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## THE GLOUCESTER AND BRISTOL JUBILEE

The rapid spread, half a century ago, of the desire to organise ringers into associations which should raise the status of their office and promote the art of change ringing, is being recalled in these days by the frequent occurrence of 'jubilee' celebrations in various parts of the country. Until the Devon Guild was organised in 1874 there was nothing of the kind in existence, except suct ancient societies as the College Youths, the Cumberlands, and the St. James' Society in London, St. Martin's Youths in Birmingham and others of less importance in smaller centres. But the ains and objects which brought the Devon Guild into being inspired others who desired to see ringing lifted to a ligher and better plane, and close on the heels of Devon followed Lancashire and Yorkshire. Then came the first diocesan organisation, which was established at Norwich, and anotber for the Diocese of Durham (since divided). Within a year, two young and enthusiastic men in Gloucestershire set themselves the task of inaugurating an association on similar lines for their own diocese, and that society, now the Gloucester and Bristol Diocesan Association, celebrated its jubilee on Monday. One of these pioneers, the Rev. C. D. P. Davies, whose services to the Exercise in many directions since that now distant day, have been unexcelled, was in the place of honour. He has seen the seed which he helped to sow, grow into a sturdy plant, and it must have given him supreme pleasure to see the enthusiasm with which the achievement of a half century of work was cetebrated. The only pang of regret was that the other founder, Mr. George H. Phillott, did not survive to join in the gathering. It is only a short year since he was called home, but his memory will ever be cherished by the association as one who did much to star the organisation upon a successful career and to promot its aspirations.
In those pioneer days it was far from plain sailing. Bell ringing was almost entirely a secular pursuit, and change ringing was little practised. Those who rang the bells for service usually did so for the small remuneration they received and for the 'emoluments ' attached to ringing for special occasions. When an organisation was set up which had other motives behind it, it was looked upon with suspicion, and it required much patient and persistent effort to break down the barriers. But it was the work and example of such men as the Rev. C. D. P. Davies and Mr. Phillott which payed the way to the successful societies, which spread like a network over the country to-day, societies whose backbone is a bory of men and women filled with the desire to serve the Church, (Continued on pago 338.)

and to promote the art of change ringing, which has grown to a degree undreamt of by those who ploughed the furrows fifty years ago. Gloucester and Bristol will be followed in their celebration by other societies of like character, for several are now approaching their jubilee. Not all of them are diocesan in name, but they all have similar aims; objects which we hope as the years go on will become more and more fully realised. Half a century has by no means completed the work there is to do; even in the spread of change ringing and bringing the bells and belfries of the land into a condition befitting the Church. But such gatherings as that at Bristol on Monday are full of promise for the activity of our ringing organisations in the future.

## TUESDAY'S MEETING ST HEREFORD

The second session of the thirteenth Council (the 36 th annual mecting) was held at Hereford on Tuesday, the president (Canon G. F. Coleridge) being in the chais.

The Bishop of Hereford gave the Council a hearty welcome to the neient city and to the diocese.
The statement of accounts was presented by the hon. secretary and reasurer Mr. E. A. Young), and these wero adopted on the motion of the auditors (Messrs. A. F.' Smith and J. Grifin), who were thanked for their services. The balance in hand was £26 15s. 6d., against $£ 45$ 3s. 10d., nccounted for by heavy printing expenses.

THE LIBRARTAN'S REPORT.
The Hon. Librarian (the Rer. C. W. O. Jenkyn), in presenting his report, stated that the sale of publications during the zear lad bean a mall one, and instead of being able to hamil over a balanee of $£ 7105$. 5 d. , as he did last year, he had to draw on the Council's funds to the oxtent of $£ 435.4 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$, in order to pay the cosi if advertising the publications. With regard to the library acting on the instruction of the Council,
Reve E. S. Powell and Mr. I. A. Trollope paid a visit to his (the libravian's) house after the last Council meeting and carefully examimed all the books, to advise if there wero auy that were not worth keepus. In the very full report which the librarian subsequently received trom them, they deprecated the idee of parting with any book, though an exception might be made in the case of a duplicate copy of Sottantail; they advised the binding of the various pamphlets by W. H. Thimpson, and the careftll consideration of what is to be the Truture the Library, bearing in mind that it ought to be the best collection nossible of ringiug literature and of easy access to members of the ercise. Later, the librarian sent to Mr. Trollope a parcel of MSS. make a report. An invitation given through The Ringing World ' reader who conld offer or obtain the offer of any book that might be of walue to the library to communicate with him, had resulied, the Librarian added, in one respouse, which had not len to

The casting aud exhibition of the world's greatest carillons in this country lave been the subject of many paragraphs in the newspapers, which were ganerally appreciative and wealk informed, also of leading erticios in one or two of the principal journals, A recent alternpt at a peal of record length naturally gave writers cynically inclined their opportunity, but for the most part referemes in the ress to hells and ringing have been both nccurate and sympathetic. It is of interest to observe that one of the general knowledge tests published a few weeks ago in the 'Daily Express' included the following question: When was the Anciont Society of College Youths fonded, and for what purpose?'

That peals of , Drubles consist of at least 42 true and complete 120 's aung without interral and without 'rounds ' or any other rows being included or rung more than once in any 120 . A peal may be lengthened br the addition of any namber of 120's fulfilling the same conditions, wilh or without one touch of less thra 120.' And the Following be substinitad for the preseat definition of a peal on six bells: "ON SIX BFILJ.s. That peals of Minor consist of at least seven true and complete $\overline{J 20}$ 's rung withat interval nud without 'rounds' or any other row laing ifcluded or rung more than oece in any 720 . A peal may be lengthened by the addition of any number of 72a's fulfiling the same cunditions, with or without ane touck of less than 720."

## FIFTY YEATS—A CONTRAST.

The Rev, C. D. I, Davies, who was greeted with cheers, said he had benu reeply tauched ly the reception which lind been given to him, and that was one of the greatest days of his life. With regard to the history of the associntion, he could not add minch to what he bad alroudy written for tha ammal report of the association and for 'Tho Ringing World, but he would like to say a word or two as to the量的 change in everything surrounding ringing in the last fifty years, The yonnger generation couk nol understand how greai that difference was. Even in the means of transport flhings hati totally changed, for fifty years ago there were no motor vehicles whatever, no bicycles
except the old-fashioned ligh ones, and the only means of gettize from place to placo was by train or walking, unless ane could affomi to engage a horse and trap. In those days apen were constamily willing to walk six or eight miles out and lome again to practisr Grandsire Triples. Then, too, there was very little ringing literature, and what there was pas hard to obtain. The only books to be fiud were ' Banister' and "Hublard," bat since they had had the whole of the Snowdor series and mnny other books besides. They now ban The Ringing World," and at one time 'Church Bell' and 'Bidl News.' Little was known by the ciergy about bells or ringing, and lie was afraid many of the clergy regarded theis rimgers as a troublesome sef (laughter). Those who wrote to the presg about bella knew little ov nothing about the subject, nnd one gentleman, Mr. Hawcis, who wrote a good deal, ran down our Englisk bell founders, and snid ther was nothing worth listening ta cxcept bells cast in Halland (laughter). It was, thercfore, very dificult to get bells rehung when they needed it, and they also suffered trom the theories put forwsod by Sir Jodmund Beckett, afterwards Loud Grimthorpe, whose ideas tresulted ia such belis as Worcester Cathedral, which laad now sot to come out and be recast. Fifty years rigo ringers found it very difticult to get churgh authorities to listea to them; to-day mary asarciations had representalives on Diocesan Advisory Boards, and ringers" considered opinions on bell matters were listetsed to with respect. I thought their association inight comgratulate itself upon what it lout done during its fifty jears. Things were not. perfect yet. Reform wu= needed in sorae ort-of-the-way perishes, and certainly change ringiny Whs not puctised in every church in the diocese. However, they hat done a great deal, and where there was still work to do it should ho an inspuation to continue their labours. They zuust tuy to pxalf wheir office and keep befove them the great main objects of bheir exist. once as an association, which was to elevale the tone oi evers belfur in the diocese (applause)
