## THE PROPOSED SUFFOLK SETTLEMENT,

The difficulties which have arisen in ringing attairs in Suftolk, on account of the establishment of the new diocese of St. Edmundsbury and Ipswich, carved out of the old dioceses of Norwich and Ely, seem to be in a fair way of settlement. The recommendations which the committee of the Norwich, St. Edmundsbury and ipswich Diocesan Association have drawn up, and which we have no doubt will be accepted by the members, provide in effect for the restriction of that organisation to the present diocese of Norwich, thus leaving the county of Suffolk without a rival association to the newly-formed Suffolk Guild. The Norwich Diocesan Association will retain its touch with its Sufiolk members by constituting them non-resident life members upon payment of a sum of two shillings on the top of this year's subscription.

We think the recommendations which are now made will be generally looked upon as satisfactory, but the position has to a large extent been forced upon the committee. Faced with the fact that its branch in Suffolk refused to function as an integral part of the Association, there was little to be done, except to drop the attempt to embrace the new diocese, a large part of which had, neither geographically nor by tradition, any connection with the former diocese of Norwich. The desire among many Suffolk ringers for an Association of their own, coupled with the official backing which the new organisation for St. Edmundsbury and Ipswich has got, made any such attempt to hold East Suffolk and to "penetrate, West Suffolk almost foredoomed to failure, and the committee have been wise in realising this position.
The steps by which it is proposed to retain the Suffolk members as 'non-resident life members' may prabably meet with some criticism, as being not altogether generous. Members of 35 years' standing are to become honorary life members, but any lesser period of membership will involve the ringer in a further payment of two shillings on the top of his current subscription. This may be a comparatively small matter, but the treatment of performing members ought scarcely to be on any worse footing than that of honorary members, who, if of eight years' standing, may, on leaving the district, be excused, under Rule VII, from their annual subscription and become life members. This, however, will probably be dealt with when the recommendations come up for confirmation.
We are glad to see the possibility of this vexed question of Suffolk apparently so near settlement, and if the

members in that area are retained under satisfactory financial arrangements there is no reason wiy the best of good feeling should not continue between the two counties. Many Suffolik ringers of to-day have the most loyal affection for the old Association, and while circumstances have made the break almost inevitable, we have no doubt they will see to it that their membership remains, although under changed conditions. From a pealringing point of view the loss of two such centres as Ipswich and Leiston is a serious matter for Norwich, but doubtless efforts will not be lacking to replace these with equally active towers on the other side of the border.

## NORWICH, ST. EDMUNDSBURY \& IPSWICH ASSOCIATION. PROPOSED DISCONTINUANCE OF SUFFOLK ORGANISATHON

A special genoral committoo meeting of the Norwich and St. Edmundsbury aud Ipswieh Diocesan Association was held in the Welfry of SL. Peter Mancroft Cluuch, Norwich, on Thursday, April 26th. th the absence of the president (the Dean of Norwich), the I(ow. W. C. Pearson (Vicar of Henley, Suffolk) was voted to the chair. Supportiny him were Mcessrs, G, P. Burton, J. E. Burton, W. L. Duffieti, Denison Hayward, r. Knights, C. S. Tuthill, and A. L. Coleman (general secretary).

Letters of apology for non-athendance were received from the Rev A. G. Bisth Messis, C. D. Borrett, F. K. Berretr, D. O. Holmes, G T. Pegnall. E. J. Goate and E. E. Diaper.

Mr. A. $\mathrm{j}_{4}$. Colenan, $\mathrm{j}_{\mathrm{p}}$ reviewing the present position of affairs in comection with the St. Edmundsbury and Ipswich Diocesan Branch, satil that a new movemeat had been developing in Suffolk some weeks prior to its elimax at Ipswich on Easter Monday, and there had resulived from the meetings uff Ipswich on that day:-
(it) The formation of a new gssocintion (the Suffolk Guild).
(b) The dissolution of another association the St . Edmundsbury nnd $I_{p s w}$ jel Diocessan Association).
(c) The disbandment of a third body (the St. Edmuadstury and Tprwich Brancla of the N. ant St. ©. and I. Diocesan Association).
All these changes were of vital interest to Suffolk ringers, while 1.14e last pamed concerued inlimately the riugers of the N. St. E. naid I. Association also. The membors then present at Ipswich had rieclined to elect offecrs, and haf passed, instend, a resolution, 'that this branch cesse to exist,' Such a resolution, however, was uliera vires, as the branch laving leeed conslituted under the auspices of the Norwich, St. Edmundsloury and Ipswich Diocesan Association, could only be dissolved constitutlonally by and with tha consent of the whole assaciation. So comparalively few ringers had been preEenl it that meeting that the resolution was open to question as heing representative of the opinion of the members in Suftolk. He had, therefore, taken steps to obtain ab furst hand a real expression of opinion of that brameh, and he had now available something quite dohnite to $\mathrm{l}_{\text {ry }}$ before the committec. He had issued a circular and fucstionnaire to ali the district secretnries and leaders of companies in the Suffolk Branch. Tlie questionnaive was as follows:-
1.- How mavy ringers in your district or company have defnitely decided, to your knowledge, to continue membership of old Association: and their mames?
2.-How many ringers altogether do you anticipate will continue?
3.-Do you think it desirable under present circumstances to conthnue our N. and St, Ed, and Ipswich districts as organised? Or, if not, in any other form?
4.- Do you desire a clango in tille? If so, what do gou suggcest?
5.-Other romarks.

## COMMITTEDS RECOMMENDATIONS.

Tha replies received to that date represented some 222 members, of whom $n$ large majority decided to continue their existing memhership, viz.: 76 as honomay life members (non-resident), 120 as annual subseribers (to be presumed), Saven replies were adverse to continuation of district organisation; five yeplies were in favour of contimation of district organisation. As regarde the title two only replied in favour of the retention of tho present title; thrce were in favour of modification; while eiglit expressed a preferenco for reverting to the original styla, "The Norwich Diocesan Association, ${ }^{\text {² }}$ to cover the arca of the Norwich Diocese only. The majority, however, had expressed no opinion on this important point. Mr. Coleman udded that hare wero several seplies still outstandiug, End he loped the members would kindly send them in before the general meeting of the Association, to be held at Pulluam-Market on SaturAny, June 2nd.
Aftar a long discussion the committe decided to recommend at Hhe general mecting of memhere, that it is not desirable under the present circumstances to contirue the district organisations in Suffolk, mad twa proposals were put forsard for the future title of the Associntion, viz.: (a) The Norwich Diocesan Association; and (b) The Norfolk Guila (for the Diocese of Nonvich).
To mont fhe wishes of the members desiring to retain their memFership, it was resolved to recommend that ati members of 35 yems stanting should be excused any further sabscription; and, ipso facts become honorary lifo members (non-resident); also that all Euffolk memthers who havo paid their subscriptions for 1923 should, with a turther payment of 2 s., berome, ipso facto, lonorary life members (non-resident) in lieu of the usual fee 5s., and that members who liave not paisl their subseriptions for the curvent year will, on paymeat of two years' subscriptions ( 4 s .), become, ipso facto, honorary life members (non-residem). For new members the fece will be 5 s.,

The Secretary amounced that tho branch meeting to be held at Pullam Market on Whit Mouday, May 2lst, had been postpouol to Saturday, June 2nd, at Pulham Market, and would be constituted a general meeting of the association. Much of the business to be transacted at that meeting concerned the menbers of the Suffolk branch, and he hoped that they would be well represanted on that occasion.
It should be poted that any alterations in the constitution of the association will, under Association Tule XI, have to come up for confrmation at the annual general meeting of the association in September nart, and in the meanwhile the association stands constituted as hitherto.

A hearty rote of thanks was passed to the Rev. W. C. Pearson for kindy presiding over the meating.

## CENTRAL NORTHANTS ASSOCIATION. <br> GENERAL SECRETARY'S PRACTIOAL SUGGESTIONS.

There is a striking featared in the report of the general secretary (Mr. D. J. Nichols) of the Central Narthants Association, which has just been issucd. It is very pratifying to record, hed says, the steady growth of the Guilsborough district, which has increased in member ship and added one new tower to its number during the yoar. I regret, to say the Northampton district las lost 46 nombers who have been erossed off the books, which include the ringors of St. Sepulchre, Northampton, who have heen menkers of the associatiou for man? years. I hope they will reconsider their decision, ane before the year is out join the association agaiu.
The number of towers now in union with the association is 65 , decrease of two from last jear. There aro now 450 members, a decrease of 46 from last year, being 43 honorary and 407 ringing members. I would like to call the attention of mernbers to the fact thal there are 26 towers out of the 65 in union with the association which lave not a completer baud of ringers to cmable them to ring all thri bells for the Sunday services.
A great many bands, continnes the reparl, were depleted during the war, which is no doubt still being foll. But I venture to sug gest that there are other reasons which have also some bearing on the question which includes:-

Differences bedween ringera and clergy.
2. Differences amongst ringens themselves.
3. Not enough probationers being brought along to fill up the gaps as thoy occur from various chuses.
4. Those in control of the belfry not having sufficient patience in leaching begimmers.
5. Not snfficient opportusity heing given to promising young ringers to bet es conductors.
6. Others staping away because they do not get ringing "suitable to their taste when there are learners in the tower.
I would sincerely ask the members to give the question their consideration, and in doing so I would like to make the following sug-gestions:-

1. That the committee in each district bring luefore their members that it is desirable that efforts be made to get a complete baud of ringers in eacll tower.
2. District committees should consist of members who are prepared to take an active part in wisiting and assisting the local bands in the district.

That it is desirable that the association should draw up a list of ringers who would be sompetent to give instruction in their district.

That the association allow outror-pocket expenses to instructor: for a stated number of wisits.
The report shows that 44 peals were rung during the year 1922, in which 18 ringers rang their first peal, and 17 weye awarded the association's certificate for laving rung their first peal on a working bell. The association had a satisfactory year, fimancially, the receipts on general account being $£ 5713 \mathrm{~s}$. Gd., and the expenditire . . 46 11s, 512d., leaving a profit on the year's working of . 11 ll 2s, 3tyl. Grants were made to Petervorough Cathedral and Grafton Under wood, of $£ 55 \mathrm{~s}$. and $£ 3 \mathrm{3s}$. respectively, from thie Belfry Repairs Fund for bell restoration. This fund now stands at 15828 . 9d. Thanks are extended to Mr. R, F. Turner on retiring from the position of district sceretar's after' soversl years' hard work.

## THERECORD PEAL OF CAMBRIDGE SURPRISE

Sir,-I was alwaps under the impression that $I$ was the first to obtain the 12,896 Cambridge Surprise Major in the early part of 1907. In August of that year I rang a 5,024 in the method which was an offspring, also tho same thing as publishing the full extent. The fact that the 5,024 turned out false makes no differcupe whatever. The 5,024 was the coveted peal or missing link of the day, and a lot of people were surprised of the discovery.- Yours. etc.

## BELFRY GOSSIP.

The zention made in this column last week of a peal report being writteu out before ther peal was rung, recalls the fact that at Guild ford some years ago a board was actually written lefore the peal (Stedman) was attempled, and it was openelt three days later! 'That,' remarks our correspondent, was a "bit hot.", And we agree. Can anyoue go one bettier?
On May 12th, 1788, at Wakefeld, "a new composition peal of Tripple Bob Tripplea, called Wakefied Delight, consisting of 5,040 in 8 courses comploak, was rung. 'The same set of ringers without changing a man or setting a bell begna another peal of Oxford Single Tripples in twelve courses, consisting of 5,040 called wakefield Surprise, Beath these peals consisted of 10,080 changes were performed, including Raising and Settieing the beils in seven hours and one minute, and wero rang with a exactness and nice distinction, an instance never before done in ye Kingdome.
The ancient report goes on to say, "What adds to the singularity of this performance is-Thete were two fathers, five sons, five brothers, four cousins, one uncle, one nephew, yet only eight persons add onty two names.'
May listh is the anniversary of two long peals. One was 12,096 Graudsire Cators at All Saints', Fulham, wung in 7 hours 50 mins, on Whit Monday, 1837.
The other was the 8,8 , Soperlative Surprise Major at Loughborough in 1894, composed aud couducterl by Nathan Pitstow. The present president of the Central Council look part in that performance.
An interesting recorl has been made by Mr. and Mrs. F. I. Hairs, who have now rung together, handbell peais of Grandsire Triples, Caters and Cinques, Stedman Triples, Caters and Cinques, Bob Major, Roysl and Mifamus, and Kent Treble Bob Major, Royal and Maximus, as well as Double Norwich Hajor.
The peal at St. Margaret's, Westminster, the report of which was published Last week, was Mr. IL Ellis 200th peal. The asterish notifying this goti into the wrong place. Mr. F. G. Nowman, against whose name the 'star' apporred, rang his ro0th peal over 30 years go-in Jalluary, 1893. to be exact.
The answer of the ringers of the long peal of Cambriage Major to 'A Flat,' ye their alleged aspirations for' the future, is simply this-' You're another!?
There will be no ringing on the bells of St. Nicholas' Chureln. Ghisiehurst. until further notice. A. crack has developed in the fower, and the bells require rehangiag.

The peal of Stedman Triples rang at Canterbury Calhedral for the wedding of the Duke of York calls for a line of explanntion. A start was made for a peal of Catens, but one of the band being taken ill, it bad to be abandoned, and Triples was substituted.
According to the 'Lincolnehire Estandard' they do nor do things by halves at Boston. It is reported that for the Royal Wedding, the Parish Church vingers raug ' 1,200 pals of griandsire doubles and 350 poals of grandsire trebles ! In reality it was something far less innposing.

Nearly one Lundred members atfended to take part in the various competitions which were held. The judging was ably done by Messrs. I. D. Johnson (Hinton) and J. Henming (Hampton), who awarded the points as follows: Ilmington: Rising and Falling, 91; Call Changes, 90; Method. 95; total, 276. Willersey: Rising and Falling, 63; Call Changes, 93; Method, 91; total, 247. Blockley: Rising and Falline 71; Call Clauges, 66; total, 137. Moreton-in-Marsh: Rising and Falling, 63; Call Changes, 70; total, 133. Ebrington: Rising and Falling, 26; Call Changes, 73; total, 99. Wootton Wawesn: Rising and Falling, 18; Call Changes, 63: Method, 10; total, 91.
The handsome challenge shield of the Guild goes to the band which obtains the greatest number of points during the year, and a certificate of merit is awarded to the band whinch is second.
$\Delta$ special service was held in the church at $4.30 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$., the preacher being the Rev. W. H. Manton, Vicar of Long Compton. Afterwards tea was provided in the hostel, where justice wre done to an excellent repast.
At the business meeting which followed, the secretary, Mr. A. R. White, intimated lis desire to resign, and Mr. Horace Terry was elected in his stead. It was decided fo hold the autumn meeting al Wootion Wawen on Saturday, Octolser 2713.

## REPORT OF THE ANALYSIS COMMITTEE

In presenting the report for another year, the commithee cousider it a matter for congratulation that it slhows the Exercise to be iu such a progressive condition. While the recovery from the effects of the war is gradual, sucl a condition is well in view. Each year the number of peals rung steadily increases, and as there is every indication of this growth being maintained, it should not be long before the big totais of inmediate pre-war years are surpassed.
The analysis for 1932 shows that 253 mare peals have been rung than in the previous year. The increase in tower bell peals exeects this number, being 365 , while peals on handbells have decreased by 12. The totals for the year are as follows:-


A grand total of 1,885 penls, this being only 474 sloort of the record number.
The Norwiclu aud Jpswich Diocesan Association retian their position at the head of the list for both peals and points, their total being 204 peale, including 23 on haneibells, and 3,476 points. This is an increase over last year of 15 peals and 140 points. The number of other Socicties whicla rang over 100 peals has iucreased by one, being luree as against two as follows:-
Midland Counties Assoeiation, 149 tower bell peals and 2.754 points: Kent County Association, 188 penls (including 3 on handbells) and 1,799 points; and the Lancashire Association, 102 tower bell peals and 1,646 points. It may he noted that while the last-named association has rung exactly the same number of peals as last year, the points value bas increasea by 197. The Durham ant Newcastle Dioresan Association again lave the highest average points per peal, 30.77 for 22 peals (including 1 on landbells) and 677 points. They ere run wery elosely by the Soejety of Royal Cumberland Youths willz 28.18 for 11 tower bell peals and 310 points, St. Martin's Guild being third with 87.69 points for 36 peals (including 15 on handbells), nd 997 points.
The total number of Surprise peals excluding Minor, is 232, an increase of 44 over 1927, clearly slowing the advance is quality as arell as in quantity. Crmbrifife continues to advance in favour, showing an increase of 2 peals of Maximus, 2 of Royal, and 17 of Major; it is also much preferred by Minor ringers. London Major has advanced consiticrably, 37 against 24 peals; while Superlative Major shows a small increase of 5 peals; Bristol has only lield its own with 15 peals. Other Surprise methods rung are: 2 peals each of Clifton and Micdlesex Foyal, 2 of Premier Major, and 1 each of Norfolk, Suffolk, Dublin and Laneaslive Major. Grandsire and Stedman run a olose mace as the farourite method. there being 347 peals of the former and 332 of the latter, excluding Doubles.

Of Major methods, while Fent and Oxford Treble Bob slow 172 peals, a decrease of 17 , Double Norwich contimues to ageend, showing 148 peals agaiust 112 for 1921 . Triples have iucreased by oxactly 100 penls to a total of 505 . Minor and Doubles have also gained ground, slowing 433 peals against 368 last year.
The records show that 690 have joined the ranks of peal ringers, ant in addition 7 lave rung their first peal on tower bells, 12 their first away from the fenor, 73 the first inside, and 52 their first on handbolls; 18 first peals have been rung by local bands, first on the bolls 51, aflev rehanging, addition, etc., 28 . and in the mothod on the hells 199; 85 made their debut as conductors. First pealers of Doubles numbered 18, Minor 88, Triples 34, Majar 104, Caters 57, Royal 51, Cinques 30 , Maximus 12. First peals ${ }^{\text {F }}$ in the method ' were rung in Deubles by 17. Minor 170. Triples 209, Major 627, Caters 120, Royal 94, Cinques 33 and Maximus 13. The number of mufled peals Whs 84, and there were 19 faremell peals; 74 peals were rung in honour of the Royal Wedding, 58 being on tho day of the ceremony.
Performances worthy of special mention are: The first pod on 14 handbelis, the method being Stedman Sextuples hy the St. Martin's Guild the first peal of Real Double Superlative by the Durham and Newcastie Association, and the record leogth. 21,363 changes of Stedmen Caters by the Oxford Diocesan Guild.
A pleasing feature of the year's work is the number of now methods: Clifton and Middlesex Surprise Rogal; Dulblin Premier and Lancashite Surprise Major, Cambridge Court Boh Major on handbells, and in addition the Granta Fariation of Treble Bob Royal for the first time on tower bells.
A rather unusual feature is the peals on 7 bells, two omitting the And, and one without the tenor. The noreltry of the yenr was a peal on handbells rung in bed.
The recording of the peals shows that mucle more eave is taken by those sending them in for publication. The committee however, are still troubled by elight errors. For instance, the name of the same conductor sometimes appears with different initials or with then roversed, and it is dificult to decide without inquiry whether it is the same person or not. If such errors are not corrected by those responsible, the committee witl be compelled in future to record them as prblished.
