The peals analysis for the year 1929, which is published in this issue, again reveals a falling off in the number of peals rung. The difference between last year and the year before was only 37, but it followed on a much bigger decline in the preceding twelve months, and is the lowest total since 1921. The report of the committee and the tables which they have prepared will be perused and closely examined by those interested in peal ringing and who look upon the analysis as the barometer of the Exercise. There are many ringers who take the view that peal ringing is the least important part of the art. With this view we do not agree. It is true that the progress of change ringing cannot be entirely judged either by the number of peals or the quality and variety of the methods, but in our opinion these things do indicate to the observant whether enthusiasm for the art and enterprise in its application are advancing or suffering under a temporary cloud of apathy. It is usually in those associations which have the highest percentage of peal ringers that the standard of change ringing is best; and the greater the ambition for peal ringing among the members the keener they are upon attaining good striking, and, what is also important, discharging their Sunday duties in the belfry. The indications which can be gathered from a careful study of the peals analysis are, therefore, not unimportant in diagnosing the health of the Exercise generally, and it is for this reason that the tables and report have a value as welt as an interest, especially whem they are compared with those of the preceding year.

In the figures for igzg there are certain disquieting fentures, apart from the reduced aggregate of peals, and the most: striking of these seem to be the drop of nearly one hundred in the number of ringers who rang their first peal and the still greater fall of 366 in the number who rang their first in a new method or method on a latger number of bells. The drop in both these categories follows upon a fall of lesser extent in each ith the preceding year. Is thrs an indication that fewer young ringers are taking an interest in peal ringing; that they are less ambitious, and is it another illustration of the now familiar story of 'other attractions'? Whatever the reason may be, it is, we suggest, a matter to which the ringing organisations sholid give close attention. In every association there are large numbers of ringers who have never rung a peal, and it will be worth while searching for and applying means of creating enthusiasm and ambition among these members of the Exercise. Success in a peal is often the factor which turns a man from indifference to keenness, and it is obvious that unless the supply of peal ringers is maintained there must ultimately be such a slump that the art itself will suffer badly.

## AN OCTOGENARIAN RINGING CLERGYMAN.

DEATH OF THE REV. O. S. WAEFORD
On tha day before his 82nd birthday, the Rev. 0 . S. Waltord passed amay at Haslemere, Surrey, on Mity 14th. The deceasend clergyman, whose father was second aaster at the Old Charterhouse in London, was educated at Cliartarhouse and Trinity Gollege, Gambridge, bad received his theologioal training at Wells College, from which he went to Haslemere in 1871 as carate. Subsequently he filled curacies in other places, and became Vican of Holy Trinity, Gosport, where he stayed for five years before going to tha Rectory of Liss in 1899. Here he remained until 1922, when tho retired from active ministerial work and weat to reside again in Haslemere, where he was always ready to give assiatames in the services of tho Church.
The Rev. O. S. Walford was greatly intereated in ringing, and was an active ringer for some time, although his opportunities wore few. He was a life member of the Winchester Guild, and one of the foundation life members of the Guildford Diocesan Guild. As long as ha was able, he delighted to sit in the churchyard at Haslemere and listen to the ringing of peals, and his personal iaterest in the Haslemere band was shown by the fact that he regularly had the young members at his house and taught them change ringing ous handbells-be could ring two eilher to Grandsire or Stedman Doubles.
The deceased was buried by the side of his wife at Libs on May 17ib, and on Sunday the bellis at Haslemere were rung half-muffled for all three services, a touch of 1,115 Grandsire Catera being rung in the evening by H. Furlonger 1, R. Hayes 2, R. Orery 3, F. Bowdea 4, J. S. Goldsmith (conductor) 5,-B. Elliott 6, J. H. B. Hessa 7, M. Smither 8, A. J. Barileit 9, W. Eltridge 10.

Many of our correspondents are proud to remind os that they have every copy from the first to the oge thousandth. For this evidence of their loyal and continued support we ask them to accapt our thanks.
The peal at St. Luke's, Wolverbampton, on May 16th, was rung for the Saciety for the Archdeaconry of Staiford.

After being silent for some time, the five-toned peal of ten hells at St. Paul's Chureh, Bedford, were heard on Friday eveming Inst when being given $a$ 'trial spin, after being overhauled and rehung on ball bearings. Messrs. Mears and Stainbank have carried out the work.
The first peal of New Cumberland Surprise Major was rung at Burton-cn-Trent on May 31st, 1886. It has never been very popultr with ringers, and $1 t$ is some years now since a peal in the method was rung.
On June 1st, 1912, a peal of Stedman Caterg, 14,031 changes, was rung on handibells at Guildford in 7 hrs. 3 mins. Later in the year the same band axtended this record length 'in hand by ringing 19,738 .
The first 12-bell peal in Birmingham was rung on Tune 3rd, 1773. It was a peal of 5,324 Grandsire Cinques. St. Martia's is one of the few old towers which has anyining like a complete record of the peals rung on the bells.
"The new peal of ten bells " at the famous Church of St. Mary-leBow, Cheapside-which are still silent while moncy is being coillected in their name for the restoration of the churclt as well as the bellswere rung for the first time on June 4 th, 1762.

Letters from Mr. J. A. Trollope and the Rev. H. Drake, jeplying to our article on "A Lead and a Challenge," as well as a number" of peals, are unavoidably held over.

## DEATH OF A BRABOURNE RINGER.

The Ashford District and East Kent have sustained a loss by the death of Mr. Ernest Cheesman, one of a well-known ringing familyHe died in the Vietoria Hospital on April 30th, aged 55 years.
Thse funeral took place at his native village of Stowting, on May 5th, the bearers being the lecal ringers.
As illncss prevented ringing at Stowting, the bells at Brahourne (of which band he had been captain for several years) were later in the day half-muffled, and Grandsire Doubles and Bob Minor rung by local ringers, assisted by Albert Tanton, an old friend from Lymingo, a broken rope preventing a peal. The deceased was a good striker and had taken part in peals in various parts of the county.

## REPORT OF THE ANALYSIS COMMITTEE.

The total number of peals rung during 1929, as shown by the analysig, was 1,665 , a decrease of 37 as compared with 1928. The following table shows the various fuctuations:-

Tower Balts.-As will be seen, the peais of Maximus have increased, there being 6 more of Surprise and 3 in other methods. Cinques show 4 more, 3 of Stedman and 1 of Grandsire. Pealy of Surprise Royal have decreased by 4, whilst other methods have increased by 1, making the total decrease 3. The increase of 3 in Caters is mnado up of Stedman 6, Double Norwich 1, whilst Grandsire lave decreased by 4 .
In Wajor the total increase is 8 . Peals of Surprise have increaseê by 25, of which Cambridge alone accounts for 23 . Treble Bob and Plain Methods have decreased by 17. Triples have decreased ly 22, made up of a decrease in Stedman of 34 and other miethods 3, and an increase of 15 in Grandsire. Minor have decreased 18 peals, the chief variation being decreases in peals in 1 and 2 methods 37 , and increases in 3,4 , and 5 methods 20 . The decrease in Doubles is 20 , which is more than accounted for by peals in 1 method.
Handhalls.-The decrease of 3 pesls in Cinques is represeated by Stedman; that of 5 in Royal by Plain Bob 3 avid Treble Bob 2. Stcdman Caters are 7 more and Grandsire Caters have decreased 1 . Major have increased by 15, there being 17 more of Plain Bob and 4 more of Treble Bob. Triples, although being equal, show one more peal of Stedman and one less of Grandsire. Mmor have decreased by 3 peals.
Yorkshire Surprise Maximus, Melton Surprise Royal, LollGuborough Bob Major, Wellington Little Court Bob Major, and Spliced Treble Bob in the Worcester varistion have been rung for the first time. Again the Midland Counties Association have ruag most pealb, their total heing 128, a decrease of 25 peals on last year's catal. The Lancashire Association and Kient County come next will 104 nnd 100 respectively. Both totals are less than last year, I.ancashire being 15 and Kent 9 down. Twenty-eight societies show a decregse in peals, the mosti serious being the Warwickshire Associatiou, whick has uropped from 34 to 6.
On the other hand 16 associations slow an increase. The Suffolk Association, with 99 peals, linve increased by 22; the Esscs wilh 90 peais have increased by 40 . The Lincoln, Stafford A rechdeaconry and Cuester have increased by 19,18 and 17 respectively.
Without doubt the outstanding performance of the year is tho long peal of Cambridge Surprise Maximus, 15,312 changes, at Ash-ton-under-Lyne, rurg under the auspices of the Lavarthire associgtion. This surpasses all previous records on 12 bells, anil was a truly wonderful fert.
No other long longth was ruag on tower bells, but a peal of Minor of 7,800 clanges was rung ou handbells by the Suffolk Guild.
Other peals worth noting are a peal of Splicel Surprise Major in 5 methods, and one in 10 methods by the Middlesex Association; Spliced Superlative and Cambridge Maximus by the Lssex Association; a nou-conducted peal of Double Norwich, one of Casmbridge Surprise Major and one of Superlative Surprise Major by the Kant County; a peal of Grandsire Triples by 4 fathers andi 4 sons for the Surrey Association; a Surprise penl by police officers for tha Middle sex Association; a 'William' peal of Kent Treble Bob 4 ajor and an 'EdFard' pent of Stedman Triples for the Kent Counts; and a ${ }^{1}$ James ' peal of Double Norwicis for the London County Association. Ie nfterwards adressed the great gathering mssembled at the Baths.

Other footnotes show that 51 peals wete the first on the bells; 46 since restorntion or augnentation; and 158 the first in the method on the bells. Miffied and half-muffled peals number 58 ; birthday peals 241, wedings (including silver and golden) 59 ; clurch festivals and dedications 44; Empire Dny 4; Armistice Day 14; anniversaries 63; welcome and farewell peals 46 ; and royal birthdays 12 .
The ladics still figure largely in the peal reports, and 91 have rung pals this year. Three appear among the conductors, and one peal of Rob Major was rung for the Ladies' Guild.

Some foubts had been expressed as to the advisnbility of holring it at a point somewhat difficult of aceess and far removeri from the greater part of the diocese. All such misgivings, however, weve eampletely diasipaterl by the result. Some ninety members assemhled in the grand old Parish Church, with its fine bells and magnificent organ, at I2. 30 p.m., and took part in one of the most inspiling ringers' setvices ever held. The singing was led by fwenty surpliexd choristers with exquisitely trained voices, and the special parima ind bymns were accompanied by the arganist with thrilling effect. The oflice was intoned by the honorary secretary of the Guild, aud the lesson reat by the senior assistant priest. The Ven. Arohdeacon Coulter, Vicar of Calne, in the course of an intensely interesting uddress, spoke of the nneient history of Calne Church and its close connection with Salisbury Cathedral, aud quoted a very carly reference to the ringing of the bells, while the Te Deum was sung, on the appointment of a former Viear of Calne as Archbishop of Canterbury- In extending a fearty welcome to the Guild, the Archdeacon commended the wisdom of occasionally wisiting the extreme points of the dioceses, in spite of the cost and secrifice entailed, and aptly remarked that the activities of the body are not confined to the region round the heart but extend to the fingers and other extromities.- A collection taken in aid of the war memorial fund amounted to $£ 20 \mathrm{~s}$. 7d. At the close of the service a beautifully
struck touch of Grandsire Triples was fung, and the company then sat down to hncheon in the Town Hall, which was most attraetively. decorated with flags and lowers. The catering was undertakcin by Maslen's Cafe, aud the arr'migements made refected great credit on the firm.

Edwards and Messrs. T. H. Beams, S. Hillier and C. H. Jennings repregentaliyes on the Central Catneil. Masses. C. Fi. Jeanings, W. Townsend and 1 . A. Wilsou were appoluted belfy inspectors in addition to Mr. S. Fiflier.
The Masier and Secretary both expressed the general regret at Mr. Berms' enforced retirement from office on account of falling health, and spoke in eulogistic terms of his valuable services to the Ginild.
Mr. Bearns had the satisfaction of reporting that his great labour of love, flue raising of $£ 200$ for the ringers war memorial in the Catiedral, had been brought to a successful conclusion. Not only had the full amount been subsoribed, hut he was able to produce ns the finshing touch to the memorial the Guild badge, skilfully carved in onk by Mr. Northover, of Bridport, and handsomely gilded and coloured. The Master expressed the cordial thanks of the Guild both to Mr. Beams and Mr. Northoves.

It was agreed to make two additions to the rules, and a grant of two gaineas was roted towarils the restoration of the grand peal of bells at Heytesbury.
Mr. C. D. Heginhothom proposed a vote of thanks to the Arch deucon, organist and choristers, for their respective parts in the service, to the ladies and gentlemen responsible for the decoration of the hall, and to the incumbents of the various churches for allowing the use of the bells. Eleven towers were open for ringing, and touches in the standard methods were enjoyed by visitors from all parts of the diocese, many of whom had travelled sixty on soventy miles to take part in the festival.
