## THE EASTER FESTIVAL.

Easter, the greatest festival of the Church, is also the greatest festival of ringing in this country, and following upon the activities of Easter Day, Monday provided opportunities of which the majority of ringers availed themselves. As is usual, there were a great number of peal attempts, but this year no effort was made to put up any new records. Easter Monday is, however, chiefly important from the fact that it is the most popular day among ringing associations for the holding of meetings, and the delightful weather which prevailed on this occasion resulted in some of the best attendances on record. These bank holiday meetings serve an excellent purpose, because they enable practically all members to participate. Saturday or mid-week gatherings must have their limitations because business inevitably prevents one section or another from attending. But with the hank holiday festivals it is different. On these occasions there are tew ringers who are prevented by business ties from attending, and, with a full day at their disposal, even those who live at a distance from the meeting place have an opportunity to be present. On Monday ringers certainly made the most of their chances, and the more important of the meetings were of a fully representative character.

While the business part of the proceedings on these occasions has, of course, considerable importance, it is not the only feature which brings ringers together. The social side has its natural attraction, for in many cases it is the one occasion during the sear when old friends can meet. At the same time, it should not be overlooked that there is a duty attaching to nienbership. Every individual ought to feel pride and concern in the successful and capable management of lis association, but he cannot complain, if he fails to take his part in the conduct of aftairs. The annual meeting is the principal opportunity of discussing questions of policy and improvement, but the occasion is seldom taken advantage of by the ordinary member, who is generally content to leave all initiative to the officers. This is not always a commendable state of affairs, for active interest on the part of the members is an incentive to the executive to achieve progress, and is ustally welcomed.

One gratilying feature anong mafters of interest this Easter has been the very considemala number of rings of bells which have been restored in time for the Chureh's festival. The leading founders thad their hands very full to complete the work demanded of them, and this signt of activity is one of wreat promise. It indicates a continued desire on the part of church authorities to place theit bells in order, and the number of restorations that is now taking place is most encouraging.

Trollope ssfd what he should have said, they would no doubt have done so.
It should also be borne in mind that throe bells were involved, for The clunge should have been 14355678 .
Now, Sir, to be candid. why should I wish to object to my own performance if I had not a substantial reason for doing so? And, suppose I am at faulb, why should Mr. Trollope agree that my objection wins well founded? and why is it a very fine point? ## OFFICIAL MINUTES OF THE 1923 MEETING

The third Session of the eleventh Council (thirty-first meeting) was lucld on Tuesday, May 22pd, at 11 a.m., in the historic Chapter House at Salisbury Cathedral, by kind permission of the Dean and Clrapter, sixty-two members being present.
The chair was taken by the President, Canen Coleridge, who opened the meeting with prryer. The Bishop of Selisbury, who gittended with the Dean and the Archencon of Sarum, gave an address welcoming the Council. The President then expressed the Council's thanks for his words, and for the kindmess of the Dean and Chapter in placing the Chapter House at their disposal.
The Minutes of the last meeting having beon published, were taken as read, and duly confirmed and signed
Apologies of absence were rececired from Mr. G. Bolland, Rev. A. H. F. Boughey, Rev. E. W. Carpenter, Messrs. J. Carter, J. H. Cheesmab, W. T. Cockerill, H. Haigh, C. H. Howard, J. Funt, P. Johnson, E. H. Lewis, W. Lawrence, J. D. Maithews, T. Metcalfe, R. Narboraugh, A. Paddon Smilf, Rev. H. S. T. Richardson, Messrs. J. R. Slarman, W. Storcy, I. W. Wilde and W. T. Wright

The Honorary Secretary and Treasurer, Mr. E. Alexr. Young, presonted the faancial siatement, which showed that the year began wilt a balance at the bank of E 74 llos . 8d., and that the present halance, after the receipts and expenditure of the year had been ilealt with, was $£ 7618 \mathrm{~s}$. 7d. Having been audited in detail by the standing Committce, the statement was, on the proposal of the Rey. FI. Law James, seconded by Canon Elsee, duly accepted.
the Honerary Librarian, the Rov. C. W. O. Jenkyn, then read his statement, and referred to the loss of E 2 l 15s. on sales of books and publications, alco to the fact that there was no book for beginners. Mr. G. P. Burton called attention to some of the peals in the 'Collection of Peals' being false. Messrs. Cave, Trollope, Pulling and the Rev. H. Law James addressed the meeting, and it was agreed to have a printed slip for insertion, in reference to these false peals. Du the motion of the Rer. C. D. P. Davies, seconded by Mr. T. Hervey Beams, the librarian's report was adopted. The Rov. F. 5 . D. Helmore was thanked for ofering to present a copy of "Campanology ' to the library.

 introduced to the president.The Fonorary Librarian then gave a statement in respect to the
Roll of Honour,' with which ho had been instructed to proceed. He reported that he had written to the various secretaries, and the names for tha roll now numbered about 1,100 . It was for the Council to give him further instructions in the matter. After many sug-

ly Mr. T. Hervey Beams, and scconded by Alderman J. S. Prichett, that the wording of the "King's Scroll" should be adepted to the mreface, and that the names slould be written in alphabetical order, followed in each case by the name of the tower and association wilh which the ringer had been specially connected-abbreviated where possible-and that the rall showld conclude wiib the test. "Their nane liveth for evermore.' It was not considered essential that more than the title page should be illuminated, but that the writing should be good and of a permanent characler.
1t was also agreed that the roll should be bound in the hest leather. of the stapeing Committe, having alyeady suggested the payment motion of the sum, together winh the whote proposal, was, on the honorary librarian's Jands.
Election of Honorary Members. The retiring members were the Rev, E. W. Carpenter, Mrs. Edwards, Messrs. J. George and H. W. Wide. These were, on the proposal of the Rev. C. D. P. Davics, reeonded by Mr. T. Hervey Beams, re-clected.
Peal Collection Committee. The President read a letter which had been received from the Ref. F. S. T. Richardson. As no other member of the committiee could tiriow any further Tight on the preseat state of its werk, a hope was expressed that a defnite report would he fortheoming next year. The honorary seeretary was directed to ask the Rev. H. S. T. Richardson to convene a meeting of the tummitiee to that end.
Literature and Presg Committoc. Mr. W. Willson reail a long and interesting report. and moved its adoption, which, being seconded fy lie Rer. C. E. Mathews, was carried. Mr. G. P. Burton, of the contmintee, said that th
pathetic towards ringing.
Methods Committee. On the motion of the Rev. H. Law James, who statert that ihe final inspection of the collection of Plain Major to exceptional pressute of business, had heen unable to complete the task, it was agreed to leave the work, which was now practically reatr for printing, over until next year, when also the cost of printing might be reduced.
Peals analysis Committee. The Rev. A. T. Beeston read his report in full. and moved its adoption, which was seconted by the Rev. C, D. P. Dryies, and carried. The President expressed the Council's indebtedness to the committee for the labour they liad expenicd on Hze report. (See further reference to ihis later.)

Towers and Belirics Committee. In Mr. E. H. Lewis' absonce the Rev. C. W. O. Jenkyn spoko as to the Jenr's work, especially ilt reference to the report issued by the Joint Conference with the Soclety for the Prolection of Ancient Buildings, and moved that the Council adopt the same, This being secondod by Major J. \#. 13. Hesse was carricd. Canon H. J. Elsce expressed gratilication thaty ancient and historio bells wero receiving more care and attention under the auspices of the Council, and Major Hesso gave some interesting observations as to the advantages of ball bearings.
It was proposed by the Honorary Librarian, and secondet hy Canon Baker, and catried, that the Council renounce any copyrighti it may have in the joint roport with the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings.
The Prosident herc said that the Rev. A. T. Beeston desirod to revert to a point. inadverteatly overlooked, viz., the reporl upor method nombuelature. The Rev. A. T. Beeston moved and Aldhimill Clambers seconded ils adoption, which was decinred carried, whercupon consideraible difference of opinion aroso, especially as to College Single Reverse,' Rev. H. Latw James moving, and Mr. J. A. Trollope seconding, the report being referred bnek. Mr. J. W. Parker and the Rev. A. ?. Beeston having defonder their attitude amd several members having spoken, the Council adjourned for luncl. On resuming after the interval, disctussion-proceeded, the Rev. A. I'. Becston, Mr. G. ]. Burton, Rev. F. LI. Ellwards, Rev. E. S. Powell. Messrs, J. A. Trollope and A. F. Marlin Stewart speaking. One of the various suggestions was that the point should be adjourned fnr another year. Uultimately upon it being pointed out that the whole discussion was somewhat irregular, inasmuch as the repart had already been adopted, it was proposed by MI. W. Willson, and seconiled by Mer. J. Perker, that the Council proceed with the naxt husiness, and this was carried by 28 to 20 votes.
Records Committee. The Rev. A. T. Beeston read the report if this committed, giving the progressive lengths rung and the mords of frth peals since the last Cameil meeting. The atteation of the Excreise was directed to tho necessity of claiming any knowu or believed record performances, when pubtishing the same. On the motion of the President, the report was adopted by gencral tomsent. It was proposed by the Honotary Secralary, and seconded hy the Rev. C. D. P. Darjes, and carried, that the collection be typrei and kept by the honorary Finmian for circulation amongst ringers.

Suicnue Museum Exhtbit Commitiea. The Howarary Secretnry gava a general staloment as to the position, and said that the conmintteg had had a meeting will the officers of the muscum, where a thas nucleus of which was now formed. He proposed that a sum of 510 sloulth be spent for a serjes of framed diagrams. Some niferemte of opinion arising, the lev. H. Law Jamea moved, and Mr. W. ## A SHREWSBURY 'JUBILEE.'

On Saturduy, April I2tin, a few friends of the tower warder of St. Clan's, Shrowsbury, mef to athempt a peal of Kent Treble Boh Maximus in honoul of Mr. C. IR. Lijley'e Sotin birthkay, which occurved on April 8th. Messre, Chopman and Page travelled from Manchegter, T. Wilde from Hyde, II. W. Wilde from Eocleston, E. Jenkins from Warringtor, S. Wood frum Asheon-under-Lyue, and H. C. Speacer from Erdingloo. The last named very Eindly made the journey at the last momeni to fill a gap through a scrjous accideat befalling Mr, B. Horton. Mr. Lilley travelled to Birmingham and back, a hundred miles, to get tho banal complested, nud best thanks are due io Mr . Albert walker for obtaining a ringer for the vacancy. The result of the attempt was a splendid peal, which, in addition to celehrating Mr. Lilley's "jubilee," was algo a birthday commemoration for Mr. Sarn Wood, the composer of the peal, who completed bis 77 th year on April 7th.
This wes the first peal of Kent Treble Boh Maximus in Shrewsbury. On December 26th, 1823, a peal of Oxford Treble Box Maximus was rung therc by the Union Societry, called by Richard Gross, and in which the renowned Samuel Jewrenen took part. No other peal of Trable Twelve had heen ring on the bells until last Saturday week.

After the peal the band were antertained to a meat ten in the Mesonic Lodge Room by Mr. lilley. Five of the band stayed the week-end, aud met the roung band at St. Clind's on Suaday mornipg, touches of Stedman Cinques, nant Caters, and Double Norwich Major being rumg. The Cinques was the first on the bells for Sundoy gerciee. Afterwark a touch of 188 Grandsire Triples was rang with members of the jumiar band taking part.

## MORETON CORBET BELLS RECAST

A DFLIGHTFUL RNNG OF SXX FROM LOUGHBOROLGE FOUNDRY
The restoration of the bells at Moteton Corbet Churcin, whicin has tuen effected at a cost of over 5500 , was celebrated on April gtil by a serviee of praise, at which the Rural Dean, Prebendary the Hon. A. Parker, gave an addrogs to a large congregation, payers being offered by the Vicas, the Rev. E. C. Bigot. At the conclusion of the service the bells were rung by ringers from Market Draytan, Stanton, Wem and Shewshmy, and many expressions of satisfaction ware expressed by the luavertis to the delightuf tone of the bells.

The bells have been recast and melung with entirely new fittings, in new, strong and massivo casl-irou framework scientifically designed so that the minimum anount of stress is placed on the structure of the tower.

The work has been carried out by Messrs. John Taylor and Co., Loughborough. There is now a perfect little peal of six bells, ibe tenor weighing $9 \mathrm{cwi}, 1 \mathrm{qr} .3 \mathrm{lb}$, and their tone is maguificent. Thu inscription on the bellg are as follows:-

Sir Gerald Vincont Corbet has generously contrituted 5400 tawards the cost of the bells.

Tho first penl by the Gambridge University Guild was rung on April 28th. 1890.
A peal of Grandsirs Cinques wes rung at Leeds Parish Church on Mar 1st, 1842. There is a record in the belfry which states that it was rune in 3 hrs. 43 mins. 9 secs. Few peals are timed so exactly as this.

The peal of Cambrikige Surprise Sinor by the Barley band is a record for their tower, of which ther may feel justly prond: they have nlgo recentry rung a 720 of Noumich Surprise aud a 720 of Oxford and Kent Treble Bob spliced, probably the first to be rung in the enunty. Anoticr interesting feature has heen tho ringing of a peal af the Cathedral to mark the 50 h mammorsary of the opeging of the belles.
[n the Walford Division Mr. Edea reparts that flings have been somewhat quiet in ringing quarters around Watiord. The bands at Ahhols Janglev, [3ushey Heath and Rielcmansuorth lave made consifferable progress during the Hear. Thanks to the energy of Mr, Maurice Hibbert, the Buslney Heatlo band lave rung a fairly lone tonclı of Crandsire Triples, and the Rickmansworth members a 500 of Stedman Triples. The distriet meeting lave not been tao well attended, but thes have been extremely successful, espeeially one loln at Rirkmanswortio. M: Eden han notified me of his desire to be relleved of his duties as district secretary. A reference to the minutes rnealls the fact that Mr. Eden was eleeted for the West Horts Distried on the ocension of the division of the association into three Histricts at Ho Faster utecting, 190\%. Excepl for a brief alsenee, nwing lo the exigencies of the war, to has rontinued the work up till to-day. An interesting footnote to a peal in his distriet molifies that our ribud has added in his many regponsibilities, lliat of a parent. As
the event was broadcasted into Lincolnshire, with similar peal horours, 1 feel sure Mr. Ayre is luppy in the possession of a nucleas of a hadica hand. M . H. ## PEAL TABLES AT SELBY ABBEY. <br> JRRBIWLATION TO THE CONDlfCTOR:

Ac Sellby Abley, on Suruay eveuing, April 6th, a very interesting cetemony took place in the belfy, where a peal tallet of white Sicilian marble, with black Relgian marble background, has been ererted to commemorato the paral of Grandsire Caters (5,003 chrunges), which was rung on Wednesday, December 26th, 1923, by an entirely local hand. Before evening service, the Rev. Canon Solloway, D.D. (Vicar), with the churchwardens, yisiter the belfry, aut in the presence of the ringers and a few friends, the viear, aiter a short prayer, unveiloil and dedicated the tablet, which borc the inserjptions, as follows:-

Korkshire Associatiou of Change Ringers. - At Selby Abbey Church, on Wednesday, December 26th, 1923, in thiee liours and twenty minutes, a peal of Grandsire Caters ( 5,003 changes) was rung by R. Fenton treble, J. W. Hall 2, F. Cryer 3 , Arthur Oryer 4, H. S. Morley 5, T. Morgan 6, G. W. P. Fenton 7, F. W. Hinton 8, H. Fairlam 9, T. Sturdwick tenor. Coulucted by H. Fairlam. First peal of Caters on Selby Abbey bells by a local band. T. G. Hawdon, Hruce Gray, F. Wray, W. T. Everatt, Churehwardens. Canon J. Solloway, D.D., Vicar.'

The Vicar sain it was interesting to know that the Selby Abbey ringers lad succeeded in ringing such a peal for the first time in the history of the sbbey. He thouglit it was very fitting for such a reeord to be placed in the helfry to bear witness of the interest anti centlusiasm the ringers were taking in their work. They had stucls well together, and were doing splendid work by service ringing, which was heerd noi culy by those who attenderl the chutwh, but by others outside, calling them to the house of Gon. Continuiug, he said he liad enother ceremony to perform, and that was to present. M1. H. Fairlam, the conductor of the peal, on belanf of the ringers, with a gold raedal in commemargition of the event as a tuken of appreciation of his comrades for the work done on that interesting oceasion. The mellal was engraved on one gide with hell, headstock, wheel, and monogram 'H. $F_{1}$.' and on the other side. 'Presented to H . Fairlam, fonductor of firet loral yual ai Selly S Sbey, 1923.
Tn acknowledging the presentation. Mr. Fairlam said it was like hiuling below the belt, it had come to him as a great-surprise. He slould value the gift, very much, not only for the record whins it commenorated, but for the kindness and consideration of his fellow ringers, whom lue wished to thank.
Mr. F. Cryer (caplain), on helhalf of the ringors, thanked Canon Solloway for performing the ceremonies, the chinroluwardens and friends for their prescace. When he commenced as a ringer at the Abbey over 40 years ago, he shid, there was no change ringing done. He introntuced the change ringing, and now he was pleased io say that all tha hanat were members of the Yorkshire Assaciation, and lad succeeded iu conducting and ringing a peal of Grandsire Caters. Thay had many difficulties in his time, liecnuse. when a probationer fot im the way of ringing fi bell. he would leave the lown, and then they lind to stayt again. Fowever, lie whs pleased to say they liad a fairly goon hand at present.

Lukis, of Wath Rectory, near Ripon, in Youkshirc. Some tinte ago 1 inquited of Miss Lutis what hasd become of this book, und she informed me that leer tather lent it some man who never returnet it. Possibly this was the said Mr. Reeves. . 1 shall he gled it atuy reader of "The linging World' can give me any further informal tion about it, or of the existence of another eopy in privato hands. The late Dr. Raven, in his ' Bells of Eugland ' (p. 244), says: 'Thn' first edition of 'Tlintinnalogia' was anonymous, but was registerul at Stationer's Hall by 'Fabyan Stedmau.'-On the olher dand, the title page of Reeves reprint says: Printed hy W. G. for Fisban Stedman at his shop in S. Dunstinn's Churchyard in Fleet Streel, 1668.' Dr. Raven further' says: 'In 1671 appenved the secoud edrtion" Printed for F. \&., and are to lec sold by Tho. Herbert at. his shop under the dyal of s . Dunstan's Churci in Fleet Streat." ' shall also be glad to hear of a cony of this euition, of which ibe haty Rev. II. T. Eliacombe says in his supplement to 'The Churel Beils of Devon," published in 1872, "A fine copy of this edition is int the possession of W. Tite, Fsf., M.P
Another book by Sitedman slyled Campaualogia, or the Art or Ringing improved, was ' lounted by W. Godbid for' W. S., and nte to be sold by Langlay Curtis in Gont Court on Ludgate Hill, 1677.' In this same year Join white putalished A riel cabinet with varlets of inventions,' a portion of which contains 'Directions for Ringing the most msual peals that helong to that art.' This was Printed for William Whitwood at the sign of the Goiden Bell int Duck Lane, near- smilhfinld, 1677.
Under the tille of "tintinnalogia, or the Are of Ringing improved, ${ }^{\text {, }}$ he published the same portion on ringing in a smaller book wilhmut date, but which slates ob ilie title page, By J. White, Gient, ${ }^{\prime}$ aud 'Printed for G. Conyers at the Ring in Little Brilaill' 1 It aso contains "The School of Artificial Fireworks, and 'The Art of Gardening.' Its thate is helioved to be aloout 1700 , thougb 1 am inclined to think it is older than the larger publication of $167 \%$.
'The Sclool of Recreation's first published in 1684 has a portion devoled to ringing; and a laber edition of this hook states that it was 'By R. H. London.' and was ' Wrinted for A. Betteswarth al the Red Lyon in Paternoster Row, 1732.' (See ' R.W.' No. 531, p. 286.)

Then follow the five editians of "Campanalngia Improved," 'by J. D. and C. M., members at the Society of Loudon Scholars,' the first, 'Printer for George Sawbridge at the three Flower-de-Luces in Litile Britain, 1702 ': the spenmi,' 'Printed for G. S., and sold by Henrs Green at the Sun and Bihle on London Bridge, 1705 ' the third, 'Printed for A. Beitesworlh and C. Hiteh at the Red Lron in Paternoster Row, 1733': the fourth, 'Printed for G. Hiteh and $L$. Hawes in Paternoster Row; and J. Hadges, near London Bridge, $1735^{\circ}$ : and the fifth, "Oorrected ly J. Monk," and 'Printed int L. Haves, W. Clarke ani R. Collins, and K, Crowder, in Patwnoster Row, 1766.
These were followed by the 'Clavis Campnallogis,' by Jones, Reeves and Blakemore, "printed for the anthors, and sold by $T$. Blakemorc. No. 4, Darby Court. Piccadilly, and 5. Bowtell. Camhridge, I788.' Two subsequent oditions withaut date were " Printnd for R. S. Kirlby, Paternoster Row,' and 'Printerl for Longman, Rees, Orme and Brown, by J. Raw. Tpswich.' ]aill these editions appear to be from the same type, and, are idenlical in every purlicular except the statements given filove from the hottom of the litle pages, and holla have the same footnate to the last page, 'Jpswicl, priated by J. Row.' Sume contemporary advertisements iltached to a copy that I have of this last edition aze dated Demmber, 1819. The later works by Shipway, Hubbard, Thackral, vie., otc. are probably well known io menters of the Exemeisn.

## LGATHERHEAD's BELLS

## BANK HOLIDAY ATHRACTION.

A happy transformation has been effected ab Leatherhead, Surrey by the tuning and relanging of the peal of ton bells. Ereviously they were not an irdeal ring but a visit to the Whitechapel Fourdry has resulted in a peal, which, heard from any position round the tower, are a delight to the ear. lncidentally it may be mentioned the bells are noisy in the ringing chamber, bub that is a dolect which can and will bo remedied
Lentherliead Church, dediexted to \$S. Mary and Nicholas, stands mpon the side of m hill overlooking a once sleepy old town. The main streets in these days, however, wear a very lively aspect, for horongh the town cuns one of the highwnys that radiate from Loudon, and on sucly is day as Monday, when all the world seemed to have taken to the open road, Lentherhead was a seene of great animation. But the church, just of the main highway, stands in a comparatively geeluded spot, and although the scene all around must bu swikingly dillerent to that which prevailed when first thers a peal of bells in the old hint-fiecd tower, there is something penceful and sootling in the huilding and its immedialto surroundings, after the helter-skelter of the streets a landred yards or so awey.
In the ehurch joveatory made in the time of Edward VI. thene were '站 hefles in the sleple,' at Leatherbead; the same steeple that siands sentinel over the cown to-day, for jt reared its lofty heal sonething like seven fundret yearg ago, a contury after the durch itself was built. Nothing more of the listory of the bells is known undil the yesr 1792, when there was a ring of six, on which onduly $30 t h$, a poal in seven Minor methods was rung, as the ancient board in the belfry still testifies. After this peal, a new ring of eight was put in, with a tenor of about 16 cwt , and these were placed in the tover on the 25 th of August of the same year-a record of despatah whicl seems to make it doubtful whether they were really a now peal. If they were, it seems most unlikely that the previous ring of six were recast for the purposc

After they got their cight fiolls, Leatherlseaf soou had a band or ethrient riugers, tor in 1795 'lotal pertormers' $\operatorname{mang}$ a 6.400 of Oxford Treble Bot, Major, conducted by one Benjanin Sinamonds whose name appears on other hoards as conductor more than twenty yeatrs lafer. In 1798 there was a 5,200 of the same method rung, nail in 180810,080 . This was osi Whit, Mondry, and some of the present hand still lavo unluppy recollections of the centenary peal attempt, which 'went west' through a rope slipping wheel and the bell setting up, after over three hours ringing!
in the year 1816 'T. Benrs recast the whole of the bells oxcepl. the third, fourh and fifth, whicho beenne the secand, belifed and fourth in a heevier ring. These hells were supposed to have $\pi$ tenor of about 21 cut., but when put an the scale recentiy it was found to be 19 swt. In 1877 Warners recast the three belis which eserped the nelling pot in 1816, and added twa lrables to complel. a petal of ten. The whole have now been overhauled by Messrs. Mearg and Stainbank, who Jiave recasp. the nimbland funed the rest, giving hem greader resonamec nat elfecting inmprovements in the hamonics which pht the bells in $n$ different chns.
The relangilag lans been tione in it new timher firnme, which, manstructed of teak, is earried on four principals of Indinn Jardwoorl. Tha bells run in ball berrimes, and thoir 'gn' is perfect.
The dedicalion fook place ai a simple service heht on Thursetay of last week, condsctert by tho Vitar. The loeal men rame a fuw romads during fine coreuony, and, as the congregation left the

Reference-was made to the prosence of Mr. George williams (Master and joint Lion. secretary of the Winchester Gaild), who, with the otlier visibors, was most cordially wolcomed.
Mr. Williams spoke of his connection with Leatherbead forty Ypars ago, and said that it was probably from Leatherhead that change ringing spread into the Diocese of Wiachester.
The mecting concluder with a vote of thanks to the Vicar and organist, and ihe Clairman, in reply, expressed great pieasure in mecting the ansociation, especially now that the bells were in good artier. The vestoration, he saju, had been carried out mainly through the efiots of ihe loeal ringers.
