## COVENTRY'S FAMOUS BELLS.

Are the famous bells of St. Michael's, Coventry, now the Cathedral Church of the new diocese, to be lost for ever to ringing? The question is prompted by the announcement that it is proposed to recast them into a carillon of i4 bells, as we briefly intimated in our last issue, and unless something is done quickly one of the finest rings of ten bellis in the world will disappear, to give place to a lighter set of bells of extremely limited capacity for tune playing. It is a difficult matter for outsiders to intrude themselves into the domestic affairs of any church, but here, we think, the Central Council might with justification endeavour to induce the Coventry people to hold their hand until further investigation has been made.

The position at Coventry is a unique one. Towards the end of the eighteenth century apprehensions as to the stability of the beautiful steeple, led to the bells being taken down and rehung in a wooden frame rising from the ground and unconnected with the steeple walls. When the church was restored in 1885 the western arch was thrown open and the bell cage, being considered unsightly, was ordered to be removed, and with it the bells had also to go. They were last rung exactly forty years ago this month, and, after being stowed away for a time, were re-erected in the Octagon, where they have since lung dead for chiming. From time to time schemes for the building of a separate campanile have been mooted, but have never matured, presumably for want of funds.
In the forty years which have passed since the bells were rung, however, great advances have been made in the engineering side of bell hanging, and it seems to us that there is opportunity here for a reinvestigation of the ability of the tower to carry the bells at a low level; or, if this project should be impracticable, to raise once more the question of another campanile. To melt up this grand old peal of bells seems almost like sacrilege, when the only object is to get out of them four more. We believe that with a little tuning to bring the bells into line with present day scientific ideas, these ten bells would be as fine as any in the land, and if eventually they are to fulfil no greater purpose than to be played upon by mechanical means, it is still to be hoped they may be preserved, and any extension of their number provided by entirely new metal. While one admires the generosity which has prompted a parishioner to defray the cost of the present proposals, there is very little information available as to whether any consideration has been given to a scheme to restore the bells to their original purpose, or whether any independent advice was sought. admire carillons（when they have sulficient scope）as very beautiful instrments，but as ringers we must guard against the sacrifice of bells，which might otherwise be rung in English fashion，to a desire for mechanical tune playing．Admittedly，the position at Coventry is unusual， but before it is too late we hope something witl be done to get the scheme，at least，reconsidered．

Mr: I'rollope and himself had lagd a great deal ol Lrouble, and had had practically to re-do the work, because they had not been able to get anyling from Hr. Lewis. Mar. Lewls was a very lusy man, but that morning Mr. Young bad handed him the papert Whicli he (the speater) sent to Mr. Tewis two yoarg ago. Mr. Trollope and he would look these papers through again, before going any further, and he hoped they would be in a position to puint a selection of 70 or 80 methods very shortly.
Mr. J. A. Trollape sad Mr. James and limself made uy their minds that they would not came to tho Coment this yoar unless they could hand in the complete mannacript ready for printing. The collention had been entirely rewrititen, but it was possible there were things in the original that that lad been overlooked in the new; therefore, Lley wanted time to look through the papers that, had now come hack from Mir. Lewis. Ther felt ashamed of the way they had had to come thare year after year and say they were go further forward. Critlemm, Mr. Trollope continued, was sometimes made of the proposal to publish these methods. It was said that lingers already hat more metloods to ring than they would ever ring. The committee dil not expect that linese Major Methods would be taken up witb the rapidity of the six-bell methads, but they must remember that before the sixbell collection was pulished six-bell ringers had about 20 or 30 mothods. There were methods which could be rung easily if they could ring Double Norwich, whereas ther mighi break their lecth on Bristol and London. Such methods were flose which werz rung at Willesden
Wr. G. P. Birton asked the committee to recollect if these melinods Were printed therre was another committee which might have sompthing to sar on the naming of them. Fe thought there was no analogg befween the six and the eight bell methods. They wank merer get mingers io ring all thesa landieds of methods on eight hells. In the methods that trere boing rung overy day, they had all the quality that jingets wanted ar ever would wont. He suggesterd that the Council should nof waste their money in printing these methats. 1. would the simply a scrap loook.

Mr. E. Barnett 1 lhought that was a verg narrow way of looking af thie matiter.

Mr. T. H. Beams supporfed wiat Mr. Burton had said with regatd to the naming of these meflouls. Once the names were printecd they would be pretty well sure fo stick to them.
The Rer. H. Jaw Jamea said the committee were ordered at the Lincoln meeting io print the methods and attach the names. They had attached the names, and weve going to print them.

They had hed a little trouble through the publication of peals laving been delayed for some montha after being rung. He ventured to say that such long delay in pubtieation should not take place agaia. Tlae Cunncil, he continued, would notice that the commiltee liad introduced a new columin into. We anatysis, indinating the number of conductars who had conducted peals for each association. There was in their repart cvers yoav a lang list given of conductors with the number of peala they had comolucted. This was a tahle that required a great deal of trauble, and the conmittee suggested that the Counci! should agrea Lo drop that part of the report, because the committee felt that it was somewhat of a personal thing: it indicated the performances of individual members of the Exoreise, and they felt that the analysis was for the Thareize as a whole, and not for any partioular indiiduals thereof.

Mr. A. H. Pulling said he cane prepared to propose that the points be abolished. It gave the commituee a lot of unnecessary worl, for il was impossible to ccramare one per! with another.

Mr, I. W. Parker said points marked the progress of a Guild on hasociation, and the quality of the ringing. There was nothing elso which marked that, and for that reason he thought they shoukd retain them, and possibly try to improve the way in which they were awarded
The Rov. C. D. P. Davies said points hat lout a grood long innimge. und he thoughi they might by bowlerl out.
The Rex. A. T. Beesion said the Conneil Hati already decided that points shall be given, and he asked if the rule cond be rescinded withont due notice.
The Presiderst: Not if it is a rule.
The Rer. A. T. Beeston said with regand to the eriticism of Mr. Soles, the Council decided the points. A table of point values was theme up liy their old colleagues, was discussed by the Council, and pinssed. The table of walucs was published in the ringiag papers, and it was liate fable which guided then in allotting points to peals. With tcgard to Leicester and Middesex Surprise Royal, the lalter was a chouble method, and the former a conpound melhod, and the Council hat decided that a compeund Sumprise method was of more value in poinks lian a dorble method. That was the reason why Leicester had 63 poinls, attil Mifflesex only 60.
It was pointed out that the scale of points was not a 'rule,' but a "denision," amd as such, the President held, could the altered without mrevious stotice.

## WELDING CRACKS IN BFLIS.

The 'lowers and Belfries Committee's report mas contained in a letLer received from Mr. E. H. Lewis, who said the Society for the Protedion of Ancient Buildings had raised the question of weldiag cracks in hells. The committce were not able to be rury helpiul, alohough Mr. Faircloagh thought such a practice was passithe. Two cases were repored ia tlie teclnical press, and wore sais to linve been successful. As. however, it is doubtful whether these bells had to stand the same freatment as our zinging bells, he could not say what the eftect would bea an liells lung for ringing. He asked for information of any ceses of welding of khich the members of the Council lard knowledge, and in the meantime le was, in canjunction with the S.P.A.B., enryyng ate some experiments on the change in erystalline structures in bell inelal eansen by welding
Thu. Hort. Secretary sait the yuestion was being investigated by tho s.P.A.R. with a view to saving some of our ntedieral bells. He always anderstood that it presented many difleultier. but their hellFoundiar friends would know all about the difficulties. Fie knew if hat tieen said that eracks liad heen cured by this process. He was told many years ago of a tenor that was mended by a German. Thim [rocess was eaid to be a secret one, and the mat locked himself in the tower, and ro one saw or knew what le did. Whather this pra*ess liad beor developerl he could not say.
Mr. Faircleugla said there was a firm in Warrington who would weld cracks in bells, if they were sent to their foumdry, on the terans af "No cure, no pay.
Mr. C. F. Johoston said lie knew of toro hrhs that had heen sucrexsfully welded, so far as the structute was concerued, but not so far 25 tono was concerned. He also leard of a German who wellt athout Figiand before the waw offering to mend bells by a secret proeess. Tit it was really no great secre, it was simple acetylene welding. He rlid a very good structural mend, bui lie diti not give the liell back its frone.
The Ref. H. Drake sait he did not see why they, as ringers, should Hiscourage the process. It might belp to kemp nin old bell in exist anco. He did not say it was rlesirable that anything of the tiad shonal be done to bells that were to be fing:
The Rer. H Law James : If isn'i necessary fo mend it if you don't want to ring it. Keep it wilh the crack in it.
The Rev. H. Drake: The eritek mas gel worze.
