## SUNDAY RINGERS' MEETINGS.

A new and interesting departure has been made by the Southern Branch of the Worcestershire Association, by the holding of a Sunday meeting for Sunday service ringers. The proceedings can certainly be counted an entire success. Ringing during the afternoon was followed by a tea and further touches on the bells before evening service, which was attended by the ringers, and which included such features as the cse of the association's special form of service, an appropriate address, delivered, of course, not only to the ringers, but to a general congregation, and a shost handbell recital. The meeting was heid at Bredons Norton at the instigation of the curate-in-charge (the Rev. F. C. Champion), who is bimself a ringer. So successful was the gathering that, we are informed, similar meetings are likely to be arranged in other parts of the county, and the experiment will doubtless be watched with interest. Indeed, we think it likely that it may be readily copied by many other associations, for there are points about it which open up new possibilities.

The majority of the ordinary meetings of associations are held on Saturdays, and there are generally a number of members regularly prevented by business from attending and sbaring the pleasure which is obtained from these gatherings. Sunday Service meetings would remove the handicap under which these ringers are placed. Beyond this, special features of the service can be made to bring the ringers' work very prominently before the congregatior of the church where the meeting is beld, as in the case at Bredons Norton. The services at the ordinary meetings are seldom attended by any but the ringers themselves, and the sermons preached-dare we say it ?-- do not often contain anything that is new. Indeed, if truth be told, ringers sometimes get just a little tired of hearing the oft-repeated story of the bells. When, however, the history, the uses, and the message of the bells can be delivered to the wider congregation present at an ordinary service, the value of the sermon may be infinitely greater, in that it may serve to extend public knowledge of what the science of ringing and the ringers' work consist. In this way useful results may follow from this new departure.
At the same time we venture to utter just a word of warning. Excellent as these gatherings are likely to be, it must not be forgotten that the ringer's Sunday duty is to his own church, and this duty ought not to be neglected without adequate arrangements having been made to see that the service ringing is properly maintained. This means that whole bands ought not to desert their towers together,

Upon another point, too, consideration must be exercised, and that is to avoid, as far as possible, involving others in Sunday Iabour to provide teas, etc. If these two matters are borne in mind, the general institation of Sunday meetings for service ringers might result in considerably extending Interest in the art.

## BELFRY GOSSIP.

Mr. G. R. Fandon, who has been elected Master of the College Youths for the ensuing year, is a native of Bourton-on-the-Hill, Gloucestershire, where he learned to pull a bell at the early gege of eight years. His connection with ringing in London dates from 1895, when he joined St. Luke's Society, Chelsea, of which he was Master in 1897 and 1898. He was elected Master of the St. James' Society (now London Connty Associstion), in 1907, and filled the office for several terms. Fo has also represonted that Society on the Central Council.
During the winter, 1899-1900, the bells of Norbury, Cheshire, were rehung by William Greenleaf, of Hereford, and on a board in the belfry commemorating this, there is reconded a aeven method peal rung on November 10 th , 1900 , which was the first peal in that number of methods for the Stockport branch of the Chester Diocesan Guild. Now, 21 years later, there has bean rung a peal in twenty-four methods, the first of Tte kind, for it comprises a greater number of methorls tham ever before spliced into esven complete 720 's,

We are told that a trophy of some value and historical intereat may be wou by any ringer with sufficient enorgy and ability to pilot the Manchester Town Hall tenor through a 5,000 .
The prize consists of a U.S. dollar note, No. D. 88062388 A., formerly the property of Mr. Richard Newton, now of Boston, U.S.A. It is at present in the bauds of another "Dick."
The present holder stipulates that the peal must be Royal or Major. So roll up, strong men of London, Birmingham, and elsewhere! The Town Hall tenor is a somewhat formidable bell, weirhing 52 cwts , but goos quite wel!, and the tower is awailable for a peal attempt almost any Sahurday.
The Towers and Belfriss Committee of the Central Council and the Saciobs for the Preservation of Ancient Buildings have ad length got into real contact with one another. This is a very happy step, and should lead to a better understanding of the different points of riew which are held on the respective sifles. We understand that a joint statement may shortly be jssued.

At the little village of Bodiam, Sussex, is a ring of five bells bung in 1761, aud the first peal has just been rung on thom by a band from Salehurst. The eveut creared quite a skir, and Mr. A. Elsom, for 27 years churchwarden, and most of tha local ringers, were present to witues the pealf which is practically the first change ringiag on the bells. They were all greatly interested.

Next Sunday will be the 110th anniversary of the first peal of Oxford Treble Bob Royal rung on handbells, It was achieved at Sheffield on December 3rd, 1B11, by ringers who on October 30tin in the same fear had scored the first peal of Oxford Freble Eight, with. of course, an additional man.
December 4th is an interesting amiversary to the College Youths, for it was on that day in 1803 that they rang their first peal of Stedman Triples. This wss at St. Mary 4 bbot's, Kensington.
In the year 1731, on December 6th, a peni of Stedman Triples was rung at St, Michael's, Coslany, Norwich. It was oomposed aud conducted by Jifward Crane, and from the ancient records appears to have caused a lot of feeling with the rival company at St. Peter Mancroft.

Henry Johnson's 'fipe ones of Stedman Caters ( 11,111 changes), the longest length in the method at the time, was rung by the College Fouths at Fulham on December 8th, 1883, in $7 \mathrm{hrs}, 12$ mins. It was conducted by James Pettit.

The len thousand of Grandsire Gaters rung at Appleton on November 19th is gpecially interesting, from the iact that the conductor (Mr. G. Holifield, senr.), tools part 33 zears ago in the 15,041 Stedman Caters (the record at that date) ruvg on the same bells
The reference made a fortnight ago in our columans to the proposal, abanloned oll account of the war, for a Clarlos Henry Hattergley memorial dinner at Sheffield, brings from a Yorkshire worthy the information that it is the intention of the Hattersley Memorial Committee to bonour the late G.O.M. of the Exercise when charges are not so sworbitant, and the trade of the city more fourishing.
We lave seen a very arbistic mutter roil designed and exectited by one of the young ringers at All Saints', Tlkley, upon which the record of atteadances for 1922 is to be kept. Patience and skill mark the penmanship of the draughtsman, and keen interest is manifest among the young band, several of whom are still in their teens.
The ringer of the strin the peal at Shoreditch, on November 14th, was William (not Erneat) Bottrill.

Peals have beer rung by bands of Freemasons, Oddfellows, Foresterm, and other societies, and there is now a moveraent on foot to attempt a peal by members of tho Ancient Order of Druids. The diffealty at the moment is to make ap the band, and ringing memfers of the society are asked to communicate with Mr. W. Farley, City Saw Mills, Wella.

## ' SIMPSON' TUNING. <br> \section*{To the Editor.}

Sir,-As no one has replied at present to Mr. Jerram's protest against Simpson tuning, perhape I may be allowed, as one living within 100 yards of a Simpson tuned ring in constant uge to say a few words in defence of tho system. One advantago it possesses over the old method of tuning is that it is prosible to get a better effect from lighter bells. For example, the tenor bell of our ring here, witich weigbs 7h cwt., is a fac more rignifed bell than the teaor, say, of St. Androw's, Cambridge, which is about 11 cwt.
For all light bells of about 5 cwt and
controvertible that the about 5 cwt . and under, I regard it an incondrovertible that the Simpson method is rasty superior, for the renen that the hamonies, especially the hum notes of these bells, are very agercsive, and it is, therefore, of the utmost importance wat they should be in tune with the dominant note of the bell. ## LEICESTER'S PROPOSED RING OF TWELVE.

## AN APPEAL.

## To the Editor.

Sir,-I am making an urgent'appeal to all xingors on behalf of the Hells of St. Marganet's, Leicester, which are now abous to be increased to twelve. Onr grand old chuich has always been famous for its fine bells and historians, and others of the past liave testifiad to this, notably John Brand in : Popular Antiquities,: who states that the Enest peal of ten bells in England is said to bo in St. Margaret's, Leicester.' We, of the present day, have ondeavoured to carry on this spirit and uphold this tradition, and when the bedls became dangerous and unringable, the Church Couneil was prevailed upon to take the matter in hand and have them rehung. It was found, on thorough examination, that the bells themselves could not uphold their traditions, and so it whe unamimously decided to recast them with additional metal, and make then worthy" of the name they bore. Messis. J. Taylor and Co. have dono this with great skill, and once more St. Margeret's, Leicester, will possess one of the finest peals in the kinglom (certainly in the Midland Counties), bung in a new steel and iron frame, with all new fittings.
It was also decided to raise the peal to twelve, providing the nenessayy funds could be raised, and as one beli was practically assured by promises of ten 510 subscriptions, the Echeme will be carried out.
There still remains gome 8700 yet before the bella van be cleared of dabt, and as the church has already raised $\mathrm{fl}, 700$, we appeal to wider public, and especially ringers who are intenested, to help us in thig great work.
There will be a public procession of the bells through Leicester, ou Saturday, December 10th, and they will be dedicated (on the floor of the ehureh) on Sunday morning, December 1lth, by the Lord Bishop of Peterborough. They will be hung and ready for ringing on Christmas Day by the St. Marganet's ringers, and I hope to arrange an 'open 'yingers' day shor'ty afterwards, which will be announced in your columns.

Any sulbscriptions, however small, will bo gratefully received by the nnder-mentioned, on behalf of the Vicar and Church Council.

## BALL BEARINGS FOR BELLS. <br> To the Editor.

Dear sir, Permit me to writo a few lines in tho defence of bell bearings for bells. Comparing ball or roller bearings with the oldfashioned gun-metal berrings. we find that the former ofer five times more resistance to friction fhen the latter. Ifence it would seem that five times as much wear wifl ake place in the gill-metal bearinge than the ball bearings. Therefore, the ball bearings will lat five times as long as the gun-metal. This fact alone should be suficient to renove aup doubt that fhere may be as to the premaneut utility of ball bearings.

These bearings do not require as much atiention as the ordinary bype, and require oil only at loutr intervals. Being totally enclosed it is impossible for dust or moisture to gain oceess to them. This cannot be said of gun-metal bearings.

Mr. J. R. Jerram says we must aim at simpligity. I beg to difer. What we must aina at and go "all out' for is effciency and progress. IL is a poor repayment to those who bave laboured go hard and spent so much time in perfecting the science of lells to have the results of their researohes etigmntised as fads. - Yours truly,

The call at 3 shortens the course by two leads, cutting out the leads in Which the tenot and 7th would have been in the slow. The Znd and Yrd are never in 6th's place at the course ends, snd the composition is in the least number of changes for a three-part peal on the plen. The first four coures repeated give a quarter-peal, 1 , 890 changes.

## THE EXTENSION OF METEODS. <br> To the Editor.

Sir,-Years ago it was pointed out that there ame two rival theorie as to what the extension of a method to higher numbers ought to be. (a) There ave the practical ringers who have mastered a method. (say, London) on eight, aud cesive a 10 -bell method to practiee, which they can call the same name. They wast sometbing ringable, and they expect the vork af individual bells to be similar on both numbers.
(b) There are the acientistr mul mathematicians who ale seeking the constructional equivalent.
In the present state of our knowledge is it posiible to get the Nxerciso to decide definitely between (a) and (b)? Consider a few of the pros and cone.
Tractical reasone in favour of (a) are obvious, and from the theoretical point of aview it can be plausibly argued that in the existing confusion as to the nomenclature of methods generally litile harm ean be done by giving a name to a method to which it is not strictly entitled. But, in this case, the inevitable result will be incessant controvergy. Now it is Lrondon, tomorrow it will be Bristol and Superlative. Naturally each inveatigator thinks his own Niscovery the nearest and best, and there will be just as much divergence of opinjon between practical ringers. Thete is, and can bo, from this point of view, no definite test for you to apply.
If yon decide to follow (b) something of the same dificulty exists, and will do until jou get an approach towards general agreement ab to what the construction of a method actually is. But even now you cen go a good way towards ruling out incorrect extensions. A true one will probably be opposed at firbt, but will almost certainly make its way by its inherent excellence. Fou may not be able to prove it is a (or the) correct extension; but instinctively you feel it to be 80. Where you have many rixals, as in Trondon; and, abave all, alternative solutions offered at intervals by the same investigatora, each with plausible claims and not oae of them singled out by general acclamation, you will not err greatly in suspecting that neither is a real extension, though it may be a variation in somewhat of the same way as Oxford and Fent are rariations of one method, or, again, Grandsire Major and Bob Major.
Further, it wil] be more than probable in this case that no trua extension on this number of bells does it fact exist, at any rate in a ringable form. Illuatrations of what is laid down nbove will be found in the history of Canbridge and Double Norwich. In the last-named method it seems more or less argreed now that Shipway was risht. There are, moreover, some reasons for thinking that Mr. Law James is, perhaps, mistaken in regarding tie Maximus wariation, with placem in 5-6.7-8 as the true extension.
A second criterion easily applied is this : any mathematician who approaches the subject without prejudice will tell you that the probability is great-in fact, so great as to amount to practical certaintor (Mr. Trollope goes too far in putting it as an absolute necossify), that if a method will extend from 6 to 8 and on to 10 by the same process you will arrive at an extension to 12 . If it will not do so fou may be sure that in (say) 99,999 cases out of 100,000 there is a diaw in the reasoning: in other woids, the succession 6, 8. 10, is not is true mathematical progression.
These two criteria which are capable of application by many practical ringers shoukd go far townrds provirling a solntion of the question for all practical purposes in ang given case, and there is more than a likelifood that the solution wil! he scient!inally sound.-. Yours, efc.,

Sir,-In reply to Mr. James Sraith, for hali-pull ringing bells should be muffed on the handstmke. This ensures the back belts turning up in the right order at the open leads, i.e., the $5-6{ }^{\prime}$ or 7 - 8 's open, and the $8-5$ 's or $8-7 \mathrm{~F}$, mufled. For whole-pull ringing, which is, to my mind, far the best method to adopt when the bells are belf-mumed, they should be rmufted at back stroke, thas prodiueing a Eaft ceho to ench change.
