## A BAD PRECEDENT.

The fight for the preservation of Coventry bells is finished, and the peal, as it has existed for a hundred and filty years-recognised as one of the finest peals of ten in the country-is irretrievably lost. One last effort to save them was made by the hon. secretary of the Central Council (Mr. E. A. Young), who deserves the utmost thanks of the Exercise for the energetic and tenacious manner in which he has carried on the struggle to prevent these bells from going into the melting-pot. His letter to the Bishop of Coventry was a last, despairing attempt to gain a respite, but the curt reply from the Bishop's secretary, published in another column, makes it clear that the sentence of the Court will not be interfered with. We believe that ringers throughout the country will regret the passing of these belts, which, though few of the present generation have heard them, were a 'tradition in the Exercise, and, of their kind, a supreme example.

There are very few old peals of bells whose preservation, except for sentimental reasons, could create the feeling that has been aroused by those of Coventry, and there are many which ringers would be only too glad to see go into the furnace and be recast. The points, however, that strike us most in connection with this question are, first, the fact that the thin end of the wedge has been inserted to substitute, in church towers, for our fine oid English art of bell ringing the mechanically played carillon; and, secondly, there has been established a precedent for melting up good peals merely because they are not 'Simpson' tuned.

It is in the former that we see the most danger. When next a big restoration at an important church or cathedrai is taked of, we shall not be surprised to hear of some Dr. Brazil or Professor Starmer coming along, calling themselves camparological experts, and advocating following the example of Coventry. And, if we are not very careful and wide-awake, the church authorities may decide to follow the example of Coventry. Moreover, it might even develop into a "fashon," and if it did so it would be a sory day for our art. The people who are in the best position to counter any' 'aggression' of this kind are our bell founders, who, until recently, at all events, found their ' bread and butter' ins the towers of our English churches. Lately, however, the carillon for abroad has, happily, increased the English bell foundry trade considerably, but it will only continue to be,
happity' for the art of ringing, as long as the carillons are sent overseas, or, at any rate, are kept out of our church towers. In this matter, we say, the bell founders, who can get the first word in the ear of the church authorities, have an overwhelmingly strong position, and (Continued on page 6 6.)

## NOTES BY THE WAY

## EARLy PEALS OF DOUBLE NORWICH

## By J ARMIGER TrROLLOPL

The one mathod about which we should have expected Habluant give us partictar information is Double Norwich Court Bob, but in whis thang ho is woctrilly disappointing. The first peal of Major was rung in 1771 ; the first of Royal in 1769: and the first of Masimus 14 1817. But Hubbarif seems to have knowu nothing aboup any of them. Of course, be could not hetp knowing that the Maxinus was ruag, for there was the big koard in Mancroft belfry that records its performace; not, as now, high un and almost out of sight; bul casily read from the old floor. But what was rung Hubbard did not know, und could aot tell us. As for the other peals, they were writen on no boards, and the memory of them seems to have died out in the city. According to Mr. Snowdon, the 6,160 whieh Thurston ealled at Coslany m 1831 was claimed to be the jongest in the method át the time. I do not know where the claim was made (it is not on the peal board), but sixiy years before in the same tower 6,720 had been ruug; and the rewarkable thing is that the mun who rang the tenor to that peal, Joln frowse, was stifl alive, still living in Norwiol, and still trking anl interest in ringing. Most probably he was still a menber of the Mancrofic company, for membership was practically a life tenare. Once elected, a marr remained a momber till he (ijed, or resigned, ol lefl the city. If he got too old to lake any active slare in the ringing, a younger man could always be fousd to deputise for him, and sfter the latiter was paid there was stilt something for the old man, which doubtless came very welcome. Trewse's ringing career hegan very soon aiter the revivat of peal ringing under Clamberlin, and le outived Samuel Thurston and the climax of ringing :n Norwich.
The Erst peal of Royal was rung before Trowse was a ringer, but he knew the men who look part in it, and it is strange that in his lifetime it should so completely have been forgatien. But it always is the case that imperfect sympathy exisis between old mea and young. The oid are not always willing or able to give the knowledge they possess, and the roung are still less willing to listen. Ollerwise we might know a great deal more about early ringing than we do. After ail, it would not take many cansecutive memories to caury us back to the rery begiming of peal ringing. I kgew Ben Smilli, who knew John Trowse, who knew Chamberlin, who snew dohn Webster, who was one of Gartion's pupils.
Double Norwich Roral was composed by Willians Porter in 1751. and was regularly practised at St, Peiers for many years. As late as 1857 Joln Cox. when on a visit' to Narwich, rang a course or two with the Norwich Soholers, and during the intervening century it seams to hare beer a standard method at Mancroft. But only one peal was ruag. Some time ago. Mr. Gcorge Berton foand the full recortl of this in the files of the 'Norfolk Chronicle.' 'On Monday, April 17ih, 1769, was rung nt St. Peter's Mancroft in this city, a compleat 5,040 of that mosi mgenious peal called the Court Boh. It was performed in three hours and 29 minutes, without a fell being out of course; and from the harmony and regularity of its clanges filled every lover of the art of ringing with the most pleasing worder and astonishment. This incomparable peal was invented in the year 1751 by Mr. Wm. Porter, one of the ringers belonging ta St. Poter's company, and though from that time it has been annually practiscù, yet never was perfectly gone through with without bells boing out of coutse till now; so that il may be affirmed that this is the firsl compleat 5,040 that ever was rung in the known world, performed by

Double Norwecl, Majol was conposed aboul. the same time, whether before the Royal or after is doubtful. Somewhere or other I have come across a I rarliliont of a peal of Major belag rung before 1769. but I cannot trace it, andi the 6,720 at Coslany is the carliest we have any reeard of,

Thae following is Oshorne's account of it:-
St. Mielhel, Coslany. Sorwiel, January $15 \mathrm{~L} \mathrm{~L}, 177 \mathrm{I}$, was rung Normich Scholars a peal of 6,720 echanges of Court Roh, in 4 hours and 25 minates, by the underwititen members, as follows:Jno. Chamberla in Jno. Peake
Sno. Havers


The methad is called Cout Bob only, but there is mot the slightest cioubl that it was Double Norwich. I have already lold how tha Notwich men ealled it Court, becruse it was what they thought was the correct version of Court Boh Minor; low "The Clavis authors added the word Norwich to distingursh it [ronn tho Court Bob then rung in London: aud how Shipwuy further added the word Douthe. You will notice, too, that Obborae spells the conductor's name Obambotain, but the usat Norwich spelling of bile name is Chamberliz, as given in the "Chronicte" accound of the peal of Royal. He also spells the tenorman's natne Frowse, and Mr. Sinowdon does the same when copying the 1778 peal of Treble Twelva frous the Chuberland's peal book. But the cotred name is l'rowse, and is evidently derjved from the village of that anam on the outskits of Narwich.

Chamberlin, as conduchor, was succeeded by James Wafling, who called the 5,170 ol Grandsive Cinques in 1775, ami Tluomas Barton, who composed aud called the 6.240 of Oxford Treble Boh Maximus in 1778. They, in turu, were followed by Robart Chesnuth, who occupies a foremost place in the history of the Norwxht Scholars, and who is especially associaterl with Donble Norwich Court Bob. Fis lesilership lasted from the closing years of the eightecnth mentury till lis deatli in 1821, and he conducted one or two notable porformances. Bul the next peal ta the Mrainuts was not rung by the Norwichs Scholars, but by a yoltng and energelic band who piaclised at St. Giles'. This was on Outober 22rid, 1809, a peal ol Bob Major. It was conducted by Jefly Kelf, and was inc tirst by all the band, which included Samuel Thurstou, Eelf does not scem to have done unything elsc, bul a Charles Kolf, whoionsly a relative, rang in the Maximus in 1817; unless it is the same man. Tha Mancreft ringers prohably despised such siuple station Boh Major, and thein next pen] was Doable Nowwich Major at Coskny in 1815.

Monday, December 18th, 1815, 5,040 ethages of that Intricute Method of Norwich Courl Bob were rung in thred lants and 20 minutes in this steeple without the misplacing of a bell, or the repelition of a single change. Cbesnuti, with his acoustomed preciston, and the hold amd regular striking refiels great eredil on the ringers; after which a short lengeh of that Ingenious and Harmonious Peal, Stedman Triples, was rung by the same conspany, and perfolmed by the collowing persons

Meanwhile Thurston was making a name as a ringer of oulslanding abilits. For a long time he was outside the Morwich Scholars. The companj, no doubt, was full up, and Chesnatt was not too tolerant of the clatmg of a young and brilliaul. rival. The rivalay between the two was pretity keen, and led to the younger man clablenging the older in tine local paper to rigg with him for $£ 100$. Whetfer this challoge was more than rhetoric, and how, if aceephed, it was to be decided do not appenr, lat it came to nothing. Thurston joined the Norwich Scliolars in 1814. ant with his lielp one of the rery best performances they ever did became possible. This was the peal of Double Norwich Maximus at Si. Peter'f on IJanuary roth, 1817. The following is a copy of tive tablet which records it

He * Lhongte it was one of the methods given on page 37 or 38 in the foutils edlijon of his hook, which means be difl not know anylbing delinite about $3 t$. He cloes not give it in his first edition, and apparcnlly in the six senrs thet had elapsed between the ringing of the penl and his becoming aequainted with the company it had ucen complelely dropped.

## A QUERY

A correspondent writes: Isn't Mv Trollope making too 'wivid a cuntrasb' in his last 'Noles by the Way' concerning the Brothers I'rowse? If John Trowse rang a peal in 1771 , he would he at least 94 yelits of $\mathrm{Hge}_{\mathrm{g}}$, when Hubhard was dreaming of his 1845 edition? The names appear in the subscribers" list merely as "J. Trowse and 3. Trowse, junr.' They were probably descendants, but surely not the 1 Thi-1817 brothers. Nor was George Smith the son of Mafthew Smitli, as stated in a former article.
One wousd hava thouglat that he would have heen sure to heve int quireld aboul such a notable performance, especially with the big peal Loard so continually before his eyes whenever be was ringing at Sancroft. He was julimate with Thutston. the composer, ant though Tlumston was dead when he wrote his book. Joln Trowse and Nalhaniol Beales and Thomas Hurry wore still alive, if not othors. Bat Trowse was very old, possibly there was a slight caldness betwaen Turry and Hubbard, and Beales seems to have been a silent, reserytrd man, not gived to talking about bimself and his doiags. William Fremman toid me that as a young man lie worided alongside Beales, and knew him well, but never lieard him so much as mention the peat, surely ilie most outstanding thing in his personal history.

## BELFRY GOSSIP.

One of the men who contributed enormonsly to the foundations ul the art of ringing was Benjanin Annable, who died on Fenruncy liste, 1756 -one lundred ant seventy years ago next Monday. He wiry buried under the Lower of St. Bride's, Flect Street, where in 1724 lat hati taken partio in the firsi peal of Cinques our record.
A newspaper parasrapla of that day may well bo quoled, atrl, altheugh liere may be fulsoute fattery, it indicates something of Anmable's ability, and of the admiration which was lield for his work
'A few nights ago waz foried moder the tower of St. Bride's, M1 Benjamin Annabel, the best ringer that was ever known in tho world fill his time riaging whe only called an art, but from the strength of his great genius lae matried it to the Mathematics, and 'tis zow an science. This man of ligures and ringing was like a Newlon in philosophy, a Ratclife in physic, a Hardwick in wisdum fuld haw. a Handel in music, a Shakespeare in writing, and a Garrick it acting O rare Ben!
Forty years ago to-day Henry Haley, one of Lomion's formasil composers and conductors, liwd at Bethat Green, al the age of 66.
The first penl of Double Bols was rung at St. Mary's, Whailechapul, on January 29 th, 1769
At Warnham, where, next Saturday week, there is to be an nilemply on the London Surprise record, Harrison's in, 176 of Kent Treble [hols was rung on February 2nd, 1891. On Feh. $4 \mathrm{th}, 1861$, 10,032 Grandufle Major was rung in 6 hrs. 18 mins. al Walsall.
For a young ringer who only rang his first Surprise peal on Des. 31st. 1924, Jola A. Cole, of Godalning, has a mosi creditnble revord for 1925 , his peals inchuding five of Superlative, four of Cambridge anil 13 of London
In connection with the first ten-bell peal mung by a band of lamies, namely, that at St. Clement Danes last week, referred to efsewhere in our columes, it is inierest'ng to recall that the first ladies' peal was Grandsire Tripies at Cubitt Town on July 20th, 1912. Peals. exclusively by iadies, since then have not been numerous- three or Pour allogether. Miss E. K. Parker, who called the first on eight, liad hlw pleasure also of condrecing the first on ten bells.

She last nuw to her credit peals of Grandsire and Stedman Triples, Plain Robs and Kent and Oxford Treble Bob Major, and Stedman Caters, and is ringing Double Norwieh ant Cambridge Surprise. Considering ${ }^{\text {ant }}$ restricted amount of practice she has been able to obtain, Miss Hawskworth has developed into an exeellent ringer, her hell management and striking being superb, and she possegses the happy qualifiration of being equally ' at home' on the heavy end as on the tiglat hells, Reliabilitw is just ancolher of her strong pointa.
Many eninent ringers were present who heard the performance from start to finish, and all were evthusiastic in their prajec, for it was unanimously agreed that the ladies had accomplished a feat of whirh they might naturally the proud.

## WHAT DO RINGERS THINK OF ：MPEON TUNING？

Sira－I also attended，as an interested spectrar and listener，th Consistory Court held at Coventry to consider the recasting of these famous bells，and now that ihe result is known，I would like to give your readers some of my impressions．To ali those who hate heard these bells rung or chimed，it musy．Tiave been a sheck to hear the startling evirience of the supporters of llo petition，that some of these bells were out of tune，and also by out own witnesses that they conld be intproved by the tuming machinc，which really goes to show how careful one has to be when judging a peal of bells by the ear．I have heard foventry heils chimed，and thought they were splendid，and all in tune with one anotlser．but accorting to the musical experts they were not，althouglı i flo not agree dies were out of tune to the extent of the plano demonslation．which wes en－ lifoly misleading，still we hed no evidence，as you romarked in your leading articie，on nucet it．
As one reads hisis case，it will be rery cratent that one of the man arguments was whether halls shorid ha simpson tuned，or．as we know them，luned on the oll plan：and，in wew of the faci that the question of the Sizopson aung of bells is． 1 believe on the agenta for the Central Counsil meetiog to be held at Ipswich this year，my object m wriling is that yon invile ringers and non－ringers interasi－ ed，who have lat their helle recast or retuned on the Simpson ptin－ ciple，as carried ont by our English bell fonnden＇s，to say whether they consider they lase a betier and more toneful peal of liefls than those cast and tumed on the old plan．This expression of opiaion would ho verp useful fo show the general opinion of ringers before the menting at Ipswich．I have in mind among recent rreast and retunen peals of bells，St．Chad＇s．Shrewshury；Westbury，Wils；St，Margaret＇s．Lei－ cester：Nouks Kirlyy，Warwickshire；St．Mary＇s，Warwick：Maceles ficld，Manchester Cathedral．Westminster Ahbey；\＆t．Andrew＇s．Hol－ born；and St．Cleaten Danes，Strand；and nearer Birminghem，we bave St．Pefer＇s，Whlvertiampton：Wednesbury：Bishop Roder＇s，Bir＇ mingham King＇s Korton，and Sorlhfield，aud which represent vecomi work by our three bell founders．There are mans ofliers I roulit quote，such as Tivertous．Devou，hul ilage are suffiently well known members of the Exomeise atmonge？these lowers mentioned who conld give us their opinions．fo conelusion，I for one am convineed that the art of bell founding．ns il exists toriav，is a vest improvement， hoth in casing anal tuming，aud thaf where peals of bells com br im－ proved we shoukl all assist in geting the wery best thal is there for tus．I apalogise for 1 aking up so much space，but Ifel cortain all ringers are keenty interefed．and 1 hope wir shall tave the wiems of olliers on the questinth of simpson thent belle

## NEW BELLS AT USK.

## FENE PEAL OF EIGET FOR SOUTH WALES.

The complete restoration of the bells at Usk, Monmoutisbire, has just been completed by Messrs. Johm Taylor and Co., of Longhborough, the scheme including the recasting of the old six hells with extlat metal and the addition of two trebles, the whole being rehung in a new iron frame on a steel fouadation. The tenor is now $14 \frac{1}{2}$ cwh., and the old inscriptions have been repraduced on the bells, which are thend on the firms ' Truc harthouic principle.

An improved Ellacombe chiming apparatus has bepn installed, and The old Sanctus bell has been reliung with new fittings, in uew framework, athote the news bell frame. The inscriptions on the bells are as follow:

The dedication took place on Wednesday, January 13ih, the ceremong being performed, in the presence of a large congregation, by the Jisfop, who also dedicated a memorial stained glass window. The Bislop preached an impressive sermon, in which le dwolt on the message of the bells. Thesir exercise, he saiti, shoula be subservient to the spiritual life, and thes slould not be used for anything that was purely worldy or secular. When they rang they carried a message to every Christian soul in the place, and they micted ass a sort of hond to keep them together. To the devout the hells were living messengers giving a call from God. They spoke not only a message, but he thonght it would not be inreverent to say that, provided the community wrs a devoul and spiritual community, thes might the regarded ns giving pleasure to God Himself; that just as God wes pleased to hear His preises sung from a thankful heam so was Ho plensed to hear the hells as a memorial hefore Him. God world never hare made the birds to sing unless He Joved music, and He would acreut the sarsic of the bells. Giont intended them to become His real children, ant if they were slack, incifferent or below the level they ougha to reacl, the bells would call them back aut cause them to roturn to that path of righteouspers which should lead them up to God.

At the dedication the bells were rang by the locel hand, uniter wro. P. $\mathrm{I}^{4}$. Clift, and aftor the sarvice members of the Llamaff and Monmoulh Diocesin Association rang tourles of Gravdsive and Stedman Triples, and Roh Major, and the delightifl tones of the betls were mercla admired, as weil as was the pasy 'go' of them, and Messrs. Taylar and Co. are heartily to be congratulated upon giving Soutio Wales anolicer fine neal of eight.

Dear Sir, Mr. Bibloy, in his reply to my query, is in agreement with my argumett, whether he intends to be or mot. Firstly, he says it is obvious that ho who can yimg Surprise Minor will ring the Major extensions quicker than he who is ouly a Kent Tueble Bob Minor ringer. Ho makes a diatinction between a Spljed Ninor riager and a Surprise Minor ringer; I canot see why, The elamees ate, that when a ringer is capable of ringing a number of spliced extents la will be far in advance of lis Surprise broller: int fact, lue may be splicing, Surprige methods. If, when a ringer has mastered the "Abbey Group,' page 32, 'Method Splicing,' le cannot ming London Su'prise Minor, he ought to give up ringing.

In Hr. Bibby's suggestion for a vourse of shudy he inelades the elementary and advanced, hat excludes the intermediate stage. Nine bands out of tere capable of ringing Kent Treble Bob Minor, are not in a position to jump to Cambridge or Loudon Surprise Minor, withoul outside leelp. Eyen those who do accomplish it have liad to put in many liard practices and waste much time before they were successful. Does not ' Method Splicing' supply his intermediafe strge?

Without giving any reason, Nr. Bibby stales that the book is not the Gest slepping-stone, yeb flat stage which it undoubtedly lends up to, is, Further comment from me is unnecessary.
I thank Mr. Keeble for lis very lavourable remarks. and I thimk if lue will study splicing eavelully, leaming methods by order of passing troble will be found the belter way. Coursing is a very good guide, but las too much of "follow my leaver" about it. At the present moment, I am not converennt with a great mumber of Sajor methods, but should imagine ihere are sorne which are combinations of two or more methods, similar to the Minor methods, and if the time comes when wo or more Major methods are introduced into one course, the ouder of passing treble will prove its superioritw. Take Mr. Parker's eight metiod 720 , for example (page 41. 'Method Splicing') it would be a diffimple mater to ring ail, other than by fla order of passing treble.-Yours, etc. JOEN P. FIDLJR.
