## THE CENTRAL COUNCIL'S PUBLICATIONS.

It is admitted that one of the most valuable parts of the work of the Central Counctl is the printing and publishing of various books and pamphets in connection with the art of ringing. Some of these publications are the results of years of patient work, which would probably never have beer undertaken except by the incentive of some such representative authority, and would certainly never have passed through the press without the financial backing of a body like the Council. There is too much monetary risk in the printing of ringing literature for any ordinary investigator to undertake the work, but the Central Council is able to step in and serve the Exercise where private enterprise is unable or unwilling to shoulder the responsibility. The Council is representative of the Exercise, and what it does, by way of issuing publications, is therefore done in the name and on behalf, as well as for the benefit, of the Exercise. In effect, when the Council decides upon the issue or reissue of any work, it is carrying out the wishes of the Exercise as expressed through its elected representatives and in this way the whole of the ringing associations have a responsibility in promoting the sales of the Council's publications. The majority of ringers, perhaps, have not viewed the matter quite in this light, and it may be for this reason that in the past the sale of the Council's literature has been of no interest to them. But a little thought on the matter will enable them to see that through their associations they have a direct interest in the successful issue or otherwise of a publication, for it is through this channel that the bulk of the Council's money (derived chiefly from association fees) is expended-this quite apart from the individual interest which a ringer ought to have in the personal possession of any publication which will add to his knowledge of the art.

A few weeks ago the Guildford Diocesan Guile's representatives on the Council put forward to their members a practical suggestion for promoting the sales of the Council's publications. It was that every association should purchase a number of copies of the various works for re-sale on the ground that, as the various ringing bodies get the benefit of the Council's publications, they should bear some of the risk of the loss on sales. As a matter of fact the Council almost every year makes a loss on sales; the total number of publications sold does not defray the cost of advertising. This is not because the goods it has to offer are not worth buying, but because the article itself cannot be come by without a little trouble, and that is one of the things which many ringers (Gontinued on page 518.)

-we might almost say the majority of them-will not take when it comes to anthing affecting ringing. If these publications could be put right into their hands, instead of their having to write a letter and get a postal order, they would probably buy almost any of the books and pamphlets which the Council issue, but if it is left to their own volition, the thing never gets done. Of course, if they only realised what they have lost and are losing by neglect to purchase many of these books-not only those issued by the Central Council but by private enterprise as well-they would quickly make amends, but the diffently is they do not realise it. We believe, however, that a great deal could be done, if the associations would act upon the suggestion made by the Guildford Guild's representatives. It is true that publications can be had by associations on the 'sale or return' system, but this brings little grist to the mill-last year it brought in to the Council less than five shillings. If the associations purchased the goods outright there would be a keener desire to sell, and if the books were distributed through district officers there ought to be few meetings at which at least a few copies were not disposed of. We suggest that in the interests of ringing, as well as in the interests of the Council's business, which in the long run is the concern of the affiliated bodies, associations should seriously consider taking off the Council's hands a considerable portion of their stock. One other result of this would be to enable the Council to go on with the publication of further works in the interests of the Exercise.

Somehody sat up late at Burton-on-Stather on July 31st, for we record this weck a landbell peal begun on that date and finisheil in August 1st, so that the ringing was spread not only over part of two days, but part of two monthis as well! It is the kind of performauce that cannot ver'y well be beaten unless some band will take an a peal that will need mote than in month to ring.
York Minster lias the uniqua recold of lowing had three potals uf twelve and a peal of ten in the course of its history. Its tower whe the first to contain a peal of twelve. That was in the year 2655 , hut in 1765 a new peal of ten to replace them was cast at Whitechapel, and these were opened on Angust 19th of that year. These bells wel's destroyed by fire in 1840 and znother ring of twalve roplaced tllem. These were succealed by the present glarious penl of twelve, cast at Loughborough.
The ringing 'week' in Lancashire and Cheshive onded on Sunday with a record of 14 successes in 16 attempts. The peals fucluled three of Double Norwich, four of Super'alive, three of Cambridge. one of Stednan Triples, two of Steduan Caters and one of Kent Treble Bob Regal. There ant mothing in all this connty finer in its way than this airy and spacious willage church of stome, a work as we see it af tho early of forur century. It is a cruciform building with fine cemberal tower of four stages splendidly ceiled, and consists of clerestorisd nave of two bays, with north and couth aisles, bransepts and chancel, with three doorways north, south and west of nave; the two formey alrangely far to the east, and the south doowsy haviny a porch. Tlie posilion of these two side doorways, perliaps, is due to the older church which eertainly stood here in Norman times, as the bowl (Continued in next column.)

## GUILDFORD DIOCESAN GUHLD.

'ГHE CENTTAL COUNCIL'S PUBLICATIONS
A pleasant meeting of the Fhrmham District of the Guidford Dincesan Guild was held at Hawley, an eight-bell tower, on Satnrduy. Although the gathering was not it large one, most of the alistrict towers were reprosented during the day, includling Aldershot, Ash, Bagshot, Farmbobongh, Taraham, Aawiey and Yorktown, while there were also ringers from Woking and a wil. come visitor in Mr. Maurice Hibbert, of Busley, who, seeking en afternoon in the contry, sumeeded in getting it by landing al th railway station three miles from his objective, and finding us means of reaching Hawley except by walking.

The Guild's service was ennlteted by the fector, whe, in his nddress, emplasised the need of personal example in the lives of all thoge who served the churcli. $A$ boumtiful tea was sarved in the Parish Room, and thoroughly enjoyed by the 23 who participated.

The Recter was thanlsed, on the call of Axhmital T. P. Walker, for the use of the bells and conducting the service, and thanks were tho extended to the ladies who plepared the tea, and to tho organist.

At the brief business meeting, over which Admiral Walker pre sided, as the Rectot had to leave for mother engagement, one anw manber was elected, and a discussion took place on the recomonendation of the Guik's Central Cauncil representatives that the Gumi should purclase, for resale to members, copies of some of the Coumeil's publications. ## SOME 'EXERCISE'!

If in one hundred jears' time our art is taken from us, we cen at lenst see to it that our ringing societies shall, afthough bereft of their bells continue as organised bodies down the pathway of time. Bera is a suggestion for what it is worlh; only we must organise at once.
I furaish an extract from 'Bengal Lancer' (Gollancz, Lhd.):
At Tughlakabad $\qquad$ - we found the hereditary well-jumpers of the Moghul court still plying their profession. In 1922 some twenty of these men were alive, and all still active, including the eddest, who was ainety-nine,
' The shaft was eighty feet deep and only eight feet wide, so that if the jumpers had taken off with the slightest outward impetus they would have hit the sides and killed themselves. The only way to reach the bottum in safety was to step off as if going down a stair, and this the old men did.

One after another they went down, making a noise like popping corks."
(One side of the well is cut away in a ramp to water level with Give arches in the shaft which enable spectators to see the performers fash by.-Ep.)

The eldest well-jumper ceme up to us, wringing his wet, white beard.
"Sabib, what are we to do with our boys," he asked. "Government has forbidden us to teach them to jump, saying it is dangerous, and that they must be educated. Are they to sit in achools with idol-worshippers instead of learning our ancient craft?"
" Who is to know whal you leach them?'s
" "That is truc," he chuckled, "and on bright nights we do still show them how the trick is done, beginning from the bottom archway. But their heads are so full of this new tyranny of education that I doubt whether they will ever have our skill."
So, there you are! Let us catch and train the younger generation now. Alternate Saturdays for 'Youths' and "Cumberlands' at Tower Bridge, commencing from the low level. Jumps from the top span to count as a peal of Cambridge Maximus. Other bridges on the river to be allotted to the junior London societies.

May I add that our certificate will in no wny be affected, as the descent from campanalogy to Thames is very clearly depited thereon.

## HOLT'S ORIGINAL.

TOUGEES FROM THE PESL.
'Lhe lamous one-part peal of Grandsire Triples, known as 'Holt's Uriginal', which was, so far as is known, the first peal of Grandsire Triples composed with ordimary bobs and two ordinary singles only, is a composition that all Grandsice conductors should aim at calling. Thare was a time when it was recognised as an outstandmg performance fo call this peai; and it is still one of the best proofs of a conductor's ability to memariso a difficult composition, True, it is no uncommon achievement in these days-another sign of the advance of the times-and a week or two ago we published the yecord of the peal being rung "noncundueted.' It was not the first time it lad been rung in this way, bub whenever it is done it is a performance which ranks ligh among notable peals. But when all is said and done, there are a great many Grandsire conductors who rather shrink from calling the "Original; not because it is really beyond them, but because of the application that is mecessary to memorise the calling. It is sometimes overlooked that scores of touches of various lengths can be got from the peal, and that practically the whole of this 'one-part cau be learnt and practised piecemeal.
For instance, a stari can be made on the first five hundred or so, a Loneh of 545 being obtained by ringing the first 33 leads producing: 476552

## A PEAKLAND EXCURSION.

The Overseal ringers' first trip to Peakland, which was made last vear, aroubed such keen interest in the liills and dales of Derbyshire that this year the ringers planner a sinilar tour. The first point of interest to be reacled was the wonderíul church of Hoar Gross, nca: Burton-on-Trent. Built by the beneficence of Lord and Lady Meynel!Engrith, this church possesses features such as may be found in few churches of its size. Beautifully proportioned and rich in carving of wook and stone, its beauty holds one spellbound. Leaving Hoar Crows, the party passed on to the very old town of Abbot's Bromley, whre the ancient market hall is still intact. Its Tudor buildings take us back to the days of 'Bluff King Hal,' and mays are the good old tales of Abbot's Bromley in the 'good old days.' From here they writi in wia Wetley Rocks and Cheadle to Leek, 'the metropolis of to moorlands.' It saw mauch of tho struggies of the Stuart period, theiry a garrison town of Charles I. Its ancieut clurch has many isteresting features, including curious epitaphs.
After an excellent lunch at the Red Lion Hotel, the drive took tha company out of Leek to the top of Morridge, and, passicg via Onecote company out of Leek to the ade of Morridge, and, passing viatanecote arder to tatea a trip by the narrow gauge railway down the wonderful Manifold Valley. This valley is rich in caves and recently many relics, inchuing Roman coins, bave been unearthed. Leaving Hulme End, liez travelied on to the pretty village of Hartington. Nesting in Lhe walley, this rillage was beloved of Joln Cotton and Isanc Waiton, 'Thas Compleat Angler.' The road then lay by way of Olstonfield and Hopedale to Ilam, and 85 a thrilling experience the 'drop ' into Tiam compares very favourably with the 'suake' at Castieton. The sextan only wes with the party this time, but his services were not -equired, as the burs and driver were both equal to the task. Passing through Ilurn, the Isaac Walton Hotel was reached, and, after a goal tea, a ramble in beautiful Dovedale was enjoyed. May field was then rencled, where the hells were tried. The old church, whth its bullet-scarred doorway and door, and striet Puritan severity, forms a matked contrast with the church of Hoar Cross. Leaving Mayfield, Mre routo lay through Ellastone and the old town of Uttoxeter to Tuthury, famous for its old castle. And then through Burton-onThenc to Overseal.
