## ANOTHER 'FAILING.'

In one or two recent articles we have commented upon some of the shortcomings to be found among ringers, of the laxity of some in paying their subscriptions, of the indifference of others in regard to practices, especially in the summer months. There is yet another matter in which ringers are apt to be neglectful, and so add not merely to the troubles of the officials, but to the difficulties of others outside their own ranks. This is with regard to notifying their intention to be present at teas, etc., in connection with meetings. This has long been a source of complaint by secretaries, but appeals of this kind seem to go unheeded. In the majority of cases caterers require to know beforehand how many they have to provide for. Particularly in the comntry districts is this essential if the catering is to be efficiently done, yet it is no unusual thing for twice as many ringers to turn up as have indicated their intention to do so. This is a bad practice in any case, it is extremely discourteous in those instances where the visitors are to be the guests of the incumbent or the local ringers. Naturally those responsible for the catering desire to do the best they can, and not only is it unfair to them for greater numbers to turn up than have beer notified, but it is equally unfair to those ringers who bave complied with the courtesies of the occasion, inasmuch as it may result-hand many times has done so-in everyone having to go short.

It may be said the associations have the remedy in their own hands, and that those who fail to do as they have been asked in the matter of saying that they will be present, should be excluded from the meal. This salutary method of dealing with the neglectful ones would no doubt have its effect, but ringers being the curious folk that they are, this way of dealing with the situation is not altogether a practical remedy. Officials have to be very chary of giving offence, and when a number of visitors turn up unexpectedly at a meeting, there is, of course, a desire to do the best under the circumstances so that they cannot feel aggrieved. But if these ringers find they cannot be catered for, they only have themselves to blame, yet time after time, given a fine afternoon, secretaries find they have been hopelessly 'let down.' Short of the policy of exclusion, it would seem that the only course open is that of continually hammering at the negligent to induce them to alter their ways. If they can only be brought to realise that it is not only the secretary who is concerned in knowing how many to expect, but that others outside the association have an interest in the matter, and that they are creating a bad impression, perhaps they will in time mend their ways in this and in the other directions in which we have recently urged that there is room for improvement.

## THE ANNUAL FESTIVAL.

The annual meating was leld at Worcester on Easter Monday, as usual. Rnin fell persistently until noon, after which the sum got through ocensionally, somewhat tempering the clilly air. Most of the eity leells were ringing fairly early, and the Cathedral bells werc aunilable from 1 to 2 p.nn. The rehanging of this ring is contemplated, after which, perhaps, betier ringing will bo enjoged by those whose opportunities are so few on twelve bells.
At 2.15, the Dean again welcomed a moderate attendance, and at the termination of the meeting interested those present with a briaf historical rewiew of the architecture of the Chapter House, where the meeting wns held. Even to a casual listener ift is obvious what a great study the Dean must have made of the hisiory of the Cathedral, as, when exnounding details, all else is oblivion.
As always, he presided, and was supporied by the Rev. .5. F. Hastings and Mr. J. R. Nemman, clerical and lay secretaries, Mr. R. Matthews and Mr. T. J. Salter.
The report and balance sheet wero readily adopted, the latter prowing satisfactory in face of the reduced sutscription.
Mr. Newrasn reminded members of the irregularity of not advising him of their intendef atterdance to enable hier to make ample pros visian for ter.
Apologies were read from the Vicars of Powick and Cradey, and Mr. H. Meson.
From the Belfry Repair Fund grants were voted of 55 to Selly Oak and Hanley Castle restorations. Two guineas were alsa voted from the general fund to the Washbrook Memorial.
New memhers were elected from Droitwich, Fitierminster, Wolverley, Wordsley, Martler and Oldswinford.
Arrangements for the annual peal were left in the hands of the Ringing Master (Mr. R. Matthews).
Mr. A. E. Parsons Jeferred to the death of Mr. W. Roek Small, whose work and logalty to the association from jts inception had been Inelpful. A vote of condolence was passed in silence to the bercaved family.
Mr. W. Short referred also to the rieath of Mr. John Bradney, of Shifnal, an old, unattached member. Here, too, a silent vote of sympatily was passed.
Trasident, vice-presidents (all clerical), lay vice-presidents, Master, *ecretaries, tressurer and nuditors were all again unanimously reelected. The Contral Committee was re-clecled with one exception.
Mr. J. R. Newman reminded members that he was getting older, and that day completed his 20 years' service as secretary, and linted at retiring in favour of young blood. The Dear very aptly and properly asked him to get on to the next business, much to the liking of all present.
The usual potes of thanke were passed.
The Gatleedral service followed, all members taking privileged seats in the cloir.
To the intense pleasure of at1, the organ, which has been silent for extensive reprirs and overhauling at a cost of over £6,000, was reopencd on Easter Sunday. ## NEW PEAL OF EIGHT IN NORFOLK.

TELLLS OF TERRINGTON S'I. CLEMENT RESTORED.
The bells of Terringion St. Clement, Narfalk, have just been restored. There were, ptior to the festoration, six bells which werc cast at various periods by different firms, and were badly out of tunc. Of the original six bells two heve been recast and two new trebles have been added, making a good peal of eight bells, the tenor weighiny $11 \frac{1}{2}$ cwit. The casting, recasting nad tuming has been done by Messrs. Mears and Stainbunk, of the Whitechapel Foundry, and the rehanging has been earried out by Messrs. Day and Sob, of Eyc, Sufolk. The bells are hung with the latest type of self-aligning ball races in an entirely new oak frame. The bells go splendidly, and no doubt will be much sougltt after by bell ringers in the vicinity.
The dedication took place on Sunday, April 19th, and was performed by the Lord Bishop of Ely. The service was a most inspiring one, and was attended by a large number of people. The bells were opened by a band of ringers from St. Margaret's Clurch, King's Lynn, who, with same members of the home company, rang several short touches during the afternoon.

## PAYING UP.

## To the Edifor.

Dear Sir ,-After acting for two years as hon. treasurer to the Durham and Newcastle Diocesan Association, I can must cordially endorse, your leading article of April 17th, under the heading of 'Paying Up.'
It may interest you to know that I found the process of collecting subscriptions a most tedious one, and one in which considerable patience is required.
On taking over my cluties, Ifound a formidable list of slackers, regarding subscriptions, awaiting me. I entered into my task with a fair nmount of zeal, and was fortuate in being able to reduce the unpaid su5seriptions by some tew pouads.
It is only with great diffeulty that husiness mothods can be infused in church work of this nizture in these parts. Bell ringers as a whole are drawn from all classes of society, and many need tactful persuasion, otherwise ofence is taken where not intended.
The prevailing idea among ringers seems to be: 'Appoint your officials, and thereafter away with all cares and worries, and leave us to our ringing, the secretary and treasurer have broad shoulders." To give a case in point, an idea to improve the financial side of our association was suggested by me. A comprehensive circular, which took hours to elaborate, was drawn up, and circular letters were sent out to 50 towers asking the support of the local secretaries, and their Guilcls, and an carly reply.
After waiting patiently for six monihs, only fwelve were reccived, consequently I did not proceed iurther with the scleme. and left it to my successor to earry on, when time and occasion again arise.

## You ask the remedy?

(1) As an partial ellesiation of the troubles of assoejation officials 1 would suggest that the treasurer's duties should be entirely separate from the secretarial work, the secretary having quite sufficient to do in arranging meethegs, writing mp reports, and other incidentals.
(2) That cach tower should establish $n$ scherne, whereby every memher will pay the small sum of Id. a week towards the outlays for repairs to bell ropes, and their suhseriptions to the association. This lias been achopted by more than one tower to my awn knowledge, with the lanppy result that their subscriptions have been prompty paid, and no arrenrs outstanding.
(3) Much younger men should be given the posts of secretary and treasurer, providing that they are not unwilling to face the music with a good heart, and also have the time and leisure at their dig-posal.-Yours faitlifully,

Divine service was held at 5 p.m., conducted by the Rev. G, W. Stainsby. The preacher was the Rev. S.F. L. Bernoys (Rector of Finchley), who gave a very inspiring ardiress, basing his remarks ou the dangerg confonting ail workers in the church, fom the clergy down to the choir, bell ringers, and other lay workers. viz., that of forgetfing the real nature of their calling. It was quite easy for tham all to torget their work was lhat of praising Godi. Even the clergy, in repeating the same services weck after week, found it easy to forget that, and the preacher mrged his hearers to endeavour to bear in mind, during the ringing of the bells, that they were just as much praising Goil as were the clergy and congregation.
Tea was provided in the schoolroom, served by tho wives and claughters of several of the local ringers, who had prepared an excellent raeal. The Rew. S. F. L. Bernays presided, and was supporter by the Rev. G. W. Stainsby, of Southgate.

At the business meeting, the chair was taken by Mr. F. A. Milne, president, supported by Messrs. W. Pye (Mrster), T. Beadle and K., Pickworth (vice-presidents) N. A. Tomlinson and R. Holloway (District Maslers), C. 'F. Coles and W. H. Hollier (hon. secs), ete.

## NEED FOR REGULAR PRACTICE.

The passiog of time, says the report, bids us once more to take stock of our position as a ringing organisntion. We find much cucouragenent in doing so; our numbers are incrensing; the subscriptions are being paid with regularity; and in most cases the Sunday ringing reaches a fairly ingh standard of axcellence, But, for all this, there are towers where there is still plenty of room for improvement and where better work could be done. In some cases, possibly, this is due to lack of effort on the part of the ringers, but there are other cases in which we are sure the ringers are not altogether to binme. We hear of towers where a regular practice night is almast oul of the question; or if there is a practice night, interruptions often take place owing to the prosimity of a hall where a public meeting as some other function is being beld. We do not suggest that the ringers are not considered, but what actually fappens is tinat they are for the time beging forgothen. Ringers must, have practice; first, to keep up and improve their own standaris of ringing; and, secondly, to teacl yamg ringers how to handle a beti. Otherwise Sunday ringing will in time cease nt any chureh where practices are continually interrupted. TFe would, therefore, wrge our vergs to set aside a definite ulight which the ringers may constier heir own, and to do their best to lave the practices kopt free from interruption, At the same time, we would urge on our members the necessity of taking fuld advantage of the weekly apportunity to practise, especially in those towers in which their practice has heen sulject to interruption, with the special intention of improving their Sunday Service ringing. For we must always bear in mind that this is the main olyject of our existence, the Sundar ringiug that is giver to God, and to it we should devote our best effotts.
Apart from the Annual Meeting: no less than 23 meetings wete lield during the year. In the North and East District ten took place, ibree of which were at six-bell kowers, whilst two were lodd in midimoek. The excellent average attendnace of 32 was reached. The ringing generality attained a bigh standard, and it was noticeable that a larger proportion of our younger members aspired to Surprise methods, goon practice in which can tusually be obtained at these meetings. Thie meetings hold In the Sonth and West District מumbered 13, all but two of which were helit on a Satunday The at-
tendance at these meetings aweraged 35, which slows no lack of interest on the part of our members. In this district, too, tae ringing usually included geveral Surprise melhods, a sure sign of progregs. In addition to the above, a joint meeting of the North ent East District and the South-Whestern Division of the Essex Association was held at Waltham Abbey on August 23rd. This meeting which was atlended by upwards of 50 members of one or other of the Associations concerned, enabled many to obtain some excelfent practice on fen and twelve bolls, besiden furnishing an opportunity for fraternal ereeimgs between ringers who seldom meet each other. I suggest that association committees hesitate before they put on a service, and that they allow sufficient time for the proper discussion of imporiant iterns of business, such as the Midland Counties Association shelved the ather riay.

## ST. PETER MANCROFT BELLS.

## THL DEDJCATION.

The restoration of St. Peter Mancroft bells is now complete, and, ns briefly mentionel in our last issue, they were re-dedicated on Sunday week. For somo time before the restaration was taken in land, the condition of the frame and fittings was far from satisfactory, and wine the bells were removed it was tound that the beams which carried the weiglit were in very bad order, and some of them badly rotted. The lower beams, forming the ceiling visible from the clatrch rotted not been removed, but have been repaired and made perfectly safe. Tile bells are now carriex on steel girders quite independert of the oid ank beams, which will henceforth the relicued of any duty excent that of earrying themselves and the wood flooring lairl on then. New fittings havo been stpplied to the hells throughout, and the bells have been gusrter turned and re-tappered. The work has needed considerable time, hut now it is done there is the stisfaction of knowing that everything in the tower is sound, and in good order, and What the strain of the bulls is more evenly distributed on the tower
closely connected with the church. Tlat of Atcxander Robert Chathberlin would long be remembered. When, in 1878, the Rev. Sidney Pelham came to Mancroft, lte gat to work with the entiusiasza of faith and youth, and he found in $\mathrm{Mr}^{\text {r }}$, Ghamberlin a quiet, retiring churchwarden amd a friend. The two men walked together in the House of God, and they saw the marks of the neglect of centuriesfour of the great windaws partially bricked up, the tower, the roof, the walls all falling into ruin. From the outside six feet of accumulated soil lay against the north and south walls. At the east end of the church the conditiong were indegcribible. Twa out of three pubiic-inouses were practically built on to the sancturiy and other honses less reputable. "I tell you these repulsive defails," said the Vicar, "because we should not forget those like Alexander Chamberlin, who pledged thenselves to purify this most glorious temple of God." Mr. Chamberlin continued his lahours with Archdeacon Neviti from 1881 to 1884, with Canon Baggaiay from 1884 to 1890 , and with Auchdeacon l'ellam Burn from 1890 to 1901 until in his (the speaker's) own

Vicariate the great work was completed in 1908 at a iotal cost of some $£ 22,000$. No wonder Mr. Chamberlin loved the botils he relung forty years ago. Their bells made their appeal to many instincts. They Hand praised God for many centaries. A humdred years before the church was buitt there almost certainly luncra a peal of five bells in the Norman tower of ald St. Peter's. They rang for the victory over the Spaniards. Again the steeple socked in 1665, when, off Lowestoft, British seamanship conguered the Dutch aggressar. At the victory of Waterloa, and, but, the other day, on November 11th, 1918, it was frou the lips of their Mancroft bells that a great hymn of thankfulmess leape to the skies while man and women wept and tried to pray.' Proceeding. Canon Meyrick referred to the ringers, who, like those in the choir stalls, were commissioned to land Gae's worship on earth. Theirs was an honoured place among the workers for God. "The music of our bells is like that of the Gospel. Thore is power-power not of this world. Hark the great iwo-ton tenor? We thought of the Norfolk men who at that very hour on that very day were marching to certain death on the battleficld of Gaza, and we thoughi of those who mourned for them. We remembered, too, that to-day, after lang silence, our bells would ring out the note of resmrection, of jife triamphing over death, and we thanked liod for the bells, for aur Norfolk heroes, and most of all for the assuramee of Easter.

The actual ringing during the interval in the service consisted of a few rounds and fring anly, in which members of the \$t. Poler Mant cirfl Guild alowe could take part, the occasion not allowing of anything else in the few minutes available.

Immediately after the service, howerer, and again during the afternoon, from 4 o'clock to 6.30 p.rinc, the hells were kept going, anol various touches were rung, in which ummerous visitors also joined. Among Those present were the secretary of fle Norfolk Guild ( $\$ \mathrm{I}$. A. Coler man), and ringers from Lpswich (St. Mary-le-Tower). Cambridge, Diss, Wymondham, Fakentam, Thoralam Magan (Suffolk), while representatives atteaded from mamy other local belfries. The mothods rung inchuded Stodman and Grandsire Cinques, Treble Bab Maximus, Bob Royal, Grandsire Caters, Cumbritge Sarprise Major. Tho 'go of the bells appears to toe all that can be desited, mat the improvement in the sound of the bells outside was much remaried upon. Nocdless tosay, the bell hangers (Messrs. Taylar and Co., of Longhhorough) have made an excellent job.

## THE FIRST PEAL.

## TO-MORROW'S ANNIVERSARY

Two lundred and ten years ego to-morrow, viz., on Mny 2nd, 1715, the first peal ou record was rung. This was a peal of Boh Triples performed by the Norwich Scholars, on the famous bells at St. Peter Mancroft. Although the compasition of this peal has zot been preserved, there is no reason to doubt its accuracy, for John Garthon, the composer, was also the conposer of the first peal of Grandsire Triples rung three years later, the truth of which was established by the late Mr. Jesper Suowdon.

The peal of 1715 is recorded ou e very eleborate board in Mancroft tawer, and the insaription is interesting:-
May the 2ad, 1715 . Here was Rung by the Ringers calld Norwich Solvolars, that most Tncomparable Peal call'd Grandsire Bob Triples, it being the 3 d whole peal they have rung, but the firs whole Peal Llat ever was Rung to the truth by any Ringem whatsoever. It has been studjed by the most Acute Ringers in England (but to no effect) ever since Triple Changes were first Rung, but now ht last it's found out to the truth by Iolin Garthon, one of the said Society, and Rung by him and the rest of the Soriets in 3 hours 18 minutes, which is aboat 1,550 changes in an hour, the whole Peal being 5.040 Changes, and not one Fell misplac'd or out of Course.
