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## PEAL RINGING, PAST © PRESENT.

The tabulated summary of the peals rung in the year 1926 appears in our pages this week, and once again che: Central Council's Committee deserve the thanks of the Exercise for the labour which they have expended in the compilation of this interesting record of a year's activilies among the peal ringers. The statistics will be examined with interest by those who follow peal ringing, for therc can be no question that, taken year by year peals do indicate very largely the standard of ringing which has been reached. The progress of this or that association can be watched, and it becomes the more striking when comparison is made with a distant year.

In 1926 there was a slight falling off in the number of peals rung, but there was nothing like the extraordinary drop which occurred in the preceding twelve months, when the total fell by no fewer than 17 t as against 1924. Last year's decline of 22 is trivial, and against this can be set a marked extension in the variety of methods rung. This year, for instance, there were five methods of Maximus rung as against three in 1925; twelve Surprise Major methods against ten, and four of Surprise Royal against three. There is thus no cause for misgiving in reduced numbers; while a distinctly encouraging feature is an increase in the number of conductors of peals.

We have before us as we write an old analysis table, whicls provides some most interesting comparisons witls the state of peal ringing now and thirty-three years ago. In 1893 the total number of peals rung was 705, and the most active association, the Sussex, could then claim oniy 68 peals, against 130 rung last year by the Midland Counties Association, who in 1893 rang only 35. Twis other associations in 1893 rang over 50 peals in the year: in 1926 fifteen societies exceeded this number. In those now seemingly distant days Maximus was confined to Treble Bob; Surprise ringing to Landon, Cambridge and Superlative. In Triples 219 peals of Grandsire were rung, and only 70 of Stedman; whereas in 1926 Stedman topped the bill with 209 and Grandsire came next with 182. The ringing of Surprise Royal and Maximus thirlythrce years ago was a thing only to be talked about, most of the Surprise Major methods rung last year had not been invented; white 'splicing ' was a thing almost undreamed of. With the three Surprise methods then rung: it is interesting to compare the relative practice to-day. Last year there were 68 peals of London; in 2803 the total in this method was two only. Eighty-nine peals of Cambridge Major were rung in 1926; but only five in the year under comparison, when Superlative was the chief attraction and 29 peals were rung. Last year the number in this method was 44 . In addition, of course, inust be (Concinnell on baec 290.)


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[^0]reckoned the lwenty peals of Bristol and the twelve in other methods rung in 1926, which find no counterpart in 1893.

One other point, among many, we would refer to, and! that is the disappearance of several of the societies which figured in this old table. Some, of course, have bear absorbed into other organisations, but others have grone from the realm of ringing. We no longer have with us the United Counties Association, the Waterloo Society or the Trinity Youths ; the Heavy Woollen District Association or the Birmingham Amalgamated Society. Gone, too, are many of the famous names that appeared among the conductors. The passage of time has made striking differences in the Exercise, but there have in this period been marked advances. In every direction we can see where progress has been made, and, while in peal ringing we are able, thanks to the statistics so painstakingly and so regularly compiled, to make definite comparisons, the advance in other respects has been no less certain and no less beneficial to the art.

Riaging commenced at 2.45 and continued until dusk, many learmers having ample opportunitios in Minor and Major mothods. Tef was served at Burkinsbaw's stores through the good offices wl Mr. Wooler, of the local company, afteu which the president, Mr. Tarlton, presided at the meeting. He referred to the loss the society had sustained by the death of Mr. Win, S. Plant, of Ranmoor, members standing in sileace as a tributa to his menory, the secretary being requestod to conrey the members' sympathy to his widow and family. The Rev. Brashaw, Fiear of Wortiey, was elected an honowary member.
Mr. Geo. Lewis referren to the practice of some members, who at mectings spent valunble time ringing a course of a methon which they were perfectly familiar witu. In one case, he quated, all the membera had condacted a peal in that particular method, and be contended that they would be serving the cause better by endeavouring to get learners through their roogh passages. Whilst one cannot expect accomplished ringers to attend meetings for the sole pirpose of doing 'spade' work, Jet the present state of atiairs could be materially improved if the local committee man (who is, according to rale, respansible for the order of ringing) would use a littis tact and control the ringing order without fear or faveur.
The secretary underteak to commonicate with the commiteo met upon this matter, and hopes they will raalise 'it is better to give than receive, for there is much more pleasure derived from getting a learnor through his first course or tonch in a particular method, than standing up with a crack band to ring a course or touch which is only too familiar.

An appeal was made to all members to attend the joint meating of the Yorkshire Association, Barnsley, Doncaster and Sheffeld District societies at Conisborough on June 17 th , the one opportunity of th3 year when all ringers in the Southern District of Yorkshire can meet to make and renew friendsinips.

## DEATH OF A SHEFFIELD RINGER.

On May 3rd, the Rammoor (Sheffield) company lost a respected and valued member in the person of Mr. Wm. S. Plant, who passed awby after an illness lasting 10 deys. Deceased, who was in his 68 fh year, had suffered for a long perion from brenchitis and asthma, and, despite his more or less ailing pature, his death came as a shock and surprise to his brother ringers.
Mr. Plant had been with the Kanmoor company for 44 years, having joined them in January, 1883, and was a member of tho Sheffield Dis. trict Society and the Yorkshire Association. Bis peals fotalled 20, ruvg principally at Ranmoor Church for the credit of the Cornty Association, and the majority of them were performed under the conductorship of the late Mr. Sam Thomas.
Although a good ringer, Mr. Plant was of a retiring disposition, and did not go far away from home for his rioging, but, so far as his health would permit, ho regularly attendedi for Sunday service ringing and on practice nights, his last pull being on Easter Sunday.
The interment took place on Triday, May 6th, at Fulwood Cemetery, ringers being presens fram the local company, St. Marje's, Dore, All Saints' and Shefteld Cathedral. Brother ringers carried him to his grave, where a course of Grandsire Triples was rung by: A. Craven 1-2, C. Harrison 3-4, J. E. L. Cockey 5-6, J. Thorpe 7-8, and in the evening. at St. John's Church, with the bells hale-muffled, a quarter peal of Grandsire Triples was rung as a tribute to his memory by: J. Osgathorpe 1, A. Craven 2, C. Fincrison (conductor) 3, J. Thorpe 4, J. Parker 5, H. Thorpe 6, C. Haynes 7, Wm. Biggin 8.

## FATHERS'AND-SONS' PEAL AT BELGRAVE.

As roparted in our peal columas, four fathers and their sons met and succestiully rang an excellent peal at Belgrave, Leicester. All are Jemestershire ringers, the two Bartrams hailing from Melton Mawbray, the Beltons from Barwell, the Grants and Morrises from St. Margaret's, Leicester. As may bo expected of such a performance, it could not go by without some facotious remarks, but it is not truo that one of the 'dadas' threatened the rope-end to his 'offspring " for sug; gesting 'putting the old 'uns on the heavy and to woar them out first,' although he glared rudely when the remark was mede, 'I hope you eklers wilt show us youngsters how to ring properly.' Anyhow, they did, in true 'fatherly' fashion, and it was well that Grandsire was rung, for $\mathrm{j}_{\mathrm{t}}$ afterwards was pointed oat that each respected father was also of 'grandsire." Another peculiar featire of this peal is that there were four Richards [Dicks], two soms being so named, and the ather two Ernests. Further, four were left-handed and four were righthanded ringers, although an argument on this point failed to convince the 'lefts 'that they were not "right."

## PEAL ATTEMPT AT EXETER.

Misfortuge attended an attempt for a peal of Stedman Cinques on he great ring of bells at Exeter Cathedral on Saturday. The arrangements bud bebn made by Mr. F. E. Dawe and Mr. F.J. Davey. The band was collected from many sources, and the loss wes disappointing to all conceraed. After 4,378 dharges had baen rung in 3 hrs. 26 mins., Mr. Davey, who was ringing the eleventh, had to give up. His big task was made all the more dificult by the sudden burst of hot weather, and that he sbould have had to surrender when so near the end (only 726 changes romaining to be run) alicited the sympathy of all the bsen. ## WINCHESTER GUILD MASTER HONOURED. <br> OLD FRIENDS GELEBRATE A BIRTHDAY.

To do honour to the Master of tho Winchester Diocesan Guild, Mr George Williams, on his 70th birthduy, a peal of Stedman Cinques was rung at Winchester Cathedral on Saturdaj. The band included at number of old friends, who had rung peals togother between thirty and forty years ago, and it was a great delight to them to he able t. maet and suitably celebrate tho occasion. Peals at Winahester Cathu dral are fow and far between, and, on account of the servicas, it 18 always ${ }^{3}$ middle-of-the-dsy job. Consequantly, some of the company found it necessary to rise at, for them, an unusually early hous, to reach the ancient cify in time. But it was a glorious May morning, and well repaid any unwonted effort, Soon after elaven o'clack they gathored in the Cathedral belfy, inom Loadon, Brighton, Slough, Woking, Swindon, the Isle of Wight, Portsmouth and Scuthanpton. Several Winchester ringers wero alsa present to join in the good wishes which were exteuded to Mr. WVilliams, and then, with barricaded doors to prevent any intrusion from visitors to the Cathediral, the ringing began. At frst, about four courses were rung by way of practice, so it was said, although thare was really a different reason for stoppiag. Then the bells went away again at noon, and wero back into rounds ust six minutes before the expiry of the time limit. The ninth man had a terrible gruelling on account of the bad "go' of his bell, but te stuck it like a hero, although for an hour and a half most of the bend had had serious misgivines as to the outcome of the valiant struggle that was going on on that particular box.
Afterwards the ringers, with Mrs. Buyley and Mrs. Goldsmith, were kindly entertained to tea by Mr. and Mrs. Williams, and over the teacups the party naturally became rominiscout, One ringer could claim to have rung a peal with Mr. Willinms 38 years before, and olhers well over thirty. 'Anno Domini' is thus rapidly passing with many, but none has it treated more kindly than George Willians, who, except for a few grey hairs, is the snme active and cnthusiastic George as of old.
Mr. Williams ${ }^{2}$ frst peal was rung at Soberton, Hants, on Ianuary $17 \mathrm{th}, 1884$, and was the first peal by the Winchester Guild in Hampshirg. His total is now well over a thousand, and throughout this long period ha has laboured unceasingly for tho benefit of young ringors, a great number of whom owe their early instruction in the art to lim. In addition, he was for twelve years sccretary of the Cea. tral Dipision of the Sussex County Assacitation; he has been hon. secretary of the Winchester Diocesan Guild, and hus now, for some time, fflled the oftice of Master. He his been a nember of the Central Courcil from its formation.

## REPORT OF THE ANALYSIS COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR 1926

Again we have to report a comparatively uneventful year of peal ringing. As wha the case in 1925, very few peals with exceptional foatures have hern rung, and the total number continues to decrease. 1,667 peale in all were rung, being 22 less than the previous year. On eight bells and apuards, the decrease is actually 80 , including 14 on twolve bells, s: $x$ on ten bells, and 60 on eight bells, while hinor shows ain inerense of 19, and Doubles of 39. Separating the handbell peals, Cinques abaw in decrease of four, otherwise there is an all-round increase of one on len bells, five on eight bells, three of Minor, and two of Doubles.
The following talale showe the totals for the year:-

N.B.-Where spliced peals contain odd and even bell methods, they are included in the higher number.
The wiflland Counties Association takes first place for the greatast number of peals, with 130 , including one on handbells, as againgt 143 last year. The Kent County, which led in 1925 with 157, has only 112,

all tower bells，the only other association to reach the centrry beirg Lameathire with 102，includigg three on handhalls，as against 131 peals last year．
It is remarkable that more than half of the societies（24）show no decrease；in fact， 20 of them show an increase．Surrey has increased by 32，Yorkshire by 29，and Sussex by 28，a gratifying feature beiag Devonshire＇s jucrcase From 12 to 28 ．Eighteen societies together show a drocesse of 211 peals，while twenty societies show it total increase of 189.

There geems to be little compensation for the drop in the total num－ ber rung．Certainly，London Surprise Major has incroased frorn 49 to Br，but taking all the Guxprise methods together wo find a decrease of 24 pals．Bu＇stol Major one less，Cambridge Maximus six less，Cam－ bridge aud New Garobridge Royal three morc，Major ten less，Buper－ lative Majur 28 less．Other methods，Royal ane more，Major two less． The variations of Treble Bob have elighty more than held their own，with an increase of three peals．The 186 peals are made up as foilows：Maximus，two of Kent；Royal， 20 of Kent，one Granta and one Spliced；Major， 121 of Keat， 35 of Oxfore，one Prince Albert，and มีvo spliced；Oxford Major showing a gain of 10 peals．
has two Norwich has decreased from 111 to 102；Double Oxford again has two peals．Plain Bob has fallen from 147 to 139 ．To set against this there are：One peal of Forward Kaximus，two peals of Canterbury Pleasure Mnjor，one peal each of Dufleld Maxiun sind Major，one Double and one Reverse Boh Major on handbells， 12 Spliced peala con－ taining plain Roysl and Major methods，and an increase of two neals in Little methods．

later, a spliced peal of Grandsire and Oxford Bob Triples with bobs only, by the Llandaff and Menmouth Association, the first peal of Stedman Caters by the Masonic Craft, under the auspices of the SE. Martin's Guild, a ' Fredericis ' peal of Grandsire Triples by the Kent County Association, is peai of London Surprise Major by the Chester Guild, being the first peal in the method by six of the band, frrst peal of Stedman Cinques by Freemasons, a "Ctarles" peal of Kent Treble Bob Major, \& handbell peal of Doubles with one man ringing 1, $2,3,4$, non-conducted peals of Stedman Cinques and Grandsire Triples by the St. Martin's Guild, and the Mifland Counties scored the first ' Ernest' peal.
The number of peals rung each month in 1925 and 1926 is shown in the followitg table:-


The peals rung on each particular day of the weak show very lititie variation, the most notable being an increase of 23 Sunday peals. The figures for 1926 ate as follows: Sunday 87, Monday 165, Tuosday 117, Wodnesday 135, Thuralay 144, Friday 71, and Gaturday 950.
Analysing the footnotes, we find that ringers of their first paal numberad 584, of their first in a diforent method or method on a differeat number of bells, 1,045 , inside 68 , away from tenor 55 , in method inside 55, Maximus 3, Cinques 1, Rofal 26, Caters 25, Major 64, Triples 25, Minor 101, Doubies 28, on 12 helis 29, on ten 48, on eight 36, on six 6 , Surprise 39, Surprise Foyal 11 , in hand 13 , in mothod in hand 27, Roynl in land 4 .
Now conductors number 69, and conductors of a fresh method 96.
Peals by local bands number five, and by Sunday Service ringers 18. A further 62 peals are recorded as being the first on the bells, 23 as first after restoration, etc., and 173 the first in the method on the bells. Half-mutted and muffeed peals yumber 61.
Peals were rung for birthdars 234, weddings (silver, golden and diamond included) 62, church festivels 26, Empire Day 5, Armistize Day 16, anniversaries 51 , memorials 3 . Welcome and favewell peals 45, and threo Masonic peals are also recorded.
Tho fadies still continue their activities, and the number taking part in peals during the year was 79. A peal of Stedman Caters was rung by 10 ladies, this being the frst peal on ten bells by ladies only. One peal was rung with scven ladies, one with five, one with four, four with three, 27 with two, and 200 with one lady in the band. The mothods rung numbered 25, and ranged from Doubles to Oambridge Surprise Maximus. The zumber of Surprise poals was 43, an increase of seven over last year. Handbell peals numbered 14, bing eight of Royal, one of Caters, one of Major, three of Minor, and one of Doubles.
Tho individual performances of the ladies were as follows: Twa rang 21 peals, ono 15 , one 14 , two 12 , one 11 , one 10 , one 8 , four 7 , five 5 , five 4, five 3, eighteen 2, and twenty-nine 1. The conductors numbered six, one lady having conducted three peals and five oue peal each.
We conchude our report by giving the nuraber of peala rung in representative years since 1881, the total of the whole period being 49,998:-

＂It is rgair with much pleasure that we present our 4thannual report，which shows a slight increase in membership，both bonorary and ringing．We hope that the coming Jear will show a still larger increase to our ranks，as we feel there ia still much to be done，and many ringers in tho county whom we should be glad to weleone to our associgtion．There is，we note，a great falling of in tha number of peals sumg during 1926－6the number being 24 against 42 for 1925，which number was of course a record for the association．The peals rung comprised：Cambridge Surprise Major 2，Fent Treble Bob Major $1_{1}$ Stedman Tripies I，Mino1＂， 7 Methods 13，Minor， 5 Methods 2，Minor，$\frac{1}{3}$ Mothods 1，Minor， 1 Method 1，Doubles， 3 Methods 1，Doubles， 1 Method 1，Graudsire Caters（on haudballs） 1 （the latter peal being the first peal in the method in hand for the association）．During the year， meetings for furtherance of the art have been held in cach of three disuicts，and on the whole have been well attended．We are glad＊o weicome back to the county the Rev．A．Rust，for many years semetary of the association，and also to welcome the return of the Husborne Grawley Company back to our ranks．In conclusion，we again wish express onr thanks to our honorary members for their continued help，and to the clerg．for weleoming us to the various parishes in the counby，as we feed it is only by this continued goodwill and help thet we can hope to carry on and make progress in our art．
In proposing the adoption of the report，Canot Baker recalled that the association was 45 years of age that day（April 18th）．Mr．Edwin Ransom lad missed very few of their annual me日tings，but ho was absent that day as his health was not very good．They were pleased to have with them again the Rev．A．Rust，and Mr．Farry King，of Biddenham．Mr．King and the chairman wore tho only members presemt who attended tho first meeting in 1882.

After the report had been received，Canon Baker was unanimously re－elected presidant
Mr．E．Ransom，Miss Steel，Mr，A．King（Luton），and Mr．Oyril
Hebert were fe－elected wiee－presicnt， sturuted to write to Mr．Rasisom eonveying the meetint＇s The Chairman said they musto congratula le Miss Steel on Having rung a hundred peals for the asseciation．Mr．Harry Clayton，of Harrold， had performed the same fcat．
Mr．Sharman was unanimonsly re－elected hon．secretary aut freasurer，the Clairmau remarking：＇I don＇t think we could get a better．＇
Mr．Fred Tmqqueray，of Woburn，was again appointed hon，auditor， and Canon Bakper reminded the meeting that Mr．Tanqueray called the first 720 erer rung for the association．Mr．Tanqueray did no ringing now，but lie looked after their money for them all right （laurghtes and applause）．
The president and secretary were clected the association＇s representa－ tives on the Central Conncil for the next three years．

conclufed．

## BELFRY GOSSIP．

Death removed a well－known Midland ringor ous Sundar，when Mr． Charles Dickens，of Sutton Coldfield，died guike suddenly，He had been at work on Saturday，and sppeared to be in his usun］health． Mr．Dickens was a very fine ringer and striker，and a ralued member of St．Martin＇s Guik，but of lato yerrs businass had prevented him doing much peal ringing．

It was on this day in 1909 that Mr．Harry Withers＇called＇a peul of Superlative without being in the tower．He stood about 30 yards away；and sigaalled the bobs by a boll fixed in the ringing raom．

Ninety Tears ago next Sunday，the old St．Fames Socioty rarg a peal of 12,096 Grandsire Caters in 7 brs． 50 mins．at All Saints ${ }^{2}$ Church， Fulham．It was，at tho time，clamed to too tho longest peal rung by tem men only，and was conducted by Thomas Tolladey．Unfortnnately for the St．James＇Society and the ringers，thore was tro＇Ringing World＇in those days，or they would have known that 20 years belore the Painswick Youths had rung a peal of 12,312 changes．

May 15 th also recalls the then longest length of Superlativo Surprise Major，a peal of 8,800 rung at Loughborongh in 1894，composed and couducted by Nathan J．Pitstow．The present president of the Central Council was one of the band，and the tenor was rung by the late Mr． John W．Taylor．

As last week＇s list of the long lengths of Treble Bob will have re－ minded our readera，the 16,608 Kent Troble Bob Major was rung at Mottram，Cheshire，on May 18th，1883．Mr．Sam Wood，tho conductor， is still on the active list，and but for indifferent health would probably have been in the still longer length of Oxford last Easter Monday－
Exactly a hundred and fifty years ago next Thurgday，11，080 Treble Bob Roynl was rung by the College Youths at Shoreditch，and this， $1 n$ just over a week，surpassed the previous record of 10,200 rung by whe Cumberlands on the same bells．
The same day is the centenary of the second peal of Double Norwich Major，which was rung at St．Giles＇，Norwich，on May $19 t h, 1827$.
The handbell peal tung at Islingion and recorded lat week，whs umpired by Mr．T．G．Symouds．

Around the tezor at Brinklow，Warwickshire，is the inscription：－ My mournfull sound doth warning give That heare men cannot always live．
The brok five bells were cast in 1705，and Messus．Taylor and added the treble，Whe first peal on them was rung last Saturday．
There are still some Coldstreamers lrom whom Mr．F．Alleway，of 13 ， Athelstone Road，Wealdstone，Harrow，Middlesex，it desirous of hear－ ing，especially：Corpl．Sugg and Pte．Banwell，both of Eomerset．Whil these ringers，aud any others who bavb heen connected with the Cold－ stream Guards，who have not already done so，kindly write to Mr． Alleway？

## DEATH OF A TONG VETERAN

Br the death of Mr．Henry Oddy，of Tong，which took place or April 26th，another link has been broken between tha Yorkshire Asso ciation and ils early members．Tho deceased commenced ringiag ift 1877，at the Parish Church of Tong，long fanoun in ringing annals as the acene of the labours of the late Mr．G．B．Bolland，and rang hi－ first peal at Tong in 1878．The only surviving member of this band is Mr．William Bolland，now in his 80th year．
Mr．Oddy took part in many peals of Minol＇，chiof among these being a 10,440 rung in 1896 ，this being still the rocord far Minor by the Yorksbire Association．In all，Mr．Oddy rang 47 peals，the last one being at Drighlington in 1912．Lenving his pative district to tako ull a post at Thornhill，near Dewsbury，caused \＆break in his ringing career，and broken henths since his return home prevented his taking part in ringing of any note．
The funoral took place at the moighfouring Church of St．Paul． Drighlington，where many old friends assembled．A plain courge of Grandsire Triples was rung on liandbells at the graveside by Messre． W．Idle，W．Pepplewell，3．Thackray and P．J．Jolnson，after which muffed ringing took place at Tong Churels，as a last iribute of resper to an old and honoured friend．
