## WHEN EXPERTS DISAGREE.

Over and over again it has been apparent that on certain points in the theory of composition and construction, and particularly construction as related to methods, our experts cannot agree. They argue at length, and not infrequently end up by befogging the mind of the ordinary ringer more than ever. These experts look at the same subject from different angles, and apply different tests to support their own standpoint. It is not altorether surprising, therefore, that they olten come to different conclusions. Each nay be right, according to his own basis of argument, and, if one side were left unchallenged, the case is generally so well made out that the average ringer would usualty be content to accept what he is told. Then, however, comes the expert [rom the opposite camp, and to his own satisfaction, but to the dismay of the onlooker, tears the argument to shreds, only to have his own case simitarly treated by his opponent. And so the thing goes on, first in relation to one matter and then to another, and has so done for years.

The latest phase of controversy is Superlative Surprise Maximus. A method, obtained independently by several composers, has been practised at Ipswich, and is put forward as the most nearly correct extension of Superlative that it is possible to obtain on twelve. One of our masters of method, the Rev. H. Law James, now tells us, however, that 'it is interesting, but not Superlative Maximus,' and in view of what Mr. James has in the past urged as the correct extension of the method, we are not surprised at his objection to giving this method the name claimed for it. For years Mr. James has argued that Shipway's extension of the method to ten bells is the correct one, and, in support of the view that it is so, the has carried it out successflally we believe to something like forty bells. But, if Shipway is right, Mr. George Baker and the others are wrong. In the meantime the practical ringer wonders where he is. He may not be much concerned with the details of the controversy; he is frequently quite uninterested in the argument, but he does feel that he has a right to some competent guidance on matters of this kind.

The Central Council once set up a committee to decide what should and what should not be considered a 'legitimate, ' or, as it is now termed, a ' regular 'method. The decisions have been challenged from time to time, but they have been accepted by the Exercise as a whole, and respected to such an extent that peals in or including 'irregular' methods are now seldom rung. Is it not possible for an expert committee of the Council to be set up, to consider the question of method extension, and to lay down the lines upon which, hereafter, extensions will

be recognised? It might not be an easy matter to dieal with, but something might be done to clear the ground ly setting out the tests which should be applied and to which method extensions should comply before being granted the right of name of the original. It is possible that any such decision woukd not le immediately accepted on every side, but in time the findings of a really competent body of men would, we leel sure, come to be recognised by the Exercise as the foundation of method construction and externsion. With such a ruling ringers would know where they stand, and those who enter upon the practice of such a difficult thing as Superlative Maximus would know whether they were ringing the real thing, or only something "interesting.'

Since that tinte, Mr. Georgo Baker has freen trying to explain away the fnota dy a theory of reciprocal welationship between the bells.
Nuw, everpone knows that if a theory comes into conflict witin achual facts there must be one fallacy ul least in the theory, and I have hrun followilg Mr. Baker carefuly, looking for the fallacy, and at lust, in lis article published in "The itiaging World ' on November 51 h , the fallacies come to light.
Tfu writes: " La all even-bell primary principlesg there exists wint I mill reciprochl relationship of the apprsite pairs of bells, and oll eight leells these are 1-8, 2-7, 3-6, and 4-5.

But this atutement is not true.
Wo nead not trouble about Superlative; the plain 123456 bunting course on Eix bells is quito sufficient to show He fallaty.

One and six are a pair, and whon they have got into enelh oliher's places, we do not get 654321, but G15231. 2 must chande with 3 and 4 with 5 . It is quite likely that such a band could he abile to get a quarter of an trons and ring welliknown hyma tunes before a studio service. They coukd ammgn to finish off with, say, a caurse of Sledman Cators doukle-handad for the benelit of listening ringers. Tluey have gu interesting fistory. When in the early 'eighties, Mism Hubbard first thought of wrovidiug bells for her Parish Church, les great wish was that the bells should be as goow as possible. With uis Rim in view, atnd possibly under the advice of the Rector of Slauglam of those days, she went to Belgimm, and there fell in love with the tones of the ofl Belgian belle and the wonderful carillons of the Lowlands.

## NOTES BY THE WAY <br> GEORGE NEWSON'S NOTEWORTHY PEALS <br> <br> By J.ARMIGER TROLLOPE.

 <br> <br> By J.ARMIGER TROLLOPE.}los his carly days Nefson usually rang at the light end, aftenwards he usually called from the tenor, and, although never al very strong inan, developed into a first-class tenor ringer. In 1894 he ght together a band to attempt the extent of Double Norwich with the tenors together, 3,440 . The latad statated for the peah on Easter Monday, Natrch 26th, and rang 13,072 changes in eight hours and fitteen minutes, when the treble rope broke-a most unfortunate and disappointing ending when so near home. Curiously enough, on the same day another long peal attempt failed by a mechanical defect. This was at Wolvertampton, where $\boldsymbol{i}_{5}, 000$ of Grandsire Caters were attempted under the conductorship of Mir. John Carter. 7,362 changes were rung in Cour hours and thirty-nine minutes, when the temor dapper broke.

The Cumberlanal band, though disappointed, did not mean to accept defeat, and a few weeks later the same men, starding in the same order, successiully accomplished the peal at St. Efward's Church, Romford. The finished peal took only one minute longer than the unsuccessfut attempt, which is accommed for by the difference in the weights of the tenors, Brentwood being at couple of a hundredweigla heavier than Ronford. *Romford, Essex. Tite Society of Royal Cumberland Youths, on Wednesdaty, Aprit isth, 1894 , in eight hours and sisteen minutes, al the Church of St. Edward, a peal of Double Norwich Court Bob Major, 13,440 changes. Tenor ${ }^{5} 7_{\frac{3}{1}}$ cwt. Benjamin Foskett 1 , Edwin Barnett 2, Henry Dains 3, Gearge Smith 4, Charles Wilkins 5, Abert Pittan 6, Arthur Jacol -7, (reorge Newson tenor. Composed and conducted by Cieorge Newson.'

This was the longest length at the time rung in the method. It was beaten by a 15,000 rung at Erith, condetted by Arr. W. Pye. This was superseded by 17,000 at Kidlington, thougin there are some doubts as to the correctness of that peal. And the lidington peal was beaten in number of changes, though not in length of time, by $\mathrm{E}_{7}, 104$ rung at Si. Thonas', Wigston, by the Niclland Counties Association on December $27 /(\mathrm{H}, \mathrm{IgO}$, in 10 hours 35 minutes. Composed and conducted by Mr . William Willson. This remains the record for the method.

Another interesting peal of Newson's was the first irue peal of Cambridge Surprise Major rung in London. This was at St. Ann's, Highgate. The history of Cambridge Surprise is at interesting one. It was composed as a sixbell method in the latter years of the seventeenth century by, if I remember rightly, Fabian Stedman, and was deservedly popular among the old ringers. Annable extended it to Major, but wrongly. He omitted fifth's and eigtith's when the treble is dodging in $3-4$, and, of course, produced an incorrect lead end. The correct extension, huvever, was shortly after discovered, and Cambridge Majos was extensively practised in London during the cighteenth century. Two peals were rung, one by the London Youths, and one by the College Youths; though, as it happened, the bands were composed of exactly the same men, except for the treble ringer, and standing at the same ropes. Both peals, unfortunately, were false.

In the early nineteenth century peals, also false, were rung in Yorkshite, and later the method was practised at Norwich, thougtt no peal was rumg. From Hubbard's early editions we leam that it was highly thought of, and
it is interesting to notice that he compares it favourably with Imperial, because it has Bob Major lead ends and the other has not.

Then, partly because of the dificulty of getting a true peal, and chielly because of the general decline of ringing in the higher methods durting the latter part of the nineteenth century, the method fell into disuse. When the revival came the experts who praised Superlative as par excellence, the perfect method,' despised Cambridge as a rude, ili-constructed affair. To Sir Arthur Heywood, Cambridge was 'radically bad, 'and the 'Glossary' is scarcely more complimentary. So it was that Superlative was the Surprise Alethod which was first extensively praclised, and peals of Cambridge were rung more as curiosities than ayything else.

Then, a lew years before the war, opinion chatnged. The fact that Cambridge will extend perfectly to any even number and the rediscovery of Cambridge Royal gave the method great popularity, and now it is rung as much as all the other Surprise Methods put together.

In George Newson's time the headquarters of the Cumberland Youths was, as now, at St. Martin's-in-the-Ficlets, and there they had a very proficient iwelve-bell band. They were not a very attractive lnt, and one would hardly apply the title "Clurch Workers ' on them, ixut thet could ring Stedman Cinques. Perhaps their most mamiable characteristic was a selfish exelusiveness. They had twelve good men to ring, and they never encouraged any young ringers. The immediate day was sufficient for ihen, the future could take care of itself, anci so, when Newson and some of the others died, there were no others to take their places, and the Cumberland Society in a few years, from leing among the very best in the country; fell into a very low state, From which mach time and nos little hard work has gradualy once again raised it.

Geurge Newsor died in 1896 , and was buried in Hampstead Cemetery. A stone was erected by the sulbscriptions of ringers.

## ICKLETON BE L RFSTORATION,

The Parochinl Church Courcil of Iecketou, Canbs, held a mecting on Thursday evening of last week, when it was decided to accept tine estiniate of Messrs; (Gilleti and Johnston for the work or restoring the bells, which, it will be remembered, were silenced a short lime ago by the breaking of the temor gudgeon pin. It was then found that the accident was due to the dilapidated condition of the old oulf frame, which was actually endangering the tower. The betfy is, therefore, to be clenred and a new iron frame installed. The tenor bell is to be recast and the other live tuned.

One subscriber to the fund having made it a condition of his gift that the tower shall be examined hy an architect ard his sanction to the work obtained, the Council are not placing fle order until the arclifeat has visited the tower. He will be met by a small comsmitiee (of which Mr. P. Webb, one of the ringers, is one)
Mr. Wehb is nnxious that when the work is carried out au H frame for eight bells shalk be evected, as he feels confident that it would not be long before two trebles could be obtained to complete the octive. At preseat there is reluotance on the part of the village foik to depart from the six to whioh they have always been accustomed, but a ittle outside induence might convert then to tho advantages of eight bells. ## COINCIDENCF

By a curious coincidence the peal of Guildford Surprise Major rung at Guildfora and recorder this week fell on the same date as that on which the first peal in the method was ruse in 1913 at Foly Trinity, viz., November 23 rd. The same composition was yung and the same time occupied in ringing it.
Witls the exception of the composition, all the resb is absolute chance, and even the ringers were unaware of it until they had finished. There have been no other peals in the method on thesa bells except the fírat one of all, which is not recorded as it turned out ialse.
