## PRESERVATION OF OLD MSS.

Such interesting information as that which we are able to give this week concerning the bells and ringing in clays gone by at Stonham Aspal, leads one to wonder whether some really determined attempt cannot be made to collect, catalogue and, where desirable, publish the records which must exist in various parts of the country, in the shape of MSS. (such as that from which Mr. Slater has compiled his article this week), the peal books of old ringers, and other material which may at present be available, but which in the future, if not carefully guarded, may disappear and be lost for ever to the Exercise. In the hands of men like Mr. Theodore Slater such papers are jealously cared for, but in the hands of some future owner they may be looked upon as worthless and consequently destroyed.
Some old papers of historic yalue, tike the Osborn MSS., have from time to time found their way to the British Museum; the MSS. of Mr. Charles Hattersley have been placed in a specially formed library at Sheffield Cathedral, and the future of some others have, perhaps, been secured. But there is much else which may well entirely disappear unless an effort is made to secure it for the Exercise, and, in this connection, it should be remenbered that interesting as these docaments may be to-day, they will increase both in interest and value as the generations go by. We should fike to see some scheme initiated by the Central Council for cataloguing all these papers as far as it is possible to trace then, so that they may know where to look for them in future, and at the same time steps should be taken to ensure that when present owners (or their heirs) have done with them, these papers will pass to the custody of the Council.

Unfortunately in the past the Council had an unhappy experience with one of its committees in work of this description, but the 'lineal descendant ' of this committee is a much more ' tive ' body, and perhaps it could be induced to take up the task of acting as an inquiry agent to gather particulars of existing MSS. of interest, and to make suggestions for the preservation of the papers, Such work would not only be of present interest, but future generations would appreciate the effort made to save those historical records which, once destroyed, could never be replaced. In addition to these MSS., there is also the question of compiling information as to old peal records. The Council possesses now the ringing publications of the last fifty years. Thie history of our art coutd be made much more complete if such particulars as exist of all previously rung peals could be collected and placed in the Library.

## BELFRY GOSSIP.

Fifty six-scores of Grandsire Doubles, each rung difereatly.' How did they do it? This is the question which the reader will naturally ask himself wien pelusing the report of the peal at Rafloctoct Tho footnote will enliohten him. Erch of the five bells was usod in tarn for ten six-geores as the plein hunt belf.
A peal lias been rung at Weybridge, Surrey, the lirst since Sept. 12th, 1900, when the Rev. F. E. Robinson called a poal of Stedrant Triples.

Forty years ago tomorrow, viz., on Jomuary 2 tib, 1885, the Sussex Association was esfablished, mad there can now be very few of the criginal founders left.
Two days later tho first peal by the Association was rung by the Brighton buanch nt Uekfiehl, conducted by J. Toy, serr. Of that band there are, wo beliere, only two survivors: Chandes Tyler, of Hunfeld; and George King, now in Crmam.
Six other peals were lung in the same year, and ju thoso days a marble tablet was put up for eacla peal! ibue that practice soon became too costly.
Theve was a sitgatar cancitence on Natuary 25th, 1842. On that day a peal of 8.105 Stedman Gaters was rung at Panswick, and a peal of 8,081 Grandsire CaLer's at Stroud, Both, howerer, wferwards turned olt to be fatse.
On Jutuary $28 \mathrm{th}_{1,1} 1751_{1}$ a peal of 5,094 Grandsjre Caters was rung at St. Sepulchre's, Fobloorr, Landon.
The Oxtord Dionesan Guild remg a peal of 10,080 Double Norwich at Appleton on Taunary, 1888.
The sarue date in the year 1911 saw the first peal of Cambridge Surprise Maxinus rung in Loudon. This was by the College Yonths, at Gornhill.
The first peal of Double Bob evor rung, 'with bols behind and befare alternately, was períormed at St. May's, Whitechapel, on Surday, Jabaary 29th, 2769, composed and conducted by Gsorge Gross.
Henry Haley, the fanous London linger, diea at Bethal Green on Jamuary 29th, 1980 , at the age of 66 years.
The peal of Grandsire Triples, rung on Deeember 20th, and published under the heading of Biddenhaw, Kont, was rung at Biddenden, and the composer was A. E. Bames, and not Batues, as prigted.
The peal ruyg at Isham last Suturday was finislaed ju complete darkness at 5.10 p.zn. owing to the oruission of lighting lamps, and this explains why Plain Bob was substituted for the last mathod and rung twice in the peal. It was the treble ringer's first peal, and great credit is the to liva on thig acconnt. The peal also celebrated the chasteaing of Devid Edward Alkins by his grandfather, which took place at this chureh on the following clay
There is therit in it peat such as ihat rung at Maribfedr, Gloucester, lest week, us the foolnole reveals.
'He ring of six bells at St. Mary's Clurch, Old Eeake, which liave been silent for some years owing lo their unsafe condition, ate to be rebung with entinely now fithings by Mr. A. Bowell, of Ipswielt. The work is to be finished by Easter.
We are not certain who rang most preals in the year 2924, but the ringer who exceeded Mr. I. G. Shade's total of 84 inade a good score, We said some time ago that Mr. Shade, who was then a long way past the thousand mark, liad given up work to go in for rioging, and, by Gcorge, he lias not belied the prophecy.
Apropos the "long' peal at St. Giles", a correspondent suggests ihere might be a bow-lcgged ' peal at Bow.

## DEATH OF WELL-KNOWN STEPNEY RINGER.

We regret to announce the dentla of Mr. George Parrell, of Slepney, which Look place on Decenber 31st, after a long nurk printul illness, from cancer, in his 68th year.
Mr. Barrell was a regular service rimger ai St. Dinnstanis Clurch, Stepney, for many pears, and mag the Eenor there and at warious other clurches in the Erst of London, to many peals, at regord of which is not available. INTERESTING HISTORY OF THIS OLD SUTEOLK RING.
We are indebted to Mr. Theodore E. Slater, of Glomsford, for the foliowint; futhey particulars ennceming the bells al shonam Aspall, Sufflk, Mr. Sinter having copied them lirom the MSti. compiled by his futhey.

Thomas Lester, of London, and now haging there by Mr. John Witliams, will be rang for the firsb time by auy rompany thut will do themselves the pleasure of coning, The Norwich and Aylsham ringers have hined lodgings at Stomlinar Pye and the arightrouring louses, intending to be in the steeple easly on that date abovementionet.
N.B.-ML: Joln Williams who las lung most of the peals in and nbont Loudon hanges church and chapel thells in the bost manner, and at the cheapest rates, and may be spoken wible at any time at his hotise in Stonlam Arpall Street.
It will be secu by the foregoing that the new peal of ten bells was opened on Monday, May 23ri, I743. Filoy remained thus until 1825, when they were all baken down and enkirely rehung by Thomas and Joshun Finvy, of Natwinh, and sis of uleno recast., They were opened on 'llausulay. Vecember' 28th. 1826, when the two Iurrys and some of tho Norwidh Scholars, with William Leach, of Ipswich, started for a 5,400 of Boll hoyal. When they had rung abaut 3 hours, Leach set his belt, the terrot, and said to Thomas Hurry, who wras calling the peal and diaging the treble and had mate: a false call: 'No! No! Mr'. Hurry. there is scope enough on ten bells without ringing changes over again. I aever rang a false peal yct, and never will, if I know it.

The firt account of a peal being rung on the bells is copied from the diles of the "Ipswich Journal," Jut it is tlought that it was not the first peal rung on the bells.

On Sunday, the 22nd of September, 1751, was rang upon the eight frgest bells at Stonham Aspall, in the wonnty of Sulfolk, a compleat peal of Five Thousand and Fory Boh Major Dabbles, in 3 hours and 20 minutes, by the persons madementioned: Henry Gray third, Daniel Heasham fourth, Richard Wierie fifth, Inmes Gariner sixth, Joseph Alcxavder seventh, Johr Share eiglath, Wham Walker ninth, fames Wilson teror

No conductor's nange is gireu in the "Tpswich Journal."
The aext penl is withont douht Holt's Original, ant this was the first time that it was rung out of London, end the serond time that t was rung at all.

On Fuidav, January 31st, 1752 , wes rang at Stonlam Aspail, in the county of Suffolk, by their own Society of Ringers, a Five Thousazd and Forty Grandsire Tripples, it heing the second time ever rang mitlu two Doubles only, This true peal las been very lately by Mr. William whlker. It was complealed in 3 lours and 10 minutes
 Richard Wade, 41 ; pilliam Ranysard, 5th; Jolin Sharp, 6Ela; Richard Moyse, 7th: Talm Thurlow, tenor. Note. It is thought impossible for man to ring one of the leals and call the Bobs at the same time, he peal heing so intricate.

There is no tecord of any more peals being rung upan the bells unti] 1884, when ten members of the Notwich Association rang on Whit Monday in that vear Ben Anmahle's 5,000 Kent Itreble Bob Roval, to whing reference was made in your last issue.

The following is it description of the tower and bells made by

Samuel shater : "Ho steeple of the Parish Chumels, Stonlan Aspall, is placed on the south side of the chntel, and forms the mincipal entrance to the church, this heing a greal curiosity. In the year 1742, Sheodore Eccleston, a gentleman, zesidity at Growficld Fill, denided to take down the old ring of five bells aut replace them with a ring of ten. It appears that after ba took down the old ring of live an got the new rizg of ten, be luad never thought how and where they were to bo lung, as the stecplo in a small one, buing builk only to recoive the old ring of five. The roon necessary for the ring of tent was found thus : Tie old steeple was taker down to the fioor where tho fuames were to rest on, and in frame was made nearla the size of the stecple, and the bells hung on the walts, and the upper part vas staddied up, boarded and surmounted witls fons wooden pinnacles, and allogether has a very handsome appearance. The olf ringiag room was also very trsefully decorated amd fitted up. It was aboul ten feet from the ground, and the walls and ceiling were plastered, and a boss with a gold and blue rimg for eacin rope to come through in the ceiling. In the centro was a golden pincapple, from which laags the beantiful brass chandelier with its six or cight branches, end roumd the boss was engraved the name of the donor. "Theodore Eccleston, lisq., 1742." The floor was fixed so that, the ringers of the treble and second and the Gfth and tixth bells could stand under the west and east arelies in the steente. The window comes down to tho floor, and used to be opened to hear the trehles from the ontside, as they ling guite on the wall. Then ronld be heard the ten bells to perfection. But now, alas! the ringers are placed higher up in the steeple, and the window alrendy mentioned whove cannot be opened, and so the frebles of this fine ring cannot now be heard in the ringing room, flus making it very awkward for the ringere to strike the ten bells, hut they can be heard putside."
Tradition tells us that the bells were taken first to Crowficid Hall barn, and there Johy Willinms made the farmes for them, the thaber laswing grown on the estate.

When John P. Powell, of Quex lazk, pulblistred his broadsheet and gave one to every existing band of ringers in the kingwom he sent one to Daniel Wade, and that along with Wade's ME. book, are in my possession in a good state of preservation.
