## NEW SUGGESTIONS ON ORGANISATION

The organisation of ringing associations has, in the course of years, developed in a variety of forms, but. chiefly upon a territorial basis, with the county or diocese as the unit. When the towers affiliated were comparatively few in numbers such units were easily run with centralised administration, but the expansion brought about by the rapid growth in the popularity of change ringing resulted in decentralisation being necessarily resorted to in the case of most societies. In regard to peal ringing, however, the only acknowledged claims are those of the parent associations, and the branch or division to which the ringers may belong is only of subsidiary importance.

On this matter some interesting points are raised by the Rev. H. Drake, who is keenly interested in the improvement of the administrative machinery of the Exercise, and he puts forward a number of suggestions which will doubtless be read and debated with interest among ringers. Brielly his most important points are that associations for peal recording purposes should be broken up into smaller units, such as Archdeaconries, and that every peal should be credited to the Archdeaconry in which it is rung, irrespective of the association from which the ringers come. Further, Mr. Drake suggests that the Central Council should be amented in its constitution in order that administrative details and matters of organisation should be dealt with by representatives of these Archdeaconry units, while the scientific section is left in the hands of a body appointed on existing lines.

Such suggestions are a little too sweeping to pass an opinion upon without very careful thought, and there are objections as well as advantages to be considered. This, however, ought not to prevent the suggestions outlined by Mr. Drake being ventilated and discussed. We think it hardly likely that at first sight many associations, or ringers, for that mateer, will jump at the proposals; but the more one thinks about the suggestions the more one has to admit that there are phases of the proposals which commend themselves as being worth development. The organisation of the Exercise has proceeded steadily in one groove for many years, and it is not fikely to be upset in any revolutionary manner ; but it does not follow that it cannot be improved upon, and, if for so other teason, Mr. Drake's suggestions can be welcomed as providing a starting point for discussion. We should tike to see consideration of matters such as this beginaing at district meetings and going forward in due course for debate at the annual meetings of the associations, where matured thought could then find expression and a carcfully considered decision be arrived at.

## ASSOCIA'IONS AND PEALS. <br> BY THE REV. A. DliAKid.

The practice of ringers scoring peals uway from lhomo las long reon bone of contention. It certeinly does not sem to many fan that ringers, living and ustailly ringing in one part of the courtry, should go to unother part, and score a peal to the credtb of another Associdtion, simply because they all huppen to belong to it. This custom arose whel ringing societies were few and far between; and so fons ats tho whole country was not covered, it could hady be arranged other. wise. Now, howerer, there is no reason for conlinutag a course was. must, wecessarily lend to friction and jealousy. At this time, ioo, all records lave been upset by the war, and it will be a yeat or two before things get into so normal a course as to make any eort of comparison wery useful. Therefore, now is clearly the time if ever, when a now rule could be made. Let us all see what is practicable; and, to begin with, I will suggest a way out of the diffculty.

For the wirpose of recording peals, let the whole country be rigiony marked ont into units; and let all peais bo scoved, so fur ats the yearly analysis is concerned, to the unit within whose borders it is actuilly rung. I woukl sugrest that the unit be an Archdeaconry. This usually consists of between 100 and 200 parishics, and is a distrite comfortably worked by one secretary. Those who do not beloug to the Atothdencomry could be elected members before statting, in the usual way as at present. This method would encouraye more local spinit ansons ringers, aud woutcl decidedly hely to increase the number of tingiug towers. The present systcu often hindors the increase of ringers.
The larger associations could go on as at present, aud in their reports hecord peals, for their own satisfachion, which are rung by then own members. It way loe thought, at first sight, that this would tenil to reduce the nembership of the larger associations; but it seems much more probable that, anyding which inereased the number of rineers would also jncronse their membership.
Indeer these smadler societies might be affilialed to the larger ones. Alrendy there are some societies for different Archdenconmes, and b.rns method of working has proved its value. They can do work whe, would be impossille if too much ground is attempted to be corered.
In Dorset I adopted the following man: A circular letter was sent to every incumbent, churchwarden, aud captain of ringers in the district, pointing out the use of the sosiety, even where there was only one bell. and n. copy was also sent to erory new incumbent. In this way we' got hold of places where new bells were proposed; or suggested the idee of new bells where they would not otherwise have been thought of. A four-page leaflet was brought out containing a list of all towers where there were ringers. Their names were pll priuted, and starred if they belonged to the society, with a cross in additio 1. if they were chavge ringers. The day ind how of the weekly practice was recorded, torether with the methods rung. If this were to be done uniformly in ench of these societies-and printed, suy, at the 'kinting World ' office-all these leaflets could be bound up each year or so into a most usefti] Ringers' Year Book. I venture to think this would do more to help the catse of ringing throughout the country than ang other single effort.
The restlt of our" "intensive culture ' of Dorset, is that there are now two flomishing societies, where at that time there wns not a single land in goine order.
If some such scheme as this were carried out, the Central Counct might be altered to corruspond. Let the existing arrangements be callried on exactly as at present; but let them discuss only seientific quesfions, and let them meet only in the tuorning. Then let a mew boxiy be constituter by letidug each of the mess tervitorial societies send one representative This could bo easily so arranted as to consist largely of the same people as the other (the present body). Jet thesc only discuss practical guestions, and let them meet in the afterwoon.
In this way people who are bored stiff with scientific questions, but are keen on organisation, or vice versa, could ench attend the meetins they-were iaterosted in, and avoid the other. The present arraugement, loy which members are forced to attend what does not iuterest them in the least, while it is intensely interesting to athers, must always canse complaiuts. The combined working of the two botics would uot be so difficult as at first sight might inplear' ; and is in consstiant use wifh Beards of Guaviians and Distriet Councils.
At present both the small society for the Archeaconry of siaftion, and the overgrown Midland Connties Association (to each of which 1 liave bolongetl), stand on the same footing with regard to the analys:5 of peals. This is mot good for either. It discourages the smatler societies b. y putting them in a hopeless position, and makes the largen nasociations think that they are doing very well, when protrally $t$ an are mot " pulling their weynt ' by any meatis.
