## THE PRACTICE OF HIGHER METHODS

In an address to members of the Oxford Guild at a meeting of the Sonning Deanery Branch the Master (the kev. C. W. O. Jenkyn) gave some very sound advice, which might be taken to beart by ringers outside as well as inside the Oxford Diocesan Guild. There is no one in the Exercise more respected than the Master of the Oxford Guild, and advice from him, matured by experience, carries weight through all sections of the ringing community. One point apon whicl the Rev. Cecil Jenkyn touched may well be emphasised, and that is the need for greater endeavout to achieve the ringing of the higher methods. It is not a new question ; but it is just as necessary that it should be kept in the forefront of ringing policy now as it ever was.

The last three or four decades have seen an immense advance in the standard of the methods generally practised. Thirty years or so ago the ringers who aspired to Surprise ringing formed a very limited circle; to-day there are numerous bands throughout the country, and a Surprise peal is not looked upon as an extraordinary performance, unless the attendant circumstances are exceptional. Yet, when the growth of change ringing is considered, it is doubtful if the practice of the higher methods has grown as much as it ought to have done in comparison. Leaving out of the question change ringing in the more difficult methods on more than eight bells, which is restricted more particularly by the facilities which a man has for practising on the higher numbers, there ought to be no limitation to the aspirations which a change ringer should have to rise from one stage to another. Unfortunately too many are content to be satisfied with ringing the plain methods, or, at the outside, what are known as the Four standard methods. But these are only the bottom rungs of the ladder, which should serve as steps on the way to higher achievements.

Encouragement will go a long way towards increasing the practice of the higher methods, and get erally speaking the enthusiast in ringing will seek out his own opportanities for advancement. More, however, might be done by the ringing organisations. They send out instructors to teach the rudiments of change ringing; but why should not conpetent ringers be sent out to instruct bands in methods something bigher than Grandsire or Plain Bob? A good many who have already attained to skill in ringing advanced methods may be inclined to say that those who want to learn should do as others before them have doneteach themselves. That, however, should not be the policy of the present day; and if at the moment no other course is open, more might be done on the lines of the Oxford Guitd, who bave arranged combined practices for Surprise methods.

A fow rounds were rung immediately the dedication wa complete, and subsequently tho bells wete ming to various methods'from Grandbire Triples to London Surprise. The elergy aud ringers were entertrined to ter in St. Marr's Church Holse, the vistors being cordially welcomed by the Ficar (tho Rev. Cocil F. Ayerst), who is presikient of the Hertford County Associntion, and is uJso a ringer. He took patt in several touches during the oreuiug. The genema opinion expressed by all the ringots present and olbers was that the founders (Messrs. Gillete and Joinston) had succeded in castimg a beantiful peal, winich, heard from a distanco, added stild more to their charm. The ringers desire to pxpress their mppreciation of the Vimurs generous insitation, and the lavish hospitality meted to thom. The occasion was a very happy remion, carrying many of those present back in dhouglit to days long dgo when they were fushed with thu enthisiasm of Fouth. The towowing is taten from the fablet which is exhibited in the riuging room:-
