## A GREAT SOCIETY.

To-morrow nembers of the Ancient Society of College Youths from all over the country will assemble in Lonclon to celebrate the $293^{\text {rd }}$ anniversary of the foundation of the society. This gathering, by far the largest event of its kind in the ringing calendar, seems to grow in popular favour every year, and were it open to ladies, as are the social gatherings in other parts of the country, would expand with a bound. It is, however, not only difficulties of accommodation which limit the party. A conservative policy of the society itself-which, for one brief perios, admitted ladies'to membership and then recanted-now restricts the dinner to gentlemen almost. but not absolutely.

The conservatism of the College Youths is one of its traditions, but that is not to say that the members have not kept abreast of all that is best in the advancement of ringing. The College Youths have a history of neaty three hundred years and those who are responsible for its management endeavour to live up to that bistory. To some people this tranquil progress which has been pursued through the centuries, which has been almost undeviating since the days when Charles I. was on the throne, may seem out of date and antiquated, but there are some respects in which it is to be encouraged. Since. change ringing began the College Youths have been all the very centre and core of the Exercise; indeed, the society has been from the first one of the pillars round which the Exercise has woven itself, and ramified throughout the country. It is only in the last fifty or sixty years that the territorial socicties have conse into existence; before that it was the College Youths and at very few societies of a like nature that kept alight the torch of change ringing and enabled the expansion of the last half century to be made. For its part in maintaining the art in the past, the Exercise owes it a debt and ringers look up to it as the doyen of alt ringing societies.

There is stilt, however, about its proceedings-which necessarily centre chiefly in the Metropolis--a spirit or aloofness and exclusiveness which is not unnoticed by those outside. This spirit may be inhred through the traditions which are behind the society, but in these days of the wider brotherhood among ringers, it seems, though we cannot for a moment think it is really intended, at title austere. London may be somewhat crowded with ringing socicties; in places they may be treating on each other's toes, but there certainly is scope in London for a greater intermingling of organisations. A policy of isolation is entirely out of keeping with the spirit of the alsein ringing as in other things. The goodwill which finds (Continued on page 7l0.)

A very enjoyable eqeaing was spent on Monday, October 27th, in the Church Room, at Nortan-in-the-Moors, Staffs, on the occasion of is presentation to Mr. J. E. Wheeldon, leader of the belfry. At the kind invitation of the Rector (Kev. J. G. Hamlet) and Mrs. Hamlet he foilowing were prasent at tea: Messrs. J, E. Wheeldon, W. C. Lawrence, J. Walley, F. Triner, W. Corfield, H. Wibberley, S. Ryles, C. Williams, J. Walker and G. W. Walker. Apologies were received fram Mr. G. Lawrence, Mr. J. Mothatford (ringers), and from Mr. W. Jack, people's warden.
In proposing the toast, Mr. G. W. Walker referred to the capabilities of Nir. Whecldon as a change ringer, and also to the admirable way in which ho had controlled the belfry at Norton for the past 30 years. Mr: Walker expressed the mish, an behalf of those present, that lio night be able to cerry out his dubies for many years to come.
At the conclusion of the tea, upwards of fifty people assembled to wituegs the presentation to Mr. Wheeldon, which was in the form of
cheque. In prescnting the gift, the Rector referred to the work that harl been done in connection with the church during 1929-1930. It would stand as a record. He wanted specially to record the work None in connection with the bells, which had been recast and rebung during 3930 , and also to record the thiply years' loyal and faithful sorwiee of Mr. Wheekton, who hat worked assiduously during these years, nnd particularly in belping to raise funds for the bells scheme. In asking Mr. Wheeldon to accept the cheque, the Rector expressed the wish tiazt Mr. and Mrs. Wheeldon would be favorred with good heallh and a happy ifo.
In thanking the Rector, churchwardeas, and paristioners for their yenmous gift, Mr. Wheelen said that during his yoars of leadership 1 Norton he had always been happy. He had always endeavoured instil inta the ringers their responsibility as churchmen. Conchining he spoke of the ready help that had always been forthcoming from his fellow-ringers, and said lie had many happy refections from their companionship, and hoped that he might still be allowed to contipue his associations.
Mr. W. Lawrence and Mr. A. Walley expressed their pleasure at wing present, and supported what had begn said by the Rector.
Tho resti of the evering was spent in a happy mood, when gongs and short stories were contributed liy the friends preseat. Mr. S . Moreton and Wiss Sillitoe supplied the music for dancing. At the close af the evening the Rector ruanked all those who had helped to muke the evening in success.

## BELLS RESTORED AT DEDDINGTON.

## AN ENGLISH OAK FRAME.

On Saturday afternoon the Bishop of Oxford dedieated the newly rehung ring of bells at Deddington, Oxfordshire, in the presence of a large congregation. The bells were raised previous to the service, which was conducted by the Vicar, and took the form of a shorlaned oveusong. The lesson was read by tho Rop. C. W. O. Jenkyn, Master of the Oxford Diocesan Guild, immediatoly after which the Bishop, clergy and churchwardens proceeded to the towor, where, at the requesf of the churchwardent, the Bishop offered the customary dedicatory prayers. In his excellent sermon the Bishop referred eapecially to tho uses andi customs connected with bolls, and said he hoped that the sound of the bella ringing out Sunday by Sunday would turn the thoughts of those living nearby to God and tho church and thair duties as Christians.
After the eervice several touches of Grandsire and Stedman Doubles and Plain Bob Minor were rung by members of the Diocesma Guild from Banbury, Appleton, Caversham, Reading, Adderbury, Bodicote, Launton, and the local band.
The work of rehanging has been most satisfactorily earried out by Mr. Richard White, of Appleton, who bas put in a znassivo framo of beautiful English oak, on a foundation of four very massive oak beams, under which are two rolled steel girdors encased in concreto.
The canons have been rotained on tho bells, which have been lung to headstocks made from some of the finest seasoned elm in the country, and fitted with self-aligning ball bearings of the latest pattorn. The whole is a very finn piece of master ernftsmanship, and the find timber-very rare in these days-of which the framo is composed is well worth inspection. The bells go heautifully, and it is moped that in the near futura two trebles will be added to completc the octave, Provision has been made in the frame for these additional bells. The present six are a 'maiden' neal east by Thomas Mears in 1791, and all bear the same iuser'ption, viz. ' 'Thos, Mears, late Lester, Pack and Chapman, of London, feeit 1791.' They ave in the key of $\mathbf{E}$, and the tenor is 17 cwt. 10 lb . There is also a small sanctus bell inscribed Anthony Basely, Richard Large, C.W., 1649."
The tower was rebuilt about 1663 . It is a very massive structure, worthy of a ring of eight, as is, indeed, the grand old church. The town stands on a slight hill, and the tower is a landmerk for miles. Its predecessor fell down in 1635 , ant in 1643 Charles I. deranaded the bells, which, as he explained, wore of no use to the churcha as the tower had recently fallen, and so they wore carled into Oxford and made into guns.

## THE FIRST PEAL AT BUCKFAST.

## THE ABBEY AND ITS BELLS.

Oug of the most inferesting peal riggiag achievements of itis year whe tho lirst peal on the twelvo bells at Buckfase Abber, Devon, on Sulluray week, the prrticulars of which appor clsemiere in this ixwle
Aiflough Buckfast Abbey, which stands on the lanks of the River Dher, las been remstablished only about fifty years, "its foundation is low in antiquity, It dates back at least to has latter lage of the 9th m-nthy and, with the exception of a periad in the reign of William Enfus, when its lands were distribuied among the King's favourites, it flourished up ta the timo of the Dissalulion. Its resurrection dates twon 1882, when monke, dispersed by tite Jirench Government from Ihn" Ablocy of La Pjerre-que-vire, weve offered the clannce to purchase what remained of the Abbey. Their decision to acquire the property whs in venture of great fath, hut Caminuls, Bishops and distinguished latmen of the Rosnan Catholie Chureh showed then sympathy in unnaistakable lermb. First the abbol's towet was reatored and a tempmiary chameh eructed. The foundations of the ancieut Abluey were exchtated, and a young architect, Mr. Trederick A. Walters, was emtrustod with the care of supervising everybing and preparing the plans. After at lapse of motrly half a century, be still has a guiding fitul on the work of restoration which, beginning verw slowly, has
fone an evor since, brathers of tho Ovdet havitg hein trataed as cruitimen and lieving executerl the work.
fomekfask was made a separate commanily, distimet from that of
 masad to the dignity oll an independent Abbey. The tirst abbot of
 Joniface Natiev, who lost lis Jifo in as shipwreck nff the Spanish consl, while on lis wry to fulds a missian in South Amerien. His companion on that tragic voyage, Dom Arscar Fonier, was ruseued, funt was alestinci to sticced him as atobot. Abbot Natter lad longed tu undetake the rebuiding of the Abbey Chureln ai Buckfast. Alitid Avscut, immediately on his election, struck a bold line, and jnlomad the warld that be wanted to rebuila the chmod in mermory of him predecessor. He had ono capafule mason tor the work, but no money, but contributions began to come jn, and the livit stone was Iaid in January, 1907. Everyono must admire the spirit of faith Liat ianed the enterprige, and the perseverance that has carried it on minil final achifvement lies in the near future.

## A DIFFICULT PLACE TO RING IN

Tho peal ruag on Baturday weck had been long contemplatect. 'big noise,' most of the sound travolling down the space between the galleries.
