## CHANGES IN THE COUNCIL.

Changes, it is understood, are likely to take place in one or two of the important offices in the Central Council at the next triennial meeting. In the nearly forty years of its existence, the Council has been extremely fortunate in those who have voluntatily served it. There have been, up to now, only three Presidents and four Secretaries. Sir Arthur Heywood, who was the virtual founder of the Council in 189 r , was the first President, and he held that office untif his death in 1917-a period of over 26 years. He was succeeded by the Rev. A. I-I. F. Boughey, who occupied the position for three years, and Canon Coleridge has filled the office since 1921. And now, it is stated, he contemplates retiring, principally on account of advancing years. In the three presidents, the Council has had not only men of eminence among ringers, but men of wide and varied experience, and in whom the Exercise has had confidence, while there probably has never been a more popular figure connected with our art than the present occupant of the chair, whose urbanity, kindiness, common sense, and geniality have endeared him to everyone.

In the secretaryship of the Council, there have been almost equally few changes. After the first year of the central body, during which Mr. F. E. Dawe acted as secretary, the Rev. H. Earle Bulwer filled the office for ten years from 1892, and he was followed by the Rev. C. D. P. Davies, who retired after serving the Council with ability and diligence for nearly twenty years. He, in turn, was succeeded by the present occupant of the office, Mr. E. Alexander Young, who, although he came to the task very little known in the Exercise, has done splendid work for the Council since 1921. Both Camon Coleridge and he took office in the same year, and now, it seems, they both propose to resign at the same time. If it is not possible to persuade liem to continue, they will depart with the deepest regret of all who have come into contact with them in the Council's affairs, in which they have had the complete confidence of the members.

But is it too late to induce one, if not both, to continue? We venture to put this question now, because when the Council meeting arrives it may be too late. The departure of either will be a loss, the simultaneous exit of both would be doubly regrettable. The knowledge and experience of one would be invaluable to a new ocspant of the other office, and while it is true that a double change nine years ago produced perfectly happy results, it might be just as well if only one change were effected at a time. Men who are fitted and able to undertake these tasks are few, and it is essential to the future success of the Council that careful choice should be made.

COUNCH'S DEFINIPION STLLL STANDS
Sir, I lave been interested in the remarks in your leader of February lthilisue, with refereace to the suggestions made by Res Law James with regard to definition for peals of Misor aud Doubles, and it is evident that the sagument is still occupying the same ground as was covered by No. 7 on the ngenda of the Central Council of 1929: "That this Council will not reagaise as a peal of Minar or Doubles any compesition in which the bells do not strike in 720 or 120 different orders rebpectively, before beginning the next 720 or 120.'

As you say, Mr. Jrmes' suggestion raises afresh (I doubt if it has ever abated, at any rate, in certain quarters) the question whether the $720^{\circ}$ s are to be (camplete) true in themselvas or not. Mr. Jathes says (in bis letter): "There are only five possible 720's in any Trebl, Bob method, and some Treble Bob methods have only one possibli composition,' and 1 ask, "What of it?' According to decisions of Central Council, and the paragreph on ABix balls on page 17, it a band rang the Treble Bob meinod meationed by Mr. James (which has only one possible conposition) seren complete times, striking round only once ab the end of each, their performance would be recognised by the Central Council as a peal of Minor, and I conténd, Sir, that so loag as that decision of the Central Council slands, and it stands yes, that ary peal of Minor or Doubles its which tho bells do not strike in 720 or 120 different orders before beginning the next 720 or 120 is 'irregulan'.

It was with the object of finding out the exnct fecling of the Exercise on this critical point that item No. 7 was placed on the agendit last year, but our experts were ablo to draw so many red herrings across the track that the whale thing became very confused, and it seomed to me that very few in the room really knew what aetually they were voting for.

If the Exercise are of the oninion that 720 or 120 different orders shoula be rung before beginning the next 720 or 120 , then a defnite vote on a motion suck as item 7 ou last year's agenda would decido it. IF, on the contrary, the Exercise is of opinion that a repetition of clanges is to be permited within the limits of individual 720 s ar 120's, then a definite vote an a notion embadying Mr. Jumes suggested new definitions would decide that. I believe, Sur, that it is essential for that critical point to be pat and voted on in Council before any satisfactory conclusion will he arrived at, or any had-
