## THE DEMANDS UPON SPACE.

The discussion which took place at the recent meeting of the Middlesex Association and the resolution which was passed with regard to "The Ringing World " is interesting and not altogether unwelcome. It is interesting because it reveals how little the average ringer knows of the ditficulties which beset such a publication as this in these abnormal times, and it is not unwelcome because it gives an opportunity of replying to criticisms which sometimes reach us and which, on this occasion, are publicly made. We have endeavoured from time to time to show how the handicap of the existing conditions prevents us from expanding as we would desire, but it is evidently necessary to remind the Exercise of some of the facts that govern the position.

The resolution asks us to put aside advertisements, peals and correspondence on the subject of composition in order to publish touches and other natter which would be beneficial to beginners. Now, no one is more anxious than we are to cater for those who are taking the firnt steps in the art, but those who argue that this should be done to the exclusion of matters which interest those who have gone beyond the beginner stage have lost the sense of proportion. It is, we think, unnecessary here to enter into a justification of the publication of peal reports and of correspondence in which those interested in the highec: branches of the art take part. Not unnaturally mank people who send a contribution to a paper, whether it de : peal, a touch, alletter, or the report of a meeting, consider that their particular item is the most important for the next issue; but it is the unprejudiced mind in the editorial chair, coupled with the knowledge of the mechanical limitations which have to be coped with, that must finatly decide which contributions shall have precedence, and we ask our contributors to believe that the choice of what shall appear is made as far as possible in the best interests of the majorty of the readers, and without "fear or favour, affection or ill-will."

But now we come to the wider issue, which is touched upon by the suggestion that a sactifice of advertisements should be one of the methods by which the limitations of space shouid be overcome. Those who talk in this strain are unaware that the present cost of printing and distributing " The Ringing World "' is just about' one farthing more per copy than the twopence which they pay for it, so that without a substantial advertisement revenue there could be no "Ringing World " at all. If we make a comparison with the pre-war cost of production, it mar surprise many to know that paper such as this journali is

printed upon is costing five times as much and labour is three times as high now as in 1914. Paper is still soaring, and was never higher in war time, while one never quite knows when another demand for higher wages may have to be met. With these complications, it is impossible to do more than carry on from week to week, making the best of the position.

The solution of the problem of providing for the wants of beginners is not on the lines suggested at the Middlesex meeting, viz., the exclusion of matters of interest to others more advanced, or the elimination of one of the most important sources of revenue, but a larger paper. This, at a time when paper is more difficult to obtain than under the war-time rationing scheme, is practically impossible. In any case, it could only be done at an increased charge. One of the difficulties of newspapers is that, milike the draper or the grocer, the owner is not able to pass on every rise in the cost of production and material to the customer. The alternative lirs between bring content for a time with the present limitations or having a bigger joumal at a higher price. This is no easy choice, for no one knows better than we do the growing demand for expansion, nor, we presume, the obstacles to a larger journal circulating, as "The Ringing Word " does, among it lintited public.
