## A PLEDGE TO THE COUNCIL.

The new Guildford Diocesan Guild proposes to include as one of its rules a definite provision that it shall be alfiliated to the Central Council and shall recognise and observe the Council's rulings. Although practically all the Guilds and Associations throughout the country are afiliated to the central body, there are few who make it an obligation under their rules to join the Council, nor do they commit themselves to observing the Council's rulings. At a meeting at which the Guildford Guild's rules were discussed on Saturday the question was raised as to whether any good purpose would be served by including the provision for recognition of the Council's rulings. The step which the organisers of the new Guild propose is, in our opinion, a very desirable one if we are to see the Central Council's position in the Exercise strengthened. It is true that nothing which the Central Council decides can be enforced upon either unwilling individuais or associations, but it is a logical attitude for an association to take to say that, if it agrees with the objects of the Council - as it implies when it affiliates - it will give its loyal support to the Council's decisions and do its best to give effect to them.

Let it be satd at once that, taken as a whole, associations do, in their formal capacity, generally accept the Council's rulings on matters conceraing the Exercise, but there is in the Council an undercurrent of feeling, or shall we say of hesitancy, when it comes to dealing with questions which concern ringing organisations, hesitancy because it is not known how the various bodies would take the ruling. If, however, the Conncil were assured beforehand that its decisions would be loyally accepted, it could turn with greater freedom to some of those subjects which at present it approaches with diffidence. The argument against action by the Council is always that it cannot compel acceptance of its resolutions. That being admitted, the next best thing is to achieve a voluntary acceptance, and this would be largely secured if all the associations were to incorporate in their rules a recognition clause. If only as an advisory body, the Council's decisions would have more effect if all its constituent organisations were pledged to its support rather than, as at present, entering upon the basis of, "If I like it I'll have it, and if I don't like it I'll leave it alone.' At present the constitution of the Council is but loosely built up. There is very little tie between it and the associations who send representatives. This was probably all that was feasible when the Council was instituted, for the relationship between the Council and the Exercise was as uncertain as the ties between the associations and the (Continued on page 658.)

## GUILDFORD DIOCESAN GUILD. <br> GHER'ISEY DISTRICI'S SELENDID RESPONSE,

Another very successful distict meeting, in connection with the formation of the Guildford Diocesan Guild, was beld at the ancient town of Chertsey on Saturday, when the atfendance was even greater thin anticipated by the organisers-and they are no pessimisis. Nearly every tower which it is proposed to include in the district was tepreseated, and there were several welcome visitors from places across the Thames, who were obviously interesterl in the proceediags. In the unavoidable abaence of the Rector, the Rev. E. F. W. Leachman, Mr. W. Melville, of GuildCord, a member of the Organising Committee, was roted to the clair for the meeting, which was held in the Church Room. Representatives of the following towers in the Chervsey area were present: Chertsey, Egham, Esher, Hersham, Oatlands, Ottershaw, Thames Dilton, Fuiton and Weybridge. Ringers from other places in the Guild's territory attended from Bagshot, Crunleigh, Guildiord and Woking, and there were visitors from London, Iper Heath, Uxbridge, Staines, Maidenbead, Caokham and Hounslow, while the presence of Mr. W. H. Hollier, hon. see., South and West District of the Middleser Association, was much appreciated. Regret was expressed at the abesnce, through illness, of Mr. J. B. Hessey, hoa. Becretary of the Yorktown District of the Wiachestor Diocesan Guild.

The Organising Committee"s report was read by the bon. secretary (Mr. J. S. Goldsmith), who wolcomed the presence of tingers from saroral fowers which had not been associated with the wiachester Guitd, and said this indication of support promised well for the future of the rew Guild. He explained the new position which had arisen with the Surrey Association, and, reiterabing what had been said at the meeting at L eatherhead, expressed the hope that, whatever might he the outcorne of the negatiations with Surrey, the two organisations would work amicably side by side in those areas where their territory overlapped.
Mr. Ferris J. Sheppard moved the adoption of the reporti, and camplimented the committee on the work which they had done.-Mr. W. T. Beeston beconded, and the motion was carried.

On the proposition of Mr. A. Woodrow, seconded by Mr. J. A. Grocker, the following resolution was adonted: "Tint this preliminary district meeting approves of the formation of the Guildford Diocesan Guild of Church Bellringers, to come into being on Januray lst next, and pledges itself to do its utmost to support the objects of the Guild and farther its interesta.'
In fihe detailed consideration of the proposed rules the meeting showed the koenest interest, and discussions took place on various points. The suggestions made at this and the other meetings will be considered by the committee before the final draft is submitted to a genernl meeting of the whole of the ringers of the diocese.

A QUESTIGN OF TITLE.
A point whicir has caused considerable discussion at each of the meetings has been the inclusion of the ward 'Churoh' in the title, which, as at preseat proposed; is to be "The Guildford Diocesan Guild of Church Bellriggers." It was argued at Guildford that the word 'Church,' iu conjunction with the word 'Diocesan,' is tautology, tund is, therefore, redundant. There are others, howover, who claim that the word is necessary to distinguish the kind of diocesan ringers which the Guild will include, and there promises to be a great discussion on the matter at the goneral meeting at Guildford. The meeling at Ghertsey voted almost unanimously in favour of retaining tho word 'Church.
A resolution in support of the reciprocal arrangement with tho Winchester and Portsmonth dioeeses to admit resident members of one Guild as compounding members of the other on payment of one shilling, wes carried, but the proposal to admit as life members without further payment the prescut life members of the winchester Diocesan Guild did not find favour.

Mr. W. Shepherd raised the guestion as to whother any good purpose would be served by including in the rules a provision that the Guild should recognise and observe the rulings of the Central Council, but it was pointed out that unless its rufings were observed it was rather useless to affiliate to the Council.
Mr. Shephord also suggested that Weybridge should be substituter for Chertsey as the name of the district, as the former was more nearly in the centre of the area.
Discussion on a variety of matters relating to the future conduct of the Guitd took place, and the proceedings terminated with a vote of thanks to the committee and tho hon. secretary for their work, co the Rector for the use of the Church Roons and the bells, and to tho chairman for presiding.
Ohertsey can claim the distinction of having been at one time famous for $a$ bell foundry. The Eldridges carried on their craft there for nearly a hundred year's, possibly setting up their furnaceg
there fa 1679, and coming to an end as foundors with the death, at there in 1619 , and coming to an end as foundors with the death, at
the age of 82 , of wilhiant Fldridge in the rear 1716 . During thig period a great many bells were cast [or churches in Surrey and the neighbouring counties.
Only one bell From this foundry remains in chertsey tower, and that is the 6th, cast in 1712 by the last of the line of Eldridges. But the 5th is a fine old pre-Reformation bell, one of the oldest in the county, and one which local iradition states came from the Abbay at its dis(Continued in next column.)

## TISBURY'S OLD BELLS RESTORED.

Tlae renorafed and restored tower and bells of St. Joha-the-Baptiatin Church, Tisbury, Wilts, were dedicated by the Bishop of Salisbury ar Wednesday evening, October 12th. The tower has been thoranghls renorated, all decajed portions haying been replaced by new atones Rnd concrete. Thze peal of six 17 th century bolls, which werg last pung in 7919 on the occasion of the peace festival, have been tumed and rehung in a new iron frame, with room tor two more 3 ells, with all the Intest modern improvements and ball beeriugs, by Messrs. Gillett and Johnstion, of the Croydon Foundry. The weight of the tenor is If cwt. in D .

After tize dedication service, tho local band rarg the first rounds on the bells, after which ringers froms Salisbury, Britford, Mere, Buckhorn Weston and Zeals rang 120's of Granasire and Stedman Doubles, and short touches of Bob Minor and Kent. Mr. Gyril duhnston represented the firm, and also took part in the ringigg.
All the ringers present were pleased with the excellent 'go' of the bells. The old clack has been repluced by one of the latest tesige, and, in addition to the original fuce, two new stone dials have been added, and there is now a dial on tho north, enst and west sides of the tower.

## OLD NORFOLK RINGER'S DEATH

On Saturday, October 8th, 'seven membors of the Norfolk Guild met at the Parish Church, St. Cross, and rante three 120's of Bob Doubles as a last token of respect to Churles Clarke, of St. Cross, who died on the prepious Tuesday. The deceased, who will be greatly missed by his fellow ringers in the Rerienhall and Bungay districts, passed away suddenly at tine age of 66. He had been a member of the old Nor* wich Diacesan Association and the Norfolk Guild since 1883.
On the following Monday, F. Borrett, G. Curson, R. Baldry, G. Howletit, R. Riches, W. Barreti, G. Poynter and C. Cutting met at Alburgh. Unfortunately, because of the serious illness of the Rector's wife, RedenhaIt bells were not available, and after an masuccessful attempt for a peal of Kenl rang 1,008 of Double Norwich, with tho bells half-muffled.

## OXFORD SOCIETY'S ANNUAL OUTING.

The Oxford Society held their annual outing on Saturday, September 10th, by chsrabanc to Berks and Gloucester districts, leaving Oxford at 9.25 a.m. and making Faringdan the first call, which was reached at 10.10. The party soon got to work on this grand ring of eight, when toudhes of Stedman, Grandsire and Kent Major were well rung. The next call was Cirencester, where the old church was visited. Stroud was reached at one odock, the party being met by Mr. A. Wright. The gecretary thanked Mr. Wright for his kindness. The tower was visited for touches of Stedman Caters and Triples, and s shorlt touch of Kent Major. Afterwards the members Ieft for Painswick with Mr. Wright and a Stroud ringer. They fonad a lowely ring of twelve, all gaing well. A touch of Stedman Cingues was tried, but had to be given up. Next Caters, and, to finish, a touch of Plain Bob Major. Good-bye was said to Mr. Wright, and the company set out for Gheltenlam. Arriving about 5.20 , they found Mr. Pates and a few others to welcome them. They had a short rimg and soon followed the leader. Time did not permit of visiting Prestioy, and regret was expressed at any inconvenience which might have been ceused to the local ringers. Charlton Kings was reached at 8.10, an hour late, where touches of Stedman Triples and Kent Major were tried. The party arrived at Oxford ati 11.10, and wish to thank all helpers for their kindness to them on this occasion.

solution. The fower also contains another fine antiquarian specimen in the 7th, which was cast by Robert Mat, the first of the Whitechapel founders, in 1588 . The tenor, originally cast in 1670, was recast in 1859, when two trebles were added. The third was cast in 1730 by Richard Phelps, and the 4 th in 1756 by Lester and Pack. The ring are, thercfore, a very mixed, if interesting, lot. With a somewhat long draught, many of the visitors found them a little difficult to handle on Saturday, but touches in a variety of methods were rung, both during the afternoon and after the meeting.
The last of the serics of district meetings will be held at Farnham ta-morrow. The general meeting for the diocese is to take piacc at Guildford an November 19th, and the inauguration, at which the Lorit Bisbop will be present on Decomber 3lat.

DUAL DIOCESAN GUILD.
The dioceses of Winchester aind Portsmouth are to remailn upitedī in one Guild, and an important meeting is to be held to-morrow at Southampton to give effect to this proposal. The agenda includes the alteration of the congtitution of the Winchester Diocesan Guild, arising out of the change of area, the question of name, the election of officers, and the rearrangement of the districts. Nearly the whole of Hampshire, and all the Isle of Wight, is covered by the two dioceses.

## SUTTON＝ON－TRENT BELLS

 RESTORATION SCHEME COMPLETED．The Norfl Notts Association have taken a keen interest in the Gutton－on－Trent bells＇restoration fund，and have given a good deal of practical help，financially，add by exhibitions of their skili in change－ ragirg on Bank Holidays，while the annual sports and gala have been taking place，to provide funds to pay for the bells．They will be plensed to know that the object for which the sports and gala have been beld for the last four years is now fully achieved－i．e．，the pay－ ruent of the chureh bells restoration costs．The bells are now entirely free from debt．
It is interesting to record that the sports committoes，patrons，sub－ gorilers，and helpers have each year consisted of members of every religions denomination represented in Sutton－on－Tront，and of mgers in all parts of the county of Nattingham．
Prior to 1922，the bells were a peal of five，cast by J．Harrison in 1825．These bells were of poor tone，and it was decided to bavo them rechst into perfect musical tone and tune，and add a new smatier bell to complete the ring of siz．
The work was done by Messis．Tohn Taylor and Co．，of Lough－ borough，who also rehung tire peal with modern fittings，including iron headstocks and ball bearings，in a new，strong and massive cast－iron framework，which they made complete for a ring of cight bells，so that two additional hells may be added in the future to complete the peal． The peal is in the key of $G$ ，and the teal weighs 12 cwt． 1 qr． 11 lb ．
The inscriptions out the six bells are as follows：－

The cantract was considerably extended after the frst order，which was for rehanging the five bells in a new framework for six bells for £400．Additions to this order were made to cover the new bell to make six，recasting the old ring into Eive of musical tone，supplying new clock hammers，ote．，floor bosses，mufflers，and inseription on the bells． The total amount paid to Messrs．John Taylor and Go．is 57513 s .8 d ． Olher work，including new screen，and woodwork，cost $£ 157$ 1s． 11 ． ， and atomemasons ${ }^{1}$ work cost 57 12s．8d．，making a grand total of 2955 18s． 3 A ．

This will be one of the lightest peals of ten in the courtry, the tenor being only 13 cwt . 6 lb . It will bu valuable adidition to the rings of ten in the area of the new Guildford Diocesan Guild. At present there are three such rings in tise new diocese Guildford, Leatherhead and Epsom.
The bells of St. John's, Leytousione, will be broadeast un Sutaday, October 30th, at 8 p.ra., on the occasion of the 25th anuiversary of the men's service. Ringers will be interested in this performance, but we are informed that the tenors do not go as well us could be wished.
The second peal of four Spliced Surprise Major methods has beon rung, the performaince having been achieved at Willesden last week by the Middlesex Association. For those who can ring Surprise methods, this form of peal ringing is of added interest, becalise of its greater dificulty.
The 'broadcnst' of the bells at St. Martin's, Birmingham, on Sunday evening, was a disappointment. for listeners. No merophone fad been fixed for the bells, and all that was heard of them was lor a few monents, as in tive dim distance, through the microphone in the church.

'Anxious ' wishes to know if it is true that the four morst farmous anatomical specimens that will go down to history are the Heel of Achilles, Willinm Giford's Blister, 'Lincle Joe's' Ankle, and ' He of England's ${ }^{3}$ Nerve.

A hundred and thirty-seven years ago to-day a peal of 8,448 Oxford Treble Bob Major was rung in the old tower at St. Mary Abhots Kensington. The board recording the performance is still iu existonce, and runs as follows:-
' 1790.-Thursday, October 21st, was proformed on the bells in this steeple. A true peal Oxford Treble Bob, consting of 8,448 changes, being the most ever accomplished without parting the tenors, and the greatest number of changes ever rung in this steeple, in 5 hours ant 3 minuts. Proformed by part of the Sowety College Youths. Benn Prince treble, Edwd. Rumball 2, John Cotton 3, Charles Barher 4 , James Brown 5, Jon. Langley 6, James Bartlett 7, William Parris 8 . The peal was elled by J. Bartlett. Mr. Jno. Bordin, Mr. James Cowneerow, Churchwardens.
The Yierr's name is not given, but the Rev, Richard Ormerad was Vicar of Kensington at that time. There is probably little doubt that the composition was the one by J. Reeves, which bad been produced a few years earlier, and which Shipway records as havine heen rung in the Kent variation by the Society of Junior Cumberlands in 1787 at, St. Mary's, Wlitechapel, 'being the first time it was ever parformed.
Next Tuesday is the anniversary of the first peal of Stedoun Triples ever rung. It was achieved af St. Peter Mancroft, Norwich, on October 25th, 1731 . It in a quaint old record, which is still preserved at Norwich: 'Here was Rung that Misterions Peal called Stedman Tripples, the discovery thereof has been the Study of several Ingenious Ringers in England, though to no effect, until this intricate Peal, which differs from all other Methods of Tripples, as being every bell of like course, was perfectly discovered by Tho. Melchior, who first compleated the Peal of Perfect Stedman Tripples, with only two Doubles ind no alteration; the extent being 5,040 changes, was compleatly rung by us in 3 hours and 40 minutes.'
The stary of the dispute between the rival Norwich companies over this performance has been well told in these columens by Mr. J A. Trollope.

## THE CLERGY AND RINGERS.

To the Editor.
Dear Sir,-Referring to your article on the help which the elorgy might give towards geting more ringers for our belfries, 1 think that a good many of the elergy would be more iuterested if their present ringers would attend the services more frequently. I had occusion recently to ask a loasl clergyman for his subscription to the Guildi to which I belong, and he romarked that he would give it more rendily if his ringers turaed up better on Sundays. I have also in mimd a church near my own tower, where often a dozen ringers will be preaent in the belfry and not more than two or three ever think of attenditg the service afterwards.
A great many ringers still look on ringing as merely an amusement or recreation, and as jong as this state of affairs continues we cannot wonder that the clergy are apathetic towards the work of the ringers. -Yours faithfully,

## A BEGINNER'S THEORY. <br> \section*{BY ' MINORMANIA.'}

This is the eleventh of the series of articles which have been specially written for beginners by. 'Minormania,' to explain to them the theory of change ringing. These articlas are not marbly for perusal. If they are to serve the purpose far which they are intended they must bo studied,

## PROVING A METHOD.

The next step is to wreat all ot the leads in the "plain course ' in exnetly the same way as shown in the last articlo, but this does not nuean that the pairs of rows have to be compared. Every lead is a replica of the first, except that tho bells at the lead-heads are differently placed in the row, so that the 'interal-row' fransposition can fus used to give us the heads that will prove fabse againse ANY LEAD. We 山nnspose the new lead-head by every false row (in column 1) in turn. Cover 12345678 with your pew lead-head (whatever it may be), and transfer the led cards to each row in your column in turn Here Jou should arrive at mo duplicates, because they have been giminated from column 1. Place the false heads produced in a column No. 2 (with the second lead-thead of the plain course af the top, us in column 1).
Do this with every lead-head, as it appears in the plain caurse, and out will have seven columns of false lead-heads, which will produce inentical rows to be found in the PLATN COURSE; the identical rows from a particular false fond will be found in that lead of the plan course which is at the top of its calumn. Then, if any of the gaven pain-course leads is rung, the false heads in its column must be amitled from the peal; if any of them is not rung, then the false heads may be admitted; that is, those false heads which refer to the lead whell is not rung. Provided that we do not clisoover other heads which are false against THOSE FALSE HEADS upon farther investiation.
Tho seven columns that we now hape, refer only to the PLAIN COURSE (headed 12345678), and, ordinarily, every course in the peal should be treated in like manner; but, in the majority of peals, this may be considerably abridged, due to the eftect that 'fixed bells' have upoll the rows.
We found in Minor that the tenor is fixed course by course, but that it was necessary to 'part' the 5th and Sth bells in order to obtain the extent of the rows, thus fixing the 5 th bell part by part, instead of courge by course. Peals in Major nre eenerally arranged so hat the tenors ( 7 and 8) shall not be 'parted.' In other words, BOTE of them are fixed course by course, and both of them coma "homo" at every course-end, with tie result that they pursue a "plain course paila ' throughout the peal, which bas the effect of fxing them (taken together) in positions at every lead-head, whith are identical with the pusitions in which they appear in one of the PLAIN COURSE LEADpusitions
For this reason, when the tenors are not parted in a peal, all of hose false heads, where 7 and 8 are NOT in pleir course positions, ill never appear; they are not allowed to, and they may be eliminated from our seven columns, when proving a peal with the 'tenors toether
All of the 'legitimate' Major methods follow the rule laid down for the Minor methods; they are compelled to produce *Bob Major leadends,' zed below are riven the seven Jead-ends (or heads) which will保 found in a plain course of any legitimate Major method. They are not given in any 'order of sequence' in the column, as each one is intended to sland by itself as an example, and not as part of the whale block. At the side are shown the positions held (in the rows) by 7 and 8 , and these are the ONLT positions they will hold (relarely) in all of the lead-heads throughout the peal, wnless they are parted 'by tho calling, which usually is mot done-

Therefore, the false lead-heads which may bo eliminated from our seven columns are such as follow: 18700000,17080000 ; 10870000 , ete. In short, any of them which has zot $7-8$ placed EXACTLY as in one of the seven examples given above, which, of course, does not apply il palls era made that will cause $7-8$ to appenr in places other than thoge of the "plain coursing order.
When these are eliminated, we shall have geven abridged columus of lead-heads, which are false against the leads of the PLAIN COURSE; olhervise, the conrse that is headed by 12345678. The calling of each hob has the effect of introducing inta the peal leads from various other courses; theoretically, our nbridged false lead-heads shozld be extended to meet the new conditions, when parts of new courses are introduced. This would be done in exactly the same way as to extended column 1 to the atleer six columns, by transposing the new courge-liead by each false-head in tarn. The better way is ta lind those COUPSE heads which are false against the whole plain course, o that they may be avaided if necessary.
This is cone in the same manner as that in which we fonnd tha ialse hemds, by comparison of 'similar' rows; there, the treble is the
only bell in the same place in the raws, but here $1-7-8$ must be in the same places in the two rows compared. One of the rows for comparison is a falsa head, and the other of the pair is ita FELLOW from one of the plain course lead-heads given above. By "iks fellow" is meant the one of tha seven which has 1-7-8 in the same positions as the falsehead under consideration.
For example: A falge-bead in yaur colman 1 might be 16254 (8)3(7) ; its fellow in the plain course is $14263(8) 5(7)$. Then-
because 14263857 is the 6 th lead-head in courge healed 12345678 then 16254837 will be 6tla $\mathrm{I}-\mathrm{H}$. from course headed 12463578

Note. While all methods have the same seven lead-hends in the plain course, they turn up in different sequences in different inothods, so that 14263857 might be the third in one method, the fotrth its another, and the fifth lead-head in the plain course of a nother method. Also zote that in writing course-heads, $1-7-8$ ars generally omitted, always being understood to be 'al home.
Then at the foot of our column 1 we can note ' . 24635 (VI)
signifying that the 6th lead-lead Erom the course headed 12465578 will be false with the first lead (shown at top of column 1) from the courso headed 12345678 -the plain course.

One more example: Your thitd lead of the plain course (column No. 3) might contain a false lead-head 1(78)35264; its fellow is 1(78) 56342 , which may appear as the FOUR'IF lead-head of the plain cuurse, 'lhen-
because 17856342 is the 4 the Lr-TH. from 12345678
then 17835264 will be tih L.-H. from 14263578.
At the foot of column 3 we note *.. 42635 (IV), signifying that lead 4 from 42635 will give repetition with lead I'HREE (column 3) from course headed 23456 .

Every false head having been treatel in this way, we shall have, at the foot of each columa, all of the course-heads that will be falso againsli each particular lead of our plain course.
From these course-heads, which are false against the PLAIN courge, we can produce those which are false against any course whatsoever by applying the 'internal rows transposition,' Cover 23455 with a new course-head and transfer the carcls to esch false-head in turm, and we shall produce the course-heads that are false against the new course which has been introduced into the peal.

Following tho cxamples quoted above, if we ring the lead which heads columu No. 1 ( 12345678 ), we mist cut out lead VI. from the course hended 24635; on the contrary, il we cut aut the lead which heads our colume No. 3 (whatever tho third lead-head of tho plair course mar happen to be), then we may include lead IV. in the course beaded 42635 , and so on, with the other live columns of ous pluin course.

Similarly with leads (incluted or omitted) in every other course of the peal and their corresponding falso courses.
Then we have to decide, from the calling of our peal, which leads of ine courgos will be rung, und which will be omitied. Actually, ench course of a peal can (and will) consist of SEVERAL PORTLONS OF DIFFIERENT COURSES, varying accurding to the composition of the peal. These 'portions' aro welded into proper courges by the 'calling positions ' laid down by the composer. This aspect must he dealt with in its proper place.
The examples given above, have been ineluded lyy way of explanation only, and are not intanded to he true examples. I propose to review what has been said by way of concreto figures, which must of mecessity be cartailed, in viow of the detailed explanation thal has gone before.

## DEATH OF MR. REUBEN HALL.

Anathor old and respected Midiand ringel has passed away in the person of Mr. Reuben Hall, of West Bromwich, who was in his 75th year- He rang for serviee al the Parish Church es usual ou Sunday noroing, Oct. Sth, but was taken ill a[terwards and died the same day
Mr. Hall was a very old member of St. Martin's Guild, and a foumdation member of the Society for the Archdeaconry of Stafford, and by his death another link with the old school of Birmingham District ringers has been broken. The contemporavies of Henry Johnson are fast disappearing.

Mir. Reuben Hall was one of a band of veterans who rang two peals logether. All but one lave now goare to thetr last rest. The only survivor of the company is Mr. James George, who, happily, is still anong the most active of ringers.

It is interesting to recall these two peals. The first was Grandsive Caters, rung at Aston Manor, Warwickshire, on April 11th, 1908, composed and conducted by John Carter. It was mung with the bells muffed as a mark of respect to the late Mr. W. S. Pritchett, of King's Norton, secretary to the Load Mayor of Birmingham and vice-president of Sit. Martin's Guild, who was interred in the family grave at King's Norton ou April 14th. It was also rung as an old men's peal.


The second was a "eterans' peal of Grandsire Cater's, at Aston, an Mity $2 \mathrm{nd}, 1914$, also composed and conducted by Jahn Carter. The total age of the bend was 653 years 10 months, and the average age 65 year's 4 months. This wias supposed to be the oldest band that ever rang a peal on ten beils, and the accompanying plotograpil appeared in 'The Ringing Warle' at the time.
In recording the peal, 'The Ringing Wornl' said: "A gay lot of "youngstera,", ranging in age from 60 to 77 yeariz of age, lave been atiplaynig their prowess at Aston, where they have scored a peal of

Graudsire Caters, and put to their credit what is halieved to ho a record, by being the oldest band to scose a ten-bell peal. The eolldnctor just qualified to squeeze into tho band by reaching his sisLieth birtliday a day or two bofore, while the task of ringing the tenor was pusbed on to the next youngest in years, alithough, despite his youth, we can believe it was a congenial job. But these two wore almost juvenile compared with the real veteran, Mr. Sam Spittic, whe caried his 77 years well, and Mr. William Rock Small, who at 74 is as keem as ever.'

## SUDDEN DEATH OF A NORTHANTS RINGER.

The death of Mr. George A. Biaxley has remofed a well-known ligure from ringing circles in the county ef Northants. While returning from ringing for a harvest festival gervice at Addington, on the evening of Thursady, October 6th, he apparently had an apoplechic seizure, and was discovered lying dead beside his bicycle carly the next morning.

He was a frequent visitor, howaver, to Isham on a Sunday evening, and always took his old place in the choir.

He rang many peals of Minor, and must have rung between 20 and 30 at Isham alone. His quiet auI diffident manner was not always understood by begimners, but he always succeeded in raising the tone of the ringing, and was rery keen on good striking. Always ready to turn out at whatever cost and however difficult the bour, he will be much missed. The more so at Tsham, as it was anticipated that the was about to take up his residence there again, and great things had been looked forward to. His was a character which will long be remembered and emulated by all who knew him.-R.I.P.
