## RECOGNITION OF CENTRAL COUNCIL'S RULINGS.

The decision of the Hertford County Association upon the recognition of peals is, we think, a step in the right direction. The primary object of the motion at last week's meeting is to bring the Association's rule more in accord with present-day developments in Minor ringing, but it goes further than this. By accepting for its records only such peals as are recognised by the Central Council, it places in the hands of that body the responsibility for the definition of a peal instead of laying down its own rules upon the point. The old rule of the Association provided that no peal of less than 5000 changes on seven bells or upwasds, or seven 720's rung in any one or more Minor methods on six bells, provided that each $7^{20}$ is called differently, shall be entered in the Peal Book. The new rule is really much broader, and its value fies in the recognition of the Central Council as the final authority for deciding what shall and what shall not be deemed a "peal.'

By accepting the resolution proposed by its new President, the Hertford County Association has set an example which we hope to see widely copied, and out of which we think might be developed the idea, so commendable in theory, but so difficult to put into practice, of giving the Central Council some kind of power to insist upon decisions being binding upon all affiliated societies. The subject has already been discussed by the Council, and some attempt made to ascertain the views of the associations and guilds upon the matter; but the response was only a feeble one, as very few of the organisations replied, or even considered the matter.

The Herts Association, however, has opened up a new line. Voluntarily they have agreed to abide by the Council's ruling with regard to what constitutes a peal. If every Association would do the same thing, the first step towards giving the Council some real power would be achieved, and, having got this stage, the Council could then well draw up a code of rules, relating to peals and other matters, which Associations could be asked to subscribe to as a condition of membersfiip of the Council. Associations which had thus given allegiance, would be in honour bound to stand by their undertaking, and we believe that the influence which would thus be exercised would result in individual ringers giving the same adherence to the Council's rulings. The obstacie to making the Council's decisions binding has been the absence of power to enforce then, but if the initiative could come from affiliated bodies in the same way as the Hertford County Association has shown that it can do, the position of the Council would be quickly and effectively strengthened.

Tho towers open for ringing were Chatham (8), St. Margaret's, IRochester (8), Gillingham (8), Rainham (8) and Cliffe-ait-Hoo (8). By kind permission of the Dean, the Rochester Cathedral tell were available from 6 to 7 p.m.
At the committee meeting, held in vestry of St. Mary's, the report of the sub-committee appointerd to examine the tenders for the two memorial bells at Canterbury was read and adopted. It was also docided that auy inscriptions on the bells shouled be in English. The committee agreed that the shillings demanded of the members towarts the cost of the dinuer should be put to the war memorial fund; £3 3 s . was woted towards the rehanging of the bells at, Clife-at-Hoo. Servico followed at 12 noon. It is inferesting to notice that the association service at the last meting held at Clatham in 1901 was the very last held in the old durch before its demolition. The fine old Norman arches in the west wall being part of the origimal charch. much older than the building pulled dowu in 1901, are still retained is the new clurch.
The prayers and lessons were road by the hon, secretary (the Rev. F. J. O. Helmore), and the Rector (the Rev. F. Wiltshire) gave the address from the test (Rom. xxi. 5),' We, being many. are one body in Girist, and everyone nembers one of anolher." Mr. W. E. Pitman, Mus.Bac., assisted ati the organ. Three liymns were sung, the same as those used last year, riz, the Taster Lymn, a special riugers' hymn. and "Light's abode, celestial Salem." The collection for the memorial fand amounted to $E 14 \mathrm{~s}$. 7 d .
At the dinner in the Working Men's Hall the association was honoured by the presenee in the chair of the Mayor of Gatham, Mr. H. F . Whyman, who is also churchwarden of St . Mary's, and 'a bit of a ringer.' The Rector was also present. Besides sundry offials and prominent members of the association there were in the hall one or two celebrities of the ringing world. notably Mr. John Carter, and a gentlenav came even all the way from Birmingham to attend the meeting!
The usual toasts were duly honoured, viz., 'The King, proposed by the Mayor; and ' Archlishop and Olergr, with special thanks to the preacher, proposed by Mr. F. White (T'unbridge Wells), to which the Rector jegponded.
The Secretary proposerl ' fire Health of the Mayor,' remarking that the presence of the chief civic authority at their gathering was most unusual. but for that reason all the more appreciated.-The Mayor, after returning thants, remained for a parly of the business moeting and sigined the minutes.
The secretary then read the report nurl balance sheet, both of hich went to show that the association continued to prosper.
Tho officers were re-elected, with the exception of the auditor, Mr. II. Drake being elected in place of the Rev, P. A. L. Clarke, who is resigning, on taking up the arduous posk of Ticar of Faversham.
Five names having been sent up for representalion in the Central Conncil in 1924, in conlest became necessary. which resulted in the reeleation of the present representatives, the hon, secretary recejing 64 votes, Mr. E. Barnetd $6 \overline{3} \mathrm{Mr}$. J. M. Cheesman 61, Mr, Groombridge 48. and Mr. W. Haiglt 47

This coneluded the business, and the company adjoumed, some to the Chatham tower, and others, it is supposed, to the other towere open for ringiug. A word of thanks is due 10 Mr . S. J. T. Shellock. socrelary of the Chatham bnid, for making sucli exeellent arrange ments for the diuner.
