In recent years there has been a gratifying amount of attention bestowed upon the bells of our cathedrals-not more than is commensurate with their inportance and their intrinsic value, ful more than in any similar period in their earlice history. Same of them have been brousho into prominence by the addition of extra bells, others by restorations, but no scheme has feached the dimensions of that undertaken at York, where a clean sweep has been made of the old bells and fittings, and an entirely new and heavier ring installed. The story of this restoration is told and jllustrated in our columas this week, and we nced not repeat what is said clsewhere. We wonld, however, congratulate Nessrs. Thylar and Co. upon the highly successtul completion of their important contrate, which has had no equal in English church bell abnals since the same firm erected the ring at St. Patl's Cathedral nearly fifty years ago. How well the work at York has been carried out ringers themselves will have the opportunity of testing at a near date. At the moment the gathering on September ath $^{\text {th }}$ is postponed owing to the fact that the contractors for the booring in the tower have not yet completed their work-bat this much is certain, Messes. Tatylor have not only left nothing undone to ensure that these beils shatl add to their already great reputation, hut that they shatl in all respects add to the glories of the noble minster in which they have found a home.

Looking down the list of the cathedrais in possession of peals of bells, one is struck by the fact that the large majority really have bells in good, or tolerably grood condition, and certainly pealable. There are at few instances where improvements micrlit with advantage be effected, and we hope that the example of York may induce those responsible to undertake the work in order that it may soon be said that, in the quality and condition of their bells, the cathedrals of Enyriand form an outstanding and complete ilfustration of what our chureh bells should be throughout the land. In those instances where the state of affairs demands that attention should be given to the bells, we hope the ringers will take every oppotfunty of bringing the matter before the responsible atuthorities. Fqually inportant is the question of having competent ringers to handte them. Although the bells are in good condition, as we lave said, in most cathedral towers, we are not so sure that the stme can be said of as many of the bands. Here it is purely at matter for the ringers so to improve their ennpetence that the ringing, as well as the bells of our cathedrals, shall be an example to every church in the conntry.

## FOR THE BEGINNERS

## CONDUCTING.-BY GEORGE WILLIAMS

Keeping to Doubles, before going on to Bob Minor, etc., a few lines on the Graudsire method may be useful. I take it for granted that the young conductor has made himself perfectly acquainted with the difference in the dodging places, viz., 4-5 instead of 3-4, and has ascertained that this is brought about by the making of 3rd's place instead of 2 nd's, with an exira bell in the hunt.
By ringing, to start with, the 5 th, and malking it the observation bell to what is known as the 'old 120' of Grandsire Doubles, a bob is called every alternate lead (or 'Hone'), that is, the lead following 3rd's place. The fifth passes the treble in 3-4 up, and this will cause it to double dodge in $4-5$ up, with the bell coming out of the hunt. The bob aiso has the effect of causing the bell that would have dodged in $4-5$ up to make 3 rd's place and take up the hunt.
This calling, twice repeated, brings rounds in 60 changes; therefore, to ring the full 120 , a single must he called instead of a bob, half-way and end, or at either of the calling places, providing you call each half to correspond.

## NOTES BY THE WAY. <br> MORI: ABOUT PEA]. TAPPING <br> BY J. ARMIGER TROLLOPE.

My notes in 'The Ringing World' of June $25^{\text {th }}$ on Elijah Runerts and peal tapping have brought me a most interesting letter from Mr. J. Segar, of Ketford, which, with his permission, I will reproduce. Those who remember the peal tapping achievenents of a few years ago will agree that no one has a greater right to express an opinion on this matter than Mr. Segar: I raised the question whether the mental strain of tapping a peal was not greater than any one has a right to subject his brain to, and 1 quoted an incident to show what other peopie thought of it. One of the young gentlemen who were tapping peals, I said, wrote to a well-known parson ringer, asking for the figures of a peal he intended to try and tap. The parson's reply was something like this:
Elijali Roberts tapped peals, went mad and shot himsell. I am not going to help you to a like fate.' Here is Mr. Segar's letter to me:-
' 1 have been interested in your articles on tapping because I sometimes do a little, and also because I am the "young gentleman who wrote to a parson ringer." In the first articie you give a very clear explanation of how it is done. I use the transposition or mental vision method. I can see six figures so well that in 1913 I could tap thirty-five methods, and have brought round a 720 in each. My best published peal was one tapped in Anston belfry, consisting of seven extents in different Surprise Methods ("Ringing World," September 12th, 1913). I differ from your opinion with regard to the mental strain, and should be less fatigued tapping a peal than in conducting one of Grandsire Triples on tower bells.

I also think different to you with regard to the comparisons you make, namely, that it is very much harder to tap a peal of Bob Royal than London Surprise Major. I do not know whether you ane personally acquainted with any tappers, or whether they will not divulge the secret, but there is another way of producing the changes in methods such as Plain Bob or Kent. The method is so easy that friends of mine with no previous experience
"have tapped a plain course of Bols Major wiff less than half an hour's instruction. It also has the advantage of making it easier to tap 5,000 of Plain Bob. Sixteen than Major, because the greater number of bells the less courses required. I am not proficient in this system (as I use the wision system), but could manage several courses of Plaits Bob. I do not wish to convey that it is casy to tap 5,000 of Bob Maximus. I mean that the system is easy to understand, and that inexperienced persons can almost immediately produce the plain course. From there it requires a great deal of practice, but a man who was desirous of tapping a 5,000 of Plain Bob would find Maximus easier than Royal, and Royal easier than Major. The disadvantage of big numbers is the tremendous number of blows which have to be struck.'

Mr. Segar enclosed me an explanation of this system, which I will come to later. He concluded his letter:'As a tapper I have great admiration for a man who can "see" eight figures, namely, Mr. Morris's London Surprise, and 1 camot understand the means of producing Stedman Caters, but the old idea of tapping peals made up of many plain courses was never deserving of the praise ther received.

I appreciate the good intentions of the Rev.
but he forgets that one swallow does not make a summer. I am sorry that some marriages are unhappy, and should not have to search back to 865 to lind a shooting affair ending a life of misery. Do you think the reverend gentleman has ceased ofliciating at weddings in order to save the young men and maidens of his parish from a similar fate?

1 certainly was quite ignorant of ally system of tapping, and 1 am sure the vast majority of ringers are so too. My comparison between Loadon Surprise Major and Bol, Royal was based on the transposition or - vision " system, as Mr. Segar calls it, and so far he corroborates me. For if it be so difficult to 'see" eight figures that only one man, Mr. Morris, is certainly known to have been able to do it to any extent, then to 'see' ten figures must be very much' more so, while the task on the higher numbers becomes stupendous. The plan Elijah Roberts used is still uncertain, and probably will always remain so, hut after reading Mr. Segar's letter I am almost sure that he used some system similar to the one explained by that gentlemas. The way he arranged his bells was as follows:-

and this is the arrangement required by the system Mr. Segar describes. But we do not know how he adapted this system to Stedman, and it will be remembered that a peal of Stedman Cinques is the best anthenticated of all his performances.
The other point Mr. Segar makes is a good one. Different mea difter so much in mental equipment that it is neither wise nor fair to dogmatise as to what any individual can or ougint to do, though it is certainly true that no man ought to subject. his brain to a long strain if there is the slightest chance of its doing him any injury. And, after all, it is possible that Elijah Roberts' suicide was only remotely the result of his ainormally developed brain. On this point, Mr. R. O. Street's letter, with the quotation from the 'Liverpool Daily Post,' throws a lot of light. For many years Roberts lived an active and outdon life, and no one has ever suggested that he was then in any way eccentric. It his latter years he foflowed the trade of a publican, and a publican has pectuliar and strong temptations. Perhaps with adovancing years his interest in life and in ringing grew dim, and he may gradually have got into the habit of tating more than was good for hirn. At any rate, for a fortmight before his death, he had been drinking heavily, and the immediate cause of his cutting his throat was defirium tremens. A very sad ending to one whose name will always be remembered in the history of the Exercise, but fortunately not one which our recent peal tappers are likely to come to.

## THE NEW BELLS.

The upening of the new riug of twelve at York Minater, which to take place on Sunday, August 291 l , uarks the completion of than greatest scheme for a peal uf clutelt belhs carried oui in Englama since the arection of the peal at St. Paul's Cathedral, London, in the yoer 1878, und the event will remain a landraark in the listory of bell restorations in this combtry. The scheme las been n whaprebitensive one, and was first considered serfumsly in 1924, when it became ubvious that sumething must be done to put the Minster behs into proper ringing order. Reonsting as well as vehtnging wis proposed. The Dean and Chapter were prepared to hear the cost of the te-
 the recasting. This, however, was mate focssible by the readiness with which new bells were offered. Three were at once promised by three of the Minster canons, the chapter wherk offered a fourth, the ringers underfook to provide another, abal so quickly, by generous gifts, the grand bid city, whose history goec back to the time of the Itomans, was assured of a peal of bells in keeping with the glory of its ancient tane.
 wil Lougliborongh, who lave thus been responsithle for the three largest ringlag peals in the world St. laul's with a tenor of 62 cwt , Exeter with a nenor of 72 cwt, and now York with a magnifeent ring, whose tenor is 60 ewt ., and sounds a line deep $B$ flat-actually the decpest toned tenor of any ringing peal in the world. The old ring, cast in 1844, Werr broken up, and with the axdition of new metal lave been converted into a peal of a full aml rich ruslity of tone and perfectry 'vaiced.' The bells have beea turned on Ite 'Taylor True-Harmonic system, which ensutes abablute sweetness and purity of tone, nt harshness and dissonance being elimimated thereby. The perfection achiered in this ring is the result of yearz of exhaustive research work by the Lougliborough firm, by which they bare obtained vast axperievee of bell tuning.

The addition of a new semitone, an A flat hell, between the 6 th and 7 th hells of the peal of 32 , las provided a madde ring of eiglat in b iat, and thos, lite Exeter, York will have four rings of six, a minor and two major eights, a minor and a major ten, as wall as the riag of twelve
The belle have been hung with new fittings of the most mindern type, incomporating all the latest and origial improvemeats introduced by Musims, Taylor and Co., elesigama nat only with a view uf reducing the labour required to ring the bella, but so also that the jells should remain in porfoce riagiag order, wibl the minimum amount of atiention The ratent 'balanced 'type of clapper is fitted to several of the befly, and this ensares each bell "clappering ap, oin tha right side without any cherking of the rope on the pant of the ringers, in addition to giving the behi a sharp how, thetely prodicing a tull tanal effect.
The bells are hung in a new massive iran framework, on a foumdaLiou of stant steel girders, well braced and firmly bolred together, the entr being grouted into the tower walls, thereliy forming a bond fand henoming a source of strenglt to the tower; in fact, cul ringing ap the hewrier bells, with clappers tied, churimg the conse of restoration, it was possible to be in the leal chazhoer without being aware than the bells were in full wwing, the general tesigu aud sirength of materials being so perfeet that mo mavement or looseness was apprient.

THE HISTORY OF YORK MINSTER BELLS.
The bella of Vork Minster lane lad an interesting history, and from the ringer's point of viow the famons pilw is the more noteworthy because it was bie lume of the frest peal of twelve bells hung for ringing in this country. Moreover, withat one period of 79 yerrs it ponsused two nepinate rings of twelve and ond peal of ten bells. The following particulars of the bells are uxtracted from a histary which Mr. J. R. ferman, of Balisbury, wrote for" "Ilue Ringing Worial "in one of ottr early numbers, nml they are well worts reprotueing bow that the Minater is in possession of a new and magnificont ting of twelve.
The enrliest notice of the hells is found in wald record extracted from the fialurie rolls, futerl s.D, 1371, written in metheval Latin, wherein it appars liat several bells were recast and rehumg, and sombe wark done tu the clock, whicla altogether anounted to the sam
 metals were delivered lo Thmans Innocent, bell founder of Fork, for casting four bolls on July Ilth, $1+66$.


UNLOADTNG THE ELJVENTHY BIELL AT THE MINSHER DOORWAK.
In the 16 th cancury here apperr to have been four bells in the north-west tower aud eight in the sauti-west one. On January 7hy 1655, these fotw were removed to the south west tower, and this seems deventi bell was crarkerl the fourth also, bping antuanble, botm were recast. The metal of the largest of the throe bells of St. Sicholas-wifioui-Wnlongate (at that time pullod town) was added to mata up the weight vequired. A further record stated that: $\frac{1}{1}$ Dicklason, buing Lenrt Nravor of the City of Sork in the reat 1657, in wonjenction wiih the Aldernan mus Conncillors, gate flso rowaris zelontriting some af the dal bells, rud making the chimes sound delighofally and perfecly bus thom nil.' Accurding to the dates on the nid hals the fourth, seventh and eleventh sern to lave bebn the onder reeast at that time ; and pussibly also one or more of the smailen Imbly. Notwithitanclag all Lhis the four hells from the north-west tower li:l rot even ilien hammatise with the otiser eight. Su in low Sithimel Smith, bell fonmider uf Yark, was entiplayed to fecist them. The mseriptions on the twolve bells at this time were as follows.-

Ihese bolls were ling iu two tierb, fine front five above, and the back seven below. They were never perfectly in tune. Jwen after being recesi by Sumue! Smith the froul lour were too light for the back eight, llie trable boing only two feet in diameter, and the second, thiril and fourth in the sarue propartion, there being a diference of nearly six inales between the fourth nud fifth. It may also be soticed llat the trable of the late peal of twelve was two feet six inches diameter, wherens the fate tenor was quite three cwt. lighter than the ond cist in 1627.
In 1733 it wus decided to Ery what retuarging would do towards improting maters. Tho 'York Gouranl' For November 26ih, 1733 gave the following account of this:-

Un Mouday, Mr. James Harrison, of Barrow, in Lincalnshire, linighed fite relanging of the peal of twelve bells in the southwest tower of the Chathedral, according to the erticle entered into by linti with the Venerable Dean and Chmpler. This was the first patal of twalve bellg in England, the tenor or largost bell being apwards of a mote deeper than the tevor of any other peal of Lwolve, dud is near six foot in dimmeler. The eleventla is about 5f humaltedweight. The rest of the bells, indeed, are not in pro portion to those, in which disadwantage the skill of the uthertaker appers vory muth, for they perform their revolutions wery regis larly, and thoir elappers are so woll managed as to make every agreathe harmony, All twolve ase knug upon one surface, or plain, in one frame, sfier this alteration several peals of Triples, Boh Slinor and Caters lave heen performed on the said balls hy the tew Society of York Scholars, who design to shortly attempt those of Bob Major, Oingues, and Maximus. The tenor may be jung by one man lor some time; but twa can manage it with ease. All the rest are raised aud maintained by one man to each bell for a considerable time. The whole is completed to the satisfaction of the church, and is agreed by most able judges to be the best finished piece of work that has been known in these parts. The said Mr. Harrison has also regulated the chimes upou the suid bells in at vary elegant matumer,
It shoulf, perinaps, be puinferl out that the Ilth, said to be about 51 ewi., was actually one 42 swt. 1 gs . It la., and the tenor, reputed to weigh Gij cwt, was found to be only 55 cwt. 1 qr. The "several penfen referred to were probably only totuches.

WHEN THE MTNSTER FAD A PEAL OF TEN.
Notwithetanding the relanging by Harrison, the old peal of twelve bells was still considered unsatisfactory, and in Dean Fountayne's Lime an estimate for a new peal of ten was obtained from Lester atad Pack, of the Whitechapel Foundry, London, the aew peal to be as nearly as possible like the peal of ten at St. Mary-le-Bow, London, cast by the sume thrm in 1762, just three years previously. The estiarate was to cast a pesl of ten bells, weighing collectivoly ten tons, a 130 . per ponim, 51,21365 . gd. To take 13 old bells, computed to weigin 1 s tons 18 cwh., aud allow 10h. per pound for them, fl, 201 19s. Bd., ledving b balance of 8117 s . The 13 old bells mentioned were prosimably the back seven of the old peal of twelve, the old hour bell and two quarter bells of the clock, athl the three bells formerly at St. Michael, Spurrimgate, to which ohureh the front five of the old Cathedral bells were romoved, where they still are, a troble having been added to them to make a peal of six

The Cathedral belis were tocordingly taken down in 1765 , and it appens that then the eighth bell was sola to $\pi \mathrm{My}$, Beckwith fot eleven petwe par pound. The liack six bolls were then found to welgh as follows:-

From this it uppears that not only were the front four bells of the old peal too smatl for the back eight, but there was also an immenge disproportion botween the tinth and tenth, zearly 25 cwt. Fhere wa
difieratuce of quile seven inches in the diameter of these two bells.
The order to cast the new peal of ten $\mathrm{B}_{\boldsymbol{y}}$ nearly as possible like Bow bells was faithfully carried out, the tetor woighing 53 cm 0 q1. $25 \mathrm{lb}_{2,}$ just $3 \mathrm{Jl}, \mathrm{h}$. havier than Buw tenor, The bells were ppened on August 18Lh, 1765, and the following advertisement relatintis thereto was pulblished:-

This is to give notice to all Gentlemen ringers and others that here is a new peal of ton bells (cast by Lester and Pack, of London), to be open on Monday, the 19th of August next, at Yozk Minster, and allowed by the best judges in Londion to be as fine A peal at that number as any in the kingdom, and as heavg Free liberty being given any straugers la open the peal Any Fingers that choose to come the Supday evening before wit be allowed to ring a round peal upon trial. They are notre banging by Samnel Turner, bell havgur to the above firm. If any geatoman, churchwardens, or others want any uew peals of bells, or ally that want new easting, or hanging, by sending a letter to the said S. Turner, ai the Cross Guns, near the Minster, betwixt this and the first of September next, they shall be waited upan immediately, and their work faithfully executed after the verty best manner by their most obedient and lumble servant, s. Turner.

We must here notice that an old clonk bell ased to lang in the south hransept. It was 43 inches in aliameter, and weigherl about 14 out. and was insoribed "Ave Gratia plema Dominus tecum.' The clock, being warn out, was removed in 1752; and this bell, together with the two auarterujack bella was removed in 1762 aud sold lo Lester nud Pauk with other old bells, as before statod.

There whs also a service bell which formorly hang in one the turrets of the south transopt. It measured 30 inches in diameter, and was inscribed as follows:-

his bell was removed in Dean Gale's time to the top of the central towar aud, later on, to the south-west tower, where it was destroyed in the fire of 1840. Lester and Pack's peal of ten bells cseaped the fire of 1829, caused by Jonathan Martin, the mad jucendiary, which only destroyen the eastern pari of the Minstor, but itu the evening of May 20th, 18:0, athother fire broke out in the south-west tower, which quickly spread to the ruof of the oate. In a short time the mlioje towet was on fire, and Lester and Pack's peal of tou leells was tota destroyed, as well as the roof of the wave and the old service Both.
Whetr the Calbedral was restored, Stephen Beckwith, M.D.., presonted the yeal of twelve bells, which occupied the lower unlil inst year. The peal were in the key of $C$, the same as the former peal of ten. The tenor tras about half ewt. more than the old one, and was put up, together with the clock, hefore the rest of the oeal. The whole peal were l'ung for the first time on $d$ uly $4 t \mathrm{th}, 184$. The inscription on the 11 th was

The bells were last vehung in 1915.
The dealicalion of the now bells takes place on Sualay. Owing, however, to the fact that the fooring in the tower has not yot been completed, it has become necessary to postpone the ns'ragenamts tor the 'Ringers' Day,' which had been anuounced for Seplanber *相.
