## THE LENGTH OF A PEAL.

A not infrequent subject of discussion amoug ringers is that of what shou'd constitute the length of a 'peal,' and it is revived again by correspondents, whose views will have been read with interest. The feeling put forward is that in the present day when the public, in the mass, is more bighly strung and kept at a higher state of nervous tension than in the days of our fathers, peals which last for three hours or over are too long to be appreciated, and that the time has come when something of a much shorter length should be recognised as a peal performance.

The present standard for a peal length has stood ever since peal ringing began, just over two hundred years ago, and never at any time, we believe, has any serious claim been set up to call less than 5,000 changes a peal. Thus the recognised standard has behind it the unbroken tradition and practice of two centuries, and it will be long before tbat qualification will be atandoned; and not only is it a matter of tradition and practice, but there is substantial argument in favour of maintaining the present number. To begin with, there are mathematical grounds, inasmuch as the recognised lengtio is the extent of Triples, which, in some respects, is the basis of peal ringing. Then, also, there is the question of the value of the peal as a performance. To reduce it by, say, a thousand changes would take off far more than twenty per cent. of its worth, for it is the last hour of a peal that counts and which requires the biggest output of both physical effort and mental alertness. To cut down the number of changes substantially would reduce a peal to a value hardly worth consideration.

If the length of time for whici bells are ta be rung at a stretch is to be reduced, ringers already have it open to them to content themselves with 'touches,' and, while we do not gainsay the statement that there are times and places where a peal of five thousand changes is too long, we think there is no reason whatever for altering the present standard of a 'peal.' Ring shorter leagths by all means if the occasion demands it, but do not lower the standard of the peal. We do not want peal ringing made easier; the tendency should be in the other direction; but to shorten the length materially would at once cheapen the performance to such an extent that peais would be looked upon with little or no more honour than touches. At the same time we fully endorse the view toat the public must in these days be considered, and that there are places where a peal under any circumstances can be a source of annoyance. It is here that ringers should observe restraint, and content thenseives with the shorter lengths which, while satisfying the occasion, must perforce fall short of the designation of 'a peal.'
