## THE CARE OF RINGING CHAMBERS.

The Llandalf and Monmouth Diocesan Association could not have seized upon a better opportunity than a meeting at which an Archdeacon was present for a resolution, calling attention to the desirability of all ring ing chambers receiving the same regular care and attention, by those responsible for the upleep of churches, as the other parts of these buildings receive. Upon the Archdeacon devolves the responsibility of seeing that church authorities, among other things, exercise due care in maintaining the churches, and the Archtleacon of Llandalf quickly seized upon the opportunity which the resolution provided, of assuring his association that it would be a pleasure to him to bring this matter before the clergy at his next visitation.
We hope that many other associations will follow the example set by that for the Diocese of Llandaff and Monmouth, and, if they cannot get an Archeleacon to their meetings, they will carry their resolution to the Archdeacons and get them interested in it. "There is no portion of the church buiding which, in the past, has been mote neglected than the belfry, and even to-day the condition of many ringing chambers is lamentable. There are, of course, a large number of belfries up and down the country which are a pattern of cleanliness and neatness, and fully in keeping with the rest of the church, but the condition of most of these is duc to the zeal of the ringers themselwes, and not to any effort made by the church authorities. In assisting the cause of 'belfry reform ' the clergy have lost no opportunity of reminding ringers that the beffry is a part of God's House, but many of these same clergy have done nothing to make the ringing chamber conform worthily, in its upkeep and appearance, with the resti of the building.

Ringing chambers have been, and in some cases still are, made the lumber room of the church, the receptacle for all unwanted furniture, where dust and cobwebs accumulate for years. Indeed, there is to-day at one of the most famous London churches, a belfry almost as black as a chinney. This sort of thing ought not to be, Ringers, by their own labour and often at their own monetary cost, have worked wonders in many towers, but it is not right that this matter should be left entirely to them. The choir are not called upon to clean out the choir stalls, and the ringing chamber should be just as carefully attended to by the church authorities as the nave, the chancel or the vestry. Where the condition of affairs shows obvious neglect, an association would, we imagine, be fully warranted in bringing the matter to the notice of the church authorities, through the incumbent I or the Parochial Council; and if tactful representation had no effect, a direct appeal to the Archdeacon to bring his influence to bear might have some result.

## A PEAL IN 30 METHODS.

GllEAT AOHIEVEMENT BY A CHESHIRE COMPANX.
A triumph of six-bell ringing has been achieved by the enterprising bsurl at Norbury, Cheshire, where on New Years Day a peal of Minor in no less that 30 methods, all contained within the scope at seven true extents, was rung. The peal was rung at the third attempt. The first was on December 23'd, and the second on Boxims Day. These attempts failed in the fourth 720 each time. On both owasions the striking was very good, and the first trip upset everything. No trip occurred is the final aitempt, and the striking throughout was faultless.

Alt lhe methods will be found in the present edition of the C. C . Collection of Legitimate methods, with the exception of Bogedore, Thowell, Grove Delight, Poynton and Overton, which, however, are also regular. Fifteen of the methods have, on previous occasions, been first rung and anamed by the Norbary company.

To those ringers whose efforts are largely limited to six bells, there is ample seope in the Cential Council's Collection, and what can be done by way of increasing juterest, wariety and intricacy is demonstrated by the men at Nombury. No one can say that six bell ringing need be ' lame' after this.
In addition to the Norbury peat, it is interesting fo note that a peal in fourteen Surprise methods was rung at Thornham Magna on December 30th.

## THE FIRST PEAL AT EAST ILSLEY.

In the peal columas last weok was recorded the first peal in the tower at Jast Ilsley, Berks. It was decided at the couclusion of the great war to add a bell to the old five in the tower as a mernorial to 21 men of the parish who gave their lives (most of this has been printed bofore, but 'Lest we forget, Mr. Erlitor, we would like it printed again). Well, after great disappointments and difficulties tackled and deleated, a seventh bell was promised prorided the octave was completed, and after a preat fete one summer day in 1919 the job was placed with the firm of Mears and Stainbank, who took the old bells away, fond taned them, cast three trebles, than which no sweeter little bells swing in the county, and hung the peal on a specially designed frame to suit the tower.
Tt was hoped that an entirely local band would ring the first peal, but the difercnce between five belis and eight has proved too big a jump at present, so it was agreed by all that a peal ought to be rung hefore 1922 went out. Therefore, five Ilsley men, with the help of three natives of adjoining parishes. Fang a Berkshiremen's peal. which was excollently struck throughout. It very seldom lappens

What several men in a peal can say that they fist rang a beil in a certain lower on a poor old ring of five That would take all the pulling aud all the handing that men could give them to get a good six-score, and that now they have rung a first-rate peal on one of tue sweetest litte rings of eight that can be found. Hearty congrutula tions from the villagers, and especially from the local ringers who were left outside, stowed the good feeling umong tho band. Tho wisitors were enferfained by Mr. Ams Mrs. W. ## DEATH OF MR. ЭOHN THACKRAY.

A PIONEER OF HANDBELE RINGING IN LIPDS.
As briety anmounced in our last isstre, the death has occured at Upper Atmley, Leeds, of Mr. John Tluackray. The deceased, who Wats in bis foth year, comnenced ringing in the wear 1881, when tho phal of six bells was liting in Clirist Claurch, uppur drmpey, ant when opportunity offered, rapidly advanced to he one of the formost six bell ringers in the district, being possessed of a fine ear, which made lim noted for good striking. In the dags when hambell ringing was liltle known in the county, in conjunctian with Mr. J. Whitaker (now a veteran indecd), sund his Lrother, Mr. J. Thaekray, under the leadership of $\mathbf{M r}$. H. Williams, trag the firsb peals in various methods out handbells, in the city, one of the greatest of their exploits, being what is beljeved to he the ouly Iandbell peal of Gundsire Triples ever rung with the conductor blindiolded. For many years the cleceased earnesty advocaterl the addition of two trebles at Armley, and early in 1922 the peal was rehning by Messrs. M"aylor. Largely owiug to the energies displayed by Mr. Thackray two trebles were added to the existing peal of six, and this was a soturce of greath gratification to him.
The funcral took place on Tucsday, December 26th, when a large and representative gathering of vingerg assembled at Clust Churoz where the first part of the funeral service wis held. Dr. W. Bradley (Mus.Doc. Oxon) officiated at the organ, while the Ficar (the Rev. T. Goodchild) conducter a most impressive serwice. The Dead March ' in Satal was played at the conclusion, after which the interment tcok place in Ammey Cemetery, close by the church, atid within sound of the bells of which he was so fond, A plain course of Grandsire Triples whs rumg on handbells at the gravesifie by Messrs. C. Fratt, W, Bartou, F. Williams and P. J. Jolinson, as a lase tribute of respect to an old friend. who endensed himself to all with whom hee came in contact by his kindly and anassumiag diavactar, whila his lass will he keenly felt, at Armley, where the land owe much to his self-sancibeing labours.-R.I.P.

## BELFRY GOSSIP.

On January 13th, 1772, a peal of 6,048 Imperial Treble Boly was rung at St, Michael Coslany, Norwich, where, a year earlier, on January 15th, $1771,5,700$ Nor"ich Courth Boh had been rung by the Norwich scholars. This last named was, we believe, the first peal in the Nownich variation of Court Bob, of which there is any record. Teals of Court Bob in other rariations had previously been rung fu Loudou.
On January 18th, 1844, a record was put up at St. Peter Mancroft, Norwich, when a peal of 7,126 Stedman Cincues was ramy in 5 lus. 17 mins., and the peal tablet recording the performance affirms that the bold and regular striking attracted the notice of the public, and is allowed to exceed any other performance over attempled in England upon Twelve Bolls.' Charles Middleton, whose name is so inseparably limked with Cambridge Surprise Major, and Henry Hubbayd, who in his day did mucls work for the att, took part in this peal.

The first peal of Forward Maximus was ramg at St, Matin's, Birmingham, twenty years ago tomorrow.

On January 14th, 1899, the St. Peter's Society; Brighton, then at the zenith of their fame, rang the first peal of London Surprise in the City of London. That was at Sit. Stephen's, Coleman Sircet, it we renember alight.
At a meeting of Gravesend Council, on Dec 20th, it was unanimously yesolved to contribute from the borough funds one hundrett guineas towards the vecasting of the bells at the Parish Church.
Mr. John Owerton has been re-elected Ringirg Master of the Bridgwortla Branch of the Hereford Diocesan Guild, and Mr. W. Hayward hon. secretary. It is hoped that more of tho towers in tho district will join the Guild during the coming year.
There are not many towers in which a peat of Cambridge Major, Royai and Maximus lias been rung, but St. Martin's Guild, Birmingham, have just completed the circuit on the famous bells in the Bull Ring.

## ENGLISH BELLS FOR AMERICA.

MESSRS, GYLLETT AND JOHNSTON'S GREAT CONTRACT.
The carillon of 42 bells ordered by Mr. J. D. Rockefeller, from the celebrated Croydon foundry of Messrs. Gillete and Johnston, for the campanile of the Park Avenue Bapfist Clurch, New York, will bo the largest on the American Cantinent, and, owing to the perrection to which the founders have brouglt the art of bell tuning, it will also be nnequalled for purity of toue atal tune.
The bells will be played by a skilled carilloneur, by means of a hand clavier, fitted also with foot pedals, this method giving complete control over the volume of sound produced, and cuabling the operator to play the most elaborate music, the great number of the bells allowing for an unlimited repertoire.
Before selecting the Croydon firm, Mr. Rockefeller secured the services of a well-known American musical expert to visit and report to him upon the leading bell founders of America and Europe, and Messrs. Gilett and Johnston are to be congratulated that, after such a critical investigation, they have scoured, in the open market ot the world, a contract of such interest and importance.
The churcli, situated in the mewest and pertiaps the most faslionable avenue in New York Cify, is of an unusual type, inasnuch as, owitg to restricted ground space. the Sunday Sehool classrooms aro built in vertical tiers outside the lofty nave, and are raached by means of large capacity express elevators. The building is surmounted by en exceptionally beautiful Gothic campanile, the delicate tracery of which will allow the music of the bells to be hoard to the luest advantage in the broad boulevard beneath,
At present the largest carillon on the Continent is that of 23 bells, with in 4 -toan tenor, installed by the same founders earlier this year at tho Metropolitan Methodist Clurel, Toronto. Recitals have been given on these belis throughout the summer, and a norelty in the way of carols was prepared for Chrisimas by uniting the voices of the large and perfectly trainedi choir, conducted hy Dr. Fricker, formerly organist of Canterbury Cathedral, Empland, with thos of the hells, the choir singing in the actual belfry, grouped round the carillonenr.

## AN EASY WAY TO SUPERLATIVE

Dear Sir,-Some ringers will make such a fuss of the odd place in Superlative. If the novice will learn what is Treble work, odd place first, odd place last, long dodge last, and lont dodge first, and then ring the method by the treble, the method sloould not be any trouble at all.
Threo times in a course you leave the front and the back. Now my experience has been this, that no mather's son requires to be told that long dodge last is followed by long dodge first. The remaining two occasions you lease it for either odd place first or odd place last-which?
Never nake odd Bth's when the treble is in 7-8, nor make odr Srd's when the treble is in 1-2, but please remember that the odd place does change your direction.
Again, on leaving places the treble is pirlier in the direction you are going, or you leave it behind you. If the treble is not in your path do thie intermediate dodge and then treble work. Ii it is in your path you take it in $3-2$ or $6-7$ according to the direction you are going and do long dodge last.- Youre traly,

## STANMORE BELLS REOPENED.

The bells of the Parish Church of Stanmore. Middesex, entered upon a new phase of their existence on Saturday, Dec. 23rd. This olier was gratefuly accepted, and the whole of the work placet in the hands of Messrs. Mears and Stainbauk. Upon examination it wha foum that No. 5 bell was badly cracked, and would require recasling. The work, how. ever, was pushed alonf, and the sequel came on Salurday, Dec. A3rd. when a shost dediration service, which inchuded special prapers and laymns, was held.-The Reetor gave a brief address, it which he traced the origin of bells from the earliest recorded times.

After the scrvice, the folloming rang thee courses of Steiman Triples: Hubert Fdon 1, Percy Parsloe 2, William Whiteliead 3, Fred Brinkiow 4. Chas. Leman 5, William Seeley 6, Mauriee Hibluert (conductor) 7, George a. Hughes 8. At the couclusion of this the ringers adjourned for tea at the Institute. On returning to the tower, several tonches were rung, the methods including Cambridge, Superlative and Grandsire. Great praise is due to Messis. Mears and Stambank for The splendid splice whicl: has been effected, and also for the 'go' of the bells, which is now perfect

## BELLS TOO NOISY FOR RTNGERS,

## WHE THHERE IS NO BAND AT ANSDELL

The December meeting of the Fylde Branch of the Lancashine Assaciation was held at Ansdell St. Joseplıs Roman Caholic Cburca on Saturday, Dec. 16th. I'his incident, logether winh tilse outhrak of the war, catased a delav of twelve months between the casting of tho bells nand fheir preotion in the tower, the bells reanwhile boing at the fonndry, paid for in advance.
At presamt the ringing einmber is immediately under the bell chamber, tho maise from the hellk is terrific, and they have not oeen rung simee Armistics Day, 1918. Mr. Maries, of Lytham. spent mans arduous months in trwing to get a band of ringers, hut falled, and wo wouder. for the din is too much for any hat the sleadiest of ringers. Originally it was intended to have the ringing chamber in the room lvolow, but this would have intarfered a little with the choir, so the hells ate intringable becauso of the ringers being too mear the bells.
This lower room is from 16 to 18 feet high. and it was the opinion of the moeting that $\&$ foor could be placed midway. wlich would allow ample epace for the choir in the lower part and the ringing chamber ahove.
Tho members found the holls in admirable going order, except the third, which wented a little attention. When this had heen made risht touches of Boh Maior, Stedman Triples. Treble Boh Major auri Minor were Euccessfully brought round. Besideg the usual Blackpoal coatingent, there were two members present from Lytham Parich Cburcli, one from St. AnnessouSea Parish Church, and Mr. nohinson, of the Preston branch.

## WHY NOT A REFERENDYM?

## To the Editor.

Dear Sir,-There are soms things in the Rev. H. B. Woolley's letter in your issue of the 29 h December wifh which I am practically in agreement with him; there are again other things-matters of opinion-as regards which we differ, antl as to which he is, of course, entitled to his own view, and I to minc. But when dofnite statemonts of fact are concorned, there can he wo such latitude allowed. If positive assertions are made they must be acourate. It is here 1 find myself in confict with Mr. Woolley.
To quote from his letier: ' and call it by the same title as the Bishop lias already given to the diocesan association." The exaclith verse is the truth. The title, St. Edmaudsbury and Ipswich, had already been adopted lyy our Suffolk branch just four moaths before the Bishop announced his decision also to take it for the new as sociation. All this is on record in the 'Ringing World,' q.v.:-
Feb. 10th, 1992 , p. 89.-Norwich and lpswicls \&itle extended to N. St. E. and I. meeting at Ipswich Feb 4th.
Feb. 24th, p. 125.-非ecting of Suffolk Diacesan Association at Ipswich, Feb. Ath.
May 12th, p. 297. - Meeting of S.D.A. at Ipswich left it to Bishop to decide as to title.
May 26 h , p. 327.-The Bishop amounces his decision to elmano title to sis. E. and I

I think, therefore, $I$ ann justified in objecting lo that part of $\begin{gathered}\text { d }\end{gathered}$ Woolley's letter, and further in complaining that he does not read his 'Ringing World ' as carefully as he ought.
And to quote again: 'Last is East, and West is West." Exaelly no. We of Narwich, st. E. and I, had always respected that view, innl appreciated the difficulties of the case. May I appeal to history again? The ecclesiastical frontier between E. and W. Suffolk was removed when the new diofese of Si. E. and I. was founded in I914. For a period ofeight years from that date, the Norwich Association was content to accept the old posilion, and made no move. Not so our West Suffolk frienrs, who as carly as May 9th, 1914 (see. Ringing World," August 26thi. 1921, 13. 513), passed a resolution to inaugutate a campaign of penetralion of East Suffolk. Only the war for a time prevemid this action. But in 1921 they slarted the invasion an arnest, first of all by arrogating to themselves a title emhracing the whole of Suffolk (Suftalk Gounty Association); then in 1922 holding a meeting at Ipswich on Felortary 41 ; and lastly demanding the Ent render of our East Suffolk menibers. All whs and more. Now, whon once St. Fimundsbury had gome to Jpswich, how can lpswich reasonabls he deaied the equivalent as yegards Fit. Edmundsbury?
And theu as to the Referendum proposal. A refereudum is generally understood to be a reference to a whole couvtry, or a whole district, collectively upon a given question, as distinct from putiurg that quitestious to the vote sectionally. By claiming the whole diocese as the spliere for the new association, Mr. Woolley, ipso facto, defones the electoral area. Fet he now would decline to abide by a referendum in it.
It is greatly to be regretled that when the present Bishop eame to the diocese lie did not adopt the bold course of becoming pafron of his ringers boith Last and West; fusion would then assuredly have come about-or, lee might lave followed his predecessor, and mado diSuffolk the mucleus of his new diocesan pesociation, whon it might have been relatively easy to win' the West, which was unattached. selecting the minority in the West for his favour, le was juevitably up against, the majority in tho East, which moveover was not unattached. The expectation of easily winuing the Fast failed; as it was bound to do. Recourse has since heen had to a form of coercion. which bas not only failed, but brought in a feeling of bitterness. Hence the present impasse. And now West Suffolk is too small an entity to carry on by itself economically. Yours very truly
