## THE NEED FOR MORE RESERVES.

We shoutd like to emphasise a point made at a meet ing of the Kent County Association at Edenbridge on Saturday by the Rector, who, commenting on the fact that few of those present were young men, urged the necessity of training young ringers so that the gaps, which must inevitably come in the ranks of the seniors, can be filled and the disastrous state of having insufficient ringers to rieg the bells in the future avoided Everyone recognises, or should recognise, the fact that continuity of efficienty can only be obtamed by training hew men, not when the old have gone, but in anticipation of that eventuality, yct in how few cases, comparatively spaking, among ringing companies is this done? Once is band is got together they are, as a rule, content to go on withoun thought of the future, butil something occurs 10 break the circle, and then, at any rate for the time being, if not permanenty, ringing in that pationlar centre suffers a seriuss set back. It is a constant occurrence, and yet the number of bands where there is any sy'stomatic attempt to bring along young ringers is very small. There are, it fict, too few reserves. Where young ringers are to be fotnd it is generally in those towers where there are not enough old hands to man the ropes. Many cases could be cited where the lass of only one ringer, throush death or removal, has thrown a band back fir a couple of years or more, yet a little foresight and the expenditure of the requisite time on tuition would have saved all this. We know the feeliny. A band has strugened to make itself proficien, and hass, perhaps, reached a stage when, al last, it call get some real satisfaction out of its performathes, and thing's go so smoothly that the desirability or necessity for any young bloos heing intraduced non only seens remote, but is definitely looked upen as invoiving a waste of time and trouble. It is, however, far from that in reality. Ringing companims senerally have quife an insufficent number of reserves, ats is olten evidenced by the fact hat When one nata is alosent it is met possible to ring all the bolls for service. No pastime that we know would loe content with such a meagre: reserve force ats we find in the Exercise, and rimging hats conlinually to suffer the ittevitable result, first in this tower and then in that. The difticulties in bringing in new men in these days of so many other attractions are fally realised, yet there never was a time when people had so much leisure on theirs hands. The hours of work are shorler by fat than wheu the present grey heads of the lixereise begat to ring, and there ought to he amony the Churehmen in every parish half-a-dozen who would be prepared to give an hour or two a week to be trained as the reserve for this part of (Conrinued on mage 655.)

\section*{NOTES BY THE WAY \\ THE ERFECT OF RELINHOS CHANLES ON RINGING。}

\section*{[1\% J. ARMICIER TROILODE.}

The attitude of the Puritans towarels bells and ringing is illustrated by the following incident. In 1032 Abhott, the Archbishop of Canterburs, visiled Soobland, and at Durlaze he was shown the parish churd hy a crumpl, unseemly person, the minister therenf. He inquired how matily bells there were, and was told, "None." His Grace asked • how it chanced,' and the minister replied, with some astonisiment at so simple a question, that ' it was one of the Reformed Churches. In lidinhurgh, Abowt hand omly one bell ; all the rest had been shipped to the Low Countries. That was in swoland, where Puritanism had far greater puwer anmen the common people than ever it had in Enyland.

In England there does not seem any evidene that its influence led ton any destruction of beils, but it did tend to lessen their use in the services of the fhureh, and, conseguenty, siswe the common people loved their bells, and would have them rung, if not for une purpose, then for another, it slid tend to secularise lieth and ringing.

In many cases the ringing of holls, which once was for purposes of ritual, was contifiued, but the original reason was forgotten. It survived as custom without any renson, and sometimes purdy seedial and even grotesque reatons were given for it. At Kegworth, in Leicestershire, for instance, the ringing of the Angelus at 7 atm. survived, but the willagers thonght it was for waken the rectury servants.

In these circumstances it is not surprising that since change ringing started at a time when lhation ideats were very strong, it was looked upon, both by its friends and is foes, as a purely secular pastime. From the early days of the seventeenth century, when the 'invention of the sises marks the real beginning of change ringing, antil 1600 the power of Puritanism wats steadily increasing. The Catholic party had ow fight a desperate, and, for the time, a losing batte 10 maintain its hold within the rhurch, and had litte or no opportunity of influencing the position of ringing in the chureth services.

The year 1648 saw the death of Charles 1. , the establishment of a Commonwealth in England, and, as far as Parlanment could do it, the turning of the Church of England into a Puritan seet. The effet on ringing does not selen to have been very great, but when in thoo the reawtion came, and the Fingdom and the Churth were restured, it received a big imperus. This was the time when Fabian Stedman was living and ringing at Catnbridsc. In 1657 the College foutho are said to have visiled that town, and, wher there, were presented by him with some five-hed peals, which they rany at St. Benct's.
Shipway, following a sertan amtiquary ammed Parnell, says that Stedman's Principle was rung at that time, lyit that, I think, is an error. The Principle was eviclenly ant produced until later-between 1668 and 1677 . So that either the College Youths' visit did not take place till after 1655 , or, which is likely, what was rung was some phain changes which Stediman and other men were at the time developing. In tgй Stedman published his first book, the 'Tintinnalogia." and he leils us that the previous few years had seen atreat and remarkable developareat of singing.

1'erhaps, in the whole history of the Exercise, ringing and ringers never stood higher in the estimation of the generat public than it did at this thee. It seems to have attracted all classes of people. Professor Jeblh, in his L.ife of Richard Bentley, says that the chief sports of the undergraduates at Cambridee at the time were tennis, ratcquets, bowls and hell ringing. And in Londsul the College Youths were apparently a weil-todo lot of men. Ringing, however, stilh remained seculas.

Thert was a Catholit reaclion in the Church during He: lisis years of the seventecnth century, hut it disi not last lenge enough to have much effect on the ritual of the services or any at all on ringing, and its matn fore was spent when, for politionl reasoms, the most prominen

Religious opinion in the Churd of Enestand of the righteenth century was totally different from that of the seventeenth. The lomg and inter conllicts were sucadeded by a perioul of quie- and apatly, and the gemeral effect was to conlirm the secular nature of ringims. The country clergy were largely the younger sons of the country gentry. They held the service on Sundays, and the rest wh the week they behaved much in the same way as the squires, hunting and shooting, and taking part in the ordinary country sports, except that, generally npeaking, they were free from the heavy drinking and gross talkings which were common at the time.
[o surth men prize ringing; was at thing to be eneouraysed. They did mot ronsider it any profanation Churdo, and, indeed, under the circumstances and at the time, prize ringing probably did far more good than harm. There was titte in no inceat of reverence for the whurdn bulding. The altar was merely a table, to be used at the celebrations, which were seidom held except on the three great festivals, and at oher times was a conveniont place where ofld things could be put, and where, ofters enough, the parsm laid his hat and doak during the service If the altar was so treated, shere is little to wonder at whan the bells were used for sport or other seculat pyzoses.
.as I have already pointed out in these notes, is structive to compare the inscripions on the bells cast in the seventeenth and eighteenah centuries with thuse befare the Refomation and all the present day: The riagers themselves were ordinary men with ordinary faults and failings. One of the most notable of the vices of the eighteenth century was drankemess. It pervaded all classes of sociely from Cabibet Ministers, judges and land-mwners downward. It was common in the Universities. The amount of wine that some of the most eminent men of the time drank is staggering. Notrody considered it as anything particularty wrong. So long an could "carry his liquor" and not make himsell a nuisance to others he could get drunk as much as he pleased. And no dinubt risugers, heing sociable and gregarious folk, were particularly liable to this failing. Ringers, tow, are conservative people, and hang on to old customs, and it is likely enouglt that they did continue their convivial habils alter greater sobricty became common among the better educated classes.

The religious revival begun by John Wesley and bis supporters did not touch the Church of England directly, and did not influente ringing at all. The Evangelical movement of the last years of the eighteonth and carly years of the ninetcenth centuries was within the Church, hut its intuenre wats nom For the gond of ringing. Those

wecelent athd pious ment, its leaders, were very fitte conerned with the rituat of publie survices or with reverence for church buildings. Thes sought rather the conversion al individuats, and any ringer who came under their inlluence was much more likely to give up ringing altogether as at worldy thing that to eonsider himself a hurcly worticer
Thus tha' wiole tendency of religious opinion it the Chureh of Fngland during the seventeenth, eighteent? fand early nineteenth centuries was to make change ringins a purcly secular pastime, and, of course, that idea largely survives to-day. But now it is being increasingly realised that bell ringing, while it is a setular pastime, is atso something more, a part of the ritual of the Church; and that bell ringers have a very real status as church workers. To the realisation of this we owe a great many idvantages. Our bells are better cared for; our belfries are dean and well furnished; and we ourselves are held in higher esteem. And this is entirely duc in the first place to the Catholic movement which began in the middle ol the nineteenth century, and has contmued to this day As I have already saicl, the rast amount ol what that movement stands for is entirely outside out present subject. All 1hat concerns us here is the grealer reverence and care for the church buildings. It began with the east end, but is inluence has spread to the tower. The early rituatists personally did nothing for bells, they had orher and more immediate things to think of. It was the widening of the intuence among all parties of the Church that has brought in reform.

But, while the old order was passing, and before the new had come, ringing and ringers bad to pass through a time of reproach. They hat intherited the traditions of more than two centuries. Naturalls, they lagged belind the reforms which were taking place in the east end of the Church. This, [ think, is the chief reason why ringers nad ringing were held in so low esteem during the forty years or so which preceled the inneties of the last century.
