## THE RINGER'S OPPORTUNITY.

The notices appearing in another column remind us all, if nothing else does, of the near approach of the Easter meetings. On Easter Monday, and from then until Whitsun more general meetings of associations are beld than in any similar period of the year. These annual meetings provide members with their one real opporturity of the year to make any change in the policy or management of their society if they desire to do so, although, generally speaking, things seems to be so well managed that the utmost satisfaction prevails, and it is seldom we read of any alteration being made in the general conduct of an association. That may be taken to point to a happy state of affairs, and where domestic bliss reigns it would be a pity to disturb it.

It is not to the management of associations, however, that we want now to direct attention, but to the opportunity which presents itself to the ordinary ringer to make a move for the general good of the Exercise. At the annual meeting of an association a member can bing forward a proposal which, if he can find endorsement for it among bis fellows, can be sent on, with an official backing, to the Central Council, which meets at Whitsun. The Council exists primarily for the advancement of the cause of ringing, and while criticism of the Council, on the ground that at times it has done very litlle for ringing, is very easily and very frequently expressed, ringers as a whole do not seem to realise that they may be in part, and indeed largely responsible for this.
Many ringers appear to imagine that when they have voted for the election of their representatives on the Council they have done all that is necessary. There could not be a greater mistake in our view. If they want the Council to be an active and an effective body they should provide it with work, and surely from among the forty affliated organisations, there ought to be sufficient ideas to provide the Council with an interesting as well as a full agenda whenever it meets. In every other annual conference that we know of, where the members are elected by affliated bodies, subjects for discussion come mainly, if not entirely, from the branches, and in the same way the work of the Councll could be made vastly more valuable if resolutions were sent up from the various associations. This subject is not new. We have discussed it in this column before, and we return to it because we believe that the adoption of the principle which we advocate would be for the eventual benefit of the Exercise, and because, beginning at Easter, there will come the opportunities of putting it into operation. There must be scores of ringers

If I shall not trespass too much on your space I will repeat thic rules for splicing given in ' Thte Ringing Worid,' August 23 rd , 1918.
(1) If two or more methods contain the sume changos in a plain course, one of the metliods may be strbstituted for another, wherever a complelo course occurs belween two consecutive bobs.
(2) Certain groups of Treble Bols methods contain the same changes in a piain lead. In this caso a lead in any method of ithe gronps may be substituted for any oher mothod af any lead end of the 720 , be it plain or bobbed.-Yours faithrally, and with goodwill,

## A YORKSHIRE RINGER'S MEMORIAL.

An interesting lithle eveut took place at St. Mathew's Clurch, Northowram, on Saturday, Feb, 17h, in the dedication of memorial tublet which had been erected in the ringing chamber of that church hy the ringers in memory of one of their own members who had fialen in the war. Tho afternoon began with a short touch of Keut Tucble Bob with the bells half-mufled, followed by a service in the church, conducted by the Vicar (the Rev, G. Watkinson), and during which an address was given by the Rov. C. C. Marshall, president of Ule Yorkshire Associntion.
At tho end of the service the riagers and the relatives repaired to the tower, when tho tablet was dedicated by the Rev. C. O. Marshall. Tho iablet ilself, very worthily executex in oak by a local erafisman, beass the record of a peal rung just a year ago, as follows: "On Saturdny, Feb. 18th, 1922, in 3 lus. 6 min,s a peal of Kent Treble Dob Major ( 5,088 changes), by the local company. Changes per mintie 27.3. Thug with the tells hall-muffled as a tribute of respect 10 Edgar Bottomley, who fell is the great war: G. Bottomley 1. E, Earrar 2, W, Botlomley 3, F. Crossley 4, H. Wright 5, A. Wright 6, J. Greonwool 7, A. Jagger 8. Composod by Wm. Sottanstall, conducted by Albert Jngger. Vicar, liev. G. Wakinson, M.A. Wardens, Mr. Bamister, M, Sutclific." After the service the mufles were taken off, and further tonches were vung, in which the lecal company wore joined by friends [rom Lighteliffe.

## GLOUCESTER AND BRISTOL DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION.

 REVIVAL IN CHELTENHAM BTRANCH.$A$ meeting of the Chellenluam Branch of the Glouvester and Bristol Association was held at Leckhampton, and was altended by abrout 25 members. Mr. G. II. Phillott was in the chair, aud spake very encouragingly ahont the future of the branch.
The officials were elected as follows: Mc. J. Ballinger, chairman; Mr. C. Dyson, representative on Management Commitfee; and W, Yeced, hon. Secretary. Nincteen new members wero elected, and Clarlton Kings was chosen as the next place of meeling on April 14th.
This repival will be especially wolcomed in the association, leecals: unsuccessiful attempts have been made before to organise this difficula area. Neiglbbouring associations have gradually worked thoir way in and clamen many of the towers, but theso it is hoped will now return to the foll of the Gloucester and Bristol Digessan Association.

## QUEEN ALEXANDRA'S DIAMOND JUBLILEE.

At Millon-next-Gravesend, Kent, on Tuesday, March 6th, 780 Plain Bob: Fred M. Mitehell (conductor) 1, Cyril Mitehe[i 2. L. Beckett 3. J. Burles 4, Fred A. Mitehell 5, G. Morrad 6. Firse 720 by C. Milcheil (aged 16, and first attenpt). This was rung on the eve of the 60th anniversary of the landing of Queen Alesandra in England. whicli took place at the Terrace Pjer, in this parish.

## BELLS, OF ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH, EEDINBURGH. <br> To the Editor.

Dear Sir, -In a recent issue of your journal, a question is raised as to the bells of the above church. I regret that I am not able to stato with defnito suthority whether a complete "peal' in the Treble Bob or any other method was ever rung on these bells, but the following particulars taken from the official decords of the Corporatian may be of interest:-

Edinburgh, 9th September, 1858. The sub-committee appointed to look after Sb. Andrew's bells, lave, during the last three montlis, employed Jonas Baldwin as bell zinger and teacher to the other ringers. They have agred pro tempore that he be paid 4s. per week and 6s. for three assistants at 2 s . per week each heing 10 s , per week in all-the amount formerly paid for ringing those bells from Jume 1st to Scptember 1st), so that $£ 610 \mathrm{~s}$, is $\mathrm{now}_{\mathrm{w}}$ due from June lst to September Ist for said service. They recommend a contimution of this arrangenent.'
They also took the opportumity of the Leeds bell ringers passing thraugh Edinburglo of getting tho bells thoroughly tried and tested, for which they ineuried an expense of $£ 315 s$, 6-l., being extra rajlway expenses, the ringers otherwise acting gratuitously on the occasion.
It was found necessary to facilitate the teaching and obviato the noise which the practising on the larger bells oceasions, to purchase a set of handbells, which the sulb-committee did at an expense of 52 .
'This extraordinary expense of $£ 515 \mathrm{~s}$, 6d. can by no chance be repeated, and the sub-committee hope the committeo will recommend to the Council its payment . . . . The magistrales and Council, having considered the foregoint seport, approved thereof, and authorised the Chamberlan to make paymont aecordiugly."

I may add that this is the oldest of the few ringing peals in Scatland. On 12th March, 1788, " the Lord Provost, who is in London, was asked to take the trouble to purchase a bell or bells for the spire of the said chureh.

Ar estimate was produced from William and Thomas Mears, of Whitcchapel, who offered ${ }^{\text {a }}$ a peal of six good and musjeal bells, in tone and tume to each other, including a new frame, bamging, etc., for $£ 387$ 10s. Subsequently it was pointed out 'that there was a material want to make the bells of St. Andrew's spire a complete chyme, and that was to complete the ocbare. That the expence of two trebles would only cost about seventy guineas. Resolved that two trabie bells he written for in addition to those already made for the said spire.'

On 1st July, 1789, we fiud that the City Chamberlain was authorised "to pay to Willian and Thomas Mears two hundred and seveney pounds fourteen shillings and a penny, tho balance of their account amounting to five hundied and twenty pounds fourteen sinil lings ancl a perny sterling.'
It seems, howerer, that the cost of "langing" was not included in the above account, for on 22nd July. 1789 , authority was giver to the City Chamberlain " to pay Edward \$imous forty-ciglat pounds seventeen shillings and twopence halfpeny, being tho expenses of hit journey from and to Loudon, his expenses here, for his time, atr tendance, and labour of putting up a peal of lells in St. Andrew's Churel.'

Unforturately, the bells are now quite unringable, being in a very bad state of repair. The tenor, if my recollection serves me aright, weighs aibout 14 cwt.-Yours faithfuly,

We lear that, after all, Eveslan bells will not be arailable for the record peal atiempt, which it was proposed to make on Easter Monday. It is not unlikely, however, that other hells may be secured.
The cancelling of Eveslam is due to local opposition to a peal of such leagth, and another result has been, Fie hear, the resiguation of Mu. 4 . Middlefon as captain of the local batud.
One of the objections urged rgsinsi the peal, put forward by $\mathrm{Mr}^{2}$
E. A. B. Barmard, who acted as joint hoo. secretary of the Ereshan Tower Bells Restoration Fund in 1910, was on the ground that " the vibrating effects of such a peal, althougli possibly not immediately apparent, might prove most prejudicial to the whole structure of the bell tower
In connection with the opening of the peal of ten at Trowbinge on Easter Monday there is to be a "smoking ' coneert in the Club Room at the White Swall at 7.30 p -m., to which all riugers are invited.
The peai of Doubles pulblishea an liob 23rd was rung at Littio Waldingfield, not freat Waldingriel, as stated.
The new Vicar of Pontefract, the Rev. J. Yonng, in honour of whose izduction by the Archbishop of York, a peal of Kent Treble Hob Royal was rung lash week, is a rimger and a membel of the Yorkshire Association. On the Sunday following ins induction ha visited the belfry, and took part in a course of Grandsire Caters before evening service.
At Bocking, Eisex, the home of J. Murray Hages, Ezra Garter and Sam Hayes, an effort is being made to start, a new band. Bocking was formerly a great centre of Essex ringing, and a place of frequent pilgrimage by College Youths.

About 30 years ago the band became "patd ' ringers-with the iucvitable result. No young hands were brought along, aud as the old ones died out the bells became silent. Tlue Fisser Assaciation is helping in the effort to resuscitate interest, and the church authorities are raising a voluntary company
The handbeli peal to which we recently referred as the firse vecorded perl of Bob Royal 'in hand 'hy the Coliege Fouths, camot claim that distinction. Mr. G. W. Cartmel, the hon. secretary of the Herts Assosiation, informs us that such a peal, the first of Bob Royal by all the band, was rung at St. Alloans on Felb. 16th, 1889, conducted by W. II. L. Buckingham.
'The greatest performance ever clone by any society' was the peal of 6,240 Oxford Treble Boh Maximus at St. Peter Mancroft, Norwich, on March 16th, 1778 , in 5 brs, 22 mins. This peal is recolded in the Cumberland Youths peal book, showing that the Norwich men were at that thme all members of the Cumberlund Society.
It was this peal at Norwich that iuspired the Oollege Youtas to regain the suprenacy for twelve-bell ringing, and eventually resulted in the peal io which we referred a fortnight ago, in which gamuel Muggeridge, single-handed. rang the tenor at Southwark to 7,008 Treble Twelve in whe year 1784. The Norwich peal was rung with lwo men at the tenor.
The Cumberlands were nearly 20 yearg before they regained the vecord, but on March 22nd, 1802. they scoved a peal of 7,104 at Sontinwark, in which J. Marlon raug the tenor in 5 hrs 30 mins. The peal was called by George Gross, junr., but George Gross, genr., also took parli in the peal, as did Witlian Shipway. Malachi Chanmon, James Baruat aud Thonas Pueeves, who were also iu this peal, were with George Gross. senk. in the 12,000 Treble Bob Thoyel, at Shoreditelz on March 27th, 1784-a few days after the College Youths' iriumple at 太outhwark.
At Debenlam, on March L6th, 1767 , a peal of 10,080 Boh Major was rung in 6 lirs. 1 min.
The fund raised to assist the widow and daughter of the late Mr Tom Wallis, of Edenbridge, Kent, amaunted to $£ 136$ 12s., about $£ 10$ of this anmont coming from riugers outside the parish.

Not mamy months ago we had the pleasure of amonmeing that two Kent ladies had stood in a pead together. On Saturday last three resident lady members of the K.C.A, rang in a peal of Grandsire Triples at Marden, vis, Miss Orlebar (Tunbridge Wrells), Mis. H. Eaker (Frittenden) and Miss Thomas (Morsham). They liave established a record for their sex in Kent, and we understand they acquiltel themselves rey well indeed. It was IIs, Baker's first peal witls an inside bell.

## THE GIFFORD MEMORIAL.

A balance sheet of this fund has been issued. The reecipts from subscriptions and bank interest were 226 6s. 9d. The cost of the tablet erected at St. Martin's Clureh, Salisbury, was 224 10s.; the Minor Faculty for evecting the memovial, 125. Gd.; circulars, postages and incidental expenses, 814 As . 3 d .

## BOWDON'S BELLS.

ANOTHER TINE RTNG OT BIGHR FOR CHESIIRE
Afloough Bowdon, or Bogedone, has a chureh history of over thonsind yoars behind it, there is nothing definite as to what bells were there previous to 1714 , but in that year a ring of six, was hung iu an old churct and *Abl. Ruhhall casi us all." Traditiou has it that llis ring was made up of old bells recast and new ones added; when ilie mew church was built tiley were trausferred to it. For some years they have been in very liad ruming order, anditn now they have been recast and two trebles added to complete the actave, the work liaving been entrusted to the well-known Croydon firm of Messrs. Gilleit and Johnston, to whom great eremit is due. Tho juseriptions of the old bells lave been reproduced. and new ones adelerl, Ali are tuaed on the five-tone Simpson primeiple, Jung in a wew thi-steel frame, with bali bearings and ail new fittings. The tenor weighs 141 cwit., and is in the key of F slarp. To this bell is fitted Mescrs. Gillett and Johnston's clapper contol, a very simple device, antoratic in its action, only being effective when the bell is 'up,' thum nilowing the clapper to strike when chimed on the swing. Its funcLon is to lift the clapper away from the sound how after the blow las been delinered. thas allowing the linn to be beard above the rest, with a pleasing and hamonious eftect.
Ou Monday evening, March 5th, the new bells were dedieated hy Whe Lord Bishop of Chester. a goorl comgegation beine present, but those persons who represent, t custom of antiquity amd of universal popularify even in this alleged docaterat aud certainly clanging age, hied themselves to the ringing elimber, where the farnal dedication
 C. L. Hamsion, M.A. hon. C.F.) receiving them, the lacal ringers ringing rounds whilst the procession returaed to the chancel. Although the rime of flie service and the situation of Bowdon made it slifficult for many ringers to be preseat, the Chester Dioersan Guild was fairly well represented, amongst those present being the honsecretary (the Rev. As a fact this cannot be contented, but it may be an open question whether the gain does not outweigh the loss. Dyson, District Master, presiding at lle subsequent meeting, welcomed the ringers, and stated that Bocking frad one at the best rings of eight bells in Essex, the bells theing noted all oven the country for their beautiful tone. Nearing half a century ago there was also a fine band of ringers at llocking. where chango ringing was rung before it was iutrodtuced to Brantree, and Bocking moduced some famous College Yauths. Often members of the Col lege Youths in London came to Bocking to practise mellods which were not rung in tondon and they spent insuructive week-mds with
the Bocking ringers. In those days ringers walked hundreds of miles io spread the kuowledge of their art in tho willages, jueluding those about Bralutree and Bocking. Enthusiaslic yingers often walked to the mearest peals of eight bells, at Great Tey or Greal Walthan, in order to practise eight-bell mathods. The grent desire was to ged the Bocking bells an the go: again, so that theil beautirul music could be heard as of yore (applause).
Mr. C. H. Howard, J.P., Master of the Associations. proposing thanks to the Dean of Bocking and others said Borking had keen a noled place for riugiug, and lie folt sure it wotid hecome so agan. "monc but the bruve cleserve the feir, for he who woulch ing on those Jershore bells must make a long and torthous elimb cind. ing with at aharp lialf left, up a slim get of steps, and cross a none too secure looking drawhridge and enter the cage, for a cage it is, and stabl and ring, like Kahomet in his coffin, suspended 'twixt earth and heaven. On the occasion of the last peal I rang there, the 4 th ringer just looked over the edge of his tago once but that was enough. It was only Rudhall's music hat saved him.
