methods, including Kent and Oxford Treble Bob. Yet Mr. Dean had never rung 120 in sither of these before ptiat ing for the peal. It is wonderful how some people 'tumble' to mothod directly thoy pull off in it." Pfo. Doan rang the 5th to a seven method peal of Minor on Juno 271.h, 1914. He has also rung two peals of Stedman Triples (one on tenor) and one peal of Superlative Susprise Major on the treble. Hia farewell touch bofore joining up was a quarter-peal of Superlative on an inside bell. Fo has also rumg a course of Fondon and Bristol on an inside bell, so that his Fnrlestone porformance pas not a mare " flash in the pan, ", and bis good work is Flanders shows that whatsobver hia hands find to do le doow with all his might.

## THE DEATH OF CORPL, BELTON.

By the death of Corpl. T. W. Belton, which we recorded labl week the Salop Archidiaconal Guild loses a valuable member. $H_{e}$ Fiac werr. ing in the Shbropshire Ligat Infantry, and fell in action about a fortnight ago. Ho was a very fine ringer and striker on any number on belle from 8 to 12, and was a member of the St. Chad's Society, Shrawsbury. It wus at that church thas ho rang lis \&irst quarter-peals of Stedman Cinques Bob Royal and Maximus, and Grandsire Cinque as well as Doublo Norwich Mnjor. He and the conductor were ohl friends, und were ongrged on tha same ostate. The six peals which Corpl. Belton rang for the Salop Guild ineluded one of Bob Majo: (the frrst on St. Cliad's bells, and tha heaviest in the Midande), one of Stedmen Triples, one of Grandsire, and three of Minor.

## RECIPROCAI PROOF.

## To the Editor.

Sir,-Soeing Mr. Baker's lolter in last week's "Ringing World," am prompted to add a few woris to his rasertions. First, ag legards Leytonskono Stedman Caters. Unfortunately, I was boo busy at the time is was piblished to go into figures, and at the present moment cannot find the issue which contrined it. But taking the mothod a given by Mr. Baker, it appoars to ba mothigg more or less than an application of the Erin Principle to ten bells, quita legitimute, accomb ing to all established rules, atml ohvionsly haviag several falso poture ends. Su much for that.
But Mr. Buker goos on tou mention Reciprocal Proof, Before commitsing myself to paper, I rend through a pracis of Mr. Baker's wrilinge that I wrote in past days, when I had nore time, and, postibly more enthusiasm. Like many retective stories, they mog't anand the light of precis. Mr. Baker's Reciprocal Proof is merely a tow nis grmentry-not z proot of trath, Now I nm fully ngreed with Mr Bnker that it is absolutely necessary for all methods, primeiples, and gystenis to bo symmetrical, But I mould add that the Law of wim netry bas never yes heon gatisphetorily proved. Wo oflen forgot. think, that the fheory of change ringing is a science in its infanayso mach so- that we are by no means all agreed, exen ont the exac disfinition of the science, and that, therefare, very fow of nur prow positions have heen formally proved.
Some day, when we have paid off our soores against Billy the German, I hope to try and prove the law, unless somebody forestalle me. Meanwhile, I accept if implicitly, in common wilh other people. Wher Mr. Baker makes a mistake is in calling hiv dost of its fulfiment proot. It if ithis misnomer which lias led to much misunderetandirg. It led to a false peal once, I believe. Reciprocal Proof is no test of the truth of a method; but it is a test, and a very good oue, of its symmetry, if properly applied. Here asain I think Mr. Baker stimblies a little. He insisis on starting ererything from rounds with the re sule that Reciproeal Proof (or shall we call it the Reciprocal I'est? sometimes makes methods, which inspection shows to be symmetrieul apparar not to bo so. Now this is untair. A few seconds thongh xhonld show that methods, ete., being romed bitocks can start and finist at any row without allerimg the working. And this, mrely, is pron That if methods which are symmelrical appear umsymmetrion whey started from rounde, they ought to be started from some other mow, Yours buly

## PORTISHEAD CHURCH.

There is in the tower of St. Peter's Ohurch, at Portishead, Some: 4et. a fine ring of eight bells, with a tenor that weighe 16 gwi. The auw whe built in the reign of Edward II.; the tower rbout the middlo of the 15th century; the tori, a relic of earlier days, is Norman. Whe pulpit is entered by some curious steps which gave access to the Rondlofk that ai one time had a place in the ehureh. The old croms has accupied its mesent pesition in tho ehurchyard fors 120 yeurs, hoforg then it atoral Ht Ihe junction of the High Street nud Clumel Rond from time immenorial.
