

## 'SPLICED RINGING.'

With the article which appears in this issue, Mr. J. P. Fidler concludes the series of hints on the 'splicing' and ringing of Minor methods. Those who have studied them will, we think, agree that Mr. Fidler has handled the subject with great lucidity, and has shown the best and simplest manner of learning and retaining a great number of methods. Before he began there nust have been many who felt that to memorise thirty-five methods, such as were rung in the Norbury peal, was a task which only super-ringers could tackle. Mr. Fidler has explained the plan adopted by himself and his Norbury colleagues in such a way that no band capable of ringing a Treble Bob nethod should now eschow 'spliced ' ringing merely because of its complexity. Compared with the ordinary seven-method peal a ' spliced ' peal will still be a difficult proposition, but the practical hints by a writer experienced in this phase of ringing have done much to indicate the surest path through the intricacies of the task, and must have disposed of much of the 'fearsomeness of the undertaking.
The manner in which Mr. Fider has simplified the work for the uninitiated should induce a large number of sixbell ringers to turn their attention to spliced ringing, which, at the moment, at any rate, is the highest form in which six-bell extents can be accomplished. It does not follow, of course, that all will be able, or even desire, to go on to the limit of thirty-five methods reached by the Norbury band, but even if only for a service touch, a 720 in five methods will sureiy be more interesting to the ringers than an extent in one method only. The whole idea of splicing gives so much greater scope to a ringer's ability and variety to his practice that no six-bell band should be satisfed until they are able to ring Minor in this way, albeit, as we have said, they have no ambition or opportunity to go to the length of thirty-five methods.
When the Central Council publish their new book of Major methods it may be that there will be among then?, as there has proved to be in the Minor Collection, methods which can be spliced, if not in leads, perhaps in courses, and it is a suggestion wortly considering that the methods (if any) which will so splice should be brought together in groups, and an indication given as to the extent to which they can be so dealt with. There is not, of course, the same demand for splicing on eight bells as upor six, but there is no reason why that form of ringing should not be encouraged as adding interest and a certain amount of difficulty to the ringing. Eight-bell singers (to say nothing of those who operate on ten and twelve) are a most conservative lot of 'practicioners,' as the old (Continued on page 65s.)

authors used to call them. Anything beyond the 'standard methods ' (and in standard methods we, of course, include Double Norwich and the three old Surprise methods) the majority refuse to look at. Only here and there does one find a band venturing outside the welltrodden paths, so that anvthing that can be done by the publication of text books extending knowledge beyond the present limited sphere of practice, and encouraging enterprise among ringers, should be done. But to retu:n to the six-bell splicing, with the advent of the long evenings and the general resumption of practice nights, there ought to be a great advance made in ringing multi-method extents, and any average band, starting from the basis of Oxford Treble Bob, ought, before mext Easter, to be able to score a peal consisting entirely' on spliced 'seventwenties.' We wonder how many will do it?

## DUDLEY PARISH CHURCH BELLS. BISHOP OF WORCESTER TO BECOMF PATRON OF DUDLEY GUILD.

The restoration of the bells of St. Thomas's Church Dudley, has been completed by Messr3. Taylor and Co., of Joughborough, who tave retuned and quarter turned the bells and rehumg them on ball bearings in new fittings, The work las been carricd out in a lighly successful manner, and in conjunction with the strengthening of the tower lass cost about 5550 . The cost of four of the bells is being borme by mernbers of the families of the late Mr. W. J. Russon, Mr. R. I. Wilkes, Mr. Samuel Spillle, and Mr. James Thomas Bayliss, each of whom was closely identified with the Church's activilies, and to whom the improved bells wil] form a ftting memorial.

The dedication service was held an Saturday afternoon, Oct. 3rol. It was conducted by the Vicar (the Rev. A. H. Pluelips), assisted by the Revs. E. R. Wallace and W. G. Wilson. The Bishop of Worcester was present to perform the dedicatary rites, and the churchwardens (Mr. Hugh Watson and Mr. J. W. Naylary were also in at tendance. A large congregation assembled. After a beautiful rendering of the anthem, 'Rejoice in the Lord alway,' by the chair (accompanied on the organ by Mr. A. H. L. Cutler), the Bishop performed the dedicatory dutjes, and at the close of bis utterances a short peal announced the completion of that pare of the fuaction. Afterwards, the Bishop preached an appropriate sermon, and subsequently the bells were again rung, and gave great dolight to the congregation and all who leard them.
In connection with the dedication, the Durtiey and District Guild held their postponed annual meeting, the members attending the service, and afterwards adjourning to the Schoolroom, where a bountiful tea was in readiness. The Bishop was present and before leaving, Mr, Churchwarden Naylor, on behalf of these present, extended to his lordship a most bearty welcome to Dudley, and sincercly thanked hima for his presence that afternoon. Mr. Clurchwarden watson econded the vote, and the Bishop briefly replied, promising to become patron of the Guild. Mrs. Phelips, Mrs. Nayior, Miss A. S. Payne, Miss Marks and Sister Francis presided at the tables.
At the business meeting which followed, the president (Canon Phelips) oceupied the chair, and was supported by the wardens andi Mr. Harry Mason. - The Vicar extended a cordial welcome to the Guile, on behali of himself, the churchwartiens and the Parochial Chureh Council.
The Secreiary read apologies from Mr. C. E. Lloyd, Mi.P., Mr. F. R McDowell, Mr. A. Spitile, and others, and then read his annual report and balance sheet, which were passed.

The Ficar of Dudley (the Rer. Canon Phelips) was re-elected president, on the proposition of Mr. H. Mason, seconded by Mr. James George, and the Vicar briefly thanked the members for the honour they had once again conferred on him. The following gentlemen were again elected as vice-presidents: Messis. C. E. Lioyd, M.P., J. W. Naylor, F. Watson, H. Mason, A. Spittle, F. R. MeDowell and J. Me D. Tait.

Mr. John Goodman was re-Ellected Ringing Master; Mr. Herbert Sheppard, hon. secretary, with hearty thanks of the membere for his services during the past year; Mr. S. J. Hughes, hon. treasurer ; and Messrs. F. Evans and P. Justice, hon, auditors,

Sereral new members were added to the roll, and it was proposed to hold the nert quarlerls meeting at Nelfurton, the date to be left with the secrefary. It was also proposed io attempt the annual peal st Dudley, the arrangements to be laft mith the Ringing Master

At the close of the meeting, on the proposition of Mr. H. Mason, seconded hy Mr. James George, the best thanks of the Guild were given to the president for his past services to the Guild, and for the great service he had rendered them that das. for conducting the serwice in ehurch, for the use of the tower and bells, also for the Schoolroom in which to hold the lea and meeting. Thanks were also accorded to Mr. A. H. Cutler (organist) and the choir for their part of the service, to the donors of the fea, to the ladies who presided at the tables, and to those who helped in preparing and serring the tea, and looking after the wants and comfort of those present.

The President then closed the proceedings with prayer, ffter which members made for the belfry, where tley kept the bells merrily going until late in the ovening to the relight of arowts of listenors zound tse church.

On Sunday evening. Oct. 4 th, in connection with the dedication of the bells, and the larvest festival, a quarter-peal of Gratidsire Caters ( 1,260 elianges) whe rung in 48 mins., by B. Gough 1, S. J. Haghes 2, W. Goodrian 3, J. Goodman, junr. (conductor), 4. J. Goodman. senr. 5, W. Bayliss 6, G. Guest 7, H. Sleppard 8, A. Greenfield g, W. Mech 10.

The belfry is open for practice on Monlap niohte, from $7.45 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$, and all ringers will be welcone.

## NOTES BY THE WAY.

## HEALING 'נHE BREACH AT NORWICH AND WHAT CAME OF IT. <br> By J. ARMIGER TROLLOPE.

Will the publication of Melchior's last letter, the curlain falls on the drama, and, as is nsual in real iffe, on a drama witl the last act missing. We de not know who the jmpartial umpire was, where he came from, or what his verdict was. We do not even krow if that meetiog was hela. We can be sure that if it wore, there was mavit talk, that argument begat argument, and ai the end eacn side was the more convined that they were right, and the ofhers wrong. Whatever tho verdict was, ft was digregarded, for on the peal boards (which, of course, were not put up till a little time after the peals were rung), cach bank restates its clainn that they and they only list! composed and rang the first peal of Stedman Triples. But we to know ihat by some means or other, then or at a later time, the breach was luealed. Afley a few years the curtain rises on att epilogue where all is peace and larmony
In 1736, two trebles were added to the ring at St. Peter's, and this refinitely re-establishod it as the leading ringing tower in the city, a position it never after lost. At the same lime the bells were rehung or overhauled, and oller allerations made. Visitors to Mancrofe will remember that one of the shriking featuros of that noble church is the bower arch with ine great west window beyond, and the stone gailory which sarves as the present ringing floor, and from which also the early peals were rong. In the sevententh and eightecnth conturies men understood very little about Gothic architecture, and thingy were done which would have caused earlier and later generations to shurlder. At St. Peter's they built a wooden gallery at the west end of the clurch, and put the organ on the top, completely blocking the tower arcli and the west windom. In that case no further harm was flone when a new floor was put in the tower halfway between the stane fallery and the bells. This was donc entirels for the conveninnee of thie ringers, for, as an ald description of the clurch I lave by me states, the lower belfry was deemerl too far from the bells. And 1 lave no rlosbt the shorter" draughl. of rope marle ringing much easiex.

In 1737, on this new floor wan rung very remarkable peal. This was one of Grandsire Caters, 12,600 changes, in 8 hours 15 minutes of the band, eight hed rung in one or other of the two peals of Stotman, and rour belonged to the Mancroff party, and four to the Coslany party. Notice the order in which they sfood: Melchior of Manrroft rings the treble. Pettingall of Coslany the 2nd, Gardiner of Marrrofl the Sud. Robert Crme of Costany the 5th, Porter of Mancroft the 8th, Blofield of Mancroft the 7th, Faward Crane of Coslany the Bth, and Booty of Hancroft the 9th. It nuyy have benn a coincidence. but the fact that there were an equal number from each tower, and that they stood alternately one from each band, does look as though jt was interded to tell the whole worlrl that the bitter difyute of six years back was all made up and forgoten. The other working bell was rung hy Thomas Barrett, the lenor man in the first peal of Frandsire Triples amd a Mancroft ringer. It is interesting to notice also who did not ring. Thomas Cmane did not stand in. Perlaps he had nat forgotten or forgiven Melchior's gibes and declined to join his brother and father in the eenernt reconciliation. Porlaps, and likelv enough, he was nof considered a good enough ringer. Fis friend, Rice Greene, is also absent. Of the Mancroft party John Foster was gone to Corinegliam, and Johm Whebster, though he was good emough a ringer. and quite able to stand a long length, was not partimarly ambitious to ting peals, and ploferred to he one of the several ingexious ringers who were abroad the whole time with proper rules to prove tive rertainty of the performance.'
This peal is recorded by a very gine board which was hung in the belfry on lie level of the new floor, and is, now that that floor has heen removed, very high up, and except in a strono light hardly readable. It reads as follows :-

On Maych the 8th, 1737, usas yung a peal of Grandsive Cators. which for the excelency of its ringing. Harmonious Clanges and Ye number of them, was certainly superior to anylhing of its kind erer flond in tha World and to Remove all douldt of the trall of the performance several ingenious Ringers were abrod the whole bime with proper rules to prove the certainty of ye same. Thus was this great peal perfectly compleated to the entire satisfastion surprite and amazement of thousands of hearets in the space of 8 hours 15 minutes. The mumbey of changes were 12,600 . rong by 9 men of the company, thon helonjing to the company. The tenor simgls by $a$ young ringer 8,000 , then $a$ secourl ringer rang bel to the and of the peal. The persons names and the bolls they rung 5 follows:-
Thas. Melehior 1, Wm. Pettingall 2. Jobn Gardiner 3, Tho. Barreft. 4. Roheri Crane 5. Wm. Porter 6. Tho. Blofeld 7, Edwd. Cranc 8. Cliristi Boety 9. James Jerom. Robt. Liddamon tenor." The rather curiously worded stalement that " the clatages were rung hy nine men of the company then belonging to the compans.' tells us
and doublesss wins intended to tell us, that not only hat the ohl enemies become rrients, but the breach was so much healed that the two rival bands ${ }^{\text {s }}$ were joined into one company, with its headguarters at St. Peter's. The name of neither composer nou conductor is given, but we may be sure that Helchior called the bobs. He had fully rindioted his right to be considered by all as the leading ringer of the city.

The figtures of the composition ure losh. [ inugine from the Jengtit ( 12,600 , which is 700 leadsi, thal it was divicled inlo regular ant equat parts, and it is pretty cerluin that it was on the old plan with humtg, the big bells coming home alj regtular intervals.
It was about this time that Renjamin Amable discovered the super iority of the tittum posilion in Cuter ringing; but the Norwich foen hat their own deas about compesition, and are not likely to have copied Loution.

When you eonsider that this peal was rung only twenty-fwo years after the first it Huy mellod you will see that it wass at really fine performance. 11 whis the sixth lenglh of over ten thousand, the first being the 10,080 of Treble $530 h$ at Coslany in 1727 , ten years previonsIy, and five men rook pari in bollh preals. It remained the longest lam bell peal for a humdred and fifty-one years till April 111.h, 1898, when the Oxford Diocesan Guilc rang 13,265 of Grendsire Caters at Applefon, I. W. Washbrook heing the consposea and conduetor, and the Rev. F. E, Rolbinsan ringing the fifth.
Curionsl: enough, though, it was only by the barest chance that Norwich kept the record so long. Only forls-oue days later than the Mancroft peal, that is an April 18:11, 1737, the Painswick men rang 12,001 changes in the same methoti. Of course, neithar band knew of the other's performance, of the Painswick company wothe surely lave added the extra six lundred changes to give them the record. Mr. Snowdon semed to think flat this penl was rung by relays of ringers ju tha same way that Barham's peals at Leeds in 1751 and 1761 were. Twice laler the Norwieh record was nearly but not quite bealen, ance at Painswict in 1817, when 12,312 Gitandsire Caters were rang, and once at Fulham in 1837, with 12,096 of the same method. Bolh these latter, however, were single-handed peals
The forg peal forms a titting climax to the first stage of known listory of ligging at Norwich. The firs peal of Grandsire Bah Triples was rung hy a hand who liad to struggle liard. In 1710 they aecomplisherl liaff a peal, a very greet performance then. Twice they rang the whole peal, but for some reason or other neither could stand, and when at last they disd succeed they probably thought they had done enougli, and Garthon and his contemporaries stood aside for younger and more ambitious men. Only one man of thisg bayd rang in the first peal of Grandsire Triples in 1718, and Garthon gave way as conductor to Melchior, who, as wo fave seet, nobly clid his part in the development of the art of ringing. And now he and his men in their turn fell that they had rone enough peal ringing, and coulf afioud to resi on their laurels.
John Webster, who succeeded as leader, wss not the ambilious man his predecessors and successors were, and so nesily thirty years went by, and a new generalion of ringers grew up before the next peal was scored at Norpich. This was Imperial The Third Hmjor, Bt St. Giles, in 1760 . It marks the beginning of the second periorl in the listory of Norwich ringing-a period ns\%aciated with the names of Lindsey, Chamberlin, Burton, Cheshuni, and others, who proved that they were fully the equals of the viligers who liad gone before them. Butt with these nien and thoir doings we are not at present concemed. Ji monld be a great mistake to jurlge these old singers by the numher of peals they rang. In the early part of the eighteenth contury peals were much more exceptional things than they afterwards became, and rery mueli more exceptional than they are at present. At Norwich, at any rate, the iclea scems to bave been that there was not mucli reason for going for a peal unless it was in mathod that had not previonsly been rung anywhere, or was a longer leagtly than hat previbusiy been accomplisherl. The only exception I know of was tho second peal of Grandsire Triples, the one in 1719, and it is noticeable that no loard was put up for that.
Something of the same irlea seems to have been held about composition. When the peal of Grandsire Bob Triples was "at last found out to the truth by JOHN GAR'THON,' after it had been ' studied by the most Acute Ringeve in England (but to no eftecl), that wat a thing worlti recording. So, too, when Garthon 'perfectly tiscowergd these Intricate methods [of Grandsire Triples? which were hidden from the gyes of all ringers of Tinganti.' So, too, when Stenman Triplea was "brouglit to lipht, and truth' by Tedward Cranc. But a "quartetpeal " of Treble Bob Major'。 thongh it were 10,080 ethanges, and a paat of Grandsire Caters, though it wore 22,600 changes, were muln leaser things in composition. Ringers elsewfore hat done as mucla, and the Norwich boards pass them by in silence. During the thirty-mine years that St. Peter's harl ten bells orily iwo penls are known to hapfa been mung on then, but hoth were of exceptional merit. One was the long pat of Grandsire, the alhar the first peal of Dotalle Norwich Canrl: Boh Roval.

1t is not surprising, thevefore, that although Stedman probably continued to be praclised at Norwich, that no other peal of Triples was jung thore till 1839, when Eamuel Thurston conducted a 5,040 of Lutes', at St, Giles. The first peal of Caters was in 1843, and the tirsl peal of Cinques in 1844. The firsl peal of Slednan Triples rung ottside Norwich was on May z2nd, 1799, ut St. Giles-in-the-Fields by Ilie Junior Gumberland Sociely, composed and conducted by John Noonan. Tho dirst peal of Caters was rung by the College Youths an May 28th, 1787, at Sil. John's, Horsleydown, London, composed and conducted by Jolin Reeves, and tho first peal of Cinques also by the College Youlhs on October 6ilu, 1788, at St. Martin's-in-the-Fields, womposed and conducted by Thomas Blakenore.

## HINTS ON •SPLICING' AND RLNGING MINOR METHODS.

 By JOHN P. FIDLER.-CONCLUDING ARTICLE.Some day, perhaps, our mathematicians will lell us exactly how many difarent 5,040 s (ol seven methats each) it is possible to ring thom thirly-five methods. Cerlainly enough to keep a band on the go for a 5 cur or two. At the raquest of the Editor, and for the bempat of those companies who, though lack of facilitios, are unable ta get the practice necessary to ling a large number of metheds in a 0,040. 1 give below a few peals in less methods.
Iu the seconcl article of the series, dealing with 'splicing,' I gave a nuven method peal. There is no necessity to repeat il, but presuming it has been ruug, let us look at Rochealer, No. 5, paga 9 of the Ceniral Council's Coliection. If 'Burton' has heen mastered, this can be rung straight off, College Dxercise being substituted for Oxford, Rochester being produced by rirging College Exercise 'up, and Eurcon 'down.' Next, look at Killamarsh (No. 14, page 11). P'ais is kent 'up,' with a work 'down which can easily be leamed.

Working to these figures, we can produce a twentrone method peal. For guidance, I have commenced each 720 with the odd method of that particular group, so its inhroduction remains constant throughout. As oeven more methods are required, take one from each group, and introduce it in the second part of the 720 . 3or example, refer to the dirst 760, Ely and Bogedone, ring the first part as stated, but in the second part substitute Knutaford or other momber of the group, and in the last part switch back to Bogedane, thus givirg three methods per 720, or twonty-one methods in all.

Further use may be mado of these figures, and a bwenty-eight method peal rung. Ring the first two parts as jnistructed for the twenty-one method peal, but instead of returning to the origima "even' method after the first bob in the last part, make use of another member of the group.
Should this prove too diffeult, there is an easior peal of this number of methods. It is obtained by cutting out the 'odd' method of each group, and using only the four methods which 'splice ' lead for lead.
Those who have made themselves conversaut with the subject should now experience no difficulty in building up peals to suit the standari of the band dosirous of ringitg peals of Minor.
Before concluding, what about the test of enduranve coupled with the reteation of the work of many metbods? In the past we liave bad long lengtls of Major Metlods, Rojal Metlods, etc. Fere is an opportuaity for the strong six-bell men. How about thirty-five extents? Taking an average of twenty-five minutes per 720. it is only a ratier of about 14 hours 35 minutes, and when you have done it, no doubt the Central Council will open a subseription list and erect an extra special Peal Board
I close, hoping that this series of articges will creaie ay added in terest in six-bell ringing. If it does. I am rowarded

## NEW PEAL OF BELLS AT CLEVEDON. MAGNIFICENT GIFT TO SOMERSET CHURCH.

For the first time for a hundred years, a peal of bells raug out fram Clevedon's ancient Parish Church on Wednesday, Sepl. 30ih, when, wilh quict, but impressive ceremoninl, the Archtioncon of Bath dedicated the new gal generously given by Miss Jeakims, of Clevedon.
The church originally possessed five belis. In 1825 two were sold for church repairs, and in 1827 a third passed from the church. Of the (wo remainieg, one (which was cast by John Cockey) now rests in tho
 lias been retuned, and forms the tenor in the uew poal of eigh1. It bears the inscription :-

> I to the Church the living call,

And to the grave do sumuon all.'
The even now bells have been cast by Messrs. John Taylor and Ca. of Louglatorough, and the whole bung in a new steel frame.
'Whe bells all bear appropriate inscriptions. One is inscribed in memury of the donor's sister; on another appears the name of the Vicar of the parish, the Rev. Preb. H. E. Badcock; and the names of the two clurchwardens, Mr. H. C. P. Dity and Mr. E. J. Hagley are inscribed upon a third one.

The spiendid work of providing the new bells and strengthening the tuwer has cost over 81,100 .
The dedication coremony was atteuded by a large number of clergy and a crowded congregation. The combined choirs of the Parish Charch and St. Peter's were in altendance. A shortened form of evensong was conducted by the Rev. W. E. Horsley (assistant ourste), the lessons leing read by the Rev. S. B. Berry (Yiear of St. Mary's, Bridgwatar, and formerly assistant ctrate at Cievedon Parish Church), and the Rev. Preb. H. E. Badcock, R.D. (Vicar of Clevedon). The processional lymn was ' We love the place, O God.' Psalms cxaii, anfi al. were chanted, and then, after another hymn, 'We give Thee but Thine own," the Vicar and churchwardens, with the Archdeacon, promeded to the entranceray to the tower, where the Viear, on belalf ait the donor, requestea the Archdeacon'to deticate to the glory of God, and for the use of this parisl, the peal of hells now huns in this claureli tower."
The Areldeacon, after offering prayer, shemnly dedicated the hells, and the lecal ringers (a band of beginuers: rang a tew rounds, led by Mr. T. Francis.
Tha singing of the hymn, "Now thank we all our God,' preceded the Arehdeacon's scrmon, which was based on the $95 t^{2}$ Psaim, $6 t 12$ verse, - O come, let us worship and bow dowri; let us kneel before the Lort mur Maker.'
During tho singing of the hymn, 'Praise, my soul, the King of Heaven, a collection was taken towards the cost of erecting an outside entrance to the belfry.
'The singing of ' 0 Godl, our belp in ages past,' closed an improspive aud extremely well-ordered service.
Preb. Badeock having wished Mr. W. Gillinglam to hring a bana of ringers from the Chew Deanery, a quarter-pesi of Grandsirm was then rung: E. Golktōe (Portishead) 1, T. Wratt (Clapion-in-Gerdano) 2 . R. G. Willinms (Partishear) 3, I. Rislop (Wraxall) 4. G. Yeo (Long Ashton) 5, I. Nishet (Portishoad) 6. W. Gillingham (Portishead), conrluctor, 7. T. Dear Sir,-1 have been requested by members of the North Wales (Hange Ringers Association to make application to you for reduced fares for our members when attending meetings in connection with the association of bell ringers. 1 would like to point out to you our nxsociation includes Flintshire, Denbighshire, Carnarvonshire, Werionethshire and Montgomery, and meelfings are held in various lowns in these countics, hut, owing to lack of cheap fares, our memhers are unable to altend these meetings as regularly as they would like to do so. For instance, a mecting was held ia Barmonth a few dinys ago, and owing to the heavy railway fare from Rhyl to Barmouth not one member was abie to attend, but had a recluced fare been nvailnble, such ns fishormen and golf players participate in, I think I could safely say seven-eighth's of the members from Rhyl would have attended this mecting. And the same applites to members from Wrexham, Buckley, Rufhin bell ringers' societfes and other societ tea in the North Wales Association. Then, agnin, variaus members of this society womld often like to travel to visil beffrics to ring peals, but owing to the Iack of a reducerl fate for hell ringers this eannot be done.
Our associntion consists of about 200 members, and if reduced fares were granted to members of hell ringers' societies going on bell ringers' business, I am sure many more would use the train service, to Ihe mutual henefit of both parties.

I ame giver to understand various associalions in Greal Britain are applying for a special reduction in fares for use of behl ringers, and are forwarding their application to headquarlers in their district. I trust you will give this application your consideration and that we may have a favourable reply granting us conditions of retituced fares,
eajoyed by other clabs and societies.
